Main Street Proposal January 2016

- The firm of Michael Gioulis Historic Preservation Consultant has provided design and other services to Main Street communities since 1989; part-time in 1989; and full-time since 1990.
 This includes conceptual and not for construction sketches for commercial buildings, site plans, streetscapes, telephone and email consultations on specific topics such as color schemes, signage and tax credits.
- Michael Gioulis has provided training workshops for volunteer design committees consistent with accepted Main Street design practices since 1989. This includes training on the National Trust's Four Point Approach. He has conducted semi-annual workshops for the State Main Street program and has developed and written editions one to four of an Owner's Maintenance Manual for downtown property owners. Mr. Gioulis has participated in over 50 resource team visits and 20 ON TRAC assessment team visits as well as annual business enhancement teams for Main Street and ON TRAC communities.
- Mr. Gioulis provides, in his private practice, assistance to property owners to qualify for historic
 preservation tax credits since 1984. He has provided, with the same knowledge and expertise,
 the same historic preservation tax credit assistance to property owners within Main Street and
 ON TRAC communities as part of his past contract services.
- In his private practice, Mr. Gioulis has successfully completed numerous National Register of Historic Places nominations in addition to working with Historic Landmarks Commissions(HLC) enabling legislation.
- Mr. Gioulis has assisted several municipalities and county governments with reviewing and implementing planning and zoning laws.
- Michael Gioulis has a Bachelor's Degree in Architecture from City College in New York City and graduated in 1977. He has been self-employed as a Historic Preservation Consultant in West Virginia and surrounding states since 1984.

 Town Hall Meeting in March of 2009. He along with Christina Crookshanks and Douglas Hylton

 Partnership that Works session. As part of his private practice, Mr. Gioulis, a member of a
 team held and spoke at a public meeting in December, 2011 for the GSA on the Huntington
 Federal Building Modernization Project.

- Residential and Commercial Properties; and West Virginia Brownfields Redevelopment Olympics Conference Session. Mr. Gioulis, along with Iowa Architect, Tim Reinders, led a Main Street Manager's Training in Martinsburg, WV on Sustainability in January of 2011.
- Michael Gioulis served as the Architects/Designer liaison for the State Coordinators, Executive Committee and the National Trust for Historic Preservation from 2009 until 2011. He is on the steering committee for planning the architects and designers sessions at the National Main Streets Annual meetings. In 2015 he spoke at the architects training on West Virginia's Growing Healthy Communities Project and its connection to Main Street Programs.
- The firm of Michael Gioulis Historic Preservation Consultant has worked and provided services in all of the past and current certified Main Street West Virginia communities as listed: Charleston Main Streets East End, Charleston Main Streets West Side, Buckhannon, Elkins, Fairmont, Kingwood, Mannington, Martinsburg, Morgantown, Philippi, Point Pleasant, Ripley, Ronceverte, Wheeling, Harpers Ferry, St. Albans, Weirton, Beckley, Hinton, New Martinsville, Alderson, Huntington, Parkersburg, Williamson and White Sulphur Springs. He has also worked and provided services in the following past and current WV ON TRAC communities: Parkersburg, Sutton, Belington, Beverly, Charles Town, Kenova, Marlinton, Parsons, Romney, Rowlesburg, Elkins, Madison, Matewan, Mt. Hope, Oak Hill, Sistersville, Wheeling and Shinnston. Providing past services and work in each of the communities has given Mr. Gioulis an enormous understanding of each community's needs and plans for building improvements.

Delivery Requirements:

