- 1. REVIEW DOCUMENTS THOROUGHLY: The attached documents contain a solicitation for bids. Please read these instructions and all documents attached in their entirety. These instructions provide critical information about requirements that if overlooked could lead to disqualification of a Vendor's bid. All bids must be submitted in accordance with the provisions contained in these instructions and the Solicitation. Failure to do so may result in disqualification of Vendor's bid.
- 2. MANDATORY TERMS: The Solicitation may contain mandatory provisions identified by the use of the words "must," "will," and "shall." Failure to comply with a mandatory term in the Solicitation will result in bid disqualification.

All Vendors submitting a bid must attend the mandatory pre-bid meeting. Failure to attend the mandatory pre-bid meeting shall result in disqualification of the Vendor's bid. No one person attending the pre-bid meeting may represent more than one Vendor.

An attendance sheet provided at the pre-bid meeting shall serve as the official document verifying attendance. The State will not accept any other form of proof or documentation to verify attendance. Any person attending the pre-bid meeting on behalf of a Vendor must list on the attendance sheet his or her name and the name of the Vendor he or she is representing.

Additionally, the person attending the pre-bid meeting should include the Vendor's E-Mail address, phone number, and Fax number on the attendance sheet. It is the Vendor's responsibility to locate the attendance sheet and provide the required information. Failure to complete the attendance sheet as required may result in disqualification of Vendor's bid.

- 5. VERBAL COMMUNICATION: Any verbal communication between the Vendor and any State personnel is not binding, including verbal communication at the mandatory pre-bid conference. Only information issued in writing and added to the Solicitation by an official written addendum by the Purchasing Division is binding.
- 6. BID SUBMISSION: All bids must be submitted electronically through wvOASIS or signed and delivered by the Vendor to the Purchasing Division at the address listed below on or before the date and time of the bid opening. Any bid received by the Purchasing Division staff is considered to be in the possession of the Purchasing Division and will not be returned for any reason. - 8. ADDENDUM ACKNOWLEDGEMENT: Changes or revisions to this Solicitation will be made by an official written addendum issued by the Purchasing Division. Vendor should acknowledge receipt of all addenda issued with this Solicitation by completing an Addendum Acknowledgment Form, a copy of which is included herewith. Failure to acknowledge addenda may result in bid disqualification. The addendum acknowledgement should be submitted with the bid to expedite document processing.
- 9. BID FORMATTING: Vendor should type or electronically enter the information onto its bid to prevent errors in the evaluation. Failure to type or electronically enter the information may result in bid disqualification.
- 10. ALTERNATES: Any model, brand, or specification listed in this Solicitation establishes the acceptable level of quality only and is not intended to reflect a preference for, or in any way favor, a particular brand or vendor. Vendors may bid alternates to a listed model or brand provided that the alternate is at least equal to the model or brand and complies with the required specifications. The equality of any alternate being bid shall be determined by the State at its sole discretion. Any Vendor bidding an alternate model or brand should clearly identify the alternate items in its bid and should include manufacturer's specifications, industry literature, and/or any other relevant documentation demonstrating the equality of the alternate items. - 11. EXCEPTIONS AND CLARIFICATIONS: The Solicitation contains the specifications that shall form the basis of a contractual agreement. Vendor shall clearly mark any exceptions, clarifications, or other proposed modifications in its bid. Exceptions to, clarifications of, or modifications of a requirement or term and condition of the Solicitation may result in bid disqualification.
- 12. COMMUNICATION LIMITATIONS: In accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules §148-1-6.6, communication with the State of West Virginia or any of its employees regarding this Solicitation during the solicitation, bid, evaluation or award periods, except through the Purchasing Division, is strictly prohibited without prior Purchasing Division approval. Purchasing Division approval for such communication is implied for all agency delegated and exempt purchases.
- 13. REGISTRATION: Prior to Contract award, the apparent successful Vendor must be properly registered with the West Virginia Purchasing Division and must have paid the \$125 fee, if applicable.
- 14. UNIT PRICE: Unit prices shall prevail in cases of a discrepancy in the Vendor's bid.
- 15. PREFERENCE: Vendor Preference may only be granted upon written request and only in accordance with the West Virginia Code § 5A-3-37 and the West Virginia Code of State Rules. A Vendor Preference Certificate form has been attached hereto to allow Vendor to apply for the preference. Vendor's failure to submit the Vendor Preference Certificate form with its bid will result in denial of Vendor Preference. Vendor Preference does not apply to construction projects.

- 16. SMALL, WOMEN-OWNED, OR MINORITY-OWNED BUSINESSES: For any solicitations publicly advertised for bid, in accordance with West Virginia Code §5A-3-37(a)(7) and W. Va. CSR § 148-22-9, any non-resident vendor certified as a small, women-owned, or minority-owned business under W. Va. CSR § 148-22-9 shall be provided the same preference made available to any resident vendor. Any non-resident small, women-owned, or minority-owned business must identify itself as such in writing, must submit that writing to the Purchasing Division with its bid, and must be properly certified under W. Va. CSR § 148-22-9 prior to contract award to receive the preferences made available to resident vendors. - 17: WAIVER OF MINOR IRREGULARITIES: The Director reserves the right to waive minor irregularities in bids or specifications in accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules § 148-1-4.6.
- 18. ELECTRONIC FILE ACCESS RESTRICTIONS: Vendor must ensure that its submission in wvOASIS can be accessed by the Purchasing Division staff immediately upon bid opening. The Purchasing Division will consider any file that cannot be immediately opened and/or viewed at the time of the bid opening (such as, encrypted files, password protected files, or incompatible files) to be blank or incomplete as context requires, and are therefore unacceptable. - 19. NON-RESPONSIBLE: The Purchasing Division Director reserves the right to reject the bid of any vendor as Non-Responsible in accordance with W. Va. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

