GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

- 1. CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENT: Issuance of an Award Document signed by the Purchasing Division Director, or his designee, and approved as to form by the Attorney General's office constitutes acceptance by the State of this Contract made by and between the State of West Virginia and the Vendor. Vendor's signature on its bid, or on the Contract if the Contract is not the result of a bid solicitation, signifies Vendor's agreement to be bound by and accept the terms and conditions contained in this Contract.
- **2. DEFINITIONS:** As used in this Solicitation/Contract, the following terms shall have the meanings attributed to them below. Additional definitions may be found in the specifications included with this Solicitation/Contract.
- **2.1. "Agency"** or "**Agencies"** means the agency, board, commission, or other entity of the State of West Virginia that is identified on the first page of the Solicitation or any other public entity seeking to procure goods or services under this Contract.
- 2.2. "Bid" or "Proposal" means the vendors submitted response to this solicitation.
- **2.3.** "Contract" means the binding agreement that is entered into between the State and the Vendor to provide the goods or services requested in the Solicitation.
- **2.4. "Director"** means the Director of the West Virginia Department of Administration, Purchasing Division.
- 2.5. "Purchasing Division" means the West Virginia Department of Administration, Purchasing Division.
- 2.6. "Award Document" means the document signed by the Agency and the Purchasing Division, and approved as to form by the Attorney General, that identifies the Vendor as the contract holder.
- **2.7. "Solicitation"** means the official notice of an opportunity to supply the State with goods or services that is published by the Purchasing Division.
- 2.8. "State" means the State of West Virginia and/or any of its agencies, commissions, boards, etc. as context requires.
- **2.9. "Vendor"** or **"Vendors"** means any entity submitting a bid in response to the Solicitation, the entity that has been selected as the lowest responsible bidder, or the entity that has been awarded the Contract as context requires.

3. CONTRACT TERM; RENEWAL; EXTENSION: The term of this Contract shall be determined in accordance with the category that has been identified as applicable to this Contract below:

Initial Contract Term: The Initial Contract Term will be for a period of one (1) year . The Initial Contract Term becomes effective on the effective start date listed on the first page of this Contract, identified as the State of West Virginia contract cover page containing the signatures of the Purchasing Division, Attorney General, and Encumbrance clerk (or another page identified as
Renewal Term: This Contract may be renewed upon the mutual written consent of the Agency, and the Vendor, with approval of the Purchasing Division and the Attorney General's office (Attorney General approval is as to form only). Any request for renewal should be delivered to the Agency and then submitted to the Purchasing Division thirty (30) days prior to the expiration date of the initial contract term or appropriate renewal term. A Contract renewal shall be in accordance with the terms and conditions of the original contract. Unless otherwise specified below, renewal of this Contract is limited to three (3) successive one (1) year periods or multiple renewal periods of less than one year, provided that the multiple renewal periods do not exceed the total number of months available in all renewal years combined. Automatic renewal of this Contract is prohibited. Renewals must be approved by the Vendor, Agency, Purchasing Division and Attorney General's office (Attorney General approval is as to form only)
Alternate Renewal Term – This contract may be renewed for successive year periods or shorter periods provided that they do not exceed the total number of months contained in all available renewals. Automatic renewal of this Contract is prohibited. Renewals must be approved by the Vendor, Agency, Purchasing Division and Attorney General's office (Attorney General approval is as to form only)
Delivery Order Limitations: In the event that this contract permits delivery orders, a delivery order may only be issued during the time this Contract is in effect. Any delivery order issued within one year of the expiration of this Contract shall be effective for one year from the date the delivery order is issued. No delivery order may be extended beyond one year after this Contract has expired.

One-Time Purchase: This Contract is for the purchase of a set quantity of goods that are identified in the specifications included herewith. Once those items have been delivered, no additional goods may be procured under this Contract without an appropriate change order approved by the Vendor, Agency, Purchasing Division, and Attorney General's office.
Construction: This Contract is for construction activity more fully defined in the specifications.
6. EMERGENCY PURCHASES: The Purchasing Division Director may authorize the Agency to purchase goods or services in the open market that Vendor would otherwise provide under this Contract if those goods or services are for immediate or expedited delivery in an emergency. Emergencies shall include, but are not limited to, delays in transportation or an unanticipated increase in the volume of work. An emergency purchase in the open market, approved by the Purchasing Division Director, shall not constitute of breach of this Contract and shall not entitle the Vendor to any form of compensation or damages. This provision does not excuse the State from fulfilling its obligations under a One-Time Purchase contract.
7. REQUIRED DOCUMENTS: All of the items checked in this section must be provided to the Purchasing Division by the Vendor as specified:
LICENSE(S) / CERTIFICATIONS / PERMITS: In addition to anything required under the Section of the General Terms and Conditions entitled Licensing, the apparent successful Vendor shall furnish proof of the following licenses, certifications, and/or permits upon request and in a form acceptable to the State. The request may be prior to or after contract award at the State's sole discretion.
As specified in the solicitation specifications
The apparent successful Vendor shall also furnish proof of any additional licenses or certifications contained in the specifications regardless of whether or not that requirement is listed

8. INSURANCE: The apparent successful Vendor shall furnish proof of the insurance identified by a checkmark below prior to Contract award. The insurance coverages identified below must be maintained throughout the life of this contract. Thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of the insurance policies, Vendor shall provide the Agency with proof that the insurance mandated herein has been continued. Vendor must also provide Agency with immediate notice of any changes in its insurance policies, including but not limited to, policy cancelation, policy reduction, or change in insurers. The apparent successful Vendor shall also furnish proof of any additional insurance requirements contained in the specifications prior to Contract award regardless of whether that insurance requirement is listed in this section.

- 9. WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE: Vendor shall comply with laws relating to workers compensation, shall maintain workers' compensation insurance when required, and shall furnish proof of workers' compensation insurance upon request.
- 10. VENUE: All legal actions for damages brought by Vendor against the State shall be brought in the West Virginia Claims Commission. Other causes of action must be brought in the West Virginia court authorized by statute to exercise jurisdiction over it.

11. LIQUIDATED DAMAGES: This clause shall in no way be considered exclusive and shall

not limit the State or Agency's right to pursue any other available remedy. Vendor shall pay liquidated damages in the amount specified below or as described in the specifications:

- 12. ACCEPTANCE: Vendor's signature on its bid, or on the certification and signature page, constitutes an offer to the State that cannot be unilaterally withdrawn, signifies that the product or service proposed by vendor meets the mandatory requirements contained in the Solicitation for that product or service, unless otherwise indicated, and signifies acceptance of the terms and conditions contained in the Solicitation unless otherwise indicated.
- 13. PRICING: The pricing set forth herein is firm for the life of the Contract, unless specified elsewhere within this Solicitation/Contract by the State. A Vendor's inclusion of price adjustment provisions in its bid, without an express authorization from the State in the Solicitation to do so, may result in bid disqualification. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Vendor must extend any publicly advertised sale price to the State and invoice at the lower of the contract price or the publicly advertised sale price.
- 14. PAYMENT IN ARREARS: Payments for goods/services will be made in arrears only upon receipt of a proper invoice, detailing the goods/services provided or receipt of the goods/services, whichever is later. Notwithstanding the foregoing, payments for software maintenance, licenses, or subscriptions may be paid annually in advance.
- 15. PAYMENT METHODS: Vendor must accept payment by electronic funds transfer and P-Card. (The State of West Virginia's Purchasing Card program, administered under contract by a banking institution, processes payment for goods and services through state designated credit cards.)
- 16. TAXES: The Vendor shall pay any applicable sales, use, personal property or any other taxes arising out of this Contract and the transactions contemplated thereby. The State of West Virginia is exempt from federal and state taxes and will not pay or reimburse such taxes.

- 17. ADDITIONAL FEES: Vendor is not permitted to charge additional fees or assess additional charges that were not either expressly provided for in the solicitation published by the State of West Virginia, included in the Contract, or included in the unit price or lump sum bid amount that Vendor is required by the solicitation to provide. Including such fees or charges as notes to the solicitation may result in rejection of vendor's bid. Requesting such fees or charges be paid after the contract has been awarded may result in cancellation of the contract.
- 18. FUNDING: This Contract shall continue for the term stated herein, contingent upon funds being appropriated by the Legislature or otherwise being made available. In the event funds are not appropriated or otherwise made available, this Contract becomes void and of no effect beginning on July 1 of the fiscal year for which funding has not been appropriated or otherwise made available. If that occurs, the State may notify the Vendor that an alternative source of funding has been obtained and thereby avoid the automatic termination. Non-appropriation or non-funding shall not be considered an event of default.
- 19. CANCELLATION: The Purchasing Division Director reserves the right to cancel this Contract immediately upon written notice to the vendor if the materials or workmanship supplied do not conform to the specifications contained in the Contract. The Purchasing Division Director may also cancel any purchase or Contract upon 30 days written notice to the Vendor in accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules § 148-1-5.2.b.
- **20. TIME:** Time is of the essence regarding all matters of time and performance in this Contract.
- 21. APPLICABLE LAW: This Contract is governed by and interpreted under West Virginia law without giving effect to its choice of law principles. Any information provided in specification manuals, or any other source, verbal or written, which contradicts or violates the West Virginia Constitution, West Virginia Code, or West Virginia Code of State Rules is void and of no effect.
- **22. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS:** Vendor shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations and ordinances. By submitting a bid, Vendor acknowledges that it has reviewed, understands, and will comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and ordinances.
 - **SUBCONTRACTOR COMPLIANCE:** Vendor shall notify all subcontractors providing commodities or services related to this Contract that as subcontractors, they too are required to comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and ordinances. Notification under this provision must occur prior to the performance of any work under the contract by the subcontractor.
- 23. ARBITRATION: Any references made to arbitration contained in this Contract, Vendor's bid, or in any American Institute of Architects documents pertaining to this Contract are hereby deleted, void, and of no effect.