- Contractor will work under the supervision of the West Virginia Main Street Coordinator.
- Contractor will visit all certified Main Street and ON TRAC communities as the need arises to consult with building owners and the local manager regarding design projects and issues related to building rehabilitation.
- Contractor will secure written permission of the West Virginia Main Street Coordinator prior to taking on any projects outside the scope of activities in this contract.
- All visits will be initiated by a request from the local Main Street or ON TRAC Manager to the West Virginia Development Office, and the West Virginia Development Office will assign the request to the Contractor.
- Onsite visits shall include meeting with property owners, studying individual buildings, finding
 feasible design solutions, and encouraging implementation consistent with the Secretary of
 Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation.
- Contractor's work will be consistent with the "Main Street Approach" to historic preservation design as developed by the National Main Street Center.
- Contractor will participate in resource team visits for new towns selected as the design
 consultant no more than three (3) times a year. Participation will include, pre-visit preparation,
 three-days staff on site in the new community along with other members of the team,
 interviewing various members of the community and preparing both an oral presentation to the
 community and following up with a written report for inclusion in the resource team's final
 report.
- The contractor shall plan and conduct a one-day workshop design workshop for program managers and design committees in the West Virginia Main Street program. This one-day workshop will be geared toward the newly designated communities. Workshop training will be decided upon by the contractor and the State Office, but will generally focus on the principles of good design relative to historic preservation and building rehabilitation.

- The contractor shall attend local program's design committee meetings as requested by the local program manager to assist the committee with particular issues, such as developing and implementing design guidelines, design review, work plan development, etc.
- As requested by the State Office contractor will assist in planning and participate in annual instate trainings.
- The contractor will attend the National Main Street Center's annual conference and designers meeting held prior to the conference.

Schedule:

- All work will begin upon award of contract and extend for a period of one year. The contract may be renewed or extended if all parties agree to terms.
- Written reports for each community assessment will be submitted on an agreed upon schedule with the State Office.
- Other reports or conceptual drawings will be completed and delivered to the local Main Street manager or ON TRAC's liaison office within thirty days of the Contractor completing the on-site visit. Copies will be submitted to the Main Street West Virginia office also within thirty days.
- The Contractor will submit monthly reports to the State Coordinator describing projects and the number and location of site visits and number of hours worked on each project.
- The Contractor will supply digital photos of all projects both before and after the work is completed.
- The Contractor will furnish an accounting of all work performed at the end of the contract. This will include number of on-site visits, documentation of projects and the status of all projects.

Bid Submission Requirements:

- Resume of Michael Gioulis, principal on project is attached.
- Mr. Gioulis has worked for the Main Street West Virginia program since 1989: part time in 1989; full time since 1990. Mr. Gioulis has attended every National Main Street Town Meeting since 1992 up until the present; this includes two days of training for state designers in addition to other educational and continuing education sessions. In 2011 Mr. Gioulis presented at a plenary session at the Iowa National Main Streets Conference entitled "A Four-Point Approach to Economic Development". Mr. Gioulis has participated in over twenty-eight (28) Business Enhancement Teams (BET's) in the Main Street communities. Mr. Gioulis has also participated in over twenty five (25) Resource Team visits for West Virginia Main Street communities and eighteen (18) Assessment Team visits for West Virginia ON TRAC communities, visiting some communities more than once. Mr. Gioulis currently serves twenty five (25) West Virginia communities.
- Mr. Gioulis has served on the selection team for the State Main Street application workshops. The selection team review includes on-site visits and interviews with community stakeholders. He has participated and hosted a number of workshops including Design Committee Training and Design Guideline Workshops. He has attended the Annual Meeting and banquets for the State in addition to individual Main Street communities. He has assisted individual Main Street communities with Design Guidelines, specifically Huntington, Morgantown, New Martinsville, Harpers Ferry and others. He has served as an advisor on Planning Legislation, the Governor's Conference on Housing under Governor Manchin, the Community of Cass under the auspices of the WV Development Office and the National Trust of Historic Preservation Housing Task Force.

