- 1. REVIEW DOCUMENTS THOROUGHLY: The attached documents contain a solicitation for bids. Please read these instructions and all documents attached in their entirety. All bids must be submitted in accordance with the provisions contained in these instructions and the Solicitation. Failure to do so may result in disqualification of Vendor's bid.
- 2. MANDATORY TERMS: The Solicitation may contain mandatory provisions identified by the use of the words "must," "will," and "shall." Failure to comply with a mandatory term in the Solicitation will result in bid disqualification.

All Vendors submitting a bid must attend the mandatory pre-bid meeting. Failure to attend the mandatory pre-bid meeting shall result in disqualification of the Vendor's bid. No one person attending the pre-bid meeting may represent more than one Vendor.

An attendance sheet provided at the pre-bid meeting shall serve as the official document verifying attendance. The State will not accept any other form of proof or documentation to verify attendance. Any person attending the pre-bid meeting on behalf of a Vendor must list on the attendance sheet his or her name and the name of the Vendor he or she is representing.

Additionally, the person attending the pre-bid meeting should include the Vendor's E-Mail address, phone number, and Fax number on the attendance sheet. It is the Vendor's responsibility to locate the attendance sheet and provide the required information. Failure to complete the attendance sheet as required may result in disqualification of Vendor's bid.

All Vendors should arrive prior to the starting time for the pre-bid. Vendors who arrive after the starting time but prior to the end of the pre-bid will be permitted to sign in, but are charged with knowing all matters discussed at the pre-bid.

Questions submitted at least five business days prior to a scheduled pre-bid will be discussed at the pre-bid meeting if possible. - 5. VERBAL COMMUNICATION: Any verbal communication between the Vendor and any State personnel is not binding, including verbal communication at the mandatory pre-bid conference. Only information issued in writing and added to the Solicitation by an official written addendum by the Purchasing Division is binding.
- 6. - 8. ADDENDUM ACKNOWLEDGEMENT: Changes or revisions to this Solicitation will be made by an official written addendum issued by the Purchasing Division. Vendor should acknowledge receipt of all addenda issued with this Solicitation by completing an Addendum Acknowledgment Form, a copy of which is included herewith. Failure to acknowledge addenda may result in bid disqualification. The addendum acknowledgement should be submitted with the bid to expedite document processing.
- 9. BID FORMATTING: Vendor should type or electronically enter the information onto its bid to prevent errors in the evaluation. Failure to type or electronically enter the information may result in bid disqualification.
- 10. ALTERNATES: Any model, brand, or specification listed in this Solicitation establishes the acceptable level of quality only and is not intended to reflect a preference for, or in any way favor, a particular brand or vendor. Vendors may bid alternates to a listed model or brand provided that the alternate is at least equal to the model or brand and complies with the required specifications. - 11. EXCEPTIONS AND CLARIFICATIONS: The Solicitation contains the specifications that shall form the basis of a contractual agreement. Vendor shall clearly mark any exceptions, clarifications, or other proposed modifications in its bid. Exceptions to, clarifications of, or modifications of a requirement or term and condition of the Solicitation may result in bid disqualification.
- 12. COMMUNICATION LIMITATIONS: In accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules §148-1-6.6, communication with the State of West Virginia or any of its employees regarding this Solicitation during the solicitation, bid, evaluation or award periods, except through the Purchasing Division, is strictly prohibited without prior Purchasing Division approval. Purchasing Division approval for such communication is implied for all agency delegated and exempt purchases.
- 13. REGISTRATION: Prior to Contract award, the apparent successful Vendor must be properly registered with the West Virginia Purchasing Division and must have paid the \$125 fee, if applicable.
- 14. UNIT PRICE: Unit prices shall prevail in cases of a discrepancy in the Vendor's bid.
- 15. PREFERENCE: Vendor Preference may only be granted upon written request and only in accordance with the West Virginia Code § 5A-3-37 and the West Virginia Code of State Rules. A Vendor Preference Certificate form has been attached hereto to allow Vendor to apply for the preference. Vendor's failure to submit the Vendor Preference Certificate form with its bid will result in denial of Vendor Preference. Vendor Preference does not apply to construction projects.

- 16. SMALL, WOMEN-OWNED, OR MINORITY-OWNED BUSINESSES: For any solicitations publicly advertised for bid, in accordance with West Virginia Code §5A-3-37(a)(7) and W. Va. CSR § 148-22-9, any non-resident vendor certified as a small, womenowned, or minority-owned business under W. Va. CSR § 148-22-9 shall be provided the same preference made available to any resident vendor. - 17. WAIVER OF MINOR IRREGULARITIES: The Director reserves the right to waive minor irregularities in bids or specifications in accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules § 148-1-4.6.
- 18. ELECTRONIC FILE ACCESS RESTRICTIONS: Vendor must ensure that its submission in wvOASIS can be accessed by the Purchasing Division staff immediately upon bid opening. The Purchasing Division will consider any file that cannot be immediately opened and/or viewed at the time of the bid opening (such as, encrypted files, password protected files, or incompatible files) to be blank or incomplete as context requires, and are therefore unacceptable. A vendor will not be permitted to unencrypt files, remove password protections, or resubmit documents after bid opening if those documents are required with the bid.
- 19. NON-RESPONSIBLE: The Purchasing Division Director reserves the right to reject the bid of any vendor as Non-Responsible in accordance with W. Va. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

- 1. CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENT: Issuance of a Award Document signed by the Purchasing Division Director, or his designee, and approved as to form by the Attorney General's office constitutes acceptance of this Contract made by and between the State of West Virginia and the Vendor. Vendor's signature on its bid signifies Vendor's agreement to be bound by and accept the terms and conditions contained in this Contract.
- 2. DEFINITIONS: As used in this Solicitation/Contract, the following terms shall have the meanings attributed to them below. Additional definitions may be found in the specifications included with this Solicitation/Contract.
- 2.1. "Agency" or "Agencies" means the agency, board, commission, or other entity of the State of West Virginia that is identified on the first page of the Solicitation or any other public entity seeking to procure goods or services under this Contract.
- 2.2. "Bid" or "Proposal" means the vendors submitted response to this solicitation.
- 2.3. "Contract" means the binding agreement that is entered into between the State and the Vendor to provide the goods or services requested in the Solicitation.
- 2.4. "Director" means the Director of the West Virginia Department of Administration, Purchasing Division.
- 2.5. "Purchasing Division" means the West Virginia Department of Administration, Purchasing Division.
- 2.6. "Award Document" means the document signed by the Agency and the Purchasing Division, and approved as to form by the Attorney General, that identifies the Vendor as the contract holder.
- 2.7. "Solicitation" means the official notice of an opportunity to supply the State with goods or services that is published by the Purchasing Division.
- 2.8. "State" means the State of West Virginia and/or any of its agencies, commissions, boards, etc. as context requires.
- 2.9. "Vendor" or "Vendors" means any entity submitting a bid in response to the Solicitation, the entity that has been selected as the lowest responsible bidder, or the entity that has been awarded the Contract as context requires.

