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

Permanent Performance Stage and Box Office / Entry Point at Camp Washington Carver

Dear members of the selection committee:

The Martinez+Johnson Architecture, PC (M+J) in association with Schuler Shook Theatre Planners and Lighting Designers (SS) is delighted to offer this proposal for design services for a permanent stage, box office and entry point at Camp Washington Carver in Clifftop, WV. We understand that the facility envisions an 8,000sf permanent stage complex, that is to be protected by a working canopy. Additionally, we recognize the Camp's need for a designated box office and entry point and that the project design shall conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Historic Structures.



Project Understanding

In leading projects, Martinez+Johnson Architecture (M+J) understands the importance of communication and commitment in the process of project execution. Performance facilities typically require larger design teams than other project types which involve highly technical (and sometimes competing) disciplines and trades. As examples, structural requirements may affect theatre design issues, mechanical considerations may affect acoustical performance, and regulatory / approval issues can impact overall project schedules. In our work, we believe in establishing in the beginning a framework invested in by the entire design team who will present it in as much detail to an owner as possible such that all parties have an understanding at the outset of critical project decisions.

During a project, the chain of command is fairly simple. The Principal in Charge at M+J will be the primary contact with the Owner and decision making entity and will lead or participate in discussions with other potential stakeholders and regulatory officials. The Principal will also caucus with the other M+J Principal on major design issues and strategies and will be in daily communication with the M+J Project Manager. The PM will co-ordinate the efforts of the design team including the recordation of site conditions and document review and co-ordination. M+J will establish a Project Schedule at the outset that will describe the design and documentation path, building into it time for client review and discussion as well as agency review. At the completion of each design phase, the design team led by M+J will review and co-ordinate documents. In the preservation review process, M+J will lead the effort and create the necessary documents for application and certification.

The implementation strategy for the development of a design plan is slightly different. The key participants in such efforts are the M+J principals and consulting principals, working with key decision makers from the West Virginia Division of Culture and History. The schedule and expectations would also be worked out in advance and M+J would present a schedule of events culminating in an adequately described work product for Owner review and approval.

Specifically, we understand the following key elements and challenges for providing a permanent performance stage and box office entry point at Camp Washington Carver:

Additions to Historic Structures

We have designed new additions to historic properties in many communities around the United States. Theatres such as the Boston Opera House, the Plaza Theatre Center in El Paso, TX, the Saenger Theatre in New Orleans, LA, the Paramount Theater in Charlottesville, VA, and the Colonial Theatre in Pittsfield, MA all required the addition of a larger stagehouse and in some cases an adjacent property to house support spaces for the facility. All required approval from the State Historic Preservation Office, some at the highest level due to the receipt of tax credits. Adding to Camp Washington-Carver grounds will require a high level of sensitivity to the existing historic fabric.

Outdoor Stage


We assume the permanent outdoor stage will need to technically accommodate a multitude of performances, while visually fitting into the camp grounds and spirit. At the same time, ease of set-up for events must be paramount. Provisions for lighting and sound systems, multimedia and special effects will be required. Our theater consultant, Schuler Shook, is well versed in determining all the technical requirements for the proposed programming. This would also include a practical plan for loading and unloading equipment.

Box Office/Entry Control

The permanent box office for large events needs to be located and sized appropriately for the anticipated crowd size. Box offices also play a role as a concierge service to the patron, and need to be friendly and open to encourage dialogue and communication. The entry point and control of the visitor is the first experience for the patron and should not diminish the expectations of the event.

Time Line

It is somewhat difficult to prepare an educated timeline with the limited amount of information and unique nature of this project at this time. It would not be unusual for the preliminary report referenced in the expression of interest to be completed in 90-120 days. Remaining design work and more importantly the approvals will typically require about a year to complete. Shorter timeframes are possible, but a greater level of detail and information is required to determine that.




St Mary's College of Maryland approached M+J with a unique problem of wishing to create a significant public space that functions as a major campus node for the academic year but can be easily transformed into a festival space for an increasing number of summer events and occasional college activities. Through a Preliminary Design process, M+J looked at solutions that would meet budgetary, programmatic, and contextual concerns. Ultimately a coliseum-style amphitheater was presented to the community, as a means of addressing all of their desires.