- 24. MODIFICATIONS: This writing is the parties' final expression of intent. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Contract to the contrary no modification of this Contract shall be binding without mutual written consent of the Agency, and the Vendor, with approval of the Purchasing Division and the Attorney General's office (Attorney General approval is as to form only). Any change to existing contracts that adds work or changes contract cost, and were not included in the original contract, must be approved by the Purchasing Division and the Attorney General's Office (as to form) prior to the implementation of the change or commencement of work affected by the change.
- 25. WAIVER: The failure of either party to insist upon a strict performance of any of the terms or provision of this Contract, or to exercise any option, right, or remedy herein contained, shall not be construed as a waiver or a relinquishment for the future of such term, provision, option, right, or remedy, but the same shall continue in full force and effect. Any waiver must be expressly stated in writing and signed by the waiving party.
- 26. SUBSEQUENT FORMS: The terms and conditions contained in this Contract shall supersede any and all subsequent terms and conditions which may appear on any form documents submitted by Vendor to the Agency or Purchasing Division such as price lists, order forms, invoices, sales agreements, or maintenance agreements, and includes internet websites or other electronic documents. Acceptance or use of Vendor's forms does not constitute acceptance of the terms and conditions contained thereon.
- 27. ASSIGNMENT: Neither this Contract nor any monies due, or to become due hereunder, may be assigned by the Vendor without the express written consent of the Agency, the Purchasing Division, the Attorney General's office (as to form only), and any other government agency or office that may be required to approve such assignments.
- 28. WARRANTY: The Vendor expressly warrants that the goods and/or services covered by this Contract will: (a) conform to the specifications, drawings, samples, or other description furnished or specified by the Agency; (b) be merchantable and fit for the purpose intended; and (c) be free from defect in material and workmanship.
- **29. STATE EMPLOYEES:** State employees are not permitted to utilize this Contract for personal use and the Vendor is prohibited from permitting or facilitating the same.
- 30. PRIVACY, SECURITY, AND CONFIDENTIALITY: The Vendor agrees that it will not disclose to anyone, directly or indirectly, any such personally identifiable information or other confidential information gained from the Agency, unless the individual who is the subject of the information consents to the disclosure in writing or the disclosure is made pursuant to the Agency's policies, procedures, and rules. Vendor further agrees to comply with the Confidentiality Policies and Information Security Accountability Requirements, set forth in www.state.wv.us/admin/purchase/privacy.

31. YOUR SUBMISSION IS A PUBLIC DOCUMENT: Vendor's entire response to the Solicitation and the resulting Contract are public documents. As public documents, they will be disclosed to the public following the bid/proposal opening or award of the contract, as required by the competitive bidding laws of West Virginia Code §§ 5A-3-1 et seq., 5-22-1 et seq., and 5G-1-1 et seq. and the Freedom of Information Act West Virginia Code §§ 29B-1-1 et seq.

DO NOT SUBMIT MATERIAL YOU CONSIDER TO BE CONFIDENTIAL, A TRADE SECRET, OR OTHERWISE NOT SUBJECT TO PUBLIC DISCLOSURE.

Submission of any bid, proposal, or other document to the Purchasing Division constitutes your explicit consent to the subsequent public disclosure of the bid, proposal, or document. The Purchasing Division will disclose any document labeled "confidential," "proprietary," "trade secret," "private," or labeled with any other claim against public disclosure of the documents, to include any "trade secrets" as defined by West Virginia Code § 47-22-1 et seq. All submissions are subject to public disclosure without notice.

32. LICENSING: In accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules § 148-1-6.1.e, Vendor must be licensed and in good standing in accordance with any and all state and local laws and requirements by any state or local agency of West Virginia, including, but not limited to, the West Virginia Secretary of State's Office, the West Virginia Tax Department, West Virginia Insurance Commission, or any other state agency or political subdivision. Obligations related to political subdivisions may include, but are not limited to, business licensing, business and occupation taxes, inspection compliance, permitting, etc. Upon request, the Vendor must provide all necessary releases to obtain information to enable the Purchasing Division Director or the Agency to verify that the Vendor is licensed and in good standing with the above entities.

SUBCONTRACTOR COMPLIANCE: Vendor shall notify all subcontractors providing commodities or services related to this Contract that as subcontractors, they too are required to be licensed, in good standing, and up-to-date on all state and local obligations as described in this section. Obligations related to political subdivisions may include, but are not limited to, business licensing, business and occupation taxes, inspection compliance, permitting, etc. Notification under this provision must occur prior to the performance of any work under the contract by the subcontractor.

- 33. ANTITRUST: In submitting a bid to, signing a contract with, or accepting a Award Document from any agency of the State of West Virginia, the Vendor agrees to convey, sell, assign, or transfer to the State of West Virginia all rights, title, and interest in and to all causes of action it may now or hereafter acquire under the antitrust laws of the United States and the State of West Virginia for price fixing and/or unreasonable restraints of trade relating to the particular commodities or services purchased or acquired by the State of West Virginia. Such assignment shall be made and become effective at the time the purchasing agency tenders the initial payment to Vendor.
- **34. VENDOR NON-CONFLICT:** Neither Vendor nor its representatives are permitted to have any interest, nor shall they acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would compromise the performance of its services hereunder. Any such interests shall be promptly presented in detail to the Agency.

35. VENDOR RELATIONSHIP: The relationship of the Vendor to the State shall be that of an independent contractor and no principal-agent relationship or employer-employee relationship is contemplated or created by this Contract. The Vendor as an independent contractor is solely liable for the acts and omissions of its employees and agents. Vendor shall be responsible for selecting, supervising, and compensating any and all individuals employed pursuant to the terms of this Solicitation and resulting contract. Neither the Vendor, nor any employees or subcontractors of the Vendor, shall be deemed to be employees of the State for any purpose whatsoever. Vendor shall be exclusively responsible for payment of employees and contractors for all wages and salaries, taxes, withholding payments, penalties, fees, fringe benefits, professional liability insurance premiums, contributions to insurance and pension, or other deferred compensation plans, including but not limited to, Workers' Compensation and Social Security obligations, licensing fees, etc. and the filing of all necessary documents, forms, and returns pertinent to all of the foregoing.

Vendor shall hold harmless the State, and shall provide the State and Agency with a defense against any and all claims including, but not limited to, the foregoing payments, withholdings, contributions, taxes, Social Security taxes, and employer income tax returns.

- **36. INDEMNIFICATION:** The Vendor agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the State and the Agency, their officers, and employees from and against: (1) Any claims or losses for services rendered by any subcontractor, person, or firm performing or supplying services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of the Contract; (2) Any claims or losses resulting to any person or entity injured or damaged by the Vendor, its officers, employees, or subcontractors by the publication, translation, reproduction, delivery, performance, use, or disposition of any data used under the Contract in a manner not authorized by the Contract, or by Federal or State statutes or regulations; and (3) Any failure of the Vendor, its officers, employees, or subcontractors to observe State and Federal laws including, but not limited to, labor and wage and hour laws.
- 37. NO DEBT CERTIFICATION: In accordance with West Virginia Code §§ 5A-3-10a and 5-22-1(i), the State is prohibited from awarding a contract to any bidder that owes a debt to the State or a political subdivision of the State. By submitting a bid, or entering into a contract with the State, Vendor is affirming that (1) for construction contracts, the Vendor is not in default on any monetary obligation owed to the state or a political subdivision of the state, and (2) for all other contracts, neither the Vendor nor any related party owe a debt as defined above, and neither the Vendor nor any related party are in employer default as defined in the statute cited above unless the debt or employer default is permitted under the statute.
- **38. CONFLICT OF INTEREST:** Vendor, its officers or members or employees, shall not presently have or acquire an interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict with or compromise the performance of its obligations hereunder. Vendor shall periodically inquire of its officers, members and employees to ensure that a conflict of interest does not arise. Any conflict of interest discovered shall be promptly presented in detail to the Agency.

- 39. REPORTS: Vendor shall provide the Agency and/or the Purchasing Division with the following reports identified by a checked box below:

 ✓ Such reports as the Agency and/or the Purchasing Division may request. Requested reports may include, but are not limited to, quantities purchased, agencies utilizing the contract, total contract expenditures by agency, etc.

 ✓ Quarterly reports detailing the total quantity of purchases in units and dollars, along with a listing of purchases by agency. Quarterly reports should be delivered to the Purchasing Division via email at purchasing.division www.gov.
- **40. BACKGROUND CHECK:** In accordance with W. Va. Code § 15-2D-3, the State reserves the right to prohibit a service provider's employees from accessing sensitive or critical information or to be present at the Capitol complex based upon results addressed from a criminal background check. - 41. PREFERENCE FOR USE OF DOMESTIC STEEL PRODUCTS: Except when authorized by the Director of the Purchasing Division pursuant to W. Va. Code § 5A-3-56, no contractor may use or supply steel products for a State Contract Project other than those steel products made in the United States. A contractor who uses steel products in violation of this section may be subject to civil penalties pursuant to W. Va. Code § 5A-3-56. As used in this section:
 - a. "State Contract Project" means any erection or construction of, or any addition to, alteration of or other improvement to any building or structure, including, but not limited to, roads or highways, or the installation of any heating or cooling or ventilating plants or other equipment, or the supply of and materials for such projects, pursuant to a contract with the State of West Virginia for which bids were solicited on or after June 6, 2001.
 - b. "Steel Products" means products rolled, formed, shaped, drawn, extruded, forged, cast, fabricated or otherwise similarly processed, or processed by a combination of two or more or such operations, from steel made by the open heath, basic oxygen, electric furnace, Bessemer or other steel making process.
 - c. The Purchasing Division Director may, in writing, authorize the use of foreign steel products if:
 - 1. The cost for each contract item used does not exceed one tenth of one percent (.1%) of the total contract cost or two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00), whichever is greater. For the purposes of this section, the cost is the value of the steel product as delivered to the project; or
 - 2. The Director of the Purchasing Division determines that specified steel materials are not produced in the United States in sufficient quantity or otherwise are not reasonably available to meet contract requirements.