- 1. CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENT: Issuance of a Award Document signed by the Purchasing Division Director, or his designee, and approved as to form by the Attorney General's office constitutes acceptance of this Contract made by and between the State of West Virginia and the Vendor. Vendor's signature on its bid signifies Vendor's agreement to be bound by and accept the terms and conditions contained in this Contract.
- 2. DEFINITIONS: As used in this Solicitation/Contract, the following terms shall have the meanings attributed to them below. Additional definitions may be found in the specifications included with this Solicitation/Contract.
- 2.1. "Agency" or "Agencies" means the agency, board, commission, or other entity of the State of West Virginia that is identified on the first page of the Solicitation or any other public entity seeking to procure goods or services under this Contract.
- 2.2. "Bid" or "Proposal" means the vendors submitted response to this solicitation.
- 2.3. "Contract" means the binding agreement that is entered into between the State and the Vendor to provide the goods or services requested in the Solicitation.
- 2.4. "Director" means the Director of the West Virginia Department of Administration, Purchasing Division.
- 2.5. "Purchasing Division" means the West Virginia Department of Administration, Purchasing
- 2.6. "Award Document" means the document signed by the Agency and the Purchasing Division, and approved as to form by the Attorney General, that identifies the Vendor as the contract holder.
- 2.7. "Solicitation" means the official notice of an opportunity to supply the State with goods or services that is published by the Purchasing Division.
- 2.8. "State" means the State of West Virginia and/or any of its agencies, commissions, boards, etc. as context requires.
- 2.9. "Vendor" or "Vendors" means any entity submitting a bid in response to the Solicitation, the entity that has been selected as the lowest responsible bidder, or the entity that has been awarded the Contract as context requires.

3. CONTRACT TERM; RENEWAL; EXTENSION: The term of this Contract shall be determined in accordance with the category that has been identified as applicable to this Contract below:

Initial Contract Term: This Contract becomes effective on Award and extends for a period of One (1) year(s). Renewal Term: This Contract may be renewed upon the mutual written consent of the Agency and the Vendor, with approval of the Purchasing Division and the Attorney General's office (Attorney General approval is as to form only). Any request for renewal should be submitted to the Purchasing Division thirty (30) days prior to the expiration date of the initial contract term of appropriate renewal term. A Contract renewal shall be in accordance with the terms and conditions of the original contract. Renewal of this Contract is limited to Three (3) successive one (1) year periods or multiple renewal periods of less than one year, provided that the multiple renewal periods do not exceed 36 months in total. Automatic renewal of this Contract is prohibited. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Purchasing Division approval is not required on agency delegated or exempt purchases. Attorney General approval may be required for vendor terms and conditions: In the event that this contract approval is

5. QUANTITIES: The quantities required under this Contract shall be determined in accordance with the category that has been identified as applicable to this Contract below.
Open End Contract: Quantities listed in this Solicitation are approximations only, based on estimates supplied by the Agency. It is understood and agreed that the Contract shall cover the quantities actually ordered for delivery during the term of the Contract, whether more or less than the quantities shown.
Service: The scope of the service to be provided will be more clearly defined in the specifications included herewith.
Combined Service and Goods: The scope of the service and deliverable goods to be provided will be more clearly defined in the specifications included herewith.
One Time Purchase: This Contract is for the purchase of a set quantity of goods that are identified in the specifications included herewith. Once those items have been delivered, no additional goods may be procured under this Contract without an appropriate change order approved by the Vendor, Agency, Purchasing Division, and Attorney General's office.
6. EMERGENCY PURCHASES: The Purchasing Division Director may authorize the Agency to purchase goods or services in the open market that Vendor would otherwise provide under this Contract if those goods or services are for immediate or expedited delivery in an emergency. Emergencies shall include, but are not limited to, delays in transportation or an unanticipated increase in the volume of work. An emergency purchase in the open market, approved by the Purchasing Division Director, shall not constitute of breach of this Contract and shall not entitle the Vendor to any form of compensation or damages. This provision does not excuse the State from fulfilling its obligations under a One Time Purchase contract.
7. REQUIRED DOCUMENTS: All of the items checked below must be provided to the Purchasing Division by the Vendor as specified below.
BID BOND (Construction Only): Pursuant to the requirements contained in W. Va. Code § 5-22-1(c), All Vendors submitting a bid on a construction project shall furnish a valid bid bond in the amount of five percent (5%) of the total amount of the bid protecting the State of West Virginia. The bid bond must be submitted with the bid.

LABOR/MATERIAL PAYMENT BOND: The apparent successful Vendor shall provide a labor/material payment bond in the amount of 100% of the Contract value. The labor/material payment bond must be delivered to the Purchasing Division prior to Contract award. In lieu of the Bid Bond, Performance Bond, and Labor/Material Payment Bond, the Vendor may provide certified checks, cashier's checks, or irrevocable letters of credit. Any certified check, cashier's check, or irrevocable letter of credit provided in lieu of a bond must be of the same amount and delivered on the same schedule as the bond it replaces. A letter of credit submitted in lieu of a performance and labor/material payment bond will only be allowed for projects under \$100,000. Personal or business checks are not acceptable.

8. WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE: The apparent successful Vendor shall comply with laws relating to workers compensation, shall maintain workers' compensation insurance when required, and shall furnish proof of workers' compensation insurance upon request.
9. LITIGATION BOND: The Director reserves the right to require any Vendor that files a protest of an award to submit a litigation bond in the amount equal to one percent of the lowest bid submitted or \$5,000, whichever is greater. The entire amount of the bond shall be forfeited if the hearing officer determines that the protest was filed for frivolous or improper purpose, including but not limited to, the purpose of harassing, causing unnecessary delay, or needless expense for the Agency. All litigation bonds shall be made payable to the Purchasing Division. In lieu of a bond, the protester may submit a cashier's check or certified check payable to the Purchasing Division. Cashier's or certified checks will be deposited with and held by the State Treasurer's office. If it is determined that the protest has not been filed for frivolous or improper purpose, the bond or deposit shall be returned in its entirety.
10. LIQUIDATED DAMAGES: Vendor shall pay liquidated damages in the amount of
for This clause shall in no way be considered exclusive and shall not limit the State or Agency's right to pursue any other available remedy.

- 11. ACCEPTANCE: Vendor's signature on its bid, or on the certification and signature page, constitutes an offer to the State that cannot be unilaterally withdrawn, signifies that the product or service proposed by vendor meets the mandatory requirements contained in the Solicitation for that product or service, unless otherwise indicated, and signifies acceptance of the terms and conditions contained in the Solicitation unless otherwise indicated.
- 12. PRICING: The pricing set forth herein is firm for the life of the Contract, unless specified elsewhere within this Solicitation/Contract by the State. A Vendor's inclusion of price adjustment provisions in its bid, without an express authorization from the State in the Solicitation to do so, may result in bid disqualification.
- 13. PAYMENT: Payment in advance is prohibited under this Contract. Payment may only be made after the delivery and acceptance of goods or services. The Vendor shall submit invoices, in arrears.
- 14. PURCHASING CARD ACCEPTANCE: The State of West Virginia currently utilizes a Purchasing Card program, administered under contract by a banking institution, to process payment for goods and services. The Vendor must accept the State of West Virginia's Purchasing Card for payment of all orders under this Contract unless the box below is checked.
- Vendor is not required to accept the State of West Virginia's Purchasing Card as payment for all goods and services.
- 15. TAXES: The Vendor shall pay any applicable sales, use, personal property or any other taxes arising out of this Contract and the transactions contemplated thereby. The State of West Virginia is exempt from federal and state taxes and will not pay or reimburse such taxes.
- 16. ADDITIONAL FEES: Vendor is not permitted to charge additional fees or assess additional charges that were not either expressly provided for in the solicitation published by the State of West Virginia or included in the unit price or lump sum bid amount that Vendor is required by the solicitation to provide. Including such fees or charges as notes to the solicitation may result in rejection of vendor's bid. Requesting such fees or charges be paid after the contract has been awarded may result in cancellation of the contract.
- 17. FUNDING: This Contract shall continue for the term stated herein, contingent upon funds being appropriated by the Legislature or otherwise being made available. In the event funds are not appropriated or otherwise made available, this Contract becomes void and of no effect beginning on July 1 of the fiscal year for which funding has not been appropriated or otherwise made available.
- 18. CANCELLATION: The Purchasing Division Director reserves the right to cancel this Contract immediately upon written notice to the vendor if the materials or workmanship supplied do not conform to the specifications contained in the Contract. The Purchasing Division Director may also cancel any purchase or Contract upon 30 days written notice to the Vendor in accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules § 148-1-5.2.b.

- 19. TIME: Time is of the essence with regard to all matters of time and performance in this Contract.
- 20. APPLICABLE LAW: This Contract is governed by and interpreted under West Virginia law without giving effect to its choice of law principles. Any information provided in specification manuals, or any other source, verbal or written, which contradicts or violates the West Virginia Constitution, West Virginia Code or West Virginia Code of State Rules is void and of no effect.
- 21. COMPLIANCE: Vendor shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations and ordinances. By submitting a bid, Vendor acknowledges that it has reviewed, understands, and will comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and ordinances.
- 22. ARBITRATION: Any references made to arbitration contained in this Contract, Vendor's bid, or in any American Institute of Architects documents pertaining to this Contract are hereby deleted, void, and of no effect.
- 23. MODIFICATIONS: This writing is the parties' final expression of intent. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Contract to the contrary no modification of this Contract shall be binding without mutual written consent of the Agency, and the Vendor, with approval of the Purchasing Division and the Attorney General's office (Attorney General approval is as to form only). Any change to existing contracts that adds work or changes contract cost, and were not included in the original contract, must be approved by the Purchasing Division and the Attorney General's Office (as to form) prior to the implementation of the change or commencement of work affected by the change.
- 24. WAIVER: The failure of either party to insist upon a strict performance of any of the terms or provision of this Contract, or to exercise any option, right, or remedy herein contained, shall not be construed as a waiver or a relinquishment for the future of such term, provision, option, right, or remedy, but the same shall continue in full force and effect. Any waiver must be expressly stated in writing and signed by the waiving party.
- 25. SUBSEQUENT FORMS: The terms and conditions contained in this Contract shall supersede any and all subsequent terms and conditions which may appear on any form documents submitted by Vendor to the Agency or Purchasing Division such as price lists, order forms, invoices, sales agreements, or maintenance agreements, and includes internet websites or other electronic documents. Acceptance or use of Vendor's forms does not constitute acceptance of the terms and conditions contained thereon.