LITIGATION BOND: The Director reserves the right to require any Vendor that files a protest of an award to submit a litigation bond in the amount equal to one percent of the lowest bid submitted or \$5,000, whichever is greater. The entire amount of the bond shall be forfeited if the hearing officer determines that the protest was filed for frivolous or improper purpose, including but not limited to, the purpose of harassing, causing unnecessary delay, or needless expense for the Agency. All litigation bonds shall be made payable to the Purchasing Division. In lieu of a bond, the protester may submit a cashier's check or certified check payable to the Purchasing Division. Cashier's or certified checks will be deposited with and held by the State Treasurer's office. - 11. ACCEPTANCE: Vendor's signature on its bid, or on the certification and signature page, constitutes an offer to the State that cannot be unilaterally withdrawn, signifies that the product or service proposed by vendor meets the mandatory requirements contained in the Solicitation for that product or service, unless otherwise indicated, and signifies acceptance of the terms and conditions contained in the Solicitation unless otherwise indicated.
- 12. PRICING: The pricing set forth herein is firm for the life of the Contract, unless specified elsewhere within this Solicitation/Contract by the State. A Vendor's inclusion of price adjustment provisions in its bid, without an express authorization from the State in the Solicitation to do so, may result in bid disqualification.
- 13. PAYMENT: Payment in advance is prohibited under this Contract. Payment may only be made after the delivery and acceptance of goods or services. The Vendor shall submit invoices, in arrears.
- 14. PURCHASING CARD ACCEPTANCE: The State of West Virginia currently utilizes a Purchasing Card program, administered under contract by a banking institution, to process payment for goods and services. The Vendor must accept the State of West Virginia's Purchasing Card for payment of all orders under this Contract unless the box below is checked.
- Vendor is not required to accept the State of West Virginia's Purchasing Card as payment for all goods and services.
- 15. TAXES: The Vendor shall pay any applicable sales, use, personal property or any other taxes arising out of this Contract and the transactions contemplated thereby. The State of West Virginia is exempt from federal and state taxes and will not pay or reimburse such taxes.
- 16. ADDITIONAL FEES: Vendor is not permitted to charge additional fees or assess additional charges that were not either expressly provided for in the solicitation published by the State of West Virginia or included in the unit price or lump sum bid amount that Vendor is required by the solicitation to provide. Including such fees or charges as notes to the solicitation may result in rejection of vendor's bid. Requesting such fees or charges be paid after the centract has been awarded may result in cancellation of the contract.
- 17. FUNDING: This Contract shall continue for the term stated herein, contingent upon funds being appropriated by the Legislature or otherwise being made available. In the event funds are not appropriated or otherwise made available, this Contract becomes void and of no effect beginning on July 1 of the fiscal year for which funding has not been appropriated or otherwise made available.
- 18. CANCELLATION: The Purchasing Division Director reserves the right to cancel this Contract immediately upon written notice to the vendor if the materials or workmanship supplied do not conform to the specifications contained in the Contract. The Purchasing Division Director may also cancel any purchase or Contract upon 30 days written notice to the Vendor in accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules § 148-1-5.2.b.

- 19. TIME: Time is of the essence with regard to all matters of time and performance in this Contract.
- 20. APPLICABLE LAW: This Contract is governed by and interpreted under West Virginia law without giving effect to its choice of law principles. Any information provided in specification manuals, or any other source, verbal or written, which contradicts or violates the West Virginia Constitution, West Virginia Code or West Virginia Code of State Rules is void and of no effect.
- 21. COMPLIANCE: Vendor shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations and ordinances. By submitting a bid, Vendor acknowledges that it has reviewed, understands, and will comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and ordinances.
- 22. ARBITRATION: Any references made to arbitration contained in this Contract, Vendor's bid, or in any American Institute of Architects documents pertaining to this Contract are hereby deleted, void, and of no effect.
- 23. MODIFICATIONS: This writing is the parties' final expression of intent. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Contract to the contrary no modification of this Contract shall be binding without mutual written consent of the Agency, and the Vendor, with approval of the Purchasing Division and the Attorney General's office (Attorney General approval is as to form only). The Purchasing Division Director may, in writing, authorize the use of foreign steel products if:
- c. The cost for each contract item used does not exceed one tenth of one percent (.1%) of the total contract cost or two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00), whichever is greater. For the purposes of this section, the cost is the value of the steel product as delivered to the project; or d. The Director of the Purchasing Division determines that specified steel materials are not produced in the United States in sufficient quantity or otherwise are not reasonably available to meet contract requirements.

43. PREFERENCE FOR USE OF DOMESTIC ALUMINUM, GLASS, AND STEEL: In Accordance with W. Va. Code § 5-19-1 et seq., and W. Va. SPECIFICATIONS

- 1. PURPOSE AND SCOPE: The West Virginia Purchasing Division is soliciting bids On behalf of the West Virginia Division of Highways, Department of Transportation to establish an open-end contract for Trailer Mounted Solar Powered Arrow Board.
- 2. **DEFINITIONS:** The terms listed below shall have the meanings assigned to them below. Additional definitions can be found in section 2 of the General Terms and Conditions.
 - 2.1 "Contract Item" or "Contract Items" means the list of items identified in Section 3, Subsection 1 below.
 - 2.2 "Pricing Pages" means the schedule of prices, estimated order quantity, and totals contained in wvOASIS or attached hereto as Exhibit A, and used to evaluate the Solicitation responses.
 - 2.3 "Solicitation" means the official notice of an opportunity to supply the State with goods or services that is published by the Purchasing Division.
 - 2.4 "WVDOH" means West Virginia Division of Highways.
 - 2.5 "OSHA" means Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970/ Exhibit C, Reference www.osha.gov.
 - 2.6 "RF" means Interference radio frequency.
 - 2.7 "L.E.D." means lighting emitting diode.

3. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:

3.1 Contract Items and Mandatory Requirements: Vendor shall provide Agency with the Contract Items listed below on an open-end and continuing basis. Contract Items must meet or exceed the mandatory requirements as shown below.

