kon, July 1, employees will begin receiving an across-the-board pay raise of\$756 annually. Also most employ-

ees will notice changes in their insurance premiums. The amount of change in each person's paycheck will be different, depending on tax deductions and insurance premiums.

In addition, eligible employees who have 3 or more years of qualifying service will receive an annual increment check along with their regular paycheck on July 31, 2000. Fifty dollars (\$50) is paid for **each** year of qualifying service, **up to a maximum of 20 years.**

#### 2000 Summer Performers Series

The 2000 Summer Performers Series is set at various parks and offers something interesting for all ages. Call for dates/locations of the following; admission is free.

*Karen Vuranch* stars in a oneperson show about Mary Draper Ingles on the frontier. Ingles was captured by Shawnee Indians and taken west. She escaped and followed the Ohio, Kanawha, and New Rivers for over 450 miles in 42 days to return home.

Traditional Appalachian dance and modern line dancing instruction will be lead by *Lou Maiuri*. He's the director and founder of Appalachian County Cloggers and is known throughout the U.S. for his line dancing and teaching abilities. Maiuri has years of experience as a mountainstyle square dancer, caller, and dance instructor, and has won many competition awards, including 3 national championships in his age division.

Mountain Women offer visitors a unique experience in story telling. *Suzie Whapples and Carrie Newman*, both West Virginia natives, entertain children and adults with stories of childhood in the mountains and homespun songs.

*Gary Boothe*, a magician and children's entertainer, performs magic and balloon artistry with a twist. Gary started in magic in the late 80's and was then asked to speak to numerous schools and camps about environmental and recycling issues. He found that he could hold the kids' attention and still give a good message by using simple magic.

Three River Avian Center's Birds of Prey Education Program features live birds of prey native to the Mountain State. A variety of live raptors, including hawks and owls, will be on display. The program covers habitat, diet, and behavior of each bird presented, and includes information on common injuries and protective laws. This is a very informative and interesting program, and cameras are permitted.

Second is failing to install patches, especially for Microsoft Office, Microsoft Internet Explorer, and Netscape browsers. Coming in third is installing games or screen savers from unknown sources.

What's the bottom line? Beware of anything you open in e-mail or download and/or install on your computer.

# Capitol Security Guard Wins \$100,000 Powerball Prize

Coworkers of Michael Calhoun, a security guard at the State Capitol, might be surprised to see a "Gone Fishing" sign in his place for a little while. Calhoun was as surprised as anyone else when he looked at the West Virginia Lottery's winning Powerball numbers in the newspaper one Thursday morning last month to find he had matched 5 of the 6 numbers, only missing the Powerball itself.

At 7:00 A.M., Calhoun said he began to call his friends to share the good news. Within an hour, a group had gathered at his home for a celebration breakfast. Calhoun said disbelief seemed to be the most common reaction, followed closely by, "How much?"

For matching 5 numbers, Lottery Director John Musgrave said the answer to that question is \$100,000 cash.

Calhoun said he purchased his winning ticket at Shop & Go on Washington Street in Charleston. He used *Easy Pick* to choose his winning numbers.

established in 1972 by Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, Senator Robert Taft, Jr., and Sam Beard, are presented by the American Institute for Public Service to rebuild public trust and encourage community involvement by saluting the "Best of America" today's heroes. They are presented on 2 levels: local and national. On the local level, recipients are comprised of ordinary people who do extraordinary things without expectation or reward. Nominations to the national level come from a myriad of media sponsors, including newspapers, television and radio stations, and cable systems which solicit them at the local level. One representative from each media sponsor is chosen by the Institute's Board of Selectors to attend the Jefferson Awards National Ceremony at the U.S. Supreme Court Building in

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Uniform deductions for the increment checks are as follows:

State Tax:	4.00%	(0.0400)
FICA:	7.65%	(0.0765)
Retirement:	<b>4.50%</b>	(0.0450)

Previously, a flat 28% was deducted for federal taxes; however, this year, employees will see an increase in the take-home amounts of their annual increment checks due to a different way of calculating the federal tax.

Though you should always check each paystub, be especially mindful for both of your July paychecks and report any discrepancies immediately to *your agency payroll office*.

## Law Enforcement Officer Training Set

The 2000 West Virginia Prosecuting Attorneys Institute Law Enforcement Training will be conducted in 5 West Virginia cities this August. Targeting West Virginia law enforcement officers, these sessions will be conducted free of charge from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. as follows:

Aug. 7:	Shepherdstown, Clarion Hotel	Aug. 10: Huntington (Marshall University)
Aug. 8:	Morgantown (WVU College of Law)	Aug. 11: Beckley (Beckley Mining Acad.)
Aug. 9:	Sutton (Flatwoods Days Inn)	

Funded by a grant awarded by the Governor's Office and administered through the Division of Criminal Justice Services, this training will address such topics as the Fourth Amendment (search and seizure issues); legislative and case law updates; driving under the influence; testifying in court, and domestic violence.

The Institute's staff and county-elected prosecutors and assistant prosecutors will conduct the sessions. All law enforcement officers in the State are encouraged to attend.