ASSIGNMENT: Neither this Contract nor any monies due, or to become due hereunder, may be assigned by the Vendor without the express written consent of the Agency, the Purchasing Division, the Attorney General's office (as to form only), and any other government agency or office that may be required to approve such assignments. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Purchasing Division approval may or may not be required on certain agency delegated or exempt purchases.

- 27. WARRANTY: The Vendor expressly warrants that the goods and/or services covered by this Contract will: (a) conform to the specifications, drawings, samples, or other description furnished or specified by the Agency; (b) be merchantable and fit for the purpose intended; and (c) be free from defect in material and workmanship.
- 28. STATE EMPLOYEES: State employees are not permitted to utilize this Contract for personal use and the Vendor is prohibited from permitting or facilitating the same.
- 29. BANKRUPTCY: In the event the Vendor files for bankruptcy protection, the State of West Virginia may deem this Contract null and void, and terminate this Contract without notice.
- 30. PRIVACY, SECURITY, AND CONFIDENTIALITY: The Vendor agrees that it will not disclose to anyone, directly or indirectly, any such personally identifiable information or other confidential information gained from the Agency, unless the individual who is the subject of the information consents to the disclosure in writing or the disclosure is made pursuant to the Agency's policies, procedures, and rules. Vendor further agrees to comply with the Confidentiality Policies and Information Security Accountability Requirements, set forth in http://www.state.wv.us/admin/purchase/privacy/default.html.
- 31. YOUR SUBMISSION IS A PUBLIC DOCUMENT: Vendor's entire response to the Solicitation and the resulting Contract are public documents. As public documents, they will be disclosed to the public following the bid/proposal opening or award of the contract, as required by the competitive bidding laws of West Virginia Code §§ 5A-3-1 et seq., 5-22-1 et seq., and 5G-1-1 et seq. and the Freedom of Information Act West Virginia Code §§ 29B-1-1 et seq.

DO NOT SUBMIT MATERIAL YOU CONSIDER TO BE CONFIDENTIAL, A TRADE SECRET, OR OTHERWISE NOT SUBJECT TO PUBLIC DISCLOSURE.

Submission of any bid, proposal, or other document to the Purchasing Division constitutes your explicit consent to the subsequent public disclosure of the bid, proposal, or document. The Purchasing Division will disclose any document labeled "confidential," "proprietary," "trade secret," "private," or labeled with any other claim against public disclosure of the documents, to include any "trade secrets" as defined by West Virginia Code § 47-22-1 et seq. All submissions are subject to public disclosure without notice.

32. LICENSING: In accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules § 148-1-6.1.e, Vendor must be licensed and in good standing in accordance with any and all state and local laws and requirements by any state or local agency of West Virginia, including, but not limited to, the West Virginia Secretary of State's Office, the West Virginia Tax Department, West Virginia Insurance Commission, or any other state agency or political subdivision. Upon request, the Vendor must provide all necessary releases to obtain information to enable the Purchasing Division Director or the Agency to verify that the Vendor is licensed and in good standing with the above entities.

- 33. The Vendor as an independent contractor is solely liable for the acts and omissions of its employees and agents. Vendor shall be responsible for selecting, supervising, and compensating any and all individuals employed pursuant to the terms of this Solicitation and resulting contract. Neither the Vendor, nor any employees or subcontractors of the Vendor, shall be deemed to be employees of the State for any purpose whatsoever. Vendor shall be exclusively responsible for payment of employees and contractors for all wages and salaries, taxes, withholding payments, penalties, fees, fringe benefits, professional liability insurance premiums, contributions to insurance and pension, or other deferred compensation plans, including but not limited to, Workers' Compensation and Social Security obligations, licensing fees, etc. and the filing of all necessary documents, forms, and returns pertinent to all of the foregoing.

Any extension of this Contract to the aforementioned Other Government Entities must be on the same prices, terms, and conditions as those offered and agreed to in this Contract, provided that such extension is in compliance with the applicable laws, rules, and ordinances of the Other Government Entity. If the Vendor does not wish to extend the prices, terms, and conditions of its bid and subsequent contract to the Other Government Entities, the Vendor must clearly indicate such refusal in its bid. A refusal to extend this Contract to the Other Government Entities shall not impact or influence the award of this Contract in any manner.
- 39. CONFLICT OF INTEREST: Vendor, its officers or members or employees, shall not presently have or acquire an interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict with or compromise the performance of its obligations hereunder. Vendor shall periodically inquire of its officers, members and employees to ensure that a conflict of interest does not arise. Any conflict of interest discovered shall be promptly presented in detail to the Agency.
- 40. REPORTS: Vendor shall provide the Agency and/or the Purchasing Division with the following reports identified by a checked box below: Such reports as the Agency and/or the Purchasing Division may request. Requested reports may include, but are not limited to, quantities purchased, agencies utilizing the contract, total contract expenditures by agency, etc. Quarterly reports detailing the total quantity of purchases in units and dollars, along with a listing of purchases by agency. Quarterly reports should be delivered to the Purchasing Division

