- 2. MANDATORY TERMS: The Solicitation may contain mandatory provisions identified by the use of the words "must," "will," and "shall." Failure to comply with a mandatory term in the Solicitation will result in bid disqualification.

An attendance sheet provided at the pre-bid meeting shall serve as the official document verifying attendance. The State will not accept any other form of proof or documentation to verify attendance. Any person attending the pre-bid meeting on behalf of a Vendor must list on the attendance sheet his or her name and the name of the Vendor he or she is representing.

Additionally, the person attending the pre-bid meeting should include the Vendor's E-Mail address, phone number, and Fax number on the attendance sheet. - 5. VERBAL COMMUNICATION: Any verbal communication between the Vendor and any State personnel is not binding, including verbal communication at the mandatory pre-bid conference. Failure to acknowledge addenda may result in bid disqualification. The addendum acknowledgement should be submitted with the bid to expedite document processing.
- 9. BID FORMATTING: Vendor should type or electronically enter the information onto its bid to prevent errors in the evaluation. Failure to type or electronically enter the information may result in bid disqualification.
- 10. ALTERNATES: Any model, brand, or specification listed in this Solicitation establishes the acceptable level of quality only and is not intended to reflect a preference for, or in any way favor, a particular brand or vendor. - 11. EXCEPTIONS AND CLARIFICATIONS: The Solicitation contains the specifications that shall form the basis of a contractual agreement. Vendor shall clearly mark any exceptions, clarifications, or other proposed modifications in its bid. - 12. - 13. REGISTRATION: Prior to Contract award, the apparent successful Vendor must be properly registered with the West Virginia Purchasing Division and must have paid the \$125 fee, if applicable.
- 14. UNIT PRICE: Unit prices shall prevail in cases of a discrepancy in the Vendor's bid.
- 15. PREFERENCE: Vendor Preference may only be granted upon written request and only in accordance with the West Virginia Code § 5A-3-37 and the West Virginia Code of State Rules. A Vendor Preference Certificate form has been attached hereto to allow Vendor to apply for the preference. Vendor's failure to submit the Vendor Preference Certificate form with its bid will result in denial of Vendor Preference. Vendor Preference does not apply to construction projects.

- 16. SMALL, WOMEN-OWNED, OR MINORITY-OWNED BUSINESSES: For any solicitations publicly advertised for bid, in accordance with West Virginia Code §5A-3-37(a)(7) and W. Va. CSR § 148-22-9, any non-resident vendor certified as a small, womenowned, or minority-owned business under W. Va. - 17. WAIVER OF MINOR IRREGULARITIES: The Director reserves the right to waive minor irregularities in bids or specifications in accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules § 148-1-4.6.
- 18. ELECTRONIC FILE ACCESS RESTRICTIONS: Vendor must ensure that its submission in wvOASIS can be accessed by the Purchasing Division staff immediately upon bid opening. The Purchasing Division will consider any file that cannot be immediately opened and/or viewed at the time of the bid opening (such as, encrypted files, password protected files, or incompatible files) to be blank or incomplete as context requires, and are therefore unacceptable. CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENT: Issuance of a Award Document signed by the Purchasing Division Director, or his designee, and approved as to form by the Attorney General's office constitutes acceptance of this Contract made by and between the State of West Virginia and the Vendor. Vendor's signature on its bid signifies Vendor's agreement to be bound by and accept the terms and conditions contained in this Contract.
- 2. DEFINITIONS: As used in this Solicitation/Contract, the following terms shall have the meanings attributed to them below. Additional definitions may be found in the specifications included with this Solicitation/Contract.
- 2.1. "Agency" or "Agencies" means the agency, board, commission, or other entity of the State of West Virginia that is identified on the first page of the Solicitation or any other public entity seeking to procure goods or services under this Contract.
- 2.2. "Bid" or "Proposal" means the vendors submitted response to this solicitation.
- 2.3. "Contract" means the binding agreement that is entered into between the State and the Vendor to provide the goods or services requested in the Solicitation.
- 2.4. "Director" means the Director of the West Virginia Department of Administration, Purchasing Division.
- 2.5. "Purchasing Division" means the West Virginia Department of Administration, Purchasing Division.
- 2.6. "Award Document" means the document signed by the Agency and the Purchasing Division, and approved as to form by the Attorney General, that identifies the Vendor as the contract holder.
- 2.7. "Solicitation" means the official notice of an opportunity to supply the State with goods or services that is published by the Purchasing Division.
- 2.8. "State" means the State of West Virginia and/or any of its agencies, commissions, boards, etc. as context requires.
- 2.9. "Vendor" or "Vendors" means any entity submitting a bid in response to the Solicitation, the entity that has been selected as the lowest responsible bidder, or the entity that has been awarded the Contract as context requires.

3. CONTRACT TERM; RENEWAL; EXTENSION: The term of this Contract shall be determined in accordance with the category that has been identified as applicable to this Contract below:

Initial Contract Term: This Contract becomes effective on Award and extends for a period of One (1) year(s). Renewal Term: This Contract may be renewed upon the mutual written consent of the Agency, and the Vendor, with approval of the Purchasing Division and the Attorney General's office (Attorney General approval is as to form only). Any request for renewal should be submitted to the Purchasing Division thirty (30) days prior to the expiration date of the initial contract term or appropriate renewal term. A Contract renewal shall be in accordance with the terms and conditions of the original contract. - 20. APPLICABLE LAW: This Contract is governed by and interpreted under West Virginia law without giving effect to its choice of law principles. Any information provided in specification manuals, or any other source, verbal or written, which contradicts or violates the West Virginia Constitution, West Virginia Code or West Virginia Code of State Rules is void and of no effect.
- 21. COMPLIANCE: Vendor shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations and ordinances. By submitting a bid, Vendor acknowledges that it has reviewed, understands, and will comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and ordinances.
- 22. ARBITRATION: Any references made to arbitration contained in this Contract, Vendor's bid, or in any American Institute of Architects documents pertaining to this Contract are hereby deleted, void, and of no effect.
- 23. MODIFICATIONS: This writing is the parties' final expression of intent. The Purchasing Division Director may, in writing, authorize the use of foreign steel products if:
- c. The cost for each contract item used does not exceed one tenth of one percent (.1%) of the total contract cost or two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00), whichever is greater. For the purposes of this section, the cost is the value of the steel product as delivered to the project; or d. The Director of the Purchasing Division determines that specified steel materials are not produced in the United States in sufficient quantity or otherwise are not reasonably available to meet contract requirements.