It is the intent that the amphitheater itself become a permanent 'sculpture' that anchors the space and enhances existing buildings and movement and service patterns but can be made into a grander, higher performing stage for the summer or even isolated events. Additionally, the scheme is inherently environmental. It responds to the context in complimentary ways but is able to transcend that context and convert the entire site and its edges from an academic atmosphere to an event venue and then back again.


This Plan, inspired by the continuing story of Mississippi's significant role in the nation's cultural arts achievements, in organized around four central elements.


- A state-of-the-art Hall of Fame celebrating Mississippi artists of all disciplines.
- · A Conference Center to serve as a catalyst for the continued growth of the arts and arts education
- · Performing arts facilities including a studio grade Theatre Center and an iconic outdoor Amphitheater. The latter has been designed to accommodate up to 12,000 persons. It will be located in a beautiful setting at Bonita Lakes
- An Artists-in-Residence Colony and a Band Shell to draw visitors into the site and engage them in a deeper and more meaningful experience. The pavilion will be a dramatic architectural statement with its roof held in suspension by stone pylons. It will cover approximately 3,500 seats, and grassy terraces will offer temporary open-air seating for another 1,500. Beyond the terraces, a meadow will hold event seating for an additional 7,000 people.











The Sunken Gardens project incorporates an environmentally designed, 6500seat amphitheatre built in and around an existing National Historic Landmark garden and theatrical venue. The extant historic structure will remain in place as a proscenium surround for the new stage and seating areas. Included in the project are the new stagehouse, back-of-house support areas, seating under a protective sunscreen canopy and new box office and front-of-house amenity spaces. The new facilities must be incorporated in an environmentally sensitive fashion so as to maintain a balanced use of water resources and energy usage while providing state-of -the-art performance and patron services.

The entire site is sited within an historic garden area which itself is situated in a public park. Issues such as traffic control and sound attenuation are primary in the design solution for the venue. A wide ranging mix of uses from musical presentations to theatrical and cinematic festivals are under consideration for the amphitheatre. The use of the existing historic towers around the stage will provide the scenic backdrop for all shows staged at the theatre.








M+J was selected by The Paramount Group to guide the restoration effort of this 1,000-seat theatre. The scope of the project included renovation of the historic theatre to accommodate a variety of activities including cinema and THX Dolby-certified digital cinema, live music, small theatre billings, and a regional conferencing center for public/private interests. State-of-the-art audiovisual and lighting equipment was installed and the stage was expanded into the rebuilt Audience Chamber, creating a 30-foot depth, permitting a wider range of performance product. New green room, dressing rooms, and rehearsal rooms were created under the theatre and a new adjacent building was designed to house breakout space, toilets, concessions, administrative offices, and a catering kitchen. The building is an integral part of Charlottesville's Main Street in the heart of the downtown business community and the historic district. As such, the project received Historic Preservation Tax Credits through concurrent dialogue with the Commonwealth and the NPS.





One major component in the emergence of Meridian, Mississippi as a cultural destination is the restoration of the 1891 Grand Opera House and the conversion of the interlocking Marks, Rothenberg Department Store into The Riley Center. The project received federal funding and as such was subject to Federal and State Historic Preservation review. In addition, other funding sources included a grant from Save America's Treasures, courtesy of the Department of the Interior.


The Grand Opera House is located on the second floor of the old department store, originally designed by JB McElfatrick. It closed after World War I and was later rediscovered as the ideal catalyst for the revitalization of downtown Meridian. This theatre is a 1,000-seat jewel box, formerly designed with resplendent wallpapers and decorative surfaces, all of which required some degree of restoration and/or replacement. M+J was able to complete this task through diligent research and some inventiveness, as many of the original materials had not been produced in many years. These


surfaces, as well as the seating, soft materials, and other decorative details have since been successfully restored to their original grandeur.