- Mr. Gioulis organized a Downtown Revitalization Session for the Annual Main Street Conference in 2005; served on the New Town Selection Team for 2005 where the Main Street New Town applications were reviewed for the communities of Charleston West Side, Ronceverte, White Sulphur Springs and Richwood. He held a Graffiti Mitigation Workshop in Charleston's East End. Mr. Gioulis has made site visits to Kenova, Logan and McDowell County for the State Main Street office in order to evaluate the local communities for future Main Street status and how to better achieve that status. He has also conducted Tri-State Workshops in Cumberland, Maryland and Ashland, Kentucky.
- Mr. Gioulis has completed numerous successful tax certification applications. These include the old Coca-Cola Warehouse building located in the Wharf District of Morgantown, WV; numerous projects in downtown Huntington, WV for Doctor Joseph B. - Mr. Gioulis has developed and conducted numerous training and technical workshops on design-related topics consistent with accepted Main Street design practices. These include design workshops for the West Virginia Main Street office from 1989 to the present; presentation to the National Composites Fabrications Association meeting in Virginia in 1995; Main Street conferences, both in-state and out-of-state; and others. Mr. Gioulis has attended all but one of the annual National Main Street Center's Town Meetings from 1989 to the present, 2015 in Atlanta, Georgia and other training and workshops on the Main Street approach.
- The Contractor will be available as required to complete the requirements of the RFQ. From
 previous Main Street experience, it is anticipated that approximately 40% of the Contractor's
 normal business time will be allocated to this contract and approximately 60% of the office's
 resources (clerical, production, etc.).
- Mr. Gioulis has provided technical advice and conceptual drawings to the Moundsville
 Downtown Economic Revitalization Committee, preparing a National Register nomination for their downtown and advising on the rehabilitation of 14 downtown buildings; the city of St.

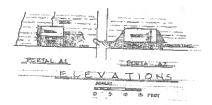

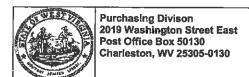

Prior to starting his historic preservation consulting company in 1984, Michael served as Historical Architect for the West Virginia Department of Culture and History and as Assistant Director of the Historic Preservation Unit. He was involved in a number of programs while employed by the state, including survey and planning grants, historic resource surveys, review of construction grant projects, and tax certification applications.

Michael is familiar with all aspects of interpreting standards for rehabilitation of existing and historic buildings and has been involved in rehabilitation projects and design assistance programs for downtown structures. Since 1988 he has been awarded the contract for the Design Consultant for the West Virginia Main Street Program, and subsequently the ON TRAC Program. This work has resulted in over 1,000 individual design projects and includes participating in the development of and conducting workshops on design-related topics; training local design committees in historic preservation and downtown revitalization concepts; energy efficiency; healthy lifestyles and smart growth principals; and training Main Street and ON TRAC staff and volunteers. It also included the participation in resource team visits, assessment team visits and technical assistance responses. Technical assistance includes conceptual drawings only and not construction documents for commercial buildings, site plans, streetscapes, telephone and email consultations on specific topics such as color schemes, signage and tax credits. All design assistance he provides is consistent with accepted Main Street design practices which includes the National Main Street Center's Four Point Approach. It is also consistent with the National Park Service's Secretary of the Interior's Standards for historic preservation products. Resource teams involve intensive site visits in a charrette environment reviewing community resources and developing strategies for revitalization. He has participated in over 50 resource teams and has written a Maintenance Manual for downtown property owners as well as a second edition of said manual.

In addition to the Main Street services, Michael has completed numerous successful tax certification applications and National Register nominations, prepared multiple Section 106 reports, conducted many historic resource surveys and a variety of facility assessment studies, and participated in numerous individual rehabilitation and restoration projects. Projects have included the restoration of 20 building facades in downtown Matewan, WV; the successful rehabilitation of 17 downtown buildings and other public projects in St. Clairsville, OH; the revitalization of the historic waterfront into a major urban park in Wheeling, WV; and the extensive facility assessments for all 55 of West Virginia's county courthouses.

Vendor shall be exclusively responsible for payment of employees and contractors for all wages and salaries, taxes, withholding payments, penalties, fees, fringe benefits, professional liability insurance premiums, contributions to insurance and pension, or other deferred compensation plans, including but not limited to, Workers' Compensation and Social Security obligations, licensing fees, etc. and the filing of all necessary documents, forms, and returns pertinent to all of the foregoing.

Vendor shall hold harmless the State, and shall provide the State and Agency with a defense against any and all claims including, but not limited to, the foregoing payments, withholdings, contributions, taxes. Social Security taxes, and employer income tax returns.