43. PREFERENCE FOR USE OF DOMESTIC ALUMINUM, GLASS, AND STEEL: In Accordance with W. Va. Code § 5-19-1 et seq., and W. Va. The cost of domestic aluminum, glass, or steel products may be unreasonable if the cost is more than twenty percent (20%) of the bid or offered price for foreign made aluminum, glass, or steel products. If the domestic aluminum, glass or steel products to be supplied or produced in a "substantial labor surplus area", as defined by the United States Department of Labor, the cost of domestic aluminum, glass, or steel products may be unreasonable if the cost is more than thirty percent (30%) of the bid or offered price for foreign made aluminum, glass, or steel products. This preference shall be applied to an item of machinery or equipment, as indicated above, when the item is a single unit of equipment or machinery manufactured primarily of aluminum, glass or steel, is part of a public works contract and has the sole purpose or of being a permanent part of a single public works project. - 2. **DEFINITIONS:** The terms listed below shall have the meanings assigned to them below. Additional definitions can be found in section 2 of the General Terms and Conditions.

 - 2.2 "Pricing Pages" means the schedule of prices, estimated order quantity, and totals contained in wvOASIS or attached hereto as Exhibit A, and used to evaluate the Solicitation responses.
 - 2.3 "Solicitation" means the official notice of an opportunity to supply the State with goods or services that is published by the Purchasing Division.

3. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:

- 3.1 Contract Items and Mandatory Requirements: Vendor shall provide Agency with the Contract Items listed below on an open-end and continuing basis. Contract Items must meet or exceed the mandatory requirements as shown below.
 - 3.1.1 General Full Matrix Trailer Mounted Solar Powered Message Board.
 - 3.1.1.1 Unit must be as submitted by evaluation to AASHTO's National Transportation Product Evaluation Program (NTPEP).
 - 3.1.1.2 The unit specified herein and offered shall be manufactured after January 1, 2016 and must be a new unit, not previously used or sold.
 - 3.1.1.3 Vendor must certify that unit offered will meet or exceed the "OSHA", "Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970" or subsequent changes that are in effect at the time of manufacture of unit. Please see Exhibit C.

3.1.2 Sign Face

- 3.1.2.1 The sign face shall be of a sufficient size in order to display three (3) lines of eight (8) characters, each character must be minimum eighteen (18) inches tall by minimum twelve (12) inches wide. Characters must be spaced a minimum of three (3) inches apart.
- 3.1.2.2 The face of sign shall incorporate measures to prevent fading from UV light, such as a polycarbonate or lexan face with UV inhibitors incorporated.
- 3.1.2.3 Optically enhanced L.E.D.s (lighting emitting diodes)shall have a minimum of 30° vertical and 30° horizontal cone of visibility.

- 3.1.2.4 Each pixel shall consist of a minimum of three (3) LED's (Lighting Emitting Diode)
- 3.1.2.5 Message color shall be a minimum 590 nanometers.
- 3.1.2.6 The sign shall have the capability to display up to six (6) messages in sequence, with variable timing in ¼ second increments under computer control.
- 3.1.2.7 As part of the manufacturer's pre-programmed message sequences, arrow display and flashing caution functions shall be included. All arrow and flashing caution displays described in the current MUTCD shall be provided.
- 3.1.2.8 All abbreviations used in pre-programmed messages shall be in compliance with the current MUTCD.
- 3.1.2.9 The sign shall be clearly visible a minimum of 4500 feet.
- 3.1.2.10 The sign legend shall be legible from a minimum distance of 1,000 feet under daylight conditions as defined by NTPEP for two- non-traffic word messages.
- 3.1.2.11 The sign legend shall be legible from a minimum distance of 900 feet under night-time conditions as by NTPEP for a two-non-traffic word message.
- 3.1.2.12 Under variable light conditions, the unit shall automatically adjust light source so as to meet the visibility requirements, without being too bright or too dim.
- 3.1.2.13 Entire sign shall have the capability to change all lines of message copy in not more than 100 mili-seconds.
- 3.1.2.14 Each character configuration shall contain 54 L.E.D. lamp pixels in a six (6) element horizontal by nine (9) element vertical arrangement.

3.1.3 Sign Panel

3.1.3.1 Length of sign panel shall not exceed 140 inches.

- 3.1.3.2 All exposed panels and seams shall be corrosion proof for a minimum of ten (10) years. With construction, all panels/parts shall be assembled as to prevent corrosion or to prevent dissimilar metal reaction from occurring.
- 3.1.3.3 The panel shall be supported on a telescoping upright member in order to permit raising the sign panel for operation and lowering the panel for transport. The upright must be capable of 360 degrees rotation and to lock into any position to which it is manually or electrically rotated.
- 3.1.3.4 Raise and lower travel shall be minimum of four (4) feet and shall be accomplished by a hydraulic power pack.
- 3.1.3.5 The bottom of the sign shall be a minimum of seven (7) feet above ground level when in the raised position.
- 3.1.3.6 In transport position, the sign shall orient to the longitudinal axis of the trailer in a manner that effectively reduces aerodynamic drag during towing.
- 3.1.3.7 The solar panel generator array shall recharge the battery bank at a rate of 2.5 hours sun to one (1) 24 hour period of usage.
- 3.1.3.8 The sign panel frame shall be constructed of a welded assembly of aluminum alloy channel, or from steel panels powder coated in corrosion proof manner for a minimum of ten (10) years.