3.1.1 General - Trailer Mounted Solar Powered Arrow Board.

- 3.1.1.1 The unit specified herein and offered shall be manufactured after January 1, 2016 and must be a new unit, not previously used or sold.
- 3.1.1.3 Vendor must certify that unit offered will meet or exceed the "OSHA", "Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970" or subsequent changes that are in effect at the time of manufacture of unit. Please see Exhibit C.

3.1.2 Arrow Board

- 3.1.3.1 Arrow board shall have built in auxiliary battery charger which would enable the batteries to be hooked up to an AC power source at the storage yard or off of a generator in the field so that the batteries shall be fully charged.
- 3.1.3.2 Charge time and charger version shall be based on the manufacturer's battery configuration.
- 3.1.3.3 The battery bank shall be of sufficient size and capacity to power the unit a minimum of 30 days with no solar assist.
- 3.1.3.4 The solar generator shall incorporate a 12 Volt DC Photovoltaic Solar Panel mounted on a self-erecting, automatic positioning device located above the unit.
- 3.1.3.5 The batteries shall be protected to prevent damage due to overcharging or discharging too deeply at any temperature.
- 3.1.3.6 The unit shall go to four (4) corner caution when charging is required.

3.1.4 Face Panel

- 3.1.4.1 Lamps shall be five (5) inch amber L.E.D. with minimum angularity of 30 degrees.
- 3.1.4.2 The unit shall increase lamp brightness when the ambient light level increases to five (5) foot candles, plus or minus one (1) foot candle and minimum legibility distance of one (1) mile.
- 3.1.4.3 The face of the panel shall be flat black with 15 hooded lamps.
- 3.1.4.4 The unit shall have the capability of the following modes of operation:
 - (1) Right arrow ten (10) lamps flashing in unison.
 - (2) Left arrow ten (10) lamps flashing in unison.
 - (3) Double arrow five (5) lamps in each arrowhead and three (3) lamps in shaft, all flashing in unison.
 - (4) Warning bar seven (7) horizontal lamps flashing in unison.
 - (5) Four point caution four (4) outermost corner lamps flashing in unison.
 - (6) Indicator lights on back of panel.
- 3.1.4.5 The flash rate shall be 30 flashes per minute and the flash cycle time shall be two (2) seconds with 50 percent on time.

3.1.5 Controller

3.1.5.1 The arrow board controller shall be housed in a weatherproof, lockable enclosure.

3.1.6 Communication

3.1.6.1 Unit shall be safe guarded from any unwanted outside RF interference which would include but not limited to VHF/FM receiver, 2-way receiver, cell phones, etc.

3.1.7 Paint

3.1.7.1 Arrow board shall be painted flat black.

3.1.8 Trailer

- 3.1.8.1 2,000 lb. axle with leaf springs.
- 3.1.8.2 Tubeless, standard tread tires and wheels.
- 3.1.8.3 Heavy duty pintle eye hitch, 3" inner diameter.
- 3.1.8.4 Adjustable jack stand on trailer tongue.
- 3.1.8.5 The unit shall have five (5) telescoping jack stands, all four(4) corners and tongue to stabilize unit while in operation.
- 3.1.8.6 Lighting and safety chains for highway use.
- 3.1.8.7 Heavy duty lighting for towing of unit with quick disconnect male pin plug.
- 3.1.8.8 License plate brackets.
- 3.1.8.9 Wheel fenders.

3.1.11 Miscellaneous:

Unspecified Accessories & Features: All parts, equipment, accessories, material, design and performance characteristics not specified herein, but which are necessary to provide a complete unit, must be furnished with each unit and required to conform to strength, quality of material, and quality of workmanship to those which are advertised and provided to the market in general by the unit industry. All parts and accessories advertised and regularly supplied as standard shall be included, except those which would represent duplication of these specified and except those which, by specification, are not to be furnished. All standard safety features, required by Federal and State Law, shall be included.

B. Unit shall be delivered: to WVDOH with all manufacturers recommended safety related decals and safety features intact.

4. CONTRACT AWARD:

To assure selfs and healthful working conditions for working men and women; by authoriting enforcement of the standards developed under the Act, by assisting and encouraging the States in their efforts to assure safe and healthful working conditions; by providing for resisted, information, education, and training in the field of occupational safety and health; and for other purposes:

he it enterted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Linked States of America in Congress assembles, That this Act may be cited as the "Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1976."

SEC. 2. Congressional Findings and Purpose

(a) The Congress finds their personal injuries and linesses arising out of work structions impose a substantial burden upon, and are a hindranea to, orderstate commerce in terms of fost production, wage loss, medical expenses, and disability compensation payments.

- (b) The Congress declares it to be its purpose and policy, through the exercise of its powers to regulate commerce among the several States and with foreign nations and to provide for the general welfare, to assure so far as possible every working non and woman in the Nation safe and healthful working conditions and to preserve our human resources —
 - (1) by encouraging amployers and employees in their efforts to radiuce the number of occupiational sofety and health histards at their places of employment, and to attriulate employers and employees to institute new and to perfect existing programs for providing safe and healthful working conditions; (2) by providing that employees and employees have separate but dependent reportabilities and rights with respect to achieving safe and healthful working conditions;
 - (3) by Authorizing the Sebretary of Labor to set mandatory occupational safety and health standards applicable to businesses affecting intensiate commerce, and by creating an Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission for corrying out adjudicatory functions under the Acts
 - (4) by building upon advances already made through employer and employee initiative for providing selfs and healthful evaning conditions;
- (5) by providing for research in the field of occupational safety and health, including the psychological fectors involved, and by developing appositive methods, including the approaches for dealing with occupational safety and health problems;
- (6) by exploring ways to discover latent diseases, establishing dasal connections between diseases and work in environmental conditions, and conducting other research relating to legalith problems, in recognition of the first that occupational results standards present problems often different from those involved in occupational arrety;
- (7) by providing medical citizs which will assure lessfar as practicable that no amployee will suffer distinsteed heakin, functional capacity, or life expectancy as a result of his work experience;
- (6) by providing for training programs to increase the number and competence of personnel engaged in the field of occupational safety and healths affecting the OSH Act since its passage in 1970 through January 1, 2004.
- (9) by providing for the development and promalgation of occupational safety and health standards;
- (iii) by providing an effective enforcement program which shall include a prohibition against giving advance notice of any inspection and sanctions for any individual violating this prohibition;
- (11) by encouraging the States to assume the fullest responsibility for the administration and enforcement of their occupational safety and health laves by providing grants to the

States to assist in identifying their needs and responsibilities in the area of occupational safety and health, to develop plans in accordance with the provisions of this Act, to improve the administration and enforcement of State occupational safety and health laws, and to complet experimental and demonstration projects in connection therewith;

- (12) by providing for appropriate reporting procedures with respect to occupational safety and health which procedures will help achieve the objectives of this Act and accurately describe the nature of the occupational safety and health problem;
- (13) by encouraging joint labor-management efforts to reduce injuries and disease arising out of employment.