42. PREFERENCE FOR USE OF DOMESTIC ALUMINUM, GLASS, AND STEEL: In Accordance with W. Va. Code § 5-19-1 et seq., and W. Va. CSR § 148-10-1 et seq., for every contract or subcontract, subject to the limitations contained herein, for the construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, improvement or maintenance of public works or for the purchase of any item of machinery or equipment to be used at sites of public works, only domestic aluminum, glass or steel products shall be supplied unless the spending officer determines, in writing, after the receipt of offers or bids, (1) that the cost of domestic aluminum, glass or steel products is unreasonable or inconsistent with the public interest of the State of West Virginia, (2) that domestic aluminum, glass or steel products are not produced in sufficient quantities to meet the contract requirements, or (3) the available domestic aluminum, glass, or steel do not meet the contract specifications. This provision only applies to public works contracts awarded in an amount more than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) or public works contracts that require more than ten thousand pounds of steel products.

The cost of domestic aluminum, glass, or steel products may be unreasonable if the cost is more than twenty percent (20%) of the bid or offered price for foreign made aluminum, glass, or steel products. If the domestic aluminum, glass or steel products to be supplied or produced in a "substantial labor surplus area", as defined by the United States Department of Labor, the cost of domestic aluminum, glass, or steel products may be unreasonable if the cost is more than thirty percent (30%) of the bid or offered price for foreign made aluminum, glass, or steel products. This preference shall be applied to an item of machinery or equipment, as indicated above, when the item is a single unit of equipment or machinery manufactured primarily of aluminum, glass or steel, is part of a public works contract and has the sole purpose or of being a permanent part of a single public works project. This provision does not apply to equipment or machinery purchased by a spending unit for use by that spending unit and not as part of a single public works project.

All bids and offers including domestic aluminum, glass or steel products that exceed bid or offer prices including foreign aluminum, glass or steel products after application of the preferences provided in this provision may be reduced to a price equal to or lower than the lowest bid or offer price for foreign aluminum, glass or steel products plus the applicable preference. If the reduced bid or offer prices are made in writing and supersede the prior bid or offer prices, all bids or offers, including the reduced bid or offer prices, will be reevaluated in accordance with this rule.

43. INTERESTED PARTY SUPPLEMENTAL DISCLOSURE: W. Va. Code § 6D-1-2 requires that for contracts with an actual or estimated value of at least \$1 million, the Vendor must submit to the Agency a disclosure of interested parties prior to beginning work under this Contract. Additionally, the Vendor must submit a supplemental disclosure of interested parties reflecting any new or differing interested parties to the contract, which were not included in the original pre-work interested party disclosure, within 30 days following the completion or termination of the contract. A copy of that form is included with this solicitation or can be obtained from the WV Ethics Commission. This requirement does not apply to publicly traded companies listed on a national or international stock exchange. A more detailed definition of interested parties can be obtained from the form referenced above.

- **44. PROHIBITION AGAINST USED OR REFURBISHED:** Unless expressly permitted in the solicitation published by the State, Vendor must provide new, unused commodities, and is prohibited from supplying used or refurbished commodities, in fulfilling its responsibilities under this Contract.
- **45. VOID CONTRACT CLAUSES:** This Contract is subject to the provisions of West Virginia Code § 5A-3-62, which automatically voids certain contract clauses that violate State law.
- **46. ISRAEL BOYCOTT:** Bidder understands and agrees that, pursuant to W. Va. Code § 5A-3-63, it is prohibited from engaging in a boycott of Israel during the term of this contract.

- 1. PURPOSE AND SCOPE: The West Virginia Purchasing Division is soliciting bids on behalf of the WV Educational Broadcasting Authority (Agency) to establish an open-end contract for Audit Services for the year ended June 30, 2024, with the opportunity for three renewals of three succeeding fiscal years.
- 2. **DEFINITIONS:** The terms listed below shall have the meanings assigned to them below. Additional definitions can be found in section 2 of the General Terms and Conditions.
 - **2.1** "Contract Item" or "Contract Items" means the list of items identified in Section 3.1 below and on the Pricing Pages.
 - 2.2 "Contract Services" means to perform the audits of the West Virginia Educational Broadcasting Authority and Affiliates (the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. and the Friends of West Virginia Public Broadcasting, Inc.) and a separate audit of the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. and also perform a review of the Audited Financial Report (AFR) for television and radio required by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. The auditor must certify the AFR.
 - **2.3 FARS:** the Financial Accounting and Reporting Section of the WV Department of Administration Finance Division.
 - **2.4** "Pricing Pages" means the schedule of prices, estimated order quantity, and totals contained in wvOASIS or attached hereto as Exhibit A, and used to evaluate the Solicitation responses.
 - 2.5 "Solicitation" means the official notice of an opportunity to supply the State with goods or services that is published by the Purchasing Division.
 - 2.6 "Three renewals for three succeeding years" means fiscal years 2025, 2026, and 2027, under the same terms and conditions, as well as same price.

3. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:

- 3.1 Contract Items and Mandatory Requirements: Vendor shall provide Agency with the Contract Items listed below on an open-end and continuing basis. Contract Items must meet or exceed the mandatory requirements as shown below.
 - **3.1.1 Labor Types:** services under this contracted shall be billed at hourly rates as established on the Pricing Page, Exhibit A.

3.1.1.1 **Senior CPA**

- 3.1.1.6.2 Vendor must indicate which type of employee each person is. See Exhibit A, Pricing Page.
- 3.1.1.6.3 By signing the Pricing Page, Vendor attests that their employees are properly categorized and meet the requirements as outlined in these specifications.

3.1.2 Audit Services

- 3.1.2.1 The contract services of this project are to perform the audits of the financial statements for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024 of the West Virginia Educational Broadcasting Authority and Affiliates, the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc., and the Friends of West Virginia Public Broadcasting, Inc. in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and GASB (Governmental Accounting Standards Board). The audits are to be performed by a firm of certified public accountants in **Public** requirements of the accordance with the Audit Guide and Requirements, Telecommunications Corporation for Public Broadcasting, as well as Principles of Public Financial Reporting for Accounting and Public Telecommunications Entities, Corporations for Broadcasting (CPB) and Generally Accepted Auditing Standards as established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and other applicable laws and regulations. Tentative draft of consolidated financial statements of WVEBA and affiliates to comply with FARS (Financial and Reporting Section) reporting requirements MUST be completed by September 15, 2024. A final draft must be submitted to FARS by October 15, 2024, or earlier if deadline is changed by FARS. See Exhibit F as an example.
- 3.1.2.2 Tax services will also be required for the completion of this project. Preparation of Federal Forms 990 for the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. for the period to be audited: July 2023 to June 30, 2024. See the sample report, Exhibit H. Completed Federal forms 990, and all subsidiary schedules common to Not-for-profit and exempt organizations

MUST be filed no later than November 15, 2024, or earlier if deadline is revised by Internal Revenue Service.

- 3.1.2.3 The WV Education Broadcasting Authority will require the auditing firm to express an opinion on the fair presentation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.
- 3.1.2.4 Additionally, the auditor will be required to prepare all supporting schedules required by the Department of Administration (FARS) for the preparation of the state's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR)
- 3.1.2.5 The auditor shall be responsible for performing certain limited procedures involving required supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board as mandated by generally accepted auditing standards.
- 3.1.2.6 The firm will be required to review and attest to the accuracy of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting Annual Financial Reports (CPB AFR), to review and attest to the information on the CPB AFR, and to provide the Independent Accountant's Report and the Audited Financial Statements to CPB in the required format. CPB AFR and Audited Financial Statements MUST be completed no later than November 30, 2024 for review by the agency and MUST be submitted by the auditor to CPB no later than November 30, 2024, or earlier if deadline is revised by CPB. A supplemental schedule of the Statement of Financial Activity must be provided in the AFS with the breakdown of TV and Radio, per CPB Financial Reporting Guidelines (Part 1, Section D, page 5). The supplemental schedule will tie to the revenue and expenses reported in the TV and Radio AFRs. The Independent Accountant will be required to perform necessary procedures to provide opinion that the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole. See exhibits C, D, and E for examples.

- 3.1.3 Other Services: Agency requires that Vendor be available to assist with related accounting issues and reporting requirements not fully described in this solicitation as they arise on an as-needed basis.
- 3.1.4 Reports to be issued: Following the completion of the audit of the fiscal year's financial statements, the auditor shall issue a report on the fair representation of the financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. A separate report shall be issued for the EBA and Affiliates, as well as the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc (see the sample report, Exhibit G).
- 3.1.5 Irregularities and illegal acts: Auditors shall be required to make an immediate written report of all irregularities and illegal acts of which they become aware to the WVEBA CFO at 124 Industrial Park Road, Beaver, WV, 25813.
- **3.1.6** Assurances: Auditors shall assure themselves that the WV Educational Broadcasting Authority's Chief Financial Officer is informed of each of the following:
 - **3.1.6.1** The Auditor's responsibility under generally accepted auditing standards
 - **3.1.6.2** Significant accounting policies

- 3.2 PERFORMANCE: A schedule for performance of Contract Services and Contract Services Deliverables is included herein by Agency, Exhibit B. In the event that this Contract is designated as an open-end contract, Vendor shall perform in accordance with the release orders that may be issued against this Contract.

Liquidated Damages for failure to perform:

Vendor shall pay liquidated damages as follows:

\$1,000.00 per day for failure to meet any deadline as described in these specifications. These liquidated damages may be waived if the Vendor can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Agency that the delay was unforeseeable and not their fault.

\$1,000.00 per occurrence for any final audit that must be reissued due to material errors or omissions discovered by West Virginia Financial Accounting and Reporting Section or other West Virginia state agency.