3.1.4 Power Source

- 3.1.4.1 The full-matrix panel shall be powered by a bank of batteries in order to convey bright, distinctive messages to the traveling public.
- 3.1.4.2 Unit shall be designed to accept two (2) power sources: one (1) being a battery bank consisting of four (4) size 4-D, deep cycle, lead acid 12 volt DC batteries wired in parallel.

- 3.1.4.3 Batteries shall be automatically recharged by a group of solar panels producing a minimum 165 watts of power, located at the highest point on the unit.
- 3.1.4.4 Unit shall be designed with sufficient energy backup to operate for a period of 30 days without any sun.
- 3.1.4.5 Unit shall provide a built-in battery charger with a minimum 25 ampere per hour rating.
- 3.1.4.6 Battery bank shall be housed in lockable heavy duty weatherproof battery boxes.
- 3.1.4.7 Shall have a second power supply enables the unit to accept existing 120 volt commercial electric service.
- 3.1.4.8 Batteries shall be capable of being recharged by a commercial 110 volt battery.

3.1.5 Computer

- 3.1.5.1 The unit shall be controlled in all functions by an on-board dedicated computer of solid state design and be removable.
- 3.1.5.2 Unit shall include a keyboard or graphic touch screen controller through which user originated messages may be entered for display or storage.
- 3.1.5.3 Computer shall store a minimum of 250 programmed messages for display when called upon by user through the keyboard.
- 3.1.5.4 Unit shall include an LCD display screen upon which messages can be reviewed before display on sign board.
- 3.1.5.5 Password coding or key entry is required for control programming to present sequences messages under operator control through keyboard entry; provide control for moving arrow displays.

3.1.6 Solar Panel Control Unit

- 3.1.6.1 The power control unit and computer shall be housed in a weather resistant, shock resistant lockable control box which includes lighting for night-time operation.
- 3.1.6.2 Power control unit shall contain two (2) current meters; one (1) to show amperage generated with the battery charge operating, and one (1) to indicate amperage generated from the solar panels to be stored in the battery bank.
- 3.1.6.3 Message Cabinet dimensions shall be:
 A. Length: Maximum 140 inches.

B. Height: Maximum 79 1/2 inches.

- 3.1.6.4 The power control unit shall incorporate a PV regulator with thermal compensation for variances in ambient temperature to regulate the charge rate to battery bank.
- 3.1.6.5 The unit shall incorporate an automatic intensity control feature in order to keep L.E.D. lamp matrix intensity constant with a reduction in voltage.
- 3.1.6.6 The message unit shall provide a photocell in order to reduce the lamp intensity at night eliminating blinding.

3.1.7 Central Processing Unit

- 3.1.7.1 Microprocessor Based 27.1 MHz.
- 3.1.7.2 Power requirements: 175 mA DC at 12 volts DC.
- 3.1.7.3 Screen size: Minimum of three (3) lines, with Eight (8) characters per line.
- 3.1.7.4 Interfaces: (2) RS232 9 pin D connectors and documentation on port numbers and pins. In addition, one USB port or one Ethernet Port with USB adaptor shall be provided.
- 3.1.7.5 Code: Application source code shall be delivered with unit.
- 3.1.7.6 Documentation: Technical documentation and application programs shall be delivered with unit.

3.1.8 Communication

- 3.1.8.1 Unit shall be guarded from any unwanted outside RF interference which would include but not be limited to VHF/FM receiver, 2 way radio receiver, cell phones, etc.
- 3.1.8.2 Each PVMS shall be controlled and monitored by its own sign controller directly from the control console inside the control cabinet on the trailer itself.

- 3.1.8.6 Local Communications control via a keypad and LCD interface: Features shall include addition or removal of message or message(s) from the PVMS list of playing messages, adjustment of luminosity to manual or automatic, and monitor miscellaneous data like battery voltage, photocells reading, etc.

3.1.9 Trailer

- 3.1.9.1 Two (2) wheel trailer shall be structurally adequate to serve both platform for components.
- 3.1.9.2 Unit shall include LED tail lights, stop lights, turn signals, license mount with light, and all necessary reflectors.

- 3.1.9.3 A two (2) inch ball type trailer hitch 6,000 pound capacity with double safety chains in accordance with SAE J684F shall be installed.
- 3.1.9.4 Trailer shall be 12 volt DC motor, pump, valve, reservoir, manual hand pump.
- 3.1.9.5 All trailer wiring shall be encased in heavy duty hypalon type industrial wire looms clamped to underside of the trailer structural tubing.
- 3.1.9.6 Shall have a hydraulic brake actuator system and fenders one (1) each wheel, included on trailer.
- 3.1.9.7 Shall have Leveling Jacks: Four (4) crank type, heavy duty, industrial leveling jacks; one (1) at each corner of the trailer deck to be installed.
- 3.1.9.8 Shall have installation of trailer electrical cable and connector (7 Pole) compatible with towing vehicles.

3.1.10 Paint

3.1.10.1 Must be manufacturer standard color paint for this unit.

3.1.11 Advertising

3.1.11.1 Shall have only one (1) manufacturer name plate, which must include model number, may appear on exterior of unit. Logos, created through the stamping or casting process of manufacturer are also acceptable. No logo will interfere with the Department's striping and logo.