- 36. INDEMNIFICATION: The Vendor agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the State and the Agency, their officers, and employees from and against: (1) Any claims or losses for services rendered by any subcontractor, person, or firm performing or supplying services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of the Contract; (2) Any claims or losses resulting to any person or entity injured or damaged by the Vendor, its officers, employees, or subcontractors by the publication, translation, reproduction, delivery, performance, use, or disposition of any data used under the Contract in a manner not authorized by the Contract, or by Federal or State statutes or regulations; and (3) Any failure of the Vendor, its officers, employees, or subcontractors to observe State and Federal laws including, but not limited to, labor and wage and hour laws.
- 37. PURCHASING AFFIDAVIT: In accordance with West Virginia Code § 5A-3-10a, all Vendors are required to sign, notarize, and submit the Purchasing Affidavit stating that neither the Vendor nor a related party owe a debt to the State in excess of \$1,000. The affidavit must be submitted prior to award, but should be submitted with the Vendor's bid. A copy of the Purchasing Affidavit is included herewith.
- 38. ADDITIONAL AGENCY AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT USE: This Contract may be utilized by other agencies, spending units, and political subdivisions of the State of West Virginia; county, municipal, and other local government bodies; and school districts ("Other Government Entities"). Any extension of this Contract to the aforementioned Other Government Entities must be on the same prices, terms, and conditions as those offered and agreed to in this Contract, provided that such extension is in compliance with the applicable laws, rules, and ordinances of the Other Government Entity. If the Vendor does not wish to extend the prices, terms, and conditions of its bid and subsequent contract to the Other Government Entities, the Vendor must clearly indicate such refusal in its bid. A refusal to extend this Contract to the Other Government Entities shall not impact or influence the award of this Contract in any manner.
- 39. CONFLICT OF INTEREST: Vendor, its officers or members or employees, shall not presently have or acquire an interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict with or compromise the performance of its obligations hereunder. Vendor shall periodically inquire of its officers members and employees to ensure that a conflict of interest does not arise. Any conflict of interest discovered shall be promptly presented in detail to the Agency.
- 40. REPORTS: Vendor shall provide the Agency and/or the Purchasing Division with the following reports identified by a checked box below:

eports may include, but are not limited to, quantities purchased, agencies utilizing the
contract, total contract expenditures by agency, etc.
Quarterly reports detailing the total quantity of purchases in units and dollars, along

41. BACKGROUND CHECK: In accordance with W. Va. Code § 15-2D-3, the Director of the Division of Protective Services shall require any service provider whose employees are regularly employed on the grounds or in the buildings of the Capitol complex or who have access to sensitive or critical information to submit to a fingerprint-based state and federal background inquiry through the state repository. The service provider is responsible for any costs associated with the fingerprint-based state and federal background inquiry.

- 42. PREFERENCE FOR USE OF DOMESTIC STEEL PRODUCTS: Except when authorized by the Director of the Purchasing Division pursuant to W. Va. Code § 5A-3-56, no contractor may use or supply steel products for a State Contract Project other than those steel products made in the United States. A contractor who uses steel products in violation of this section may be subject to civil penalties pursuant to W. Va. Code § 5A-3-56. As used in this section:
 - a. "State Contract Project" means any erection or construction of, or any addition to, alteration of or other improvement to any building or structure, including, but not limited to, roads or highways, or the installation of any heating or cooling or ventilating plants or other equipment, or the supply of and materials for such projects, pursuant to a contract with the State of West Virginia for which bids were solicited on or after June 6, 2001.

 b. "Steel Products" means products rolled, formed, shaped, drawn, extruded, forged, cast, fabricated or otherwise similarly processed, or processed by a combination of two or more or such operations, from steel made by the open heath, basic oxygen, electric furnace, Bessemer or other steel making process. The Purchasing Division Director may, in writing, authorize the use of foreign steel products if:
 - c. The cost for each contract item used does not exceed one tenth of one percent (.1%) of the total contract cost or two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00), whichever is greater. For the purposes of this section, the cost is the value of the steel product as delivered to the project; or
 - d. The Director of the Purchasing Division determines that specified steel materials are not produced in the United States in sufficient quantity or otherwise are not reasonably available to meet contract requirements.

