A. Firm Overview

Energy Saving Technologies

Responsible design strategies often integrate energy savings technologies with alternative energy sources. Early agreement and commitment by the project team to defined and measurable goals for these design intentions is critical to achieving a successful project. Ideally, the project team for these purposes includes the Owner, design professionals, contractors and in some projects the end user, if not the Owner. Establishing these goals early in the project memorializes the intentions to be as important as space allocation requirements and aesthetic objectives. The goals can include targeted operating costs savings, desired consumed energy targets, education and demonstration and other mutually agreed items. Nearly all building projects now integrate energy savings technologies. Many of these are static design and construction details as simple as building envelop design assessments to determine levels and types of insulation and windows, use of light color roofing materials to reduce heat gain and heat island effects. These and other materials and construction techniques contribute to the overall building system. Active technologies are most often evident in lighting and space conditioning systems. Light fixture design, lamp engineering and automated lighting controls systems are positive contributors to building performance. Integrating lighting systems design with mechanical operational system engineering will further realize energy (and costs). BCI is committed to working with the Client to understand their goals early in the process in order to implement energy saving strategies throughout the project.

Alternative energy source or sometimes identified as renewable energy sources may include: solar thermal panels often used for water heating systems, photovoltaic panels for electricity generation, wind turbines also for power generation and ground and water source heat (geothermal) heat pump systems to utilize the constant earth temperature to supplement heating and cooling systems. These are some of the more common technologies employed in many building initiatives. Other alternative approaches include: biomass and wood gasification systems that are used to generate high heat to generate steam for heating or to power turbines for power generation, and also new fuel cell technologies which are designed to generate electricity. Usually the integration of these and other higher technology and higher capital costs



systems is a function of availability for local or regional knowledge resources, funding, and geographic and climatic conditions. A complete return of investment analysis must also be completed to fully understand the merits of integrating any of these systems - particularly when the objective is for lower operation costs.



Children's Schoolhouse Nature Park Lake Metroparks Kirtland, Ohio

Architectural design and construction documents for the renovation, remodeling, and expansion of an existing historic, one-room schoolhouse. Formerly a single-family residence, the facility now incorporates classrooms, exhibit and display spaces, work areas, observation areas, staff apartment, support facilities, and outdoor classroom space.

This project was completed by Vice President Richard T. Parker prior to joining Brandstetter Carroll Inc.










Akron, Ohio

The Mustill House and Store are the Cascade Locks Park's showcase pieces. Located in their original site at Lock 15 in Akron, Ohio, these canal-era buildings are believed to have been built in the 1850s. Three generations of Mustills serviced canal users until the late 1880s. Today the Store and House have been rehabilitated to their canal-era form by a unique partnership consisting of the City of Akron, the Cascade Locks Park Association, Metro Parks Serving Summit County, and the National Park Service. By itself, the Store possesses the distinction of being one of the last remaining canal structures of its kind. Its companion residence provides outstanding opportunities for interpretation in an authentic setting and context. The restoration ensures that the buildings regain structural integrity, are weather proof and configured to permit them to perform interpretive roles within the park environment.

Richard T. Parker served as the lead architect for this project while principal with his former firm.






Forstmann Conference Center Frost Valley Association Claryville, New York

The 1916 summer home of Julius Forstmann was renovated into a guest house and small group meeting facility that operates in conjunction with other adjacent Frost Valley facilities. Renovations included code compliance upgrading, accessibility improvements, new utility systems, and meeting accommodations. As a historic structure on the national register, all work was completed in compliance with the preservation guidelines of the Department of Interior.

This early 20th century summer retreat home of millionaire Edward W. Moore in Kirtland, Ohio, an eastern suburb of Cleveland, is now an exquisitely renovated conference facility. The mansion was redeveloped by Lakeland Community College as the Mooreland Educational Center. The 10,000 s.f. center is used by faculty, board and the local community for conferences, meetings, training and special receptions. A primary meeting room for 50 persons is supported by breakout rooms, lounge areas, dining areas, and several smaller conferences rooms.

The historic restoration of the building and grounds required complete architectural and landscape architectural services. These included structural, architectural enhancements, and complete mechanical and electrical systems replacement for the conversion of use. A substantial area of original plaster all finish and other hazardous materials were abated prior to redevelopment. The facility combines a turn-of-the-century building with 21st century technology. Each meeting room has individual conditioning controls and is equipped with digital fiber-optic services. Site elements included the front entrance, terrace, and rose garden that were designed to reflect the beauty of the mansion's landscape during the late 1800s. Honor Award for Preservation Achievement from American Institute of Architects – Cleveland and the Cleveland Restoration Society

Langston Hughes Center Fairfax Renaissance Development Corporation Cleveland, Ohio

Renovation of a former Andrew Carnegie Branch Library and the construction of a 13,000 square foot addition has resulted in the Langston Hughes Center, a key catalytic project initiative for the Fairfax Renaissance Development Corporation in Cleveland, Ohio . The Community Center provides a new home for Senior Outreach Services, Inc. whose mission is to serve older adults and their families. The facilities, designed to LEED Silver Certification for New Construction will support programming to optimize health, independence and quality of life through community outreach and support. The building has several multi-purpose spaces, administrative offices, complete commercial kitchen and dining room. In addition the Cleveland Clinic has developed the initial phase of Community Health Resource Center free clinic. The \$4.5 million project was led by Brandstetter Carroll Inc. Vice President Richard T. Parker while principal with schmidtcopeland parkerstevens and was completed in 2008.