3.1.12 Miscellaneous:

A. Unspecified Accessories & Features: All parts, equipment, accessories, material, design and performance characteristics not specified herein, but which are necessary to provide a complete unit, must be furnished with each unit and required to conform to

5. ORDERING AND PAYMENT:

7.3 Operating and Service Manuals and Parts Lists: An operator's manual must be included with each unit upon delivery. A "line sheet" (if applicable) and the

"Equipment Preventative Maintenance Questionnaire", (Exhibit "B") must be with pilot unit upon delivery, Attn: Marcia Lee. There must be 12 service/shop/maintenance manuals and 14 parts manuals; CD-ROM is preferred in lieu of parts manuals. Manuals shall be delivered upon completion of delivery of total units. Failure to do so will delay payment.

7.4 Training: Manufacturers and/or dealers will be required to stage a thorough seminar on the subjects of Preventative Maintenance, Operator, and Mechanic Training. Public Law 91-596 84 STAT. 1590 91st Congress, S.2193 December 29, 1970, as amended through January 1, 2004, (1)

An Act

To assure safe and healthful working conditions for working men and women; by authorizing enforcement of the standards developed under the Act; by assisting and encouveging the States in their efforts to assure safe and leadful working conditions; by providing for research, information, education, and training in the field of occupational safety and health; and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That this Act may be citied as the "Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970."

Footprote (1) See Historical notes at the and of this document for changes and amendments affecting the OSH Act since its passage in 1970 through January 1, 2004.

SEC. 2. Congressional Findings and Purpose

(a) The Congress finds that personal injuries and illnesses arising out of work situations impose a substantial burden upon, and are a hindrance to, intensists commerce in terms of lost production, wage loss, medical expenses, and disability compensation payments.

- (b) The Congress declares it to be its purpose and policy, through the exercise of its powers to regulate commerce among the several States and with foreign reations and to provide for the general walfare, to assure so fer as possible every working man and woman in the Nation safe and healthful working conditions and to preserve our human resources –
 - (1) by encouraging employers and employees in their efforts to reduce the number of occupational sofiety and health hazards at their places of employment, and to standate employers and employees to institute new and to perfect existing programs for providing safe and healthful working conditions; (2) by providing that employers and employees have separate but dependent responsibilities and rights with respect to achieving safe and healthful working conditions.
 - (3) by authorizing the Secretary of Labor to set mendatory occupational safety and health standards applicable to businesses affecting interstate commerce, and by creating an Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission for parying out adjusticatory functions under the Act;
- (4) by building upon advances already made through employer and employee initiative for providing safe and healthful working conditions;
- (5) by providing for research in the field of occupational safety and health, including the psychological factors involved, and by developing innovative methods, techniques, and approaches for dealing with occupational safety and health problems;
- (6) by exploring ways to discover brent diseases, establishing causal connections between diseases and work in sawfrommental conditions, and conducting other research solding to health problems, in recognition of the fact that occupational health standards present problems often different from those involved in occupational safety;
- (7) by providing medical criteria which will assure insofar as practicable that to employee will suffer diminished health, functional capacity, or life expectancy as a result of his
- (8) by providing for training programs to increase the number and computance of parsonnel engaged in the field of occupational safety and health; effecting the OSH Act since its passage in 1970 through January 1, 2004.
- (9) by providing for the development and promulgation of occupational safety and health
- (10) by providing an effective enforcement program which shall include a prohibition against giving advance notice of any inspection and sendrous for any individual violating this prohibition;
- (11) by encouraging the States to assume the fullest responsibility for the administration and enforcement of their occupational safety and health laws by providing grants to the

States to assist in identifying their needs and responsibilities in the area of occupational safety and health, to develop plans in accordance with the provisions of this Act, to seety and reach to conduct experimental and demonstration projects in connection therewith:

- (12) by providing for appropriate reporting procedures with respect to occupational safety and health which procedures will help achieve the objectives of this Act and accurately describe the nature of the occupational safety and health problem;
- (13) by encouraging joint labor-management efforts to reduce injuries and disease arising out of employment.

SEC. 3. Definitions

- (1) The term "Secretary" means the Secretary of Labor.
- (2) The term "Commission" means the Occupational Safety and Health Review ommission established under this Act.
- (3) The term "commerce" means trade, traffic, commerce, transportation, or communication among the several States, or between a State and any place outside thereof, or within the District of Columbia, or a possession of the United States (other than the Transfer of the Desile Transfer of the Desil than the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands), or between points in the same State but through a point outside thereof.
- (4) The term "person" means one or more individuals, partnerships, associations, corporations, business trusts, legal representatives, or any organized group of persons.
- (5) The term "employer" means a person engaged in a business affecting commerce who has employees, but does not include the United States (not including the United States Postal Service) or any State or political subdivision of a State.
- (6) The term "employee" means an amployee of an employer who is employed in a business of his employer which affects commerce.
- (7) The term "State" includes a State of the United States, the District of Columbia Averto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samos, Guarn, and the Trust Tembory of the
- (8) The term "occupational safety and health standard" means a standard which requires conditions, or the adoption or use of one or more practices, means, methods, operations, or processes, reasonably necessary or appropriate to provide safe or healthful employment and places of employment.
- (9) The term "national consensus standard" means any occupational safety and health standard or modification thereof which (1), has been adopted and promulgated by a rationally recognized standards-producing organization under procedures whereby it can be determined by the Secretary that persons interested and effected by the scope or provisions of the standard have reached substantial agreement on its adoption, (2) was secondated in a manuser which efforted an importunity for disease views to be considered. formulated in a manner which afforded an opportunity for diverse views to be considered and (3) has been designated as such a standard by the Secretary, after consultation with other appropriate Federal agencies.
- (10) The term "established Federal standard" means any operative occupational safety and health standard established by any agency of the United States and presently on effect, or contained in any Act of Congress in force on the date of enactment of this Act.
- (11) The term "Committee" means the National Advisory Committee on Occupational Safety and Health established under this Act.
- (12) The term "Director" mains the Director of the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health.
- (13) The term "Institute" means the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health established under this Act.
- (14) The term "Workmen's Compensation Commission" meens the National Commission on State Workmen's Compensation Laws established under this Act.