- 3.3 VENDOR QUALIFICATIONS: Vendor, or Vendor's staff if requirements are inherently limited to individuals rather than corporate entities, shall have the following minimum qualifications:
 - 3.3.1 The firm must be independent and licensed to practice in West Virginia. Vendor must provide supporting documentation upon request and prior to contract award.
 - 3.3.2 All Directors, Principals or Partner equivalents on the engagement must be licensed CPA's (Certified Public Accountants) with at least 5 years of audit experience with governmental entities. All manager level employees on this engagement must be CPA's with 3 years of experience on governmental engagements. The state agency retains the right to approve or reject replacements based upon their qualifications, experience or performance.  - 3.3.3 The firm must have experience auditing/consulting with 3 different state (does not have to be West Virginia) government entities (agencies) over the past 5 years. Upon request and prior to contract award, the firm must submit a list of those state audits/consulting engagements.
 - 3.3.4 Upon request and prior to contract award, the firm shall submit a statement that they have not failed their 2 most recent AICPA (American Institute of CPA's) Peer Reviews of their audit/accounting practice and submit the most recent review upon request and prior to contract award.
 - 3.3.5 The firm must have at least 7 licensed CPAs on staff within the audit firm that are strictly audit and not tax professionals. This insures we have a firm that has a breadth of experience that we are looking for and can substitute engagement members should turnover occur. At least 5 of these audit professionals must all be in the same location and cannot be spread amongst other firm locations. Upon request and prior to contract award, Vendor shall submit a statement attesting that they meet this requirement.

- 3.3.6 The firm must not have had a final audit issued by the proposing firm that had to be reissued due to material errors or omissions discovered by West Virginia Financial Accounting and Reporting Section or other West Virginia state agency two times or more. Upon request and prior to contract award, Vendor shall submit a statement attesting that they meet this requirement.
- 3.3.7 Upon request and prior to contract award, the firm must provide a statement that they are a member in good standing of the AICPA's Governmental Audit Quality Center.

4. CONTRACT AWARD:

- 4.1 Contract Award: The Contract is intended to provide Agencies with a purchase price on all Contract Items. The Contract shall be awarded to the Vendor that provides the Contract Items meeting the required specifications for the lowest overall total cost as shown on the Pricing Pages.
- 4.2 Pricing Pages: Vendor should complete the Pricing Pages by entering hourly rates into the Pricing Page in Excel format, Exhibit A. The spreadsheet will calculate all totals including the Bid Total. Vendor representative shall sign and date the form on the line provided. Vendor should complete the Pricing Pages in their entirety as failure to do so may result in Vendor's bids being disqualified. A sample pricing page, Exhibit A2, is provided for clarification.

The Pricing Pages contain a list of the Contract Items and estimated purchase volume. The estimated purchase volume for each item represents the approximate volume of anticipated purchases only. No future use of the Contract or any individual item is guaranteed or implied.

5. ORDERING AND PAYMENT:

5.1 Ordering: Vendor shall accept orders through wvOASIS, regular mail, facsimile, e-mail, or any other written form of communication. Vendor may, but is not required to, accept on-line orders through a secure internet ordering portal/website. If Vendor has the ability to accept on-line orders, it should include in its response a brief description of how Agencies may utilize the on-line ordering system. Vendor shall ensure that its on-line ordering system is properly secured prior to processing Agency orders on-line.

5.2 Payment: Vendor shall accept payment in accordance with the payment procedures of the State of West Virginia.

6. DELIVERY AND RETURN:

- 6.1 Delivery Time: Vendor shall deliver standard orders within the time frame listed in these specifications. Vendor shall deliver emergency orders within three working day(s) after orders are received. Vendor shall ship all orders in accordance with the above schedule and shall not hold orders until a minimum delivery quantity is met.
- 6.2 Late Delivery: The Agency placing the order under this Contract must be notified in writing if orders will be delayed for any reason. Any delay in delivery that could cause harm to an Agency will be grounds for cancellation of the delayed order, and/or obtaining the items ordered from a third party.

Any Agency seeking to obtain items from a third party under this provision must first obtain approval of the Purchasing Division.

- 6.3 Delivery Payment/Risk of Loss: Standard order delivery shall be F.O.B. destination to the Agency's location. Vendor shall include the cost of standard order delivery charges in its bid pricing/discount and is not permitted to charge the Agency separately for such delivery. The Agency will pay delivery charges on all emergency orders provided that Vendor invoices those delivery costs as a separate charge with the original freight bill attached to the invoice.
- 6.4 Return of Unacceptable Items: If the Agency deems the Contract Items to be unacceptable, the Contract Items shall be returned to Vendor at Vendor's expense and with no restocking charge. Vendor shall either make arrangements for the return within five (5) days of being notified that items are unacceptable, or permit the Agency to arrange for the return and reimburse Agency for delivery expenses. If the original packaging cannot be utilized for the return, Vendor will supply the Agency with appropriate return packaging upon request. All returns of unacceptable items shall be F.O.B. the Agency's location. The returned product shall either be replaced, or the Agency shall receive a full credit or refund for the purchase price, at the Agency's discretion.
- 6.5 Return Due to Agency Error: Items ordered in error by the Agency will be returned for credit within 30 days of receipt, F.O.B. Vendor's location. Vendor shall not charge a restocking fee if returned products are in a resalable condition. Items shall be deemed to be in a resalable condition if they are unused and in the original packaging. Any restocking fee for items not in a resalable condition shall be the lower of the Vendor's customary restocking fee or 5% of the total invoiced value of the returned items.

7. VENDOR DEFAULT:

- 7.1 The following shall be considered a vendor default under this Contract.
 - **7.1.1** Failure to provide Contract Items in accordance with the requirements contained herein.
 - **7.1.2** Failure to comply with other specifications and requirements contained herein.
 - 7.1.3 Failure to comply with any laws, rules, and ordinances applicable to the Contract Services provided under this Contract.
 - **7.1.4** Failure to remedy deficient performance upon request.
- 7.2 The following remedies shall be available to Agency upon default.
 - 7.2.1 Immediate cancellation of the Contract.
 - **7.2.2** Immediate cancellation of one or more release orders issued under this Contract.
 - 7.2.3 Any other remedies available in law or equity.

8. MISCELLANEOUS:

- **8.1 No Substitutions:** Vendor shall supply only Contract Items submitted in response to the Solicitation unless a contract modification is approved in accordance with the provisions contained in this Contract.
- **8.2** Vendor Supply: Vendor must carry sufficient inventory of the Contract Items being offered to fulfill its obligations under this Contract. By signing its bid, Vendor certifies that it can supply the Contract Items contained in its bid response.

- 8.3 Reports: Vendor shall provide quarterly reports and annual summaries to the Agency showing the Agency's items purchased, quantities of items purchased, and total dollar value of the items purchased. Vendor shall also provide reports, upon request, showing the items purchased during the term of this Contract, the quantity purchased for each of those items, and the total value of purchases for each of those items. Failure to supply such reports may be grounds for cancellation of this Contract.

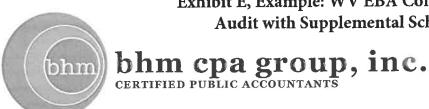

The Combined Statements of Net Position, Combined Statements of Financial Activity, and Combined Schedules of Functional Expenses present additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The statements and schedules are management's responsibility, and derive from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. We subjected these statements and schedules to the auditing procedures we applied to the basic financial statements. We also applied certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling statements and schedules directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, these statements are schedules are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

As management of the Educational Broadcasting Authority, we offer readers of these financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Authority for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2019. This discussion and analysis is designed to assist the reader in focusing on the significant changes in financial position. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the financial statements as a whole.

Financial Highlights

The EBA's total assets increased by \$8,586,160 or 45.92% over the course of the year's operations.

The EBA's current liabilities increased by \$5,975 or 1.52% and long-term liabilities decreased by \$561,400 or 18.0%. Long term liabilities are made up of compensated absences, other post-employment benefits, net pension liability and deferred inflows of resources for pensions.

Basic Financial Statements

The basic financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the EBA's finances in a manner similar to private sector business.

The statement of net position presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities and provides information about the nature and amounts of investments in resources (assets) and the obligations to creditors (liabilities). It also provides the basis for evaluating the capital structure of the Authority and assessing the liquidity and financial flexibility of the Authority.

All of the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position. This statement measures the success of the Authority's operations over the past year.

The final required financial statement is the Statement of Cash Flows. This statement reports cash receipts, cash payments, and net changes in cash resulting from operations, investing, and financing activities and provides answers to such questions as where did cash come from, what was cash used for, and what was the change in the cash balance during the reporting period.

Financial Analysis

Net position may serve, over time, as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. In the case of the EBA, assets exceeded liabilities by \$15,1,522 at the close of the most recent fiscal year.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization, Principles of Combination and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Organization and Principles of Combination

The West Virginia Educational Broadcasting Authority (the Authority), a component unit of the State of West Virginia, is a public corporation which was created by the State of West Virginia and is responsible for extending educational, cultural and informational experiences to all citizens of West Virginia through the construction and operation of noncommercial education TV and radio stations and related facilities statewide. EBA supervises and operates three public TV stations and nine public radio stations plus a statewide two-way microwave network that links the stations and provides special telecommunication services for other state and public service agencies for non-broadcasted activities such as teleconferencing, in-service training, and data delivery.

The following radio and television stations are operated by EBA:

The combined financial statements include the assets, liabilities, financial activities, and cash flows of the West Virginia Educational Broadcasting Authority, each of the above stations and their interrelated affiliated organizations as follows:

The West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) was formed in 1992 as a non-profit corporation. The Foundation was organized exclusively for charitable and educational purposes to receive, hold, disperse, and invest monies or property given or donated to the Authority for educational and eleemosynary purposes related to the preservation, maintenance, promotion, development and growth of educational and public broadcasting in the State of West Virginia. The Authority has sole discretion as to the use of the money and property.

<u>Friends of West Virginia Public Broadcasting, Inc.</u> The Friends solicits funds for the benefit of the related television and radio stations and public broadcasting. Funds are expended by the Friends for the benefit of the related stations in amounts determined by their respective Boards of Directors.