41. BACKGROUND CHECK: In accordance with W. Va. Code § 15-2D-3, the Director of the Division of Protective Services shall require any service provider whose employees are regularly employed on the grounds or in the buildings of the Capitol complex or who have access to sensitive or critical information to submit to a fingerprint-based state and federal background inquiry through the state repository. - 42. PREFERENCE FOR USE OF DOMESTIC STEEL PRODUCTS: Except when authorized by the Director of the Purchasing Division pursuant to W. Va. Code § 5A-3-56, no contractor may use or supply steel products for a State Contract Project other than those steel products made in the United States. A contractor who uses steel products in violation of this section may be subject to civil penalties pursuant to W. Va. Code § 5A-3-56. As used in this section:
- a. "State Contract Project" means any erection or construction of, or any addition to, alteration of or other improvement to any building or structure, including, but not limited to, roads or highways, or the installation of any heating or cooling or ventilating plants or other equipment, or the supply of and materials for such projects, pursuant to a contract with the State of West Virginia for which bids were solicited on or after June 6, 2001.
- b. "Steel Products" means products rolled, formed, shaped, drawn, extruded, forged, cast, fabricated or otherwise similarly processed, or processed by a combination of two or more or such operations, from steel made by the open heath, basic oxygen, electric furnace, Bessemer or other steel making process. The Purchasing Division Director may, in writing, authorize the use of foreign steel products if:
- c. The cost for each contract item used does not exceed one tenth of one percent (.1%) of the total contract cost or two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00), whichever is greater. For the purposes of this section, the cost is the value of the steel product as delivered to the project; or d. The Director of the Purchasing Division determines that specified steel materials are not produced in the United States in sufficient quantity or otherwise are not reasonably available to meet contract requirements.

43. PREFERENCE FOR USE OF DOMESTIC ALUMINUM, GLASS, AND STEEL: In Accordance with W. Va. Code § 5-19-1 et seq., and W. Va. CSR § 148-10-1 et seq., for every contract or subcontract, subject to the limitations contained herein, for the construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, improvement or maintenance of public works or for the purchase of any item of machinery or equipment to be used at sites of public works, only domestic aluminum, glass or steel products shall be supplied unless the spending officer determines, in writing, after the receipt of offers or bids, (1) that the cost of domestic aluminum, glass or steel products is unreasonable or inconsistent with the public interest of the State of West Virginia, (2) that domestic aluminum, glass or steel products are not produced in sufficient quantities to meet the contract requirements, or (3) the available domestic aluminum, glass, or steel do not meet the contract specifications. This provision only applies to public works contracts awarded in an amount more than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) or public works contracts that require more than ten thousand pounds of steel products.

The cost of domestic aluminum, glass, or steel products may be unreasonable if the cost is more than twenty percent (20%) of the bid or offered price for foreign made aluminum, glass, or steel products. If the domestic aluminum, glass or steel products to be supplied or produced in a "substantial labor surplus area", as defined by the United States Department of Labor, the cost of domestic aluminum, glass, or steel products may be unreasonable if the cost is more than thirty percent (30%) of the bid or offered price for foreign made aluminum, glass, or steel products. This preference shall be applied to an item of machinery or equipment, as indicated above, when the item is a single unit of equipment or machinery manufactured primarily of aluminum, glass or steel, is part of a public works contract and has the sole purpose or of being a permanent part of a single public works project. This provision does not apply to equipment or machinery purchased by a spending unit for use by that spending unit and not as part of a single public works project.

All bids and offers including domestic aluminum, glass or steel products that exceed bid or offer prices including foreign aluminum, glass or steel products after application of the preferences provided in this provision may be reduced to a price equal to or lower than the lowest bid or offer price for foreign aluminum, glass or steel products plus the applicable preference. If the reduced bid or offer prices are made in writing and supersede the prior bid or offer prices, all bids or offers, including the reduced bid or offer prices, will be reevaluated in accordance with this rule.

- PURPOSE AND SCOPE: The West Virginia Purchasing Division is soliciting bids
 On behalf of the West Virginia Division of Highways, Department of Transportation
 to establish an open-end contract for Trailer Mounted Solar Powered Arrow Board.
- 2. DEFINITIONS: The terms listed below shall have the meanings assigned to them below. Additional definitions can be found in section 2 of the General Terms and Conditions.
 - 2.1 "Contract Item" or "Contract Items" means the list of items identified in Section 3, Subsection 1 below.
 - 2.2 "Pricing Pages" means the schedule of prices, estimated order quantity, and totals contained in wvOASIS or attached hereto as Exhibit A, and used to evaluate the Solicitation responses.
 - 2.3 "Solicitation" means the official notice of an opportunity to supply the State with goods or services that is published by the Purchasing Division.
 - 2.4 "WVDOH" means West Virginia Division of Highways.
 - 2.5 "OSHA" means Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970/ Exhibit C, Reference www.osha.gov.
- 2.6 "RF" means Interference radio frequency.
- 2.7 "L.E.D." means lighting emitting diode.

3. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:

3.1 Contract Items and Mandatory Requirements: Vendor shall provide Agency with the Contract Items listed below on an open-end and continuing basis. Contract Items must meet or exceed the mandatory requirements as shown below.

3.1.1 General - Trailer Mounted Solar Powered Arrow Board.

- 3.1.1.1 The unit specified herein and offered shall be manufactured after January 1, 2016 and must be a new unit, not previously used or sold.
- 3.1.1.3 Vendor must certify that unit offered will meet or exceed the "OSHA", "Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970" or subsequent changes that are in effect at the time of manufacture of unit. Please see Exhibit C.

3.1.2 Arrow Board

- 3.1.2.1 The arrow board shall be a weather-tight panel/minimum 48 inches high by 96 inches wide.
- 3.1.2.2 The height from the bottom of the panel to the roadway shall be seven (7) feet above the roadway.