Additionally, the City of Meridian engaged M+J to develop a comprehensive streetscape for this sizeable structure that would bring legibility, consistency, and coherence to the public spaces around the center. The resulting product has become a center that has been nationally recognized with a number of different awards.


several years prior to its rehabilitation, the Colonial Theatre served the community of Pittsfielld, MA as a hardware shop, among other things. M+J led the design team in an effort to fully restore this iconic theatre. while simultaneously enhancing the production systems and support spaces. The project is a Save America's Treasures grant awardee, and received significant funding from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. In addition to restoring the lobbies and audience chamber, the stage house was rebuilt, new backof-house support under the audience chamber was provided, and the loading and stage movement area behind the theatre was expanded. M+J also designed a Visitor's Center adjacent to the building that provides additional lobby area and new vertical circulation mitigating intrusion into the historic fabric of the theatre. As a result of the restoration, The Colonial Theatre now hosts traveling music and theatre product and accommodates many community groups.




Martinez+Johnson Architecture working with the not-for-profit State Theatre Foundation to reopen the 1938, Art Deco movie-house as a 800-seat performing arts venue in the hopes that it will be the foundation of a cultural center for the entire region. 





The Howard Theater, which opened in accordance with the Secretary of the 1910 and was home to a pantheon of African-American artists, playing host to many of the great black musical artists of the early and mid-twentieth century. Designed by J. Edward Storck, the 1,200-seat theater included orchestra and balcony seating as well as eight proscenium boxes. The interior was lavishly decorated, but no less extravagantly than the exterior, where elements of Beaux-Arts, Italian Renaissance, and neoclassical styles combine in an elegant façade, topped with an over-lifesized statue of Apollo playing his lyre. Alterations in 1931 stripped the building of its classical detailing, its brick façade and windows were covered with a layer of stucco, and the portico was removed and replaced with a streamlined marquee. The building was further altered in 1941 and 1974. It closed in the early 1980's.

M+J's design will take the Howard back to its original 1910 appearance, which is being guided by on-site investigation and historic photographs. This design has won unanimous approval from the DC Historic Preservation Review Board. The firm's work is designed in

Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation in order to qualify the project for the Historic Preservation Tax Credit.

Since it was built in 1928, the Thomas Lamb-designed BF Keith Memorial Theatre has been an important piece of Boston's architectural and cultural history. The Boston Opera House project restored the 2,600-seat landmark in the Boston theater-district and created a state-of-the-art facility with the capacity to accommodate the largest Broadway performances.

The design called for enlarging the stage house, providing new seating configurations, upgraded acoustical and lighting systems, as well as new egress, loading support facilities, and management offices. The theatre contains museum-quality ancillary spaces such as lounges, passages, and lobbies which all required renovation and reprogramming.




The initiative to rehabilitate the Plaza Theatre began as a public/private effort to provide a new home for the local symphony, performing arts organizations, and travelling musical/ theatrical groups. After M+J was selected as head architect in a national search, the project began with the development of a Master Plan. In guiding all subsequent work, the study included programming options, user interviews, backstage expansion, improved loading facilities, modernization of all theatrical and building systems, and building restoration, all in accordance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards. M+J expanded the historic theatre's stage house-renovating it to accommodate full theatrical shows, reconfigured loading operations, and created new performer support spaces. Within the historic building complex, M+J created a second theatre of 250 seats for smaller performances. The renovations and additions to the venue make a stunning permanent home for major performing arts organizations and provide excellent settings for regional emerging arts organizations.



The David H. Koch Theater (formerly the New York State Theater) at Lincoln Center houses the New York City Ballet and New York City Opera. The facility, originally opened in 1964, was in need of general renovation, theater technology upgrades, mechanical electrical plumbing replacement, acoustical upgrades, and accessibility compliance. Stewart Jones, former Principal-in-Charge for JCJ Architecture, led the renovation efforts.

The \$70 Million project was designed and constructed within two years, from 11/01 - 11/09. The design work was coordinated to allow construction within three periods of inactivity within the building; summer and fall 2008, spring 2009, and summer 2009. The program addressed needs for both companies, beginning with converting a fixed orchestra pit to a larger pit with a mechanized lift system (capable of both horizontal and vertical movement). The pit can now contain the largest orchestras required for Opera productions and contract for smaller Ballet orchestras without losing seats. Additional improvements included a complete new stage lighting system with additional lighting positions, new media and broadcast studio and dressing room and wardrobe renovations. Acoustic improvements began with improved sound from the orchestra pit, increased reverberation in the auditorium from removal of sound deadening materials, reshaping of reflecting wall surfaces near the proscenium, and reduced background noise from mechanical and theatrical systems.