43. PREFERENCE FOR USE OF DOMESTIC ALUMINUM, GLASS, AND STEEL: In Accordance with W. Va. Code § 5-19-1 et seq., and W. Va. CSR § 148-10-1 et seq., for every contract or subcontract, subject to the limitations contained herein, for the construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, improvement or maintenance of public works or for the purchase of any item of machinery or equipment to be used at sites of public works, only domestic aluminum, glass or steel products shall be supplied unless the spending officer determines, in writing, after the receipt of offers or bids, (1) that the cost of domestic aluminum, glass or steel products is unreasonable or inconsistent with the public interest of the State of West Virginia, (2) that domestic aluminum, glass or steel products are not produced in sufficient quantities to meet the contract requirements, or (3) the available domestic aluminum, glass, or steel do not meet the contract specifications. This provision only applies to public works contracts awarded in an amount more than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) or public works contracts that require more than ten thousand pounds of steel products.

The cost of domestic aluminum, glass, or steel products may be unreasonable if the cost is more than twenty percent (20%) of the bid or offered price for foreign made aluminum, glass, or steel products. If the domestic aluminum, glass or steel products to be supplied or produced in a "substantial labor surplus area", as defined by the United States Department of Labor, the cost of domestic aluminum, glass, or steel products may be unreasonable if the cost is more than thirty percent (30%) of the bid or offered price for foreign made aluminum, glass, or steel products. This preference shall be applied to an item of machinery or equipment, as indicated above, when the item is a single unit of equipment or machinery manufactured primarily of aluminum, glass or steel, is part of a public works contract and has the sole purpose or of being a permanent part of a single public works project. This provision does not apply to equipment or machinery purchased by a spending unit for use by that spending unit and not as part of a single public works project.

All bids and offers including domestic aluminum, glass or steel products that exceed bid or offer prices including foreign aluminum, glass or steel products after application of the preferences provided in this provision may be reduced to a price equal to or lower than the lowest bid or offer price for foreign aluminum, glass or steel products plus the applicable preference. If the reduced bid or offer prices are made in writing and supersede the prior bid or offer prices, all bids or offers, including the reduced bid or offer prices, will be reevaluated in accordance with this rule.

East End Historic District Historic Resource Survey and National Register Nomination Charleston, West Virginia 2013-2014

The Charleston Historic Landmarks Commission contacted the Firm in the Fall of 2013 to conduct a Historic Resource Survey of the north section of the East End neighborhood in the City of Charleston with the intent of expanding the existing East End Historic District. This project was funded by a grant from the WV State Historic Preservation Office and the City of Charleston, The Firm had previously surveyed the majority of Washington Street East and the warehouse district; these areas were to be incorporated into the new survey. The original East End Historic District only encompassed the resources located to the east of Washington Street and omitted Lee Street entirely. The Historic Resource Survey documented a total of 826 resources, some of which were modern.

In consultation with the Charleston Historic Landmarks Commission and the WV State Historic Preservation Office, a boundary for the expanded East End Historic District was determined and the Firm completed and submitted a National Register of Historic Places nomination. The new expanded district encompassed the original district plus the area bounded roughly by Dixie Street, Greenbrier Street, Lee Street East and Shelton Alley. All historic resources within that boundary are included in the new expanded district. There are 644 contributing resources and 164 non-contributing resources in the expanded boundary. The district was listed in the Register on December 14, 2014. The businesses and home owners in the district have not only the honor of being within a historic district but there are financial incentives for rehabilitation projects

Mr. Glouis has been active in Historic Preservation in West Virginia since 1977. He served as Historical Architect for the West Virginia Department of Culture and History and as Assistant Director of the Historic Preservation Unit. While there he was involved in a number of programs, including: Survey and Planning grants; historic resource surveys; review of construction grant projects; and tax certification applications. He is familiar with all aspects of interpreting standards for rehabilitation of existing and historic buildings. In private practice, (established 1984) he has been involved in rehabilitation projects and design assistance programs for downtown structures. This includes services to the West Virginia Main Street Office, resulting in over 800 individual design projects, as well as workshops, resource team visits and technical assistance responses. Resource teams involve intensive site visits in a charrette environment reviewing community resources and developing strategies for revitalization. He has participated in over 30 teams. In addition, Michael has written a Maintenance Manual for downtown property owners. He has completed a number of successful tax certification applications and has participated in individual rehabilitation and restoration projects including the restoration of 20 building facades in downtown Matewan, WV.