3.1.3 Power Source

- 3.1.3.1 Arrow board shall have built in auxiliary battery charger which would enable the batteries to be hooked up to an AC power source at the storage yard or off of a generator in the field so that the batteries shall be fully charged.
- 3.1.3.2 Charge time and charger version shall be based on the manufacturer's battery configuration.
- 3.1.3.3 The battery bank shall be of sufficient size and capacity to power the unit a minimum of 30 days with no solar assist.
- 3.1.3.4 The solar generator shall incorporate a 12 Volt DC Photovoltaic Solar Panel mounted on a self-erecting, automatic positioning device located above the unit.
- 3.1.3.5 The batteries shall be protected to prevent damage due to overcharging or discharging too deeply at any temperature.
- 3.1.3.6 The unit shall go to four (4) corner caution when charging is required.

3.1.4 Face Panel

- 3.1.4.1 Lamps shall be five (5) inch amber L.E.D. with minimum angularity of 30 degrees.
- 3.1.4.2 The unit shall increase lamp brightness when the ambient light level increases to five (5) foot candles, plus or minus one (1) foot candle and minimum legibility distance of one (1) mile.
- 3.1.4.3 The face of the panel shall be flat black with 15 hooded lamps.
- 3.1.4.4 The unit shall have the capability of the following modes of operation:
 - (1) Right arrow ten (10) lamps flashing in unison.
 - (2) Left arrow ten (10) lamps flashing in unison.
 - (3) Double arrow five (5) lamps in each arrowhead and three (3) lamps in shaft, all flashing in unison.
 - (4) Warning bar seven (7) horizontal lamps flashing in unison.
 - (5) Four point caution four (4) outermost corner lamps flashing in unison.
 - (6) Indicator lights on back of panel.
- 3.1.4.5 The flash rate shall be 30 flashes per minute and the flash cycle time shall be two (2) seconds with 50 percent on time.

3.1.5 Controller

3.1.5.1 The arrow board controller shall be housed in a weatherproof, lockable enclosure.

3.1.6 Communication

3.1.6.1 Unit shall be safe guarded from any unwanted outside RF interference which would include but not limited to VHF/FM receiver, 2-way receiver, cell phones, etc.

3.1.7 Paint

3.1.7.1 Arrow board shall be painted flat black.

3.1.8 Trailer

- 3.1.8.1 2,000 lb. axle with leaf springs.
- 3.1.8.2 Tubeless, standard tread tires and wheels.
- 3.1.8.3 Heavy duty pintle eye hitch, 3" inner diameter.
- 3.1.8.4 Adjustable jack stand on trailer tongue.
- 3.1.8.5 The unit shall have five (5) telescoping jack stands, all four (4) corners and tongue to stabilize unit while in operation.
- 3.1.8.6 Lighting and safety chains for highway use.
- 3.1.8.7 Heavy duty lighting for towing of unit with quick disconnect male pin plug.
- 3.1.8.8 License plate brackets.
- 3.1.8.9 Wheel fenders.
- 3.1.8.10 The arrow board shall be raised and lowered using a hand operating winch (or hydraulic pump and ram).
- 3.1.8.11 Unit shall include LED tail lights, stop lights, turn signals, license mount with light, and all necessary reflectors.

3.1.9 Trailer Paint

3.1.9.1 The trailer shall be painted manufacturer standard color paint for this unit.

3.1.10 Advertising

3.1.10.1 Shall have only one (1) manufacturer name plate, which must include model number, may appear on exterior of unit. Logos, created through the stamping or casting process of manufacturer are also acceptable. No logo will interfere with the Department's striping and logo.

3.1.11 Miscellaneous:

A. Unspecified Accessories & Features: All parts, equipment, accessories, material, design and performance characteristics not specified herein, but which are necessary to provide a complete unit, must be furnished with each unit and required to conform to strength, quality of material, and quality of workmanship to those which are advertised and provided to the market in general by the unit industry. All parts and accessories advertised and regularly supplied as standard shall be included, except those which would represent duplication of these specified and except those which, by specification, are not to be furnished. All standard safety features, required by Federal and State Law, shall be included.

B. Unit shall be delivered: to WVDOH with all manufacturers recommended safety related decals and safety features intact.

4. CONTRACT AWARD:

4.1 Contract Award: The Contract is intended to provide Agencies with a purchase price on all Contract Items. The Contract shall be awarded to

of title 5, United States Code, governing appointments in the competitive service, and competitive service, and competitive service, and competitive service, and of the public. The Secretary shall designate one of the public members as Chaffman. The members shall be selected upon the basis of their experience and competence in the field of occupational safety and health.

- (2) The Committee shall advise, consult with, and quaire recommendations to the Sucretary and the Secretary of Health and Human Services on matters stating to the administration of the Act. The Committee shall hold no fever than two meetings during each calendar year. All meetings of the Committee shall be open to the public and a transcript shall be kept and made available for public inspection.
- (3) The members of the Committee shall be compensated in accordance with the provisions of section 3109 of title 5, United States Code.
- (4) The Secretary shell furnish to the Committee an executive secretary and such secretarial, clarical, and other services as are pleaned necessary to the conduct of its business.

(b) An advisory committee may be appointed by the Secretary to assist him in his standard-setting functions under section 6 of this Act. Each such committee shall consist of nor more than filteen members and shall include as a member one or more designess of the Secretary persons qualified by experience and affiliation to present the viewpoints of the employers involved, and of persons similarly qualified to present the viewpoints of the employers as wall as one or more representatives of health and safety apencies of the States. - (3) The Secretary, in cooperation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, shall issue regulations requiring employees to meintain accurate records of employee exposures to potentially teach missessies or harmful physical agents which are necessitated to be monitored or measured under section 6. Such regulations shall provide employees or their representatives with an apportunity to observe such monitoring or measuring, and to have access to the records thereof. SEC. 18. State Jurisdiction and State Plans

(a) Nothing in this Act shell prevent any State agancy or court from asserting jurisdiction under State law over any occupational safety or health leave with respect to which no standard is in effect under section 6.

