# IS&C's Matt Brown Elected President of National Telecommunicators Association

Congratulations goes to Matt Brown of the Information Services and Communications Division (IS&C) on his recent election as President of the National Association of State Telecommunications Directors (NASTD).


Brown has been actively involved with the association for a number of years and has held several positions within the association. He served as Eastern Region President (1994), Chairman of the Corporate Relations Committee (1995), Association Secretary/Treasurer (1996), and Association Vice President and National Program Chair (1997). Brown will serve as president for a one-year term.

NASTD is an association that is committed to providing leadership in the sharing of information among states, advancing telecommunications public policy, and developing the national telecommunications infrastructure - all to improve the operational efficiency of state governments.

Representatives from the 50 United States of America, Washington, D.C., and other U.S. Territories comprise NASTD's membership. State membership is open to regular, full-time state employees who are primarily responsible for providing and managing telecommunication services for their state. Each state has one vote in association activities. In addition, a Corporate Affiliate Program was established in 1987 to provide an avenue for private sector vendors to participate; however, affiliate members do not have voting privileges.

The NASTD Annual Conference and Trade Show (held this year in September in Denver, Colorado) provides an opportunity to improve telecommunications support for the states through the exchange of ideas, concepts, and technological information. It is designed to promote an information-sharing environment and foster collaboration between key state decision makers and leadingedge telecommunications providers. In addition, regional meetings are held annually in each of 4 regions: South, East, West, and Midwest.

West Virginia has been a member of the association since 1992.

# **DOH Earns State and National Wellness Awards**

The West Virginia Department of Transportation/Division of Highways (DOT/DOH) has been judged one of West Virginia's and the nation's healthiest places to work. The Wellness Council of West Virginia (WCWV) made the State award; the national award was given by the Wellness Councils of America. The DOT/DOH received its recognition at the WCWV Twelfth Annual Governor's Conference on Worksite Wellness, October 15-16, at the Charleston Marriott.

Companies participate in a lengthy application process for Well Workplace awards and are measured according to rigorous national standards defined by the Wellness Councils of America (WELCOA), a national not-for-profit organization with more than 2500 member companies throughout the country. To date, 300 companies nationally and 75 West Virginia companies have achieved Well Workplace status.

The DOT/DOH received the coveted Well Workplace Silver designation by creating a work environment that encourages lifestyle improvement through a comprehensive system of employee health and wellness services.

The most notable accomplishment of the program has been the continuation of the DOT/DOH Health Fair, which has provided an annual health fair to all employees for the past 8 years at no cost. The health screenings received by the participants have been the instrument through which many employees become aware of serious health problems or risk factors likely to result in serious illness, and have led employees to seek medical help or to become involved in some form of medical intervention.

"It is a great honor to be recognized by the Wellness Councils of America and the Wellness Council of West Virginia for our Worksite Wellness Program," said Sam Beverage, Commissioner of the Division of Highways. He continued, "To be judged as one of the nation's healthiest workplaces is an outstanding accomplishment. I believe the mission of the DOT/DOH and the mission of the Worksite Wellness Program are perfectly compatible and, in fact, complement each other. Adding wellness to the organizational plan guarantees successful completion of projects now and a positive, healthy responsive staff in the future. ## Capitol Parking Garage Plan Enters Reality Stage

That long-discussed, long-awaited Capitol Complex parking garage has become more than just talk. Last May, a Request for Proposal was sent out for bids on a 700+ space building to be built on a rear portion of the parking lot behind Building 3. Bids were opened in July, and a contract was awarded to Carlton Construction Company.

The proposal included plans for an elevator and for accessibility to people with disabilities. At this time, assignment of spaces will be approximately a third for State employees, with a few rented out to vendors and the remainder for the general public. Parking fees for employees will probably be at the standard \$15/ month rate. Vendors will pay more, and the charge for the public will be determined at a date closer to completion of the project.

Construction on the building is set to begin this month, requiring the relocation of about 250 parking spaces. Cost of the project is about \$5.6 million, with completion expected in June, 1999.

The West Virginia University (WVU) School of Social Work and Public Administration, Division of Social Work,

## Jackpot Generates Record Profits: State Receives \$500 Million Since 1986

The \$295 million Powerball jackpot in July generated an unprecedented \$18 million in profits for programs benefiting education, senior citizens, and tourism in West Virginia, according to Lottery Director John Musgrave. He said the transfer pushed the Lottery's total profits to the State since 1986 past the half billion dollar mark.

Noting that the Lottery recently closed its books for July, Musgrave attributed the record August transfer to 4 days of Powerball sales totaling \$14.8 million, a 2,000% increase over the game's \$631,000 average for each drawing. "Certainly, all our games made a significant contribution, but it was the world-record drawing July 29 that brought people in from across state lines to play Powerball ... while they were here, they bought other tickets as well."

Musgrave called it an "unusual opportunity." "This was an incredible way to begin the fiscal year; a tremendous boost in helping us meet an \$80 million profit estimate for this year. We have a lot of ground to cover between now and the end of the year next June 30, however, with no guarantees for the winter months ... sales, and in turn profits, directly correspond with the size of the jackpot, and that can't be predicted. Our profit estimates are based on averages ... we can only hope for the extraordinary," he explained.

For comparisons, Musgrave said that prior to a \$195 million drawing last May, the Lottery's average monthly transfer to the State was \$2.8 million; before introducing Lotto\*America as the first MultiState game in 1988, the average transfer was \$2 million. "That puts the \$18 million August transfer in proper perspective ... it's an incredible achievement for which every State Lottery retailer should be praised ... with a crush of customers from every direction, they did a remarkable job."

Musgrave noted that the Lottery's profit estimate for the current year is \$80 million. "The Lottery is a significant contributor to State programs, and has certainly surpassed the \$8 million a year profit level that was originally estimated by proponents."

To celebrate the profits that have been generated, Musgrave said the Lottery is producing a series of videos that have been taped of a variety of groups statewide that have benefited from Lottery dollars.

"Beginning this fall, we will be running them on television stations across the State ... it's an opportunity to let citizens see first-hand how their Lottery profits are being spent."