SEC. 4. Applicability of This Act

(a) This Act shall apply with respect to employment performed in a workpiece in a State, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Guarn, the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, Wake Island, Outer Continental Sheff Lands defined in the Outer Continental Sheff Lands Act, Johnston Island, and the Canal Zona. The Secretary of the Interior shall, by regulation, provide for judicial enforcement of this Act by the courts established for greats in which there are no United States district courts having

(b) (1) Nothing in this Act shall apply to working conditions of employees with respect to which other Federal agencies, and State agencies acting under sestion 274 of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended (42 U.S.C. 2021), exercise statutory authority to prescribe or enforce standards or regulations affecting occupational safety or health.

- (2) The safety and health standards promulgated under the Act of June 30, 1936, commonly known as the Waish-Healey Act (41 U.S.C. 35 at seq.), the Service Contract Act of 1985 (41 U.S.C. 351 at seq.), Public Law 91-54, Act of August 9, 1989 (40 U.S.C. 333), Public Law 85-742, Act of August 23, 1958 (33 U.S.C. 941), and the National Foundation on Arts and Humanities Act (20 U.S.C. 951 et seq.) are supersected on the effective date of corresponding standards, promulgated under this Act, which are determined by the Secretary to be one effective. - (2) shall comply with occupational safety and health standards promulgated under this Act.
- (b) Each employee shall comply with occupational safety and health standards and all rules, regulations, and orders issued pursuant to this Act which are applicable to his own actions.

6. Occupational Safety and Health Standards

- (a) Without regard to chapter 5 of title 5, United States Code, or to the other subsections of this section, the Secretary shall, as mon as practicable during the period beginning with the effective date of titls Act and ending two years after such date, by rule promulgate as an occupational safety or health standard any national constrains standard, and any established federal standard, unless he determines that the promulgation of such a standard would not result in improved safety or health for specifically designated amployees. In the event of conflict among any such standards, the Secretary shall promulgate the standard which assures the greatest protection of the safety or health of the affected employees.
- (b) The Secretary may by rule promulgate, modify, or revoke any occupational safety or health standard in the following manner:
- (1) Whenever the Secretary, upon the basis of Information submitted to him in writing by an interested person, a representative of any organization of employers or employees, a nationally recognized standards-producing organization, the Secretary of Health and Human Services, the Restonal Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, or a State or political subdivision, or on the basis of information developed by the Secretary or otherwise available to him, determines that a rule should be promulgated in order to sarve the objectives of this Act, the Secretary may request the recommendations of an advisory committee appointed under section 7 of this Act. The Secretary stall provide such an advisory committee with any proposals of his own or of the Secretary of Health and Human Services, together with all perdisert factual information developed by the Secretary or the Secretary of Health and Human Services, or otherwise available, including the results of research, demonstrations, and experiments. An advisory committee shall submit to the Secretary is recommendations regarding the rule to be promulgated within ninety days from the date of its appointment or within such longer or shorter period as may be prescribed by the Secretary, but in no event for a period which is longer than two hundred and severity days.
- (2) The Secretary shall publish a proposed rule promulgating, modifying, or revoking an occupational safety or health standard in the Faderal Register and shall afford interested persons a period of thirty days after publication to submit written data or comments. Where an advisory committee is appointed and the Secretary determines that a rule should be issued, he shall publish the proposed rule within story days after the submission of the advisory committee's recommendations or the expiration of the period prescribed by the Secretary for such submission.
- (3) On or before the last day of the period provided for the submission of written date or comments under paragraph (2), any interested person may file with the Secretary written objections to the proposed rule, stating the grounds therefor and requesting a public hearing on such objections. Within thirty days after the fast day for fring such objections, the Sacretary shall publish in the Federal Register a notice specifying the occupational safety or health standard to which objections have been filled and a hearing requested, and specifying a time and place for such hearing.
- (4) Within sixty days after the expiration of the period provided for the submission of

written data or comments under paragraph (2), or within aboy days after the completion of any hearing hald under paragraph (3), the Secretary shall issue a rule promulgating, modifying, or revoking an occupational safety or health standard or make a determination that a rule should not be issued. Such a rule may contain a provision delaying its effective date for such period (not in excess of ninety days) as the Secretary determines may be necessary to insure that affected employers and employees will be informed of the existence of the standard and of its terms and that amolouses affected are given any existence of the standard and of its terms and that employers affected are given an opportunity to familiarize themselves and their employers with the existence of the requirements of the standard.

(5) The Secretary, in promulgating standards dealing with tode materials or hamful physical agents under this subsection, shall set the standard which most adequately assures, to the extent feasible, on the basis of the best available evidence, that no hasires, to the extent feasible, on the basis of the best available evidence, that no employee will suffer material impairment of health or functional capacity even if such amployee has regular exposure to the hazard dealt with by such standard for the period of his working life. Development of standards under this subsection shall be based upon research, demonstrations, experiments, and such other information at may be appropriate. In addition to the attainment of the highest degree of health and safety protection for the engloyee, other considerations shall be the latest available scientific data in the field, the feasibility of the standards, and experience gained under this and other health and safety laws. Whenever practicable, the standard promulgated shall be expressed in terms of objective criteria and of the performance dealted.

(6) (A) Any employer may apply to the Sacretary for a temporary order granting a variance from a standard or any provision thereof promulgated under this section. Such temporary order shall be granted only if the employer files an application which meets the requirements of clause (B) and establishes

- (i) he is unable to comply with a standard by its effective date because of unavailability of professional or technical personnel or of meterials and equipment needed to come into compliance with the standard or because necessary construction or attention of facilities cannot be completed by the effective date.
- (#) he is taking all available steps to safeguard his employees against the hazards covered by the standard, and
- (III) he has an effective program for coming into compliance with the standard as quickly as practicable.