 - (3) provides for a right of entry and inspection of all workplaces subject to the Act which is at least as effective as that provided in section 8, and includes a prohibition on advance notice of inspections.
 - (4) contains satisfactory assurances that such algency of agencies have or will have the legal authority and qualified personnal necessary for the enforcement of such standards.
- (5) gives satisfectory assurances that such State will devote adequate funds to the administration and embracement of such standards,
- (5) contains setisfactory assurances that such State will, to the extent permitted by its law, establish and maintain an effective and comprehensive occupational selecty and health program applicable to all employees of public agencies of the State and its political subclyditions, which program is as effective as the standards contained in an accrowed also.
- (7) requires employers in the State to make reports to the Secretary in the same minimar and to the same extent as if the plan were not in effect, and
- (8) provides that the Sinte equally self-inside such reports to the Secretary in such form and containing such information, as the Secretary shall from time to time require.
- (d) If the Secretary rejects a pion submitted under subsection (b), he shall afford the State submitting the pion due notion and apportunity for a hearing before so doing.

SEC. 15. Pederal Agency Safety Programs and Responsibilities

- (b) The Secretary shall report to the President a summary or dignet of reports submitted to Pub. 1. 97-375 recommendations derived from such reports.

The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall also conclude necessful into the motivational and betavioral factors relating to the field of occupational safety and health.

Upon the request of any employer who is required to measure and record deposite of employees to substance or physical against as provided under this subsection, the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall found all financial or other assistance to such employer for the purpose of defraying any additional expense incurred by him in carrying out the measuring and recording as provided in this subsection.

(d) Information obtained by the Secretary and the Secretary of Health and Human Services under this section shall be disseminated by the Secretary to employers and employees and organizations thereof.

(e) The functions of the Secretary of Health and Human Services under this Act shall, to the extent flexible, be delegated to the Delector of the Nectonal Bustisse for Occupational Safety and Health satablished by Section 22 of this Act.

EXPANDED RESEARCH ON WORKER SAPETY AND HEALTH

The Secretary of Health and Human Services (referred to in this section as the "Secretary"), acting through the Derector of the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health, shall anhance and sopend restarch is deemed appropriate on the health and safety of workers who are at thick for incorrunal threats or attacks in the moriphics, including research on the health effects of measures taken to treat or project such workers for diseases or desirable resulting from a bloberorist threat or attack. L. 96-86, Title V, section 509(b), 93 Stat. 666, 695, redesignated references to the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to the Department of Health and Human Services and redesignated references to the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare to the Secretary of Health and Human Serverse.

On September 13, 1962, Pub. L. 97-256, (#4(b), 96 Stat. 877, 1967, effectively substituted "Section 3324(a) and (b) of Title 31" for "Section 3648 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (31 U.S.C. 529)" in section 22 (e)(6), 29 U.S.C. 671, relating to MiOSH procurement authority.

On December 21, 1982, Pub. L. 97-375, 96 Stat. 1819, deleted the sentence in section 19(b) of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 668, that directed the President of the United States to transmit annual reports of the activities of faderal agencies to the House of Representatives and the Sanate.

On October 12, 1984, Pub. L. 98-473, Chiapter II, 98 Stat. 1837, 1987, (commonly referred to as the "Sentencing Reform Act of 1984") Instituted a classification system for criminal offenses punishable under the United States Code. Under this system, an offense with impraporment terms of "stit months or less but more than thirty days," such as that found in 29 U.S.C. 566(a) for a while violation of the OSH Act, is classified as a criminal "Class B minderneanor." 18 U.S.C. 3559(a)(7).

The criminal code increases the monetary penalties for criminal misdemaners beyond what is provided for in the CSH Act: a fine for a Class 6 intelegration resulting in death, for exemple, is not more than \$250,000 for an individual, and is not more than \$250,000 for an ingentication. On November 5, 1990, Pub. L. 101-506, 104 Stat. 1388, amended section 17 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 666, by increasing the penalties in aection 17(a) from \$10,000 for each violation to \$70,000 for each violation, but not (f) from \$1,000 to \$7,000.

On October 26, 1992, Pub. L. 102-Stzt, 106 Stat, 3410; 3420, added to Title 29, section 671m "Workers' Family Protection" to graint authority to the Director of NICSH to evaluate, investigate and if necessary, for the Setretary of Labor to regulate employee transported releases of hazardous material that result from contamination on the amployee's electing or person and any adversely effect the hazith and agricly of workers and their families. Note: mixtion 671a was enotined as section 209 of the Fire Administration Authorization Act of 1992, but it is reprinted here because it is codified within the chapter that comprises the QSH Act.

On October 28, 1992, the Housing and Community Development Act of 1992, Rub. 1, 102-550, 105 Stat. 3672, 3924, whended section 22 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 671, by adding subsection (g), which requires MIOSH to institute a beling grant program for lead-based pairs ectivates.

On July 5, 1994, section 7(b) of Pub. L. 103-272, 108-Stat. 745, topically section 31 of the OSH Act, "Emergency Locator Belocores," Section 1(e) of the same Public Law, however, etacted a modified version of section 31 of the OSH Act. This provision, titled "Emergency Locator Transmitters," is codified at 49 U.S.C. 44712.

On December 21, 1995, Section 3003 of Pub. L. 104-66, 109 Stat. 707, as amended, effective May 15, 2000, terminated the provisions relating to the transmitted to Congress of reports under section 25 of the OSH Act. 29 U.S.C. 675.

