West Virginia Office of Technology Improves Customer Service with Consolidation

Although the word "consolidation" may not always invoke a positive reaction, at the West Virginia Office of Technology (WVOT), the consolidation of information technology (IT) personnel within State government over the last several months is proving to be quite constructive and viewed as a positive step in efficiency and cost-savings.

To date, approximately 94 employees have joined the WVOT team from four State agencies. Additional outside hires have also been made to fill vacancies in the organization. The four agencies are the Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of Health and Human Resources, the Department of Transportation, and the Department of Commerce.

The consolidation means an increase to approximately 11,000 customers for which the WVOT now serves. Four additional agencies which will be brought into the WVOT organization in the upcoming months are the Department of Military Affairs and Public Safety, the Department of Education and the Arts, the Department of Revenue, and the Department of Administration.

"There were perceived negatives that response times would take longer and the quality of service would suffer," said Kathy Moore, WVOT's Director of Client Services Delivery. "Our survey responses show this is not the case. Our collaborative approach is working well.

The Service Desk staff is able to resolve a large number of problems during the initial call. They now have the ability to use remote access tools so they can work interactively with the users to resolve technical problems."

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West Virginian Receives Adoption Award

cuses on bringing together key leaders to strengthen the partnerships that support successful practice with children and families.



WV Agriculture Commissioner Urges Farmers to Respond to AG Census

West Virginia Commissioner of Agriculture Gus R. Douglass is urging State farmers to watch their mailboxes for Census of Agriculture forms, which should arrive sometime in early January 2008. The completed forms are due back by February 4, 2008.

"West Virginia was number three in the country in terms of response rate in the last Census in 2002, and I encourage all our farmers to reply this year," said Commissioner Douglass. "The Census gives all farmers a voice, regardless of the size of their operation, and provides decision-makers at all levels with valuable information about the state of agriculture throughout the United States."

The states with higher response percentages than West Virginia in the last Census were Alaska, with 600 farms, and Rhode Island, with 800. West Virginia has 21,200 farms, leading the U.S. in the percentage of family-owned farms.

"To have that level of response from a comparatively large number of operations really says something about the farmers in West Virginia," said Dale King, Director of USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service – West Virginia Field Office, located at the West Virginia Department of Agriculture's (WVDA) headquarters at Guthrie.

King stresses that census data has a multitude of uses: Government leaders use it for decisions concerning agricultural and rural programs; companies may use Census data when determining where to locate their operations; and farmers themselves look at Census data to formulate their own production strategies.

Conducted every five years by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), the Census is a complete count of the nation's farms and ranches and the people who operate them. The Census looks at land use and ownership, operator characteristics, production practices, income and expenditures, and other topics. It provides the only source of uniform, comprehensive agricultural data for every county in the nation.

Producers can return their forms by mail, but for the first time, they have the convenient option of filling out the Census online via a secure website.

Eight Governor's Portraits Restored and Returned to State Capitol

The West Virginia Division of Culture and History has announced that Page Conservation of Washington, D.C. has completed restoration on eight more governor's portraits. The restored portraits were re-hung this month on the hallway walls of the State Capitol Building's main floor. This is the second group of portraits the company has restored. When this group of oil paintings were delivered, the final 10 were picked up.

The portraits returned include Ephraim Morgan, Emanuel Wilson, Matthew Neely, Okey Patteson, William McCorkle, Aretas Fleming, Clarence Meadows, and Jacob Jackson.

Page Conservation specializes in restoring paintings which are in distress because of dirt, yellowing varnish, cracks, and support problems that can cause distortions. The restoration project began last year after Division of Culture and History staff began noticing loose canvas, discoloration, environmental changes, and blanching. The company has, in some cases, had to do inpainting in areas of damage or missing paint.

Upon completion, 30 governor's portraits will have benefitted from the restoration process. The restoration project is a collaboration between the Division of Culture and History and the Department of Administration.

The primary account is the financial institution to where you want your net pay sent each pay period. Secondary accounts are financial institutions to where you want specific amounts sent each pay period.


I travel on State business. What exactly is a Travel Primary Account?

Medicaid Bureau Partners with WVU School of Medicine

The West Virginia Bureau for Medical Services (the Bureau) and the West Virginia University (WVU) School of Medicine have entered into an agreement for project management services for a set of federal grants known as transformation initiative grants and Mountain Health Choices, the State's new Medicaid program.

The Bureau has been in the process of redesigning the Medicaid program since 2005 with the ultimate goal of improving the health of low-income West Virginians.

West Virginia received five Medicaid transformation grants totaling \$13.8 million from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services for the purpose of transforming the program. Dr. Jeffrey H. Coben, professor of emergency medicine and community medicine at the WVU School of Medicine will serve as the project manager of the transformation grant project. Coben and his team will assist the Bureau in promoting health through personal responsibility and through improvements in the health care system.

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Moore said when problems cannot be resolved at the WVOT Service Desk, queries are resolved through on-site visits or are assigned to teams working in specialized support areas.

"When high impact outages occur, our Service Desk handles the communications with both customers and management so the troubleshooting and response staff can focus on the situation at hand," Moore said. She estimated that since the consolidation began, the WVOT averages 6,000 telephone calls and e-mails each month from State agencies. Since June of 2007, a satisfaction survey is sent monthly to a random 20 percent of customers asking questions about their experience with the WVOT service and staff. With approximately 20 percent of the recipients responding, Moore said WVOT is seeing favorable results.

On questions relating to WVOT staff being knowledgeable, courteous, able to resolve issues in a timely manner, and their overall satisfaction, responses have consistently rated in the 92-97 percent range for the combined "strongly agree/agree somewhat" categories, with a small fraction of responses falling in the combined "neutral," "disagree somewhat," and "strongly disagree" categories.

Even with the outstanding reviews, Moore is taking nothing for granted. "When we receive less than favorable ratings from our customers," Moore said, "we follow up and determine if there is something we can improve upon, or that we can use to enhance our service. Our goal has always been and always will be to constantly improve our customer service."