SEC. 3. Definitions

- (10) The term "established Federal standard" means any operative occupational safety and health standard established by any agency of the United States and presently in affect, or contained in any Act of Congress in force on the date of enectment of this Act.
- (11) The term "Committee" means the National Advisory Committee on Occupational Safety and Haulth established under this Act.
- (12) The term "Director" means the Director of the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health.
- (13) The term "Institute" means the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health established under this Act.
- (14) The term "Workmen's Compensation Commission" means the National Commission on State Workmen's Compensation Laws established under this Act.

SEC. 4. Applicability of This Act

(a) This Act shall apply with respect to employment performed in a workplace in a State, the Disnot of Columbia, the Commonweight of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samue, Guein, the Trust Ferthery of the Pacific Islands, Wales Island, Outer Continental Shelf Lands defined in the Quiter Continental Shelf Lands Act, Johnston Island, and the Carel Zone. SEC, 7. Advisory Committees; Administration

(a) (1) There is hereby established a National Advisory Committee on Occupational Safety and Health consisting of twelve members appointed by the Secretary, four of whom are to be designated by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, without regard to the provisions

(4) The Sparetary shall furnish to the Committee an executive secretary and such secretarial, clerical, and other services as are deemed necessary to the conduct of its business.

(a) in order to carry out the purposes of this Act, the Secretary, upon presenting appropriate credentials to the owner, operator, or agent in charge, is authorized —

(b) In making his irrejections and investigations under this Act the Secretary may require the attendance and testimany of witnesses and the production of evidence under coth. Witnesses shall be paid the same fees and mileage that are paid witnesses in the courts of the United States. In case of a contumer, failure, or refusel of any person to obey such an order, any district court of the United States cours of any territory or possession, within the jurisdiction of which such person is found, or resides or transacts business, upon the application by the Secretary, shall have jurisdiction to issue to such person an order requiring such person to appear to produce evidence if, as, and when so ordered, and to give testimony selating to the maker under investigation or in question, and any failure to obey such order of the court may be

punished by said court as a contempt thereof:

- (a) (1) Each employer shall make, heep and preserve, and make evaliable to the Secretary or the Secretary of Heath and Human Services, such records regarding his activities relating to this Act as the Secretary, in cooperation with the Secretary of Heath and Human Services, may prescribe by regulation as recessary or appropriate for the enforcement of this Act or for developing information regarding the causes and prevention of occupational accidents and lineases. In order to party out the provisions of the puragraph such regulations may include provisions requiring employers to conduct periodic inspections. The Secretary shall also lisuse regulations requiring that employers through posting of notices or other appropriate means, keep their employees informed of their protections and obligations under this Act, Including the provisions of applicable standards.
- (2) The Secretary, in cooperation with the Secretary of Health and Hurham Services, shall prescribe regulations regularing employers to maintain accurate records of, and to make periodic apports on; work-related deaths, injuries and illnesses other than minor injuries requiring only first aid treatment, and which do not knotve medical treatment, loss of consciousness, restriction of work or incition, or transfer to another job.
- (3) The Secretary, in cooperation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, shall issue regulations requiring employers to maintain accurate records of employees exposures to potentially trade materials or harmful physical agents which are required to be monitored or measured under stackloo. 6. Such regulations shall provide employees or their representatives with an apportunity to observe such monitoring or measuring, and to have access to the records thereof. Such regulations shall also misse appropriate provision for each analogue or former employee to have access to such records as will induste his own exposure to back materials or learnful physical agents. Each employer shall promptly notify any employee who has been or is being exposed to footh metanate or harmful physical agents in concentrations or at levels which exceed those prescribed by an applicable occupational safety and health standard promulgated under section 6, and shall inform any employee who is being thus exposed of the corrective action being taken.
- (d) Any information obtained by the Secretary, the Secretary of Health and Human Services, or a State agency under this Act shall be obtained with a minimum burden upon employers, especially those openiting small businesses. Unnecessary duplication of efforts in obtaining information shall be reduced to the maximum extent feasible.
- (a) Subject to regulations issued by the Secretary, a representative of the employer and a representative authorized by his employees shall be given an opportunity to accompany the Secretary or his authorized representative during the physical inspection of any workplace under subsection (a) for the purpose of aiding such inspection. Where there is no authorized employee representative, the Secretary or his authorized representative shall consult with a reasonable number of employees concerning matters of health and safety in the workplace.
- (f) (1) Any employees or regressentative of employees who believe that a violation of a safety or heath standard exists that threatens physical harm, or that an amminent danger exists, may request an expection by giving notice to the Secretary or his enthorseed representative of such violation or danger. Any such makes that he reduced to writing, shall set forth with resecrable of employees, and a copy shall be provided the employer or his agent no later than at the time of impection, except that, upon the request of the person giving such notice, his name and the names of individual employees referred to therein shall not appear in such copy or or stry record published, released, or made available pursiant to subsection (g) of this section. - (g) (1) The Secretary and Secretary of Health and Human Services are authorized to compile, analyse, and publish, either in summary or detailed form, all reports or information obtained under this sertion.
- (2) The Secretary and the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall each prescribe such rules and regulations as the may deem necessary to carry out their responsibilities under this Act, including rules and regulations dealing with the inspection of an employer's establishment.
- (h) The Secretary shall not use the results of enforcement activities, such as the number of citations assed or peoples assessed, to evaluate employees directly involved in enforcement activities under this Act or to impose quotas or goals with regard to the results of such activities.

- (g) Whoever knowingly makes any false statement, representation, or certification in any application, record, report, plan, or other document filed or required to be maintained pursuant to this Act shell, upon conviction, be punished by a first of suit more than \$10,000, or by more or not more than she months, or by both.

SEC. 18. State Jurisdiction and State Plans

(a) Nothing in this Act shall prevent any State agency or court from esserting jurisdiction under State law over any occupational safety or health issue with respect to which no standard is in effect under section 6.