Financial Statement Presentation

The combined financial statements of the Authority have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the Unites States of America as prescribed by Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), including Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statement – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments. The financial statement presentation required by GASB No. 34 provides a comprehensive, entity-wide perspective of the Authority's assets, liabilities, net position, revenues, expenses, changes in net position and cash flows and replaces the fund-group perspective previously required. The Authority's net postion are classified as follows:

Net Investment in Capital Assets - This represents the Authority's total investment in capital assets, net of outstanding debt obligations related to those capital assets. To the extent debt has been incurred but not yet expended for capital assets, such amounts are not included as a component of, net investment in capital assets. The Authority had no related outstanding debt as of June 30, 2019.

Restricted Net Position, Expendable – This includes resources in which the Authority is legally contractually obligated to spend resources in accordance with restrictions imposed by external third parties.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization, Principles of Combination and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Restricted net position, nonexpendable - This includes endowment and similar type funds in which donors or other outside sources have stipulated, as a condition on the gift instrument, that the principal is to be maintained inviolate and in perpetuity, and invested for the purpose of producing present and future income, which may either by expended or added to principal. The Authority has one trust that is considered restricted nonexpendable at June 30, 2019 (Note 10).

<u>Unrestricted net position</u> - Unrestricted net position represent resources derived from other than capital assets or restricted net assets. These resources are used for transactions relating to the general operations of EBA, and may be used at the discretion of the Board of Directors to meet current expense for any purpose.

Basis of Accounting

For financial reporting purposes, the Authority is considered to be engaged only in business-type activities. Accordingly, the Authority's financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting with a flow of economic resources measurement focus. Revenues are reported when earned and expenses when material or services are received. All intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated.

Capital Assets

Capital assets include property and equipment. Capital assets are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition or fair value at the date of donation in the case of gifts. Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets which range from 3 to 30 years. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operating expenses as incurred.

Program Rights

Program rights purchased by the Authority and affiliates from the Public Broadcasting Service on an annual basis are expended in the year purchased.

Deferred Production Costs

The costs relating to programs being produced that will be broadcast in a subsequent period are reported as deferred production costs. Grants and contributions related to such programs are included in deferred revenue. As the programs are broadcast, applicable program expenses and revenues are included in the combined statement of revenues, expenses and change in net position.

Revenue Recognition

General appropriations from the State of West Virginia and appropriations from other state agencies which are considered exchange transactions are recorded as operating transfers in the combined statement of revenues, expense and changes in net assets at the time such appropriations are utilized by incurring authorized expenditures as determined on an accrual basis.

Unrestricted contribution and pledges are recorded as revenue in the combined statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net position in the period received. Contributions and grants restricted for specific projects are reported as deferred revenue until qualifying expenses have been incurred.

Donated or contributed services and material, including amounts contributed by other state agencies and component units of the State, are recorded at their fair value on the date of the contribution.

Cash and cash equivalents

For purpose of reporting and the combined statement of cash flows, the Authority and affiliates considers cash on hand, cash in banks, cash with the State of West Virginia and certificates of deposit which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties and which have original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization, Principles of Combination and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Income Taxes

The Authority, as a public corporation established by the State of West Virginia, is recognized as exempt from Federal income taxes. The Friends and the Foundation are non-profit, non-stock corporations which are recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and similar state statutes, and are classified as other than private foundations.

Budgets

Budgets for appropriation from the State of West Virginia are adopted annually on a cash basis and are approved by the State of West Virginia Legislature. Most appropriations for operating funds lapse at year end.

Compensated Absences

Accumulated vacation is accrued as the employees become vested in the benefits. Employees, hired prior to July 1, 2002, vest in accumulated sick leave only upon retirement, when unused sick leave can be converted into termination benefits, such as employer paid premiums for post retirement health care benefits or additional credited service for retirement benefits. A liability for accrued sick leave is recognized to the extent that accumulated leave is expected to be converted to termination benefits on retirement.

Interfund Transactions

Quasi-external transactions are accounted for as revenues and expenses. All other interfund transactions are reported as transfers.

Classification of Revenues

The Authority has classified its revenues as either operating or nonoperating revenues according to the following criteria:

Operating revenues - Operating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of exchange transactions.

Nonoperating revenues - Nonoperating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of non-exchange transactions, such as gifts and contributions, and other revenues that are defined as nonoperating revenues by GASB No. 9, Reporting Cash Flows of Proprietary and Nonexpendable Trust Funds and Governmental Entities That Use Propriety Fund Accounting and GASB No. 34, such as state appropriations and investment income.

Use of Restricted Funds

The Authority has not adopted a formal policy regarding whether to first apply restricted or unrestricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available. Generally, the Authority attempts to utilize restricted funds first when practicable.

Use of Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities and reported revenues and expenses. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Net Position

Of the Authority's restricted net position of \$243,618, none were restricted by enabling legislation.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization, Principles of Combination and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Pensions

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the West Virginia Public Employees Retirement System (the PERS Plan) and additions to/deductions from the PERS Plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the PERS plan. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Net Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB) Liability

For purposes of measuring the net OPEB liability and deferred outflows/inflows of the resources related to other post-employment benefits, and other post-employment benefit expenses, information about the fiduciary net position of the Division's Other Post-Employment Benefits Plan (OPEB) of the West Virginia Retiree Health Benefit Trust Fund (RHBTF) and additions to/deductions from the plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the RHBTF. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value. Detailed information on the investment valuation can be found in the plans' financial statements.

Note 2- Revenue Concentrations

During the year ended June 30, 2019, the Authority recognized revenue of \$10,096,913 from appropriations from the State of West Virginia, and \$2,421,410 from grants from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. The ability of these entities to fund operations at this level is dependent on the state and national economic conditions and related tax collections. Future funding is also dependent on the willingness of legislative and grantor entities to continue funding Authority affiliates.

Note 3- Deposits and Investments

Statement No. 3 of the Government Accounting Standards Board requires government entities to categorize deposits and investments to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the entity at year-end. These categories of risk follow:

<u>Interest rate risk</u> – Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment.

The Authority does not have a formal policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

<u>Credit Risk</u> - Credit risk is the risk that an issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations.

The Authority has no investment policy that limits its investment choices. As of the fiscal years ended June 30, 2019 the Authority's investments were not rated by Standard & Poor's or Moody's.

<u>Concentration of Credit Risk</u> – Concentration of credit risk is the risk of loss attributed to the magnitude of a government's investment in a single issuer.

The Authority places no limit on the amount the Authority may invest in any one issuer. More than 5 percent of the Authority's investments are in VANGUARD and Certificates of Deposits. These investments were 77% and 23% of the Authority's total investments as of June 30, 2019.

<u>Custodial Credit Risk</u> – For an investment, custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the government will not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. All of the Authority's investments are held in the name of the Authority. For deposits, custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the government's deposits may not be returned to it.

<u>Deposits</u> - The Authority does not have a policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2019, none of the Authority's bank balances was exposed to custodial credit risk.

Note 6- Other Postemployment Benefits

General Information about the OPEB Plan

Plan description. The government contributes to the West Virginia Other Postemployment Benefit Plan (the Plan), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit postemployment healthcare plan. The financial activities of the Plan are accounted for in the West Virginia Retiree Health Benefit Trust Fund (RHBT), a fiduciary fund of the State of West Virginia. The Plan is administered by a combination of the West Virginia Public Employees Insurance Agency (PEIA) and the RHBT staff. Plan benefits are established and revised by PEIA and the RHBT management with approval of the Finance Board. The Finance Board is comprised of nine members. Finance Board members are appointed by the Governor, serve a term of four years and are eligible for reappointment. The State Department of Administration cabinet secretary serves as Chairman of the Board. Four members represent labor, education, public employees and public retirees. The four remaining members represent the public at large. The Plan had approximately 43,000 policyholders and 63,000 covered lives at June 30, 2017. The RHBT audited financial statements and actuarial reports can be found on the PEIA website at www.peia.wv.gov. Benefits provided. The Plan provides medical and prescription drug insurance and life insurance. The medical and prescription drug insurance is provided through two options: 1) Self-Insured Preferred Provider Benefit Plan (primarily for non-Medicare-eligible retirees and spouses) and 2) External Managed Care Organizations (primarily for Medicare-eligible retirees and spouses).

Contributions. Paygo premiums are established by the Finance Board annually. All participating employers are required by statute to contribute this premium to the RHBT at the established rate for every active policyholder per month. The active premiums subsidized the retirees' health care by approximately \$150 million for both fiscal years ending June 30, 2017 and June 30, 2018. Contributions to the OPEB plan from the government were \$148,791 for the current fiscal year.

Net OPEB Liabilities, OPEB Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to OPEB

At fiscal year-end, the government reported a liability of \$1,562,136 for its proportionate share of the net OPEB liability. The net OPEB liability, deferred inflows and outflows of resources and OPEB expense were determined by an actuarial valuation date as of June 30, 2017, rolled forward to June 30, 2018, which is the measurement date. The government's proportion of the net OPEB liability was based on a projection of the government's long-term share of contributions to the OPEB plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating governments, actuarially determined.

Note 8- Commitments/Contingencies

The Authority is involved in various legal actions, from time to time, in the ordinary course of business. Management is not currently aware of any matters, which will have a significant adverse effect on the accompanying combined financial statements.

Note 9- Risk Management

The Authority is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; employee health and life coverage; and natural disasters.

The State of West Virginia established the Board of Risk and Insurance Management (BRIM) and the Public Employees Insurance Agency (PEIA), to account for and finance uninsured risks of losses for state agencies, institutions of higher education, and component units. The Authority manages it worker's compensation risk by utilizing a private carrier, BrickStreet.

BRIM is a public entity risk pool that provides coverage for general, property, medical malpractice, and automobile liability. PEIA is also a public entity risk pool that provides coverage for employee and dependent health, life and prescription drug insurance.

Note 9- Risk Management (Continued)

BrickStreet provides coverage for workers' compensation and work related accidents. The Authority retains the risk of loss on certain tort and contractor claims in excess of the amount insured or covered by BRIM's insurance carrier.