On July 16, 1998, Pub. L. 105-197, 112 Stat. 638, emended section 21 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 670, by adding subsection (d), which required the Secretary to establish a compliance setabance program by which employers can consult with state personnel regarding the application of and compliance with GSHA standards.

On July 16, 1998, Pub. L. 105-198, 112 Stat. 640, amanded section 8 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 657, by adding subsection (h), which fortide the Secretary to use the results of enforcement activities to evaluate the employees involved in such enforcement or to impose quotes or goals.

On September 29, 1998, Pub. L. 105-241, 112 Stat. 1572, amended sections 3(5) and 19(a) of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 652 and 668, to include the United States Postal Sarvice as its "employer" subject to GSHA enforcement.

On June 12, 2002, Pub. L. 107-188, Title I, Section 153, 116 Stat. 631, Congress emicied 29 U.S.C. 559a, to separal research on the Thealth and safety of workers who are at risk for bioterrorist threats or attacks in the workplace."

The text of section 29, (Additional Assistant Secretary of Labor), created an Assistant Secretary for Occupational Safety and Health, and section 30 (Additional Positions) created additional positions within the Department of Labor and the Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission in order to carry out the provisions of the CSH Act. The text of these sections is emitted here because it no longer reflects the current statutary provisions for staffing and pay. For current provisions, see 29 U.S.C. 553 and 5 U.S.C. 5108 (c).

Section 31 of the prighted OSH Act enhanded 49 U.S.C. 1421 by Institting a Section statistic "Emergency Locator Beacons," The text of that section is omitted in this reprint because Pub. L. 103-272, 108 Stat. MS; Quly 5, 1994), repeated the text of section 31 and enacted a modified version of the provision, antitled "Emergency Locator Transmitters," which is codified at 49 U.S.C. 44712.

Notes on other legislation effecting the administration of the Occupational Servicy and Health Act. Sometimes legislation does not directly amond the OSH Act, but does place requirements on the Secretary of Labor either to act or to herigin from acting under the authority of the OSH Act. Included below are some examples of such legislation. Please note that this is not intended to be a comprehensive list.

STANDARDS PROMULGATION.

For example, legislation may require the Secretary to promulgate specific standards pursuant to authority under faction 6 of the OSH Act, 29 U.S.C. 655, Some examples include the following:

Hazardaus Histo Committees. Pub. L. 99-499, Title I, section 126(a)-(f), 100 Stat. 1613 (1986), as amended by Pub. L. 100-202, section 101(f), Title II, section 201, 101 Stat. 1329 (1967), required the Secretary of Labor to promulgate standards concerning hazardous waste operations.

Chemical Process Sisting Muniquement: Rub. L. 101-549, Title 212, section 304, 104 Stat. 2399 (1990), required the Secretary of Labor, in coordination with the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, to promising a chemical process safety standard.

Hamilton Fabrials. Pub. L. 101-615, section 29, 104 Stat. 3244 (1990), required the Secretary of Labor, in consultation with the Secretaries of Transportation and Treasury, to issue specific standards concerning the

Biocolorne Petrogens Standard Pub. L. 102-170, Titla I, section 180, 105 Stat. 1107 (1991), required the Secretary of Lebor to promulgate a final Bioedborne Petrogens standard.

Lead Standard. The Housing and Community Development Act of 1992, Pub. L. 109-550, Title X, sections 1031 and 1032, 106 Stat. 3672 (1992), required the Secretary of Labor to issue an interim final load standard.

EXTENSION OF COMPRISE

Sometimes a statute may make some OSH Act provisions applicable to certain emittee that are not subject to those provisions by the temps of the OSH Act. For example, the Congressional Accountability Act of 1995, Pub. L. 104-1, 109 Stat. 3, (1595), extended decision OSH Act coverage, such as the duty to comply with Section 5 of the OSH Act, to the Lagislative Branch. PROGRAM CHANGES ENACTED THROUGH APPROPRIATIONS LEGISLATION.

Sometimes an appropriations statute may allow or restrict certain substantive actions by OSHA or the Secretary of Labor. For example, isometimes an appropriations statute may restrict the use of money appropriated to non restriction, that has been included in OSHA's appropriation for many years, finite the applicability of OSHA requirements with respect to farming operations that amploy ten or fewer vertices and to not maintain a temporary labor camp. Another example is a restriction that limits OSHA's authority to conduct certain amfortament activity with respect to employees of ten or liever employees in low heater industries. See Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2004, Pub. L. 108-199, DN: E.—Labor, Health and Human Services; and Ectuation, and Related Agencies Appropriations, 2004, Title I.—Department of Labor, 118 Stat. 3 (2004), safety and health training or grants. PURCHASING AFFIDAVIT

MANDATE: Under W. Va. Code §5A-3-10a, no contract or renewal of any contract may be awarded by the state or any of its political subdivisions to any vendor or prospective vendor when the vendor or prospective vendor or a related party to the vendor or prospective vendor is a debtor and; (1) the debt owed is an amount greater than one thousand dollars in the aggregate; or (2) the debtor is in employer default.

EXCEPTION: The prohibition listed above does not apply where a vendor has contested any tax administered pursuant to chapter eleven of the W. Va. "Related party" means a party, whether an individual, corporation, partnership, association, limited liability company or any other form or business association or other entity whatsoever, related to any vendor by blood, marriage, ownership or contract through which the party has a relationship of ownership or other interest with the vendor so that the party will actually or by effect receive or control a portion of the benefit, profit or other consideration from performance of a vendor contract with the party receiving an amount that meets or exceed five percent of the total contract amount.