- (b) Any State which, at any time, desires to assume responsibility for development and enforcement therein of occupational safety and neeth standards relating to any occupational safety or health issue with respect to which a Federal standard has been promulgated under saction 6 shall submit a State plan for the development of such standards and their enforcement.
- (c) The Secretary shall approve the plan submitted by a State under subsection (b), or any modification thereof, if such plan in his judgement --
 - designates a State agency or agencies as the agency or agencies responsible for administering the plan throughout the State.
 - (2) provides for the development and enforcement of shiety and health standards relating to one or more enfoty or lessith issues, which standards (and the enforcement of which standards) are or will be at least as effective in providing safe and healthful employment and playes of employment as the standards promulgated under section 6 which relate to fite same issues, and which standards, when applicable to products which are distributed or used in intensities commerce, are required by compelling local conditions and do not unduly burden intensities commerce.
 - (3) provides for a right of entry and inspection of all workplaces subject to the Act which is at least as effective as that provided in section 8, and includes a prohibition on advance notice of syspections.
 - (4) contains splisfactory assurances that such algency or agencies have or will have the legal authority and qualified personnel necessary for the enforcement of such standards,
 - (5) gives satisfactory assurances that such State will devote adaquate funds to the administration and enforcement of such standards,
- (6) contains satisfactory assurances that such State will, to the extent permitted by its law, establish and maintain an effective and comprehensive occupational safety and health program applicable to all employees of public agencies of the State and its potitical subdivisions, which program is as effective as the standards contained in an accrowed plan.
- (7) requires employers in the State to make reports to the Secretary in the same makiner and to the same entent as if the plan were not in effect, and
- (a) provides that the State agency will make such reports to the Secretary in such form and containing such information, as the Secretary shall from time to time require.
- (d) If the Secretary rejects a plain submitted under subsection (b), he shall afford the State submitting the plan due notice and apportunity for a bearing before so doing.
- (e) After the Secretary approves a State plan submitted under subsection (b), he may, but shall not be required to, exercise his authority under suction 6, 3, 10, 13, and 17 with respect to comparable standards promulgated under suction 6, for the period specified in the next sentence. The Secretary may exercise the authority referred to above tend he idetermines, on the basis of actual operations under the State plan, that the criteria set forth in subsection (c) are being applied, but he shall not region such determination for at least three years after the plants approved under subsection (c). Upon making the determination referred to in the proceeding sentence, the provisions of sections \$(a)(2), 8 (except for the purpose of carrying out subsection (f) of this section), 9, 10, 13, and 17, and standards provingiated under section 6 of this Act, shall not apply with respect to any occupational safety or health issues covered under the plan, but the Secretary may retain jurisdiction under the above provisions in any proceeding commenced under section 9 or 10 before the
- (f) The Secretary shall, on the basis of reports submitted by the State agency and his own inspections make a continuing evaluation of the manner in which sech State having a plan approved under this section is terrying out such plan. Whenever the Secretary finds, after afforcing due extice and apportunity for a hearing, that in the administration of the State plan there is, a failure to comply substantially with any provision of the State plan (or siny assurance construct therein), he shall notify the State agency of his withdrawal of approval of such plan and upon receipt of such notice such plan shall ensue to be in effect, but the State may retain jurisdiction in any case commenced before the withdrawal of the plan is order to enforce standards under the plan whenever the issues involved do not relate to the vassors for the withdrawal of the plan.
- (g) The State may obtain a review of a decision of the Secretary withdrawing approval of or rejecting its plan by the United States court of appeals for the circuit in which the State is located by filing in such court within thirty days following receipt of notice of such decision a polition to modify or set aside in whole or in part the action of the Secretary. A copy of such petition shall furthwith be served upon the Secretary, and thereupon the Secretary shall

restify and file in the court the record upon which the decision complained of was issued as provided in section 21,12 of title 28, United States Code. Unless the court finds that the Secretary's decision in rejecting a proposed State plan or withdrawing his approval of such a plan is not supported by substantial evidence the court shall affirm the Secretary's decision. The judgment of the court shall be subject to review by the Supreme Court of the United States upon certification as provided in section 1254 of title 28, United States Code.

(h) The Secretary may enter into an agreement with a State under which the State will be parallel to continue to enforce one or none occupational health and safety standards in effect in such State until final action is taken by the Secretary with respect to a plan stamitted by a State under subsection (b) of this section, or two years from the date of enactionant of this Act, whichever is earlier.

SEC. 19. Pederal Agency Safety Programs and Responsibilities

- (a) It shall be the responsibility of the head of each Federal agency (not including the United 29 USC 668 States Postni Service) to establish and maintain an effective and comprehensive occupational states and feetin program which is consistent with the standards promulgated under section 6. The head of each agency shall failur consultation with representatives of the amployees thereof).
 - (1) provide selfs and healthful places and conditions of employment, consistent with the $\,$ Pub. $\,$ L. 50-241 standards set under Section 6;
 - (2) acquire, maintain, and require the use of safety equipment, personal protective equipment, and devices reasonably necessary to protect employees;
 - (3) keep adequate records of all occupational accidents and lineages for proper evaluation and necessary corrective accom;
 - (4) consult with the Secretary with regard to the adequacy as to form and content of records large pursuant to aubsection (a)(3) of this section; and
- (5) make an arrival report to the Secretary with respect to occupational accidents and injuries and the agency's program unour this section. Such report shall include any report submitted under section 7902(e)(2) of title 5, United States Code.
- (b) The Secretary shall report to the Prusident a etrumery of eligest of reports submitted to Pub. L. 97-375 him under subsection (a)(5) of title section, together with his evaluations of and recommendations derived from such reports.
- (c) Section 7902(c)(1) of title 5, United States Code, is amended by inverting after "agencies" the following: "end of labor organizations representing employees",
- (d) The Secretary shall have access to records and reports text and filed by Federal egondes pursuent to subsections (e)(3) and (5) of this section unless those records and reports are specifically required by Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of the national distance or foreign policy, in which case the Secretary shell have eccess to such adornation as will not properties national defense or foreign policy.

SEC. 20. Research and Related Activities

- (a) (1) The Secretary of Health and Hurian Services, after constitution with the Secretary and with other appropriate Federal departments or agencies, shall conduct (directly or by grants or contracts) research, experiments, and demonstrations relating to occupational safety and health, including statites of psychological factors involved, and relating to Inneventive methods, techniques, and approaches for dealing with occupational safety and health problems.
 - (2) The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall from time to time consult with the Secretary in order to develop specific plans for such research, demonstrations, and experiments as are necessary to produce externe, including crained leastifying time substances, enabling the Secretary to sneet his responsibility for the formalition of safety and health standards under this Act; and the Secretary of Health and Human Services, on the basis of such research, demonstrations, and experiments and any other information everlable to him, shall develop and publish at least arrivally such crients as will affectivate the purposes of this Act.
- (3) The Secretary of Health and Human Services, on the basis of such research, Cemonstations, and experiments, and any other information invalidate to him, shall develop criteria dealing with toole materials and harmful physical agents and substances which will describe exposure levels that are safe for vertous paracle of employees, including but not limited to the exposure levels at which no employee will suffer impaired health or functional capacities or diminished life expectancy as a result of his work experience.
- (4) The Secretary of Health-and Human Services shall also conduct special research, experiments, and demonstrations retailing to occupational safety and health as are necessary to explore new problems, including those created by risw technology in occupational safety and health, which may require ameliorative action beyond that which is otherwise provided for in the operating provisions of this Act. The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall also conclust research into the motivational and between factors relating to the field of occupational safety and health.