Through its participation in PEIA and through its private carrier, BrickStreet, the Authority has obtained health coverage and coverage for job related injuries for its employees. In exchange for payment of premiums to PEIA and BrickStreet, the Authority has transferred its risk related to health coverage and job related injuries of employees.

Note 10- Endowment Trusts

In 1991, cash of \$5,764 was transferred to the Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation (the Foundation) to constitute the principal of the Friends of West Virginia Public Radio, Inc. Endowment Fund, for the purpose of funding equipment replacement. Under the terms of the trust agreement, Friends of West Virginia Public Radio, Inc. has the right to receive the income from the fund, but has no control over, or access to the assets of the fund. Therefore, the assets are not included in these financial statements. Funds received by The Friends of West Virginia Public Radio, Inc. restricted for the benefit of this fund are transferred to the Foundation on an annual basis or more often as a significant amount of funds accumulate.

Spending is authorized by the Foundation's Board of Directors. At June 30, 2019, the Endowment Fund had a fair value of \$70,146.

During 2005, the Herscher Foundation created an endowment trust called the Betty J. Herscher Memorial fund for Cultural Programming in the amount of \$200,000 with the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. (WVPBF) as the beneficiary. Under the terms of the agreement, WVPBF must obtain an asset level of \$5,000,000 before the trust funds will be transferred to the Foundation.

The WVBF has the right to receive the income from the fund, but has no control over or access to the assets of the fund. Annual income distributions from the trust must be paid to WVPBF to provide funding for opera and other cultural programming on radio and television.

The annual distribution for 2019 was \$10,000, split in a 75:25 ratio between television and radio.

In 2006, the Abbey Myers Thornhill and Sarah Bishop Thornhill Fund was established by Warren and Carolyn Thornhill at the Beckley Area Foundation (BAF) to benefit the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc., has the right to receive the income from the fund, but has no control over, or access to the assets of the fund. Therefore, the assets are not included in these financial statements. Fund income is distributed on an annual basis to provide funding for educational programming and services. At June 30, 2019, the fund had a fair value of approximately \$112,609.

Note 11 - Beneficial Interest of Perpetual Trust

A donor established a trust with a national banking association naming an affiliate of the Authority as a beneficiary of the charitable trust upon the benefactors death. Payments from the trust started in 2002. Under terms of the split-interest agreement, the Organization is to receive 10% of the trust's income annually for its unrestricted use. The Organization is required to report the present value of future cash flows. The Organization reports the investment in the trust using the fair value of the trusts assets as determined by quoted market price, with the fair value change reported as a change in beneficial interest – permanently restricted net assets in the statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets which equated a gain of \$21,860 for 2019. The fair value of the trust is reported in the statement of financial position as beneficial interest in perpetual trust and as restricted net assets, nonexpendable of \$243,618.

We applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, consisting of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not opine or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to opine or provide any other assurance

Supplementary and Other Information

Our audit was conducted to opine on the Authority's basic financial statements taken as a whole. The Combined Statements of Net Position, Combined Statements of Financial Activity, and Combined Schedules of Functional Expenses present additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The statements and schedules are management's responsibility, and derive from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. We subjected these statements and schedules to the auditing procedures we applied to the basic financial statements. We also applied certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling statements and schedules directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, these statements are schedules are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated September 13, 2019 on our consideration of the Authority's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The report describes the scope of our internal control testing over financial reporting and compliance, and the results of that testing, and does not opine on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the Authority's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

As management of the Educational Broadcasting Authority, we offer readers of these financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Authority for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2019. This discussion and analysis is designed to assist the reader in focusing on the significant changes in financial position. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the financial statements as a whole.

Financial Highlights

The EBA's total assets increased by \$8,559,160 or 84.42% over the course of the year's operations.

The EBA's current liabilities increased by \$5,975 or 1.52% and long-term liabilities decreased by \$561,400 or 18.0%. Long term liabilities are made up of compensated absences, other post-employment benefits, net pension liability and deferred inflows of resources for pensions.

Basic Financial Statements

The basic financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the EBA's finances in a manner similar to private sector business.

The statement of net position presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities and provides information about the nature and amounts of investments in resources (assets) and the obligations to creditors (liabilities). It also provides the basis for evaluating the capital structure of the Authority and assessing the liquidity and financial flexibility of the Authority.

All of the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position. This statement measures the success of the Authority's operations over the past year.

The final required financial statement is the Statement of Cash Flows. This statement reports cash receipts, cash payments, and net changes in cash resulting from operations, investing, and financing activities and provides answers to such questions as where did cash come from, what was cash used for, and what was the change in the cash balance during the reporting period.

Financial Analysis

Net position may serve, over time, as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. In the case of the EBA, assets exceeded liabilities by \$15,191,522 at the close of the most recent fiscal year.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization, Principles of Combination and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Organization and Principles of Combination

The West Virginia Educational Broadcasting Authority (the Authority), a component unit of the State of West Virginia, is a public corporation which was created by the State of West Virginia and is responsible for extending educational, cultural and informational experiences to all citizens of West Virginia through the construction and operation of noncommercial education TV and radio stations and related facilities statewide. EBA supervises and operates three public TV stations and nine public radio stations plus a statewide two-way microwave network that links the stations and provides special telecommunication services for other state and public service agencies for non-broadcasted activities such as teleconferencing, in-service training, and data delivery.

The following radio and television stations are operated by EBA:

The combined financial statements include the assets, liabilities, financial activities, and cash flows of the West Virginia Educational Broadcasting Authority, each of the above stations and their interrelated affiliated organizations as follows:

The West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) was formed in 1992 as a non-profit corporation. The Foundation was organized exclusively for charitable and educational purposes to receive, hold, disperse, and invest monies or property given or donated to the Authority for educational and eleemosynary purposes related to the preservation, maintenance, promotion, development and growth of educational and public broadcasting in the State of West Virginia. The Authority has sole discretion as to the use of the money and property.

<u>Friends of West Virginia Public Broadcasting, Inc.</u> The Friends solicits funds for the benefit of the related television and radio stations and public broadcasting. Funds are expended by the Friends for the benefit of the related stations in amounts determined by their respective Boards of Directors.

Financial Statement Presentation

The combined financial statements of the Authority have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the Unites States of America as prescribed by Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), including Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statement — and Management's Discussion and Analysis — for State and Local Governments. The financial statement presentation required by GASB No. 34 provides a comprehensive, entity-wide perspective of the Authority's assets, liabilities, net position, revenues, expenses, changes in net position and cash flows and replaces the fund-group perspective previously required. The Authority's net postion are classified as follows:

Net Investment in Capital Assets - This represents the Authority's total investment in capital assets, net of outstanding debt obligations related to those capital assets. To the extent debt has been incurred but not yet expended for capital assets, such amounts are not included as a component of, net investment in capital assets. The Authority had no related outstanding debt as of June 30, 2019.

Restricted Net Position, Expendable – This includes resources in which the Authority is legally contractually obligated to spend resources in accordance with restrictions imposed by external third parties.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization, Principles of Combination and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Restricted net position, nonexpendable - This includes endowment and similar type funds in which donors or other outside sources have stipulated, as a condition on the gift instrument, that the principal is to be maintained inviolate and in perpetuity, and invested for the purpose of producing present and future income, which may either by expended or added to principal. The Authority has one trust that is considered restricted nonexpendable at June 30, 2019 (Note 10).

<u>Unrestricted net position</u> - <u>Unrestricted net position</u> represent resources derived from other than capital assets or restricted net assets. These resources are used for transactions relating to the general operations of EBA, and may be used at the discretion of the Board of Directors to meet current expense for any purpose.

Basis of Accounting

For financial reporting purposes, the Authority is considered to be engaged only in business-type activities. Accordingly, the Authority's financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting with a flow of economic resources measurement focus. Revenues are reported when earned and expenses when material or services are received. All intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated.

Capital Assets

Capital assets include property and equipment. Capital assets are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition or fair value at the date of donation in the case of gifts. Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets which range from 3 to 30 years. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operating expenses as incurred.

Program Rights

Program rights purchased by the Authority and affiliates from the Public Broadcasting Service on an annual basis are expended in the year purchased.

Deferred Production Costs

The costs relating to programs being produced that will be broadcast in a subsequent period are reported as deferred production costs. Grants and contributions related to such programs are included in deferred revenue. As the programs are broadcast, applicable program expenses and revenues are included in the combined statement of revenues, expenses and change in net position.

Revenue Recognition

General appropriations from the State of West Virginia and appropriations from other state agencies which are considered exchange transactions are recorded as operating transfers in the combined statement of revenues, expense and changes in net assets at the time such appropriations are utilized by incurring authorized expenditures as determined on an accrual basis.

Unrestricted contribution and pledges are recorded as revenue in the combined statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net position in the period received. Contributions and grants restricted for specific projects are reported as deferred revenue until qualifying expenses have been incurred.

Donated or contributed services and material, including amounts contributed by other state agencies and component units of the State, are recorded at their fair value on the date of the contribution.

Cash and cash equivalents

For purpose of reporting and the combined statement of cash flows, the Authority and affiliates considers cash on hand, cash in banks, cash with the State of West Virginia and certificates of deposit which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties and which have original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization, Principles of Combination and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Income Taxes

The Authority, as a public corporation established by the State of West Virginia, is recognized as exempt from Federal income taxes. The Friends and the Foundation are non-profit, non-stock corporations which are recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and similar state statutes, and are classified as other than private foundations.

Budgets

Budgets for appropriation from the State of West Virginia are adopted annually on a cash basis and are approved by the State of West Virginia Legislature. Most appropriations for operating funds lapse at year end.

Compensated Absences

Accumulated vacation is accrued as the employees become vested in the benefits. Employees, hired prior to July 1, 2002, vest in accumulated sick leave only upon retirement, when unused sick leave can be converted into termination benefits, such as employer paid premiums for post retirement health care benefits or additional credited service for retirement benefits. A liability for accrued sick leave is recognized to the extent that accumulated leave is expected to be converted to termination benefits on retirement.

