### CHIP to Introduce Voluntary Medical Home Program

The West Virginia Children's Health Insurance Program (WVCHIP) proposes to implement a voluntary Medical Home Program for its members during 2007. Currently, only members with a household income between 150-200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) must pay a co-payment for an office visit, excluding preventive services. With the voluntary medical home, all members are subject to co-payments for non-well visits outside their designated medical home.

Under this plan, a member may choose a medical home provider from the WVCHIP medical home directory to avoid co-payments for non-well visits. Members will pay co-payments when a medical home is not designated. In addition, copayments still apply for office visits to providers outside the member's medical home. Co-payments for nonmedical home visits are based on family income and range between \$5 for members below 150% FPL. \$15 for members between 150-200% FPL and \$20 for members above 200% FPL. Income guidelines for the most current FPL's are listed on the WVCHIP application guide and at its website, www.wvchip.org.

Adoption of this change will encourage more comprehensive, coordinated primary care, emphasizing prevention, as described and recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics. Medical home providers and parents act as partners to identify and access all medical and non-medical services needed to help children and their families achieve their maximum potential.

### **First Presidential Dollar Coin Released**

The U.S. Mint has unveiled designs for its newest additions: dollar coins that will feature deceased presidents on a rotating basis, similar to the popular state quarters.



The gold-colored George Washington coin is the first to be released. Like the Sacagawea dollar, the new coin is slightly larger than a quarter -9.2% larger. The front of the coin shows a new portrait of George Washington, along with his years of presidency, and the denomination.

The back of the coins will not change during the series. It shows the Statue of Liberty as it appears on the 2001 New York quarter, and \$1 appears for the first time on a circulated U.S. coin.

### YOU'VE STILL GOT TIME ... ... TO REDUCE YOUR 2006 TAXABLE INCOME

Reduce your taxable income for 2006 and plan for your future at the same time. You have until April 16, 2007 to make contributions to an Individual Retirement Account (IRA). The maximum IRA contribution for 2006 is \$4,000 (\$5,000 if you are age 50 or older by the end of the year). To qualify for the full deduction, you must either:

- ☑ Not be eligible to participate in a company retirement plan OR
- ☑ If eligible, your adjusted gross income must be less than \$50,000 for singles or less than \$75,000 for married couples filing jointly\*.

There is more than one type of IRA. To find out what's best for you, consult a trusted financial advisor. For information purposes only: Many banks, credit unions, insurance agents, accountants, investment firms, and other financial sources offer this service.

\*NOTE: The amount for married couples increases to \$80,000 for 2007

# **News From the Medical Front**

### WEIGHTLIFTERS: DON'T HOLD YOUR BREATH!

A team of researchers at the Manhattan Eye, Ear, and Throat Hospital have concluded that lifting weights improperly can cause an increase in potentially damaging eye pressure and the development of glaucoma.

Whether you're a body builder lifting very heavy weights or in a routine pressing 150-pounders, the study, conducted by Dr. Robert Rich, found that the risk of these conditions is greater in those weightlifters who hold their breath during repetitions.

The study looked at pressure in the inner eyes of men ages 18 to 40. He found intraocular pressure increased significantly (but temporarily) during four repetitions of a 150-pound bench press if the men held their breath. On the other hand, Dr. Richard Bensinger, chair of the Eye Department at Seattle's Swedish Hospital disagrees, believing there is no correlation.

Anyone who has concerns is urged to discuss them with his or her doctor.