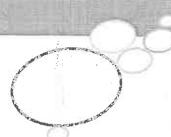
A number of training and technical workshops have been conducted by Mr. Gioulis. 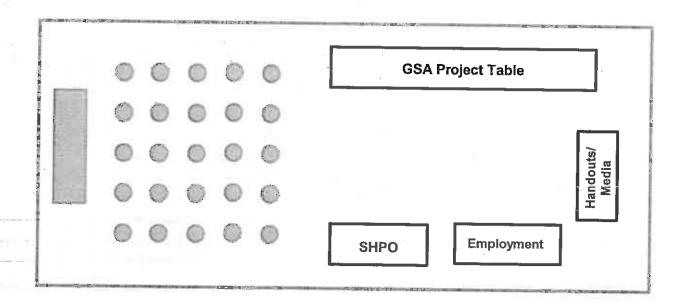
What is the purpose of this Public Meeting?

Frequently Asked Questions – Preservation

Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act

What is the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA)?

The NHPA is the core legislation regarding the preservation of historic and cultural properties in the United States. The NHPA created many familiar components of preservation in the United States, such as the National Register of Historic Places, State Historic Preservation Offices (SHPOs), and Federal stewardship programs regarding Federally owned or managed historic properties.

What is the West Virginia State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO)?

The West Virginia SHPO is part of the West Virginia Division of Culture and History, whose mission is to identify, preserve, protect, promote and present the ideas, arts and artifacts of West Virginia's heritage, building pride in our past accomplishments and confidence in our future.

The West Virginia SHPO encourages, informs, supports, and participates in the efforts of the people of West Virginia to identify, recognize, preserve and protect West Virginia's prehistoric and historic structures, objects and sites. The Office administers both the state and federal historic preservation programs. They aid federal and state agencies, local governments and the general public in identifying and preserving the physical historic and prehistoric resources of West Virginia.

What is Section 106?

Section 106 of the NHPA requires Federal agencies to take into account the effects of their undertakings on historic properties. The goal of Section 106 Consultation is to identify historic properties that may be affected by the undertaking, assess the effects of the undertaking on these historic properties, and seek ways to avoid, minimize, or mitigate any adverse effects.

Project Background

Who is the General Services Administration (GSA)?

GSA is a federal agency whose mission is to provide superior workplaces, expert technology solutions, contracting services, purchasing and travel solutions and government-wide management policies, at best value. GSA's services allow federal agencies to focus on their vital core missions.

GSA owns and operates the Huntington Federal Building, whose sole tenant is the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Who is the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE)?

The USACE is a federal agency and a major Army command made up of some 38,000 civilian and military personnel, making it the world's largest public engineering, design and construction management agency.

The Corps' mission is to provide vital public engineering services in peace and war to strengthen the nation's security, energize the economy, and reduce risks from disasters.

Huntington Federal Building

The Federal Building in Huntington, WV, is a seven story office building containing 138,588 gross square feet on a 1.33 acre lot. The building was constructed in 1959 of brick with polished granite base, and houses the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) district office. It was designed by prominent Charleston architectural firm CE Silling and Associates, the state's oldest still-operating architecture firm.

Why is this building important to the historic district of Downtown Huntington?

The building is located within the Downtown Huntington Historic District, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Within the downtown historic district, it is part of a group of civic buildings, which includes City Hall, the Cabell County Courthouse and Sidney L. Christie Federal Building. This grouping of buildings effectively creates a "government square" subset of the historic district. These buildings represent historic architectural styles prevalent during their construction and during the period of significance of the historic district.