Interfund Transactions

Quasi-external transactions are accounted for as revenues and expenses. All other interfund transactions are reported as transfers.

Classification of Revenues

The Authority has classified its revenues as either operating or nonoperating revenues according to the following criteria:

<u>Operating revenues</u> - Operating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of exchange transactions.

Nonoperating revenues - Nonoperating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of non-exchange transactions, such as gifts and contributions, and other revenues that are defined as nonoperating revenues by GASB No. 9, Reporting Cash Flows of Proprietary and Nonexpendable Trust Funds and Governmental Entities That Use Propriety Fund Accounting and GASB No. 34, such as state appropriations and investment income.

Use of Restricted Funds

The Authority has not adopted a formal policy regarding whether to first apply restricted or unrestricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available. Generally, the Authority attempts to utilize restricted funds first when practicable.

Use of Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities and reported revenues and expenses. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Net Position

Of the Authority's restricted net position of \$243,618, none were restricted by enabling legislation.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization, Principles of Combination and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Pensions

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the West Virginia Public Employees Retirement System (the PERS Plan) and additions to/deductions from the PERS Plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the PERS plan. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Net Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB) Liability

For purposes of measuring the net OPEB liability and deferred outflows/inflows of the resources related to other post-employment benefits, and other post-employment benefit expenses, information about the fiduciary net position of the Division's Other Post-Employment Benefits Plan (OPEB) of the West Virginia Retiree Health Benefit Trust Fund (RHBTF) and additions to/deductions from the plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the RHBTF. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value. Detailed information on the investment valuation can be found in the plans' financial statements.

Note 2- Revenue Concentrations

During the year ended June 30, 2019, the Authority recognized revenue of \$10,096,913 from appropriations from the State of West Virginia, and \$2,421,410 from grants from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. The ability of these entities to fund operations at this level is dependent on the state and national economic conditions and related tax collections. Future funding is also dependent on the willingness of legislative and grantor entities to continue funding Authority affiliates.

Note 3- Deposits and Investments

Statement No. 3 of the Government Accounting Standards Board requires government entities to categorize deposits and investments to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the entity at year-end. These categories of risk follow:

At June 30, 2019, the carrying amount of the Authority's cash deposits were \$1,622,062 and the bank balance was \$1,186,845. The differences represent normal reconciling items associated with timing differences and cash on hand. At June 30, 2019, \$1,000,000 of the bank balances was insured by the FDIC (Category 1). <u>Interest rate risk</u> – Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment.

The Authority does not have a formal policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

<u>Credit Risk</u> - Credit risk is the risk that an issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations.

The Authority has no investment policy that limits its investment choices. As of the fiscal years ended June 30, 2019 the Authority's investments were not rated by Standard & Poor's or Moody's.

<u>Concentration of Credit Risk</u> – Concentration of credit risk is the risk of loss attributed to the magnitude of a government's investment in a single issuer.

The Authority places no limit on the amount the Authority may invest in any one issuer. More than 5 percent of the Authority's investments are in VANGUARD and Certificates of Deposits. These investments were 77% and 23% of the Authority's total investments as of June 30, 2019.

<u>Custodial Credit Risk</u> – For an investment, custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the government will not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. All of the Authority's investments are held in the name of the Authority. For deposits, custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the government's deposits may not be returned to it.

<u>Deposits</u> - The Authority does not have a policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2019, none of the Authority's bank balances was exposed to custodial credit risk.

Discount rate. The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.5 percent for all defined benefit plans. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rates assumed that employer contributions will continue to follow the current funding policies. Based on those assumptions, the fiduciary net position for each defined benefit pension plan was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments were applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liabilities of each plan.

Note 6- Other Postemployment Benefits

General Information about the OPEB Plan

Plan description. The government contributes to the West Virginia Other Postemployment Benefit Plan (the Plan), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit postemployment healthcare plan. The financial activities of the Plan are accounted for in the West Virginia Retiree Health Benefit Trust Fund (RHBT), a fiduciary fund of the State of West Virginia. The Plan is administered by a combination of the West Virginia Public Employees Insurance Agency (PEIA) and the RHBT staff. Plan benefits are established and revised by PEIA and the RHBT management with approval of the Finance Board. The Finance Board is comprised of nine members. Finance Board members are appointed by the Governor, serve a term of four years and are eligible for reappointment. The State Department of Administration cabinet secretary serves as Chairman of the Board. Four members represent labor, education, public employees and public retirees. The four remaining members represent the public at large. The Plan had approximately 43,000 policyholders and 63,000 covered lives at June 30, 2017. The RHBT audited financial statements and actuarial reports can be found on the PEIA website at www.peia.wv.gov. Note 6- Other Postemployment Benefits (Continued)

Benefits provided. The Plan provides medical and prescription drug insurance and life insurance. The medical and prescription drug insurance is provided through two options: 1) Self-Insured Preferred Provider Benefit Plan (primarily for non-Medicare-eligible retirees and spouses) and 2) External Managed Care Organizations (primarily for Medicare-eligible retirees and spouses).

Contributions. Paygo premiums are established by the Finance Board annually. All participating employers are required by statute to contribute this premium to the RHBT at the established rate for every active policyholder per month. The active premiums subsidized the retirees' health care by approximately \$150 million for both fiscal years ending June 30, 2017 and June 30, 2018. Contributions to the OPEB plan from the government were \$148,791 for the current fiscal year.

Net OPEB Liabilities, OPEB Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to OPEB

At fiscal year-end, the government reported a liability of \$1,562,136 for its proportionate share of the net OPEB liability. The net OPEB liability, deferred inflows and outflows of resources and OPEB expense were determined by an actuarial valuation date as of June 30, 2017, rolled forward to June 30, 2018, which is the measurement date. The government's proportion of the net OPEB liability was based on a projection of the government's long-term share of contributions to the OPEB plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating governments, actuarially determined.

The long-term rates of return on OPEB plan investments are determined using a building-block method in which estimates of expected future real rates of returns (expected returns, net of OPEB plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentages and by adding expected inflation. The strategic asset allocation consists of 55% equity, 15% fixed income, 10% private equity, 10% hedge fund and 10 % real estate invested. Note 8- Commitments/Contingencies

The Authority is involved in various legal actions, from time to time, in the ordinary course of business. Management is not currently aware of any matters, which will have a significant adverse effect on the accompanying combined financial statements.

Note 9- Risk Management

The Authority is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; employee health and life coverage; and natural disasters.

The State of West Virginia established the Board of Risk and Insurance Management (BRIM) and the Public Employees Insurance Agency (PEIA), to account for and finance uninsured risks of losses for state agencies, institutions of higher education, and component units. The Authority manages it worker's compensation risk by utilizing a private carrier, BrickStreet.

BRIM is a public entity risk pool that provides coverage for general, property, medical malpractice, and automobile liability. PEIA is also a public entity risk pool that provides coverage for employee and dependent health, life and prescription drug insurance.

Note 9- Risk Management (Continued)

BrickStreet provides coverage for workers' compensation and work related accidents. The Authority retains the risk of loss on certain tort and contractor claims in excess of the amount insured or covered by BRIM's insurance carrier.

Through its participation in PEIA and through its private carrier, BrickStreet, the Authority has obtained health coverage and coverage for job related injuries for its employees. In exchange for payment of premiums to PEIA and BrickStreet, the Authority has transferred its risk related to health coverage and job related injuries of employees.

Note 10- Endowment Trusts

In 1991, cash of \$5,764 was transferred to the Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation (the Foundation) to constitute the principal of the Friends of West Virginia Public Radio, Inc. Endowment Fund, for the purpose of funding equipment replacement. Under the terms of the trust agreement, Friends of West Virginia Public Radio, Inc. has the right to receive the income from the fund, but has no control over, or access to the assets of the fund. Therefore, the assets are not included in these financial statements. Funds received by The Friends of West Virginia Public Radio, Inc. restricted for the benefit of this fund are transferred to the Foundation on an annual basis or more often as a significant amount of funds accumulate.

Spending is authorized by the Foundation's Board of Directors. At June 30, 2019, the Endowment Fund had a fair value of \$70,146.

During 2005, the Herscher Foundation created an endowment trust called the Betty J. Herscher Memorial fund for Cultural Programming in the amount of \$200,000 with the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. (WVPBF) as the beneficiary. Under the terms of the agreement, WVPBF must obtain an asset level of \$5,000,000 before the trust funds will be transferred to the Foundation.

The WVBF has the right to receive the income from the fund, but has no control over or access to the assets of the fund. Annual income distributions from the trust must be paid to WVPBF to provide funding for opera and other cultural programming on radio and television.

The annual distribution for 2019 was \$10,000, split in a 75:25 ratio between television and radio.

In 2006, the Abbey Myers Thornhill and Sarah Bishop Thornhill Fund was established by Warren and Carolyn Thornhill at the Beckley Area Foundation (BAF) to benefit the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. Under the terms of the Agreement, the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc., has the right to receive the income from the fund, but has no control over, or access to the assets of the fund. Therefore, the assets are not included in these financial statements. Fund income is distributed on an annual basis to provide funding for educational programming and services. At June 30, 2019, the fund had a fair value of approximately \$112,609.

Note 11 - Beneficial Interest of Perpetual Trust

A donor established a trust with a national banking association naming an affiliate of the Authority as a beneficiary of the charitable trust upon the benefactors death. Payments from the trust started in 2002. Under terms of the split-interest agreement, the Organization is to receive 10% of the trust's income annually for its unrestricted use. The Organization is required to report the present value of future cash flows. The Organization reports the investment in the trust using the fair value of the trusts assets as determined by quoted market price, with the fair value change reported as a change in beneficial interest – permanently restricted net assets in the statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets which equated a gain of \$21,860 for 2019. The fair value of the trust is reported in the statement of financial position as beneficial interest in perpetual trust and as restricted net assets, nonexpendable of \$243,618.