Bradley Building Bradley Partners, Ltd. Historic Warehouse District, Cleveland, Ohio

Originally build as executive offices, ticket offices and warehouse space for the Alva Bradley Steamship Company, the 150,000 square foot Bradley Building currently offers 35 apartments and four floors of commercial space occupied by offices, restaurants and nightclubs. This classic example of the Chicago School style, with its expansive glass areas, was designed by Cudell & Richardson in 1888 and expanded in the early 1900's. Renovated as the first adaptive reuse building in the Historic Warehouse District enabled this building to become the catalyst for the District's redevelopment. Renovation included the installation of a modern elevator, exit stairways, complete new systems infrastructure, fire alarm systems, and new common areas. The building facades have been restored and many of the tenant spaces incorporate the brick, cast iron columns and timber beam and deck construction into the design of the spaces.

City Hall and Municipal Court Renovation Lebanon, Ohio

The Lebanon City Hall was constructed originally as a Town Hall and theater. As the need for the theater regressed over time, this space became available. Brandstetter Carroll Inc. totally renovated the second floor of this building to accommodate the current needs of the City of Lebanon, including a new Municipal Court Room, Clerk's space, and Judicial chambers.





Smith's Famous Farm Columbus Recreation and Parks Columbus, Ohio

Since 1952, Smith Farms has preserved the history and heritage of family farming. Richard T. Parker, in association with Floyd Browne Group and their consultant team, made recommendations to retain as many farm buildings as possible to preserve the organic character of the complex. Outdoor activities include an animal paddock, theme gardens, hands on agricultural education area, and themed children's play area. Programming for exhibits and extensive interpretive opportunities were developed for the site as well as for specific buildings.

2005 Downtown Development Award, Downtown Cleveland Partnership The Sincere Building G&Z LLC, inc.
Cleveland, Ohio

Built in the early 1900's and formerly known as the Sincere Building, the building has undergone a dramatic historic renovation and revitalization for adaptive re-use. Its eight floors will provide much-needed mixed-use space in the heart of downtown Cleveland. Anchoring the corner of the last remaining intact assemblage of late nineteenth and early twentieth century commercial structures, the building is being redeveloped with a restaurant on the street level and seven floors of luxurious condominiums above.

The developers have utilized historic tax credits for the renovation as well as preservation easements that will safeguard the building's historically significant features for future generations. The completed project is a vibrant addition to one of Cleveland's most historically intact neighborhoods. The location is emerging as an exciting new entertainment district and is infusing new energy in downtown Cleveland.



Liberty School Apartments Glasgow, Kentucky

Brandstetter Carroll Inc. worked in conjunction with AU Associates to convert an abandoned school building into affordable housing for senior members of the local community. The building consists of 20 apartments that offer spacious and comfortable living to seniors functioning on a fixed income.

The Liberty School Apartments was recently awarded "Best Historic Preservation" by the Community Affordable Housing Equity Corporation.







Honda Wetland Education Center at Glacier Ridge Columbus, Ohio

A collaboration with Floyd Browne Group, Inc., this project brought to life a conceptual plan and program established by Metro Parks and funded in part by The Honda Motor Company. One hundred eighty acres of wetland were constructed or restored at this 970-acre park to provide the public a unique opportunity to view active wetlands. The project includes two new structures for educational opportunities for visitors of Glacier Ridge Metro Park. The new Orientation Shelter and restrooms were composed in part by a dismantled and relocated historic barn, and provide a focal point for the Park. A two-story observation tower provides dramatic views of the wetlands. This project was awarded the 2005 ASLA Ohio Merit Award for Environmental/Sustainable Design, and the 2005 Ohio Parks and Recreation Association Meritorious Facility Development Award.

Fire Station Lebanon, Ohio

This project consisted of a renovation to a masonry building into a 13,500 s.f. four-bay fire station. The facility includes offices, dormitory, day room and related facilities.

Carroll County Library Expansion and Renovation Carrollton, Kentucky

In 2001, Brandstetter Carroll Inc. provided professional services for a feasibility study for an addition and renovation to the existing 6,200 square foot Carroll County Library located in downtown Carrollton, Kentucky. The firm analyzed the existing conditions, interviewed library staff and assessed the existing services provided by the Public Library. The firm then assessed services that were not being provided to its patrons as a result of the existing building conditions. Recommendations were made for an 8,000 square foot addition. In January of 2005, members of the Public Library Board authorized executing the recommendations. The project was completed in 2006, and now boasts features such as a local history room, children's program room, coffee bar, "Y.A. Café", ample staff space and a technologically well-equipped community room with gallery space.

Washington County Historic Courthouse Renovation Springfield, Kentucky

Brandstetter Carroll Inc. provided Architectural and Design services for the historic county courthouse in downtown Springfield. The building was originally constructed in 1815, just five years after the birth of President Abraham Lincoln. It was one of the oldest functioning courthouses in the United States until the spring of 2009, and houses historic artifacts such as the marriage license of President Lincoln's parents. Brandstetter Carroll Inc. conducted a study to determine a phasing plan to renovate the first floor into a museum or visitor's center, and the second floor into county offices. Phase I documents were completed to repair, restore and replace existing windows, and to clean and tuck point the existing brick exterior. Phase II will consist of interior improvements.







This was a historical preservation project.

College Park Gymnasium Community Center Winchester/Clark County, Kentucky

In 1979 Brandstetter Carroll Inc. provided a Feasibility Study to determine the most appropriate method to convert a college gymnasium into a municipal community center. That same study was revisited 21 years later, and was developed through the assistance of a \$1,200,000 state grant. Phase I included a gymnasium and running track along with exercise rooms, meeting spaces and offices. Phase II included an indoor lap pool, therapy pool and fitness center addition. Total project cost was approximately \$6,000,000.