(5) The Secretary of Health and Human Services, in order to comply with his responsibilities under paragraph (2), and in order to develop needed information requested potentially trade substances or harmful physical agents, may prescribe requisitions requiring employers to measure, record, and make reports on the exposure of employees to substances or physical agents which the Secretary of Health and Human Services reasonably believes may endanger the fleelith or select of employees. The Secretary of Health and Human Services also is authorised to explosives, the Secretary of Health and Human Services are may be necessary for determining the incidence of occupational divisors and traits as may be necessary for determining the incidence of occupational divisors and the act shall be desired to such divisors. Noting in this or any other provision of the Act shall be desired to authorize or require medical examination, writination, or treatment for those who object traints on religious grounds, except where such is necessary for the protection of the health or selectly of others. Upon the request of any employer who is required to measure and record exposure of employees to substances or physical agents as provided under the subsection, the Secretary of Health and Haman Services shall furnish hall financial or other assistance to such employer for the purpose of defraying any additional expense incurred by him in carrying out the measuring and recording as provided in this subsection.

(6) The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall publish within six months of enactories of disease and thereafter as needed but at least enacelly a list of all known back substances by generic family or other isself grouping, and the concentrations at which such toatify a known to occur. He shall determine following a written request by any employer or authorized representative of employees, specifying with resonable particularity the grounds on which the request is made, whether any substance normally found in the place of employment has potentially toxic effects in such concentrations as used or found; and shall subsist such determination both to employers and affected employees as soon as possible. If the Secretary of Health and Human Services determines that concentrations in which it is used or found in a place of employment, and such substance is not covered by an occupitional earlier or feed in a place of employment, and primariligated under section 6, the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall impredistiply submit such determination to the Secretary, together with all pertinent orders.

(7) Within two years of enactment of the Act, and annually thereafter the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall conduct and publish industry wide studies of the effect of chronic or low-level exposure to industrial materials, processes, and stresses on the potential for linear, disease, or loss of functional capacity in aging adults.

(b) The Secretary of Health and Human Services is authorized to make inspections and question employers and employees as provided in section 8 of this Act in order to early out his functions and responsibilities under this section.

(c) The Secretary is authorized to enter into contracts, agreements, or other arrangements with appropriate public ageicus or privite organizations for the purpose of conducting studies relating to his responsibilities under this Act. In corrying out his responsibilities under this subsection, the Secretary shall cooperate with the Secretary of Health and Human Services in order to avoid any diplication of efforts under this section.

(d) Information obtained by the Secretary and the Secretary of Health and Human Services under this section shall be dispendicated by the Secretary to employers and employees and organizations thereof.

(e) The functions of the Secretary of Health and Human Services under this Act shall, to the extent feesible, he delegated to the Director of the National Institute for Occupational Sefety and Health established by section 22 of this Act.

EXPANDED RESEARCH OH WORKER SAFETY AND HEALTH

The Secretary of Health and Human Services (referred to in this section as the "Secretary"), acting through the Director of the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health, shall enhance and expend research as deemed appropriate on the health and safety of workers who are at risk for biotexnoust threats or attacks in the workplace, including research on the health effects of measures taken to treat or protect such workers for classes or decreters resulting from a bioternoust threat or attack. Nothing in whis section may be construed as establishing new regulatory authority for the Secretary or the Director to issue or modify any occupational safety and health safe or regulation.

SEC. 21. Training and Employee Education
(a) The Secretary of Health and Human Services, after consultation with the Secretary and bitth other appropriate Federal departments and agencies, shall conduct, directly or by grants or contacts —

- discriminal programs to provide an adequate supply of qualified personnel to carry out the purposes of this Act, and
- (2) Informational programs on the importance of and proper use of adequate safety and health acutoment:
- (b) The Secretary is also authorized to conduct, directly or by grants or contracts, short-time training of personnel engaged in work related to his responsibilities under this Act.
- (c) The Secretary, in consultation with the Secretary of Health and Human

Services, shall ...

- (1) provide for the establishment and supervision of programs for the education and braining of employers and employees in the recognition, providence, and prevention of unstate or unhealthful working conditions in employments covered by this Act, and
- (2) consult with and advise employers and employers, and organizations representing employers and employees as to effective means of preventing occupational injuries and litreases.

- (d) (1) The Secretary shall establish and support cooperative agreements with the States under which employers subject to this Act may consult with State personnel with respect to --
 - (A) the application of occupational safety and health requirements under this Act or under State plans approved under saction 18; and
 - (8) voluntary efforts that employers may undertake to establish and maintain safe and healthful employment and places of employment. Such agreements may provide, as a condition of receiving funds under such agreements, for contributions by States towards meeting the costs of such agreements.
- (2) Pursuant to such agreements the State shell provide on-site consultation at the employer's workeds to employers who request such assistance. The State may also provide other education and training programs for employers sixt employees in the State. The State shall ensure that or-site consultations conducted pursuant to such agreements include provision for the participation by employees.

 - (A) which requests and undergoes an on-site consultative visit provided under this subsection;
 - (B) which corrects the hazards that have been identified during the visit willian, the time frames established by the State and agrees to request a subsequent consultative visit if major changes in working conditions or work processes occur which introduce new hazards in the workplace; and
- (C) which is implementing procedures for regularly identifying and preventing hazards regulated under this Act and mishtains appropriate involvement of, and training for, management and not-management employees in achieving sale and healthful working conditions, may be exempt hore an inspection (except an inspection requested under section 8(?) or an inspection to determine the clause of a workplace accident which resulted in the death of one or more employees or hospitalization for three or more employees) for a period-of 1 year from the classing of the consultative visit.
- (5) A State shall provide worksite consultations under paragraph (2) at the

request of an employer. Priority in scheduling such consultations shall be

assigned to requests from strell businesses which are in higher hexerd industries or have the most hazardous conditions at here in the request.

SEC. 22. National Distribute for Occupational Sefety and Health (a) It is the purpose of this action to establish a National Institute for Occupational Sefety and Health in the Department of Health and Human Services in order to carry out the policy set forth in section 2 of this Act and to perform the functions of the Secretary of Health and Human Services under sections 20 and 21 of this Act.