Aesthetic improvements included new seats in the auditorium, pre-wired and seamlessly designed for future installation of a seatback titling system. Two center aisles were installed in the former continental style orchestra seating, adding convenience and reducing the visual size of the auditorium. Freshly painted walls and restored decorative surfaces completed the auditorium experience. The lobby was refinished with new carpeting and wall covering that added scale, warmth in a distinguished and youthful appearance. All public restrooms were completely reconfigured to improve accessibility and efficiency. Four decades of donor, directional and identification signage were consolidated into a new contemporary unified appearance.








Chicago's Millennium Park is a new public space created over existing below-ground commuter train lines. The Music Pavilion is the new home of the Grant Park Music Festival, the only cityfunded free music festival in the United States. In addition, the Mayor's Office of Special Events books the Pavilion for popular music acts during Chicago's many summer festivals. The Pavilion stage is also used as an indoor space during the colder months.SchulerShook planned the facility with architect Gehry Partners, including the 4,000 fixed seats and the 7,000-person lawn seating area. They closely watched issues of stage space and circulation to allow users the most complete performance area and gave productions room to grow by designing power and support systems for larger future installations. The Pavilion's striking metal shapes are lit in a multi-color arrangement each night. The architectural lighting and its control scheme are designed to integrate with the performance lighting controls. Schuler Shook's work allowed for multiple uses and the totally new experience for Chicagoans who love music in the park.









For the Ravina Festival Pavilion project SchulerSkook guided the renovation of the 3,500 seat Pavilion and included designs for acoustical, lighting and rigging upgrades. The new orchestra enclosure consists of wall panels and overhead panels, which are required to shift quickly from orchestra concert mode to popular concert mode. The wall panels both pivot and track into storage positions, and the tilt mechanism for the overhead panels can be remotely activated without lowering the panels to the floor, which saves many hours of stage setup time. The new orchestra lighting consists of a combination of halogen and ceramic metal halide - this system is energy efficient and also requires less air conditioning to keep the stage cool in the summer heat. The renovation also included new house lighting, which was arranged in a radial pattern to match the seating layout.








This new outdoor amphitheater was designed by SchulerShook with a variety of programs in mind, including live music ensembles, amplified concerts, and drama are produced at this venue.



PURCHASING AFFIDAVIT

West Virginia Code §5A-3-10a states: No contract or renewal of any contract may be awarded by the state or any of its political subdivisions to any vendor or prospective vendor when the vendor or prospective vendor or a related party to the vendor or prospective vendor is a debtor and the debt owed is an amount greater than one thousand dollars in the aggregate.

DEFINITIONS:

"Debt" means any assessment, premium, penalty, fine, tax or other amount of money owed to the state or any of its political subdivisions because of a judgment, fine, permit violation, license assessment, defaulted workers' compensation premium, penalty or other assessment presently delinquent or due and required to be paid to the state or any of its political subdivisions, including any interest or additional penalties accrued thereon.

"Debtor" means any individual, corporation, partnership, association, limited liability company or any other form or business association owing a debt to the state or any of its political subdivisions. "Political subdivision" means any county commission; municipality; county board of education; any instrumentality established by a county or municipality; any separate corporation or instrumentality established by one or more counties or municipalities, as permitted by law; or any public body charged by law with the performance of a government function or whose jurisdiction is coextensive with one or more counties or municipalities. "Related party" means a party, whether an individual, corporation, partnership, association, limited liability company or any other form or business association or other entity whatsoever, related to any vendor by blood, marriage, ownership or contract through which the party has a relationship of ownership or other interest with the vendor so that the party will actually or by effect receive or control a portion of the benefit, profit or other consideration from performance of a vendor contract with the party receiving an amount that meets or exceed five percent of the total contract amount.

EXCEPTION: The prohibition of this section does not apply where a vendor has contested any tax administered pursuant to chapter eleven of this code, workers' compensation premium, permit fee or environmental fee or assessment and the matter has not become final or where the vendor has entered into a payment plan or agreement and the vendor is not in default of any of the provisions of such plan or agreement.

Under penalty of law for false swearing (West Virginia Code §61-5-3), it is hereby certified that the vendor affirms and acknowledges the information in this affidavit and is in compliance with the requirements as stated.