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States and the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*, the financial statements of the business-type activities of the West Virginia Educational Broadcasting Authority and Affiliates (the Authority) (a component unit of the State of West Virginia), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Authority's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated September 13, 2019.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

As part of our financial statement audit, we considered the Authority's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures appropriate in the circumstances to the extent necessary to support our opinion on the financial statements, but not to the extent necessary to opine on the effectiveness of the Authority's internal control. Accordingly, we have not opined on it.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, when performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and timely correct misstatements. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of internal control deficiencies resulting in a reasonable possibility that internal control will not prevent or detect and timely correct a material misstatement of the Authority's financial statements. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all internal control deficiencies that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider material weaknesses. However, unidentified material weaknesses may exist.

NOTE 1 – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

The West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) is a nonprofit corporation organized to receive, hold, disperse and invest monies or property given or donated to the West Virginia Educational Broadcasting Authority (WVEBA) for the educational and charitable purposes related to the preservation, maintenance, promotion, development and growth of educational and public broadcasting in the State of West Virginia. The WVEBA has sole discretion as to the use of the assets of the Foundation.

A summary of significant accounting policies follows:

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and in accordance with applicable standards for governmental nonprofit organizations whereby revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Use of Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities and reported revenues and expenses. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment items are recorded at cost. Depreciation is calculated by the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to expense as incurred.

Revenue Recognition

Unrestricted contributions and grants are recorded as revenue in the statement of financial activity in the period received. Contributions and grants restricted for specific projects are reported as deferred revenue until qualifying expenses have been incurred.

Donated or contributed services and materials are recorded at their fair value on the date of contribution.

NOTE 1 – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Foundation considers cash on hand, cash in banks and certificates of deposit which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties and which have original maturities of ninety days or less to be cash equivalents.

Trade Receivables

Trade receivables are carried at the original invoice. Past experience has enabled management to determine that the collectability of trade receivables is such that no allowance for uncollectible accounts is required for a fair presentation of the financial statements. Trade receivables are written off when deemed uncollectible. Recoveries of trade receivables previously written off are recorded when received.

Income Taxes

The Foundation, which is not considered a private foundation, is a nonprofit corporation which is recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing the programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of financial activity. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. Occupancy costs are allocated based upon square footage. Other costs requiring allocation to the functions are allocated mainly based upon usage.

Distribution of Assets Upon Event of Dissolution

In the event of dissolution, all assets of the Foundation would revert to the WVEBA, if in existence, or to another public corporation or organization which is exempt from income taxes.

Advertising

Advertising is expensed by the Foundation when purchased.

NOTE 1 – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Total Columns (Memorandum Only)

Total columns on the combined statements are captioned "Memorandum Only" to indicate that they are presented only to aid in financial analysis. These amounts are not intended to present all information necessary for a fair presentation in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

NOTE 2 – RISK MANAGEMENT

The Foundation is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters. The Foundation participates in the State of West Virginia Board of Risk and Insurance Management (BRIM), a public entity risk pool established to account for and finance uninsured risks of losses for state agencies, institutions of higher education and component units. BRIM establishes premiums, bills participants, reinsures certain risks, and services claims. Premiums are established using methods which are not necessarily based on actuarial estimates of the amounts necessary to pay prior and current year claims and to establish reserves for catastrophic losses.

NOTE 3 – REVENUE CONCENTRATIONS

During the year ended June 30, 2019, approximately 15% percent of the Foundation's revenue consisted of grants from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB). The amount of CPB funding to which the Foundation is entitled is a function of nonfederal financial support generated by WVEBA, the Foundation, and related Friends organizations. Additionally, future funding levels are dependent upon the continued receipt of Federal appropriations by CPB. 25% of the Foundation's revenue was generated by underwriting agreements.

NOTE 4 – DEPOSITS

At June 30, 2019, the carrying amount of deposits held with financial institutions was \$782,104 and the bank balance was \$536,249. The principal difference between the carry amount and bank balance are deposits in transit and outstanding checks. The bank balance was entirely insured by Federal Depository Insurance.

NOTE 5 – INVESTMENTS

The Foundation investments include marketable equity securities and certificates of deposit with original maturities of more than 90 days that are reported at their fair value in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets. Investment income and gains are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized. The equity investments are as follows:

NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Foundation is organized exclusively for the benefit of the WVEBA and is financially interrelated with WVEBA and various nonprofit Friends organizations that support WVEBA's public television and radio stations and shares common administrative and management personnel with WVEBA. Expenditures paid by the Foundation for the benefit of the WVEBA and affiliates will vary annually based upon available funding. There were no significant transactions with the various related entities during the year.

NOTE 7 – ENDOWMENT TRUSTS

In 2003, Randall and Joyce Broyles created an endowment at the Beckley Area Foundations (BAF) to benefit the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation Inc. Through the Dr. Thomas Walker Memorial Health Foundation matching opportunity, their \$10,000 investment was doubled to \$20,000. In 2003, Television Friends of West Virginia Public Broadcasting Inc. and Friends of West Virginia Public Radio, Inc. each contributed \$5,000 to the Broyles trust, again taking advantage of the matching opportunity, bringing the trust's value to \$40,000. Under the terms of the trust agreement, West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. has the right to receive the income from the fund, but has not control over, or access to the assets of the fund.

NOTE 7 – ENDOWMENT TRUSTS (CONTINUED)

Therefore, the assets are not included in these financial statements. Fund income is distributed on an annual basis to support the activities of West Virginia Public Broadcasting. At June 30, 2019, the fund had a fair value of \$70,146.

During 2005, the Hersher Foundation created an endowment trust called the Betty J. Hersher Memorial Fund for Cultural Programming in the amount of \$200,000 with the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. (WVPBF) as the beneficiary. Under the terms of the agreement, WVPBF must obtain an asset level of \$5,000,000 before the trust funds will be transferred to the Foundation. The WVBF has the right to receive the income from the fund, but has no control over or access to the assets of the fund. Annual income distributions from the trust must be paid to WVPBF to provide funding for opera and other cultural programming on radio and television. The annual distribution for 2019 was \$10,000, split in a 75:25 ratio between television and radio.

In 2006, the Abbey Myers Thornhill and Sarah Bishop Thornhill Fund was established by Warren and Carolyn Thornhill at the Beckley Area Foundation (BAF) to benefit the West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc. Under the terms of the Agreement, West Virginia Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc., has the right to receive the income from the fund, but has no control over, or access to the assets of the fund. Therefore, the assets are not included in these financial statements. Fund income is distributed on an annual basis to provide funding for educational programming and services. At June 30, 2019, the fund had a fair value of approximately \$112,609.

NOTE 8 - BENEFICIAL INTEREST OF PERPETUAL TRUST

A donor established a trust with a national banking association naming an affiliate of the Foundation as a beneficiary of the charitable trust upon the benefactor's death; payments from the trust started in 2002. Under terms of the split-interest agreement, the Foundation is to receive 10% of the trust's income annually for its unrestricted use. The Foundation is required to report the present value of future cash flows in the accompanying financial statements. The Foundation reports the investment in the trust using the fair value of the trust's assets as determined by quoted market price, with the fair value change reported as a change in beneficial interest-permanently restricted net assets in the *statement of financial activity* which equated to a gain of \$21,860 for 2019.

Agency Answer: We do not have this information. The previous contract was bid as a lump sum cost per year.

Agency Answer: Two (2) people were assigned. The final audit was issued in October 2023

11. Can you describe how any extra services were procured from the previous auditor over the period of the contract and the nature of those services?

Agency Answer: Assistance with Journal entries and adjustments.

12. Please describe any significant staff turnover that may impact the audit from the WV EBA perspective? Who are the points of contact from the WV EBA perspective responsible for the audit services and experience level of the WV EBA staff? What is the size of and experience of the entities accounting/ financial reporting department?

Agency Answer: Our previous CFO retired. Our new CFO was not appointed until May 2024. The new CFO has 14 years of experience in state government and non-profit organizations. We have three (3) additional employees with experience ranging from 1-3 years in governmental accounting.

13. Have there been any liquidated damages paid by any of the previous auditors over the last audit contract years?

Agency Answer: No.

14. Were there any change orders issued or contract amendments in the most recent audit contract, if so please describe the nature of the change order and amount? Was the fee disclosed in the prior auditor engagement letter the actual fee paid for service in the prior year?

Agency Answer: There was one change order to adjust an incorrect entry and change orders each year to adjust the total contract amount per the initial pricing page. The fees paid by our agency were as outlined in the original contract. Additional services were requested and paid for by the WV Public Broadcasting Foundation.

15. Please provide the most recent management letter or findings from the audit, Journal entries made and proposed by the auditor, and any passed adjustments you determined not to book.

Agency Answer: These documents are not necessary for this solicitation. The provided documentation is sufficient.

Agency Answer: New CFO is working to implement better internal controls to address the audit findings from prior years.

17. How many individual trial balances are used and please describe how eliminations, consolidations are handled internally.

Agency Answer: As stated in the specifications, we will have two (2) individual trial balances. One for the EBA (State Funds) and one for the Foundation. These are reported separately for CPB purposes and will not be consolidated.

18. Do you only use OASIS or do you have an add-on financial reporting function like Quickbooks or something else for trial balances and financial reporting?

Agency Answer: We also use a software called Beyond for financial reporting.

19. Can you describe the nature of the computer software utilized and the extent of reliance on those programs related to financial reporting, including the nature of any contract software arrangements or SOC 1 or SOC 2 implications?

Agency Answer: The software is your typical accounting software. Has check writing abilities, posting to GL. Adjustments, Receipts, Invoicing, Etc.

Agency Answer: Yes.

21. When will management have the draft of its MD&A completed?

Agency Answer: We plan to have it completed by 7/31/2024.

Agency Answer: We may have the selected firm assist with this preparation.

Agency Answer: Please see Exhibit B, Delivery Schedule. We expect both physical and digital copies of all final reports.