- (b) There is hereby established in the Department of Health and Numan Services a National Institute for Occupational Selety and Health. The Institute shall be headed by a Director who shall be appointed by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and who shall serve for a term of sor years unless previously removed by the Secretary of Health and Human Services.
- (c) The Institute is suthorized to -
 - (1) develop and establish recommended occupational safety and health standards; and
 - (2) perform all functions of the Secretary of Health and Human Services under sections 20 and 21 of this Act.
- (d) Upon his own initiative, or upon the request of the Secretary of Health and Human Services, the Director is authorized (1) to conduct such research and experimental programs as he determines are recessary for the development of prizerie for new and improved occupational seriety and health standards, and (2) after consideration of the results of such recommendations contemming new or improved occupational seriety and health standards. Any occupational seriety and health standard recommended pursued to this section shall immediately be forwarded to the Secretary of Labor, and to the Secretary of Health and Humain Services.

- (e) In addition to any authority vested in the Institute by other provisions of this section, the Director, in corrying out the functions of the Institute, is authorized to -
 - (1) prescribe such regulations as the deems necessary governing the menner in which its functions shall be carried out;
 - (2) receive money and other property donatest, bequesthed, or clavised, without condition or restriction other then that it be used for the purposes of the institute and to use, self, or otherwise dispose of such property for the purpose of carrying out its functions;
- (3) receive (and use, sell, or otherwise dispose of, in accordance with paragraph (2)), money and other property donated, bequestived, or devised to the Eastitute with a condition or restriction, including a condition that the Institute use other funds of the Eastitute for the purposes of the gift;
- (4) in accordance with the civil service laws, appoint and fix the compensation of such personnel as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this section;
- (5) obtain the services of experts and consultants in accordance with the provisions of section 3109 of this 5, United Status Code;
- (6) accept and utilize the services of voluntary and noncompensated personnel and reimburse them for bavel expenses, including per diam, as authorized by section 5703 of title 5, United States Code;
- (7) enter into contracts, gaints or either arrangements, or modifications thereof to carry out the provisions of this section, and such contracts or modifications thereof may be extered into without performance or either bonds, and without regard to section 3709 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (41 U.S.C. 5), or any other provision of law relating to competitive bidding;
- (8) make advance, progress, and other payments which the Director deems recessary under this title without regard to the provisions of section 3324 (a) and (b) of Title 31; and
- (9) make other nacessary expenditures.

- (f) The Director shall submit to the Secretary of Health and Human Services, to the President, and to the Congress on annual report of the operations of the Institute under this Act, which shall include a detailed statement of all private and public funds received and depended by II, and such received and depended by II.

 - (C) There are authorized to be appropriated, a minimum, \$10,000,000 to the Institute for each of the flecal years 1954 through 1997 to make grante under this paragraph.
- (2) Evaluation of Programs. The Institute shell conduct periodic and comprehensive executive entermines of the efficacy of the worker and supervisor training programs developed and offered by those receiving grants under this section. The Director shall prepare reports on the results of these eleveraments addressed to the Admitistrator of the Environmental Protection Agency to include recommendations as may be appropriate for the revelor of these programs. The sum of \$500,000 is authorized to be appropriated to the limitation for each of the flocal years 1994 through 1997 to carry out this paragraph.

 - (IV) indoor air quality, as the research concerning such partains to the fate of chemicals trainsported from a workplace into the home environment; and

(V) methods for differentiating exposure health effects and relative risks associated with specific agents from other sources of exposure inside and

(iv) Identify the role of Federal and State agencies in responding to incidents of home contamination;

(v) prepare and submit to the Task Force established under paragraph (2) and to the appropriate committees of Congress, a report concerning the results of the matters studied or evaluated under dauses (f) through (iv); and

(vi) study home contamination incidents and issues and worker and family protection policies and practices related to the special discumstances of firefighters and prepare and submit to the apprepriate committees of Congress a report concerning the findings with respect to such study.

This reprint generally retains the section numbers uriginally created by Congress in the Occupational Safety and Health (OSH) Act of 1970, Pub, L. 91-996, 84 Statt 1990. This document includes some editorial changes, such as changing the format to make it easier to read, correcting typographical errors, and updating some of the margin rotes. Because Congress enacted schemements to the Act since 1970, this version differs from the original version of the QSH Act. It also differs slightly from the version published in the United States Code at 29 U.S.C. 651 at seq. For example, this reprint refers to the statute as the "Act" rother than the "chapter."

This reprint reflects the provisions of the OSH Act that are in effect as of January 1, 2004. Challons to Public Laws which made important amendments to the OSH Act since 1970 are set forth in the margins and explanatory nature are archited below.

NOTE. Some provisions of the OSH Act may be affected by the enactment of, or amendments to, other stabutes. Section 17(h)(1), 29 U.S.C. 666, is an example. Amendments

On January 2, 1974, section 2(c) of Pub. L. 93-237 replaced the phresé "7(b)(6)" in section 28(d) of the OSH Act with "7(b)(5)". 87 Stat. 1823. Note: The text of Section 28 (Sconomic Assistance to Small Business) amended Section 2(b) and Section 4(c)(1) of the Small Business Act. Because these amendments are no longer current, the text of section 28 is omitted in this reprint. For the current version, see 15 U.S.C. 636.

In 1977, the U.S. entered into the Penarra Conal Treaty of 1977, Sept. 7, 1977, U.S.-Pename, T.I.A.S. 2003b, 33 U.S.T 39. In 1979, Congress enected implementing legislation. Pename Carrel Act of 1979, Pub. 1. 95-70, 93 Stat. 432 (1979). Although no corresponding amendment to the OSH Act was enected, the Canal Zone coased to exist in 1979. On October 17, 1979, Pub. L. 96-88, Title V, section 509(b), 93 Stat. 668, 695, reclessympted references to the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to the Department of Health and Human Services and redesignated references to the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare to the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

On September 13, 1962, Pub. L. 57-258, §4(b), 96 Stat. 677, 1067, effectively substituted "Section 3324(a) and (b) of Title 31" for "Section 3648 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (31 U.S.C. 529)" in section 22 (e)(6), 29 U.S.C. 671, relating to MIOSH procurement autitiority.

On December 21, 1992, Pub. L. 97-375, 96 Stat. 1819, deleted the sentance in section 19(b) of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 668, that directed the President of the United States to transmit annual reports of the activities of federal agencies to the House of Representatives and the Senate.

