Division of Protective Services Issues Reminder

A recent in-house security assessment of the Capitol Complex's secured areas was conducted and has prompted the Division of Protective Services (DPS) to remind all State employees to prominently display their State-issued photo ID cards at all times while in secured Capitol Complex buildings. Although an employee may be wearing his or her ID card, a DPS officer may stop the employee to inquire of the individual's identity and nature of business in the secured building if it is not prominently displayed. Wearing photo ID cards in a visible manner negates the necessity of DPS officers to stop employees for identification purposes.

Employees are also reminded to always use their proximity cards when entering secured Capitol Complex buildings. Do not lend or permit another individual to use your card and never allow entry of other individuals when entering a building (tailgating). Allowing others to tailgate seriously hampers the Division's efforts to provide a safe and secure working environment. Although an employee may want to perform a courteous act by opening a door for another individual, it's considered tailgating and is in direct violation of the West Virginia Division of Personnel's Workplace Security Policy (DOP-P15). It may also allow someone with ill intent to enter and has the potential to create a dangerous situation.

If you lose or forget your proximity card, you must undergo the same screening procedure that visitors and other non-employees follow when entering secured buildings. Lost cards should be reported to your supervisor or other designated individual immediately.

In some cases, State employees whose offices are not physically located on the complex but visit it to attend meetings, etc. have been issued proximity cards and are not required to pass through the Directed Public Access Points located in Buildings 3 and 7. They are able to enter at doors equipped with a card reader. Off-campus employees are to also prominently display their state-issued photo ID while in secured Capitol Complex buildings.

The largest security force of any organization is its employees, as they are an invaluable aid in assuring their workplace is a safe and secure environment. Employees can greatly assist the Division of Protective Services in creating a safer and more secure workplace by merely using their eyes and ears to be constantly aware of "who" and "what" are around their work areas. Employees are directly responsible for maintaining a higher level of safety and security by: ensuring a door closes securely after entry; not propping open a door or otherwise causing it

Eat Family Meals. Although this is more a stress reliever for everyone in the family, mom benefits greatly too. You can raise happy, healthy, loving, and responsible kids, and eating together as a family is an easy step toward accomplishing this goal – and that reduces your stress. It also helps kids learn to use their own body signals to eat just until they are full.

The research is in, and whether you're a stay-at-home mom, a work-outside-the-home mom, a single mom, or a mom-to-be, it's proven that happier moms = happier kids!

Is Retirement in Your Near Future?

Thinking about retirement can be a scary thing. The trick is to reduce your stress by allowing plenty of time to get things processed. The Consolidated Public Retirement Board (CPRB) advises employees who are covered under the Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) and who are contemplating retirement in the coming year to do the following:

- ② Contact the PERS at least six months piror to the date you anticipate making application for retirement.
- © Complete and submit a Benefit Estimate Request form (available at www.wvretirement.com/forms/PERSBenefitEstimateRequest.pdf).
- Schedule an appointment with a PERS Retirement Advisor to discuss eligibility and retirement specifics. Be sure to bring all needed documents, including your birth certificate and, if appropriate, marriage certificate. Copies can be made at the PERS Office. Many questions can also be answered over the phone, which will save you valuable time when you meet with your advisor.
- Keep a list of questions and concerns so that you can discuss them with your advisor when you meet.

Employees are strongly advised to NOT terminate employment until they have at least received their estimate of benefits and retirement eligibility.

Still have a few years to go? CPRB advises employees who are within five years of retiring to take the Division of Personnel's *Heading into Retirement* course. The class addresses topics such as PERS benefits, deferred compensation, insurance information, and Social Security. Even if you will become eligible within the next five years, but don't have plans to retire at that time, the information offered could be of valuable assistance to you.

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to not secure properly which allows non-authorized individuals access to a secure building; never allowing entry of other individuals (tailgating) when they are entering a building; reporting to the Division of Protective Services any type of abandoned and/or suspicious-looking package, backpack, etc.; reporting any suspicious activity in or near their facility's entry/exit points, loading locks, parking lots, and garage areas; asking individuals not displaying a state-issued photo ID while in a secured building the purpose of their visit, and notifying their immediate supervisor, the Division of Protective Services (558-9911), or calling 911 if they know or suspect any person such as a fellow employee, visitor, vendor, etc., possesses a firearm or other dangerous/deadly weapon, or that any person is engaged in threatening behavior or language while on State Capitol grounds. Under no circumstances should any employee attempt to confiscate any firearm or dangerous/deadly weapon from any individual.