Any temporary order issued under this paragraph shall prescribe the practices, means, methods, operations, and processes which the employer must adopt and use while the order is in effect and state in detail his program for conting into compliance with the standard. Such a temporary order may be granted only after notice to angitives and an opportunity for a hearing. Provided, That the Secretary may lissue one startim order to be effective until a decision is made on the basis of the hearing. No temporary order may be in effect for longer than the period needed by the employer to acrieve compliance with the standard or one year, whichever is shorter, except that such an order may be removed not more that twice (1) so long as the requirements of this paragraph are met and (11) if an application for renewal is filed at least 90 days prior to the expiration date of the order. No interim renewal of an order may remain in effect for longer than 180 days. Any temporary order issued under this paragraph shall prescribe the practices, means,

- (8) An application for temporary order under this paragraph (6) shall contain:
- (i) a specification of the standard or portion thereof from which the employer seeks a
- (ii) a representation by the employer, supported by representations from qualified persons having firsthand knowledge of the facts represented, that he is unable to comply with the standard or portion thereof and a detailed statement of the reasons therefor,
- (III) a statement of the steps he has taken and will take (with specific detes) to protect employees against the hazard covered by the standard,
- (iv) a statement of when he expects to be able to comply with the standard and what steps he has taken and what steps he will take (with dates specified) to come into compliance with the standard, and
- (v) a certification that he has informed his employees of the application by giving a copy thereof to their authorized representative, posting a statement giving a summery of the application and specifying where a copy may be examined at the piece or places where notices to employees are normally posted, and by other appropriate means.

- (C) The Secretary is authorized to grant a variance from any standard or portion thereof whenever he determines, or the Secretary of Health and Human Services certifies, that such variance is necessary to permit an employer to participate in an experiment approved by him or the Secretary of Health and Human Services designed to demonstrate or validate new and improved bechniques to safeguand the health or safety
- (7) Any standard promulgeted under this subsection shall prescribe the use of labels or other appropriate forms of warning as are necessary to insure that employees are apprised of all hazards to which they are exposed, relevant symptoms and appropriate emergency

treatment, and proper conditions and precautions of safe use or exposure. Where appropriate, such standard shall also preacible solitable protective equipment and control or technological procedures to be used in connection with such hazards and shall provide for mentioring or measuring employee exposure at such locations and intervals, and in such manner as may be necessary for the profescion of employees. In addition, where appropriate, any such standard shall be made available, by the employer or at his cost, to employees exposed to such hazards in order to most effectively determine whether the health of such employees is adversely affected by such exposure. In the event such medical examinations are in the nature of research, as determined by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, such examinations may be furnished at the exposure of the Secretary of Health and Human Services. The results of such examinations or tests shall be furnished only to the Secretary of the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and, at the request of the employee, to his physician. The Secretary, in consultation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, may by rate promulgated pursuant to section 553 of title 5, limited States Code, make appropriate modifications in the foregoing requirements relating to the use of labels or other forms of warming, maniforms or measuring, and medical examinations, as may be warranted by experience, information, or medical or technological developments accurred subsequent to the propartients of the relevant standard.

- (8) Whenever e rule promylgated by the Secretary differs substantially from an existing national consensus standard, the Secretary shall, at the same time, publish in the Federal Register a statement of the reasons why the rule as adopted will better effectuate the purposes of this Act than the national consensus standard.
- (c) (1) The Secretary shall provide, without regard to the requirements of chapter 5, title 5, Unites States Code, for an emergeincy temporary standard to take immediate effect upon publication in the Federal Register if he determines
 - (A) that employees are exposed to grave danger from exposure to substances or agents determined to be toxic or physically harmful or from new hazards, and
 - (B) that such entergency standard is measurery to protect employees from such danger.
- (2) Such standard shall be effective until superseded by a standard promulgated in accordance with the procedures prescribed in paragraph (3) of this subsection.
- (3) Upon publication of such standard in the Federal Register the Secretary shall commence a proceeding in accordance with section 6 (b) of this Act, and the standard as published shall also serve as a proposed rule for the proceeding. The Secretary shall promutgate a standard under this paragraph no later than six months after publication of the amergency standard as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection.
- (d) Any affected employer may apply to the Sacretary for a rule or order for a variance from a standard promalgated under this section. Affected employees shall be given notice of each such application and an opportunity to participate in a hearing. The Secretary shall leave such rule or order if he determines on the record, after opportunity for an inspection where appropriate and a hearing, that the proponent of the variance has demonstrated by a preponderance of the evidence that the conditions, practices, means, methods, operations, or processes used or proposed to be used by an employer will provide employment and places of employment to his employees which are as safe end healthful as those which would prevail if he complied with the standard. The rule or order so leaved shall prescribe the conditions the employer must maintain, and the practices, means, methods, operations, and processes which he must adopt and utilize to the extent they differ from the standard in question. Such a rule or order may be medified or revoked upon application by an employar, employees, or by the Secretary on his own raction, in the manner prescribed for its lesuance under this subsection at any time after six months from the sessance.
- (e) Whenever the Secretary promulgates any standard, makes any rule, order, or decision, grants any exemption or extension of time, or compromises, mitigates, or settles any penalty assessed under this Act, he shall include a statement of the reasons for such action, which shall be published in the Federal Register.
- (f) Any person who may be adversely affected by a standard issued under this section may at any time prior to the stidicth day after such standard is promulgated file a petition challenging the validity of auch standard with the United States court of appeals for the circuit whitein such person resides or tes his principal place of business, for a judicial review of such standard. A copy of the petition shall be forthwith banamitted by the clerk of the court to the Secretary. The filing of such petition shall not, unless otherwise ordered by the court, operate as a stay of the standard. The determinations of the Secretary shall be conclusive if supported by substantial evidence in the record considered as a whole.
- (g) In determining the priority for establishing standards under this section, the Secretary shall give due regard to the impancy of the need for mandatory safety and health standards for particular industries, trades, craits, occupations, instancesses, workplaces or work satvironments. The Secretary shall also give due regard to the recommendations of the Secretary of Health and Human Services regarding the need for mandatory standards in determining the priority for establishing such standards.

