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# Tourism Debuts Country's Most Advanced State Tourism Website and Database

The West Virginia Division of Tourism recently began using a customized tourism database system – the most advanced in the country, tourism officials said.

The system allows callers to the State's 1-800-CALL-WVA tourism hotline, as well as visitors to the division's website, to receive instant fulfillment of their information requests. The database generates the information and, with a few clicks, Division of Tourism travel counselors can send callers a personalized letter or e-mail that contains the information the caller requested.

The Internet-based database features more than 8,000 listings of statewide tourism facilities, events, and activities. Another unique feature is that the State's tourism companies and organizations can update their own information instantly via the web, ensuring that the most upto-the-minute information is always available.

Gov. Bob Wise was on hand for the introduction of the new system and spoke personally with one of the first callers.

"This system is an exceptional example of the best West Virginia


can be," Wise said. "A public/private partnership worked together to develop a system that uses cutting edge information technology while emphasizing personalized, 24-hour customer service. The development and use of this system show the innovative and creative energy our government and our State businesses share."

## **Bananas - A Bunch of Goodness**

They're a fun food - a favorite of kids and adults alike - and the most popular fruit in the world. So why promote bananas when everyone likes them already? Because they're *SERIOUS* food! Bananas should be more than an occasional snack, more than dessert, and more than pie filling. You should eat them on purpose. They're just that good for you.

Consider this bundle of benefits from "big yellow":

They're high in potassium, which means bananas can lower the risk of high blood pressure and related diseases like heart attack and stroke. If you already have high blood pressure, eating bananas may help.

Bananas keep bad cholesterol from oxidizing and sticking to your artery walls. One researcher at the University of Mississippi Medical Center says we should think of foods like bananas the same way we think of love and money: You just can't get too much!

They can assist in keeping your stomach in order. Bananas are a natural antacid. Eat one if you have heartburn and you may not need anything else. Some studies show bananas help to heal stomach ulcers and may guard the stomach against harsh substances.

They're "regular" food. After a bout with a stomach virus, they can replensih your vital fluids and nutrients.

The next time you get that twinge of hunger, grab a "naner"... and as an added bonus, you can recycle the peel. Roses love banana peels. Simply spread the peel sections around the base of your rose plants for natural fertilizer. The only thing you need to throw away is the brand sticker!

### Women's Cancer Treatment Cost Fears Eased

A woman diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer goes through many emotions, not the least of which is fear. As of April 1, 2001, part of the fear may be alleviated. Uninsured women under age 65 who have been diagnosed with either forms of cancer under the CDC Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program or by a public or private provider approved by the West Virginia Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program (BCCSP) can get coverage for treatment under the State Medicaid Program.

"A woman who is a mother, a wife, or daughter doesn't need go through the terror of cancer and the anxiety of being uninsured," said Governor Bob Wise, as quoted from the March 21, 2001 issue of the *Wetzel Chronicle*. Wise continued, "I'm sure every West Virginian will applaud the fact we're able to help

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more than a year's work between the division and Citynet, West Virginia's largest Internet company.

"This partnership with Citynet gives us an incredible database system that provides the public with quick, customized West Virginia travel information and puts tourism businesses in control of the information we provide callers and website visitors," she said. "We think it's the nation's most advanced tourism information system, and it was built with no upfront cost to the State."

The new system can be used to respond to any inquiry regardless of origin – web, e-mail, telephone, regular mail, or fax. Visitors to the division's website (www.callwva.com), now have 24-hour-a-day access to the same information that tourism employees provide to those who call the division's 1-800-CALL-WVA hotline. Additionally, the system allows the Division of Tourism to gather more accurate caller information. This research is important in tracking the effectiveness of the State's advertising campaigns, Bailey said.

"We'll still be mailing travel guides and brochures to our callers, but that's in addition to the instant e-mails and faxes they'll receive. This system gives us the ability to offer a whole new level of fast and very personalized customer service."

Citynet will begin marketing the new product to other jurisdictions and has already received inquiries from as far away as Europe and Asia, said Citynet CEO Jim Martin.

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these women. They need all the support they can get when presented with the diagnosis of cancer."

Diagnosed women will be given a confirmation card which identifies them as a BCCSP participant. The card will be signed by the medical provider and attached to a simplified Medicaid eligibility form. There is no income or asset testing; therefore, if the forms are accurately completed, the card should be issued in about 4 weeks. This will not delay treatment eligible women may begin treatment immediately.

The card is valid for the duration of the cancer treatment. In addition to the treatments, the insured women will be eligible for any services included in the State Medicaid plan, allowing them access to routine and acute health care services, pharmacy services, and other covered items.