Frequently Asked Questions - Project

Project Need

Several factors are driving the renovation project at the Huntington Federal Building:

- Issues with existing façade
- · Heating Ventilation and Air Conditioning System is not energy efficient
- Current office layout does not maximize productivity for USACE employees
- New security upgrade mandates for USACE facilities across the country

Project Accomplishments

The project will accomplish:

- \checkmark Installation of new building façade and windows, matching Historic Downtown Huntington aesthetics
- ✓ New high-performance heating ventilation and air conditioning system
- √ Installation of rooftop solar panels
- ✓ Interior workspace renovations and new systems furniture
- ✓ Renovations for security standards compliance

Project Timeline

The project is currently underway, with exterior construction at Huntington beginning this month. Construction will reach substantial completion in the Summer of 2015.

What will the new Huntington Federal Building look like?

A rendering of the building is available in the back of this packet.

Will construction work impact traffic?

You may have noticed that construction staging has already begun at the site. Construction will force traffic lane and sidewalk closures on 5th Avenue and 8th Street near the building. GSA and the Corps are working with the city on these closures, and will provide the necessary signage and safety requirements at the facility.

Where will the USACE Employees go during Renovations?

GSA and the Corps of Engineers have worked closely since the inception of this project to determine a way in which to complete renovations with least disruption to the Corps employees. GSA procured temporary lease space at the Pullman Plaza Hotel in downtown Huntington to house the majority of employees during renovations. Some USACE employees will move next door to the Sidney Christie Courthouse, and a few will remain in the Federal Building during renovations.

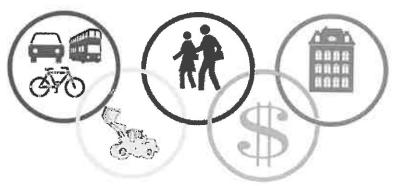

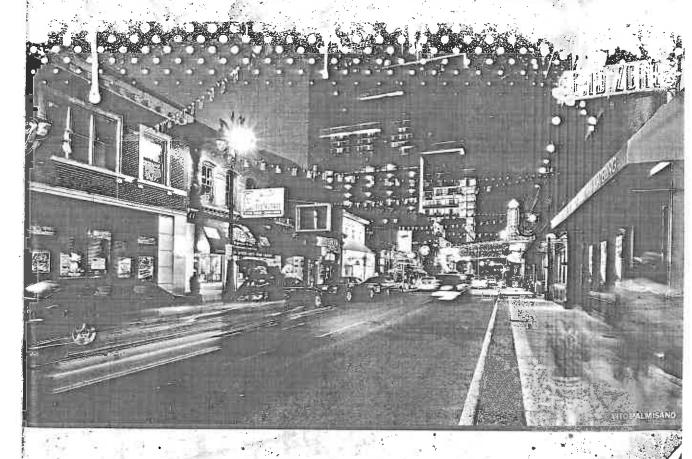

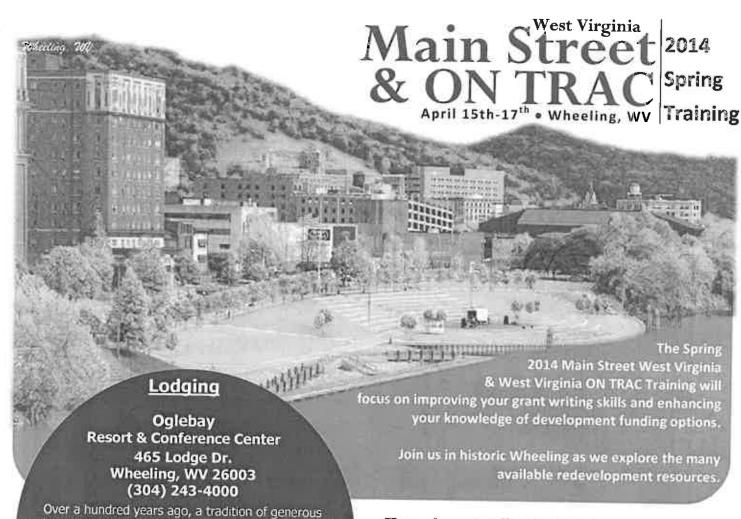

Building Purchase or Investigation Checklist

The following checklist suggests the kinds of information you will need and the steps you should take to reach an informed decision.