SEC. 7. Advisory Committees; Administration

29 USC 656

(a) (1) There is hereby established a National Advisory Committee on Occupational Safety and Health consisting of twelve members appointed by the Secretary, four of whom are to be designated by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, without regard to the provisions of title 5, United States Code, governing appointments in the competitive service, and composed of representatives of management, labor, occupational safety and occupational health professions, and of the public. The Secretary shall designate one of the public members as Chairman. The members shall be selected upon the basis of their experience and competence in the field of occupational safety and health.

- (2) The Committee shall advise, consult with, and make recommendations to the Secretary and the Secretary of Heath and Human Services on matters relating to the administration of the Act. The Committee shall haid no fewer than two meetings during each calendar year. All meetings of the Committee shall be open to the public and a transcript shall be kept and made available for public inspection.
- (3) The members of the Committee shall be compensated in accordance with the provisions of section 3109 of title 5, United States Code.
- (4) The Secretary shall furnish to the Committee an executive secretary and such secretarial, clerical, and other services as are deemed necessary to the conduct of its business.
- (b) An edvisory committee may be appointed by the Secretary to assist him in his standard setting functions under section 6 of this Act. Each such committee shall consist of not more than fifteen members and shall include as a member one or more designees of the Secretary of Heath and Human Services, and shall include among its members an equal number of persons qualified by experience and affiliation to present the viewpoint of the employers involved, and of persons smilerly qualified to present the viewpoint of the workers involved, as well as one or more representatives of heath and safety agencies of the States. An advisory committee may also include such other persons as the Secretary may appoint who are qualified by knowledge and experience to make a useful contribution to the work of such an professionals specializing in occupational setty or health, and one or more representatives of professional translutations of technicians of professionals appointed to any such advisory committee shall not exceed the number of persons so appointed to any such advisory committee shall not exceed the number appointed to such committee as representatives of Federal and State agencies. - (1) use, with the consent of any Federal agency, the sandces, facilities, and personnel of such agency, with or without reimbursement, and with the consent of any State or policial subdivision thereat, accept and use the services, facilities, and personnel of any agency of such State or subdivision with reimbursement; and
- (2) employ experts and consultants or organizations thereof as authorized by section 3109 of title 5, United States Code, except that contracts for such employment may be renewed annually; compensate incliniquels so employed at rates not in excess of the rate specified at the time of service for grade GS-18 under section 5332 of title 5, United States Code, Including travel time, and allow them while away from their homes or regular places of business, travel expenses (including per digm in fleu of substatence) as authorized by section 5703 of title 5, United States Code, for persons in the Government service employed intermittently, while so employed.

SEC. S. Inspections, Investigations, and Recordingping

(a) In order to carry out the purposes of this Act, the Secretary, upon presenting appropriate credenius to the owner, operator, or agent in charge, is authorized—

- to enter without delay and at reasonable times any factory, plant, establishment, construction site, or other area, workplace or environment where work is performed by an amployee of an employer; and
- (2) to inspect and investigate during regular working hours and at other reasonable times, and within reasonable limits and in a reasonable manner, any such place of employment and all perthent conditions, structures, machines, apparatus, devices, equipment, and materials therein, and to question privately any such employer, owner, operator, agent or employee.
- (b) In making his inspections and investigations under this Act the Secretary may require the attendance and testimony of witnesses and the production of evidence under cath. Witnesses shall be paid the same fees and misage that are paid witnesses in the courts of the United States. In case of a contamacy, failure, or refusal of any person to obey such an order, any district court of the United States or the United States courts of any territory of possession, within the jurisdiction of which such person is found; or resides or trensacts business, upon the application by the Secretary, shall have jurisdiction to issue to such person an order requiring such person to appear to produce subdirice if, as, and when so ordered, and to give testimony relating to the matter under investigation or in question, and any failure to obey such order of the court may be

punished by said court as a contempt thereof.