On October 12, 1994, Pub. L. 96-473, Chapter II, 98 Stat. 1837, 1987, (commonly referred to as the "Sentending Reform Act of 1994") instituted a classification system for activated offerses punishable under the United States Code. Under this system, an offerse with hyprisorment terms of "six months or less but more than thirty days," such as that found by 29 U.S.C. 656(a) for a walks viplation of the OSH Act, is classified as a criminal "Class B missierneanor." 18 U.S.C. 3559(a)(7).

The criminal code increases the monetary penalties for criminal mademeaners beyond what is provided for in the OSH Act: a firse for a Class 8 missismeaner resulting in clasts, for example, is not more than \$250,000 for an erganization. IS U.S.C. 3571(b)(4), (c)(4). The criminal code also provides for authorized terms of probation for both individuals and organizations, IS U.S.C. 3551, 3561. The term of impresonment for individuals is the same as that authorized by the OSH Act. 18 U.S.C. 3581(b)(7).

On Revember 8, 1984, Pub. L. 98-620, 98 Spai. 3335, deleted the last sentaines in section 11(a) of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 650, that required publicons filed under the subsection to be heard expeditionally.

On November 5, 1990, Pub. L. 101-508, 104 Stat. 1388, amended section 17 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 666, by increasing the penalties in section 17(a) from \$10,800 for each violation to "\$70,000 for each violation, but not this train \$5,000 for each willful violation," and increased the languages on penalties in sections (b), (c), (d), and (f) from \$1,000 to \$7,000.

On October 26, 1992, Pub. L. 102-522; 106 Stat. 3410; 3420, added to Title 29, section 671a "Workers' Family Protection" to grant authority to the Director of NICSH to evaluate, investigate and if necessary, for the Secretary of Labor to regulate employee transported releases of hazardous material that result from contamination on the amployee's doctoring or person and may ephersely affect the health and suffely of workers and high fibrilless. Note, action 671a was enerted as section 2019 of the Fire Administration Authorization Act of 1992, but it is reprinted here because it is codified within the chapter that comprises the OSH Act.

On October 28, 1992, the Housing and Community Development Act of 1992, Pub. 1. 102-560, 105 Stat. 3672, 3924, whended section 22 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 671, by adding subsection (g), which requires MTOSH to institute a training great program for lead-based pairs activities.

On July 5, 1994, section 7(b) of Pub. L. 103-272, 108 Stat. 745, repeated section 31 of the OSH Act, "Emergency Locator Beacons." Section 1(e) of the same Public Law, however, enacted a modified version of section 31 of the OSH Act. This provision, titled "Emergency Locator Transmitters," is codified at 49 U.S.C. 44712.

On December 21, 1995, Section 30(3 of Pub. L. 104-65, 109 Stat. 707, as amended, effective May 15, 20(0, barmusted the provisions relating to the transmitted to Congress of reports under section 35 of the OSH Act. 29 U.S.C. 675.

On July 16, 1999, Pub. L. 105-197, 112 Stat. 638, amended section 21 of the Put. 29 U.S.C. 670, by adding subsection (d), which required the Secretary to establish a compliance assistance program by which employees can consult with state personnel regarding the application of and compliance with OSHA standards.

On July 16, 1996, Pub. L. 105-198, 112 Stat. 540, amended action 8 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 657, by adding subsection (h), which forbids the Secretary to use the results of enforcement activities to evaluate the engloyees involved in such enforcement or to impose quotas or goals.

On September 29, 1998, Pub. L. 105-241, 112 Stat. 1572, amended auctions 3(5) and 19(a) of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 652 and 668, to include the United States Postal Service as an "employer" subject to OSHA enforcement.

On June 12, 2002, Pub. L. 107-188, Title I, Section 153, 116 Stat. 631, Congress enacted 29 U.S.C. 669a, to expand respond on the "health and safety of workers who are at risk for bioterrorist threats or attacks in the workplace."

L. 103-272, 108 Stat.745; (July 5, 1994), repealed the text of section 31 and enacted a modified version of the provision, entitled "Emergency Locator Transmitters." which is codified at 49 U.S.C. 44712.

Notes on other legislation effecting the administration of the Occupational Bafuty and Health Act. Sometimes legislation does not directly amend the OSH Act, but does place regislements on the Secretary of Labor either to act or to refrain from acting under the authority of the OSH Act. Included below are some examples of such legislation. Please note that this is not intended to be a comprehensive list.

STANDARDS PROMULGATION.

For example, legislation may require the Secretory to promulgate specific standards pursuant to authority under section 6 of the OSH Act, 29 U.S.C. 655. Some examples include the following:

Hazardous Hiberte Operations: Pub. L. 99-499, "Ride 1, section 126(a)-(f), 100 Stat. 1613 (1996), as amended by Pub. L. 100-202, section 101(f), Title II, section 201, 101 Stat. 1329 (1987), required the Secretary of Labor to promulgate standards concerning hazardous waste operations.

Chemical Process Siristy Management: Pub. L. 101-549, Title III, section 304, 104 Stat. 2399 (1990), required the Secretary of Labor, in coordination with the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, to promulgate a chemical process safety standard.

/mampines /feterials. Pulo. L. 101-615, section 29. 104 Stat. 3244 (1990), required the Secretary of Labor, in consultation with the Secretaries of Transportation and Transport, to issue specific standards concurring the landing of instantous implerials.

Bioodiume Pathogens Standard. Pub. L. 102-170, Title I, section 100, 105 Stat. 1107 (1991), required the Secretary of Labor to promulgate a final Bioodiume Pathogens standard.

Lead Standard. The Housing and Community Development Act of 1992, Pub. L. 102-550, Title X, sections 1031 and 1032, 105 Stat. 3672 (1992), required the Secretary of Labor to Issue an Interim final lead standard.

EXTENSION OF COVERAGE.

Sometimes a statute may make some OSH Act provisions applicable to certain critics that are not subject to those provisions by the terms of the OSH Act. For example, the Congressional Accountability Act of 1996, Pub. L. 104-1, 109 Stat. 3, (1995), extended certain OSH Act coverage, such as the duty to comply with Section 5 of the CSH Act, to the Legislative Branch. This statute does not make all the provisions of the OSH Act applicable to the Legislative Branch. Another example is the Medicare Prescription Drug, Improvement, and Modernization Act of 2003, Title 17, Section 947, Pub 1, 108-173, 117 Stat. 2065 (2003), which requires public hospitals not otherwise subject to the OSH Act to comply with COSHA's Bloodborne Pethogens standard, 29 GPR 1910.1030. PROGRAM CHANGES ENACTED THROUGH APPROPRIATIONS LEGISLATION.

Sometimes an appropriations stabule may allow or restrict certain substantive actions by OSHA or the Socretary of Labor.