These items relate to the building itself and regulatory issues. Financing and other issues are not included.

Building/Property Inspection:

Can the building do what you want

 - Verify no existing contemplated assessments
 - Verify no pending rezoning
 - Verify no pending administrative proceedings or governmental plans or studies
 - Verify no utility moratorium

Miscellaneous Other Documentation To Be Secured From The Current Owner:

- Notices of any new or special assessment or taxes
- Information with respect to any pending hazard or liability insurance claims
- Notices with respect to exercise of any right of eminent domain by the State

What can a Main Street, Ontrac or other downtown development entity do to help

- Establish a "one stop shopping" program for building owners. This would explain all regulations applying to building rehab, and provide forms, telephone numbers, contacts etc. to all persons and agencies involved in rehabs. The building permit process, fire codes, building codes, licenses, assistance etc. would all be in one place for the owners. When someone wanted to rehab a building they would only have to have this one package for total information.

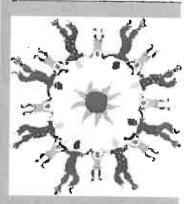

The workshop will identifying significant historic details and elements of many of our downtown commercial and residential buildings.

The purpose is to provide familiarity with terms we use when rehabilitating and discussing historic buildings, so that we can better communicate. In addition, understanding historic features of buildings gives us a better sensitivity to make decisions in rehabilitation projects that protect these character defining elements. As has been stated often in the Main Street approach, the key step in treating Main Street buildings is to treat each as an individual. We do not promote a "stylistic" approach to revitalization. Each building is a product of its own time, significant for its contribution to the continuum of development in the built environment. Therefore it is important to recognize what makes a building significant.

While looking at the buildings on the tour we will also point out or discuss some common maintenance issues that we often see in historic and older buildings. Much of this topic may be covered in earlier sessions at the conference and the on site tour will reinforce some of this discussion.

Following is a rough outline of the program, though we will necessarily be flexible and adjust or react to discussions or questions as they arise. We want to encourage a comfortable atmosphere of give and take during the workshop.

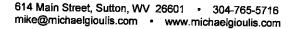

PURCHASING AFFIDAVIT

MANDATE: Under W. Va. Code §5A-3-10a, no contract or renewal of any contract may be awarded by the state or any of its political subdivisions to any vendor or prospective vendor when the vendor or prospective vendor or a related party to the vendor or prospective vendor is a debtor and: (1) the debt owed is an amount greater than one thousand dollars in the aggregate; or (2) the debtor is in employer default.

EXCEPTION: The prohibition listed above does not apply where a vendor has contested any tax administered pursuant to chapter eleven of the W. Va. Code, workers' compensation premium, permit fee or environmental fee or assessment and the matter has not become final or where the vendor has entered into a payment plan or agreement and the vendor is not in default of any of the provisions of such plan or agreement.

DEFINITIONS:

"Debt" means any assessment, premium, penalty, fine, tax or other amount of money owed to the state or any of its political subdivisions because of a judgment, fine, permit violation, license assessment, defaulted workers' compensation premium, penalty or other assessment presently delinquent or due and required to be paid to the state or any of its political subdivisions, including any interest or additional penalties accrued thereon.

"Employer default" means having an outstanding balance or liability to the old fund or to the uninsured employers' fund or being in policy default, as defined in W. Va. Code § 23-20-2, failure to maintain mandatory workers' compensation coverage, or failure to fully meet its obligations as a workers' compensation self-insured employer. An employer is not in employer default if it has entered into a repayment agreement with the insurance Commissioner and remains in compliance with the obligations under the repayment agreement.

"Related party" means a party, whether an individual, corporation, partnership, association, limited liability company or any other form or business association or other entity whatsoever, related to any vendor by blood, marriage, ownership or contract through which the party has a relationship of ownership or other interest with the vendor so that the party will actually or by offect receive or control a portion of the benefit, profit or other consideration from performance of a vendor contract with the party receiving an amount that meets or exceed five percent of the total contract amount.

AFFIRMATION: By signing this form, the vendor's authorized signer affirms and acknowledges under penalty of law for false swearing (*W. Va.