- (c) (1) Each employer shall make, keep and preserve, and make evailable to the Secretary of the Secretary of Health and Human Services, such records regarding his activities relating to this Act as the Secretary, in cooperation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, may prescribe by regulation as necessary or appropriate for the enforcement of this Act or for developing information regarding the causes and prevention of occupational accidents and lineases. In order to carry out the provisions of this paragraph such regulations may include provisions requiring employers to conduct periodic inspections. The Secretary shall also easie regulations requiring that employers, through posting of notices or other appropriate means, leep their employees informed of their protections and obligations under this Act, including the provisions of applicable standards.
- (2) The Secretary, in cooperation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, shall prescribe regulations requiring employers to maintain accurate records of, and to make periodic reports on, work-related deaths, injuries and filesses other than minor injuries requiring only first aid treatment and which do not involve medical treatment, loss of consciousness, restriction of work or motion, or transfer to another job.
- (3) The Secretary, in cooperation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, shall issue regulations requiring employers to statistical accurate records of employee exposures to potentially tooks materials or harmful physical agents which are required to be monitored or measured under section 6. Such regulations shall provide employees or their representatives with an opportunity to observe such monitoring or measuring, and to have access to the records filtered. Such regulations shall also make appropriate provision for each employee or former employee to have access to such records as will indicate his own exposure to took materials or harmful physical agents in concentrations or at the being exposed to took materials or harmful physical agents in concentrations or at these which exceed those prescribed by an applicable occupational safety and health standard promulgated under section 6, and shall inform any employee who is being thus exposed of the corrective action being between
- (d) Any information obtained by the Secretary, the Secretary of Health and Human Services, or a State agency under this Act shall be obtained with a minimum burden upon employers, especially those operating small businesses. Unnecessary duplication of efforts in obtaining information shall be reduced to the maximum extent feasible.
- (e) Subject to regulations issued by the Secretary, a representative of the employer and a representative authorized by his employees shall be given an opportunity to accompany the Secretary or his authorized representative during the physical inspection of any workplace under subsection (a) for the purpose of alting such inspection. Where there is no authorized employee representative, the Secretary or his authorized representative shall consult with a reasonable number of employees concerning matters of health and safety in the workplace.
- (f) (1) Any employees or representative of employees who believe that a violation of a safety or health standard coats that threatens physical herm, or that an imminent danger exists, may request an inspection by giving notice to the Secretary or his authorized representative of such violation or danger. Any such notice shall be reduced to writing, shall set forth with reasonable particularity the grounds for the notice, and shall be signed by the employees or representative of employees, and a copy shall be provided the employer or his agent no later than at the time of inspection, except that, upon the request of the parsing plying such notice, his time and the names of individual employees reterred to therein shall not appear in such copy or on any record published, released, or made available pursuant to subsection (g) of this section. If upon receipt of such notification the Secretary determines there are reasonable grounds to believe that such violation or danger exists, he shall make a special inspection in accordance with the provisions of this section as soon as practicable, to determine if such violation or danger exists. If the Secretary determination has a practicable, to determine there are no reasonable grounds to believe that a violation or danger exists. If the Secretary determination has been an or representative of the employees in writing of such determination.
- (2) Prior to or during any inspection of a workplace, any employees or representative of employees employed in such workplace may notify the Secretary or any representative of the Secretary responsible for conducting the inspection, in writing, of any violation of this Act which they have reason to believe exists in such workplace. The Secretary shall, by requisition, establish procedures for informal review of any refunal by a regulation of the Secretary to issue a citation with respect to any such alleged violation and shall furnish the employees or representative of employees requesting such review a written statement of the reasons for the Secretary's final disposition of the case.
- (g) (1) The Secretary and Secretary of Health and Human Services are authorized to compile, analyze, and publish, either in summary or detailed form, all reports or information obtained under this section.
- (2) The Secretary and the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall each prescribe such rules and regulations as he may deem necessary to carry out their responsibilities under this Act, including rules and regulations dealing with the inspection of an employer's establishment.
- (h) The Secretary shell not use the results of enforcement activities, such as the number of citations issued or penalties assessed, to evaluate employees directly involved in enforcement activities under this Act or to impose quotes or goals with regard to the results of such activities.

SEC. 19. Procedures to Counteract Imminent Dangers

(a) The United States district courts shall have jurisdiction, upon petition of the Secretary, to nearth any conditions or practices in any place of employment which are such that a danger exists which could reasonably be expected to cause death or serious physical harm immediately or before the imminence of such danger can be eliminated through the antioroment procedures otherwise provided by this Acc. Any order issued under this section may require such steps to be taken as may be necessary to avoid, correct, or remove such imminent danger and prohibit the amplicament or transcence of any including in instance or may require such steps to be taken as may be nacessary to award, correct, or remove sount imminent danger and prohibit the employment or presence of any individual in locations or under conditions where such imminent danger exists, except individuals whose presence is necessary to avoid, correct, or remove such imminent danger or to maintain the capacity of a continuous process, operation to resume normal operations without a complete cessation of maintains are unlikely at a presentation of maintains in management, to parent such to he operations, or where a cessation of operations is recessary, to permit such to be accomplished in a safe and orderly manner.

(b) Upon the filing of any such petition the district court shall have jurisdiction to grant such injunctive relief or temporary restraining order pending the outcome of an enforcement proceeding pursuant to this Act. The proceeding shall be as provided by Rule 65 of the Federal Rules, CMI Procedure, except that no temporary restraining order issued without notice shall be effective for a period longer than five days.

(c) Whenever and as soon as an inspector concludes that conditions or practices described in subsection (a) exist in any place of employment, he shell inform the affected employees and employers of the idenger and that he is recommending to the Secretary that relief be sought.

(d) If the Secretary arbitrarily or capticiously falls to seek relief under this section, a (Q) If the secretary answarm, or capticousty raiss to seek renet under this section, any employee who may be injured by reason of such failure, or the representative of such employees, might tring any action against the Secretary in the United States district court for the district in which the financiant danger is alleged to exist or the employer has its principal office, or for the District of Columbia, for a writ of mandamus to compel the Secretary to seek such an order and for such further relief as may be appropriate.

SEC. 14. Representation in Civil Litigation

Except as provided in section 518(s) of title 28, United States Code, relating to litigation before the Supreme Court, the Solicitor of Labor may appear for and represent the Secretary to any civil litigation brought under this Act but all such litigation shall be subject to the direction and control of the Attorney General.

SEC. 15. Confidentiality of Trade Secrets

All information reported to or otherwise obtained by the Secretary or his representative in connection with any inspection or proceeding under this Act which contains or which might reveal a trace secret referred to in section 1905 of this 18 of the United States Code shall be considered confidential for the purpose of that section, except that such information may be disclosed to other officers or employees concerned with carrying out this Act or when relevant in any proceeding under this Act. In any such proceeding the Secretary, the Commission, or the court shall lesse such orders as may be appropriate to protect the

confidentiality of trade secrets.

16. Variations, Tolerances, and Exemptions

The Secretary, on the record, after notice and opportunity for a hearing may provide such reasonable limitations and may make such rules and regulations allowing reasonable variations, tolerances, and examptions to and from any or all provisions of this Act as he may find necessary and proper to avoid serious impairment of the national defense. (a) Any employer who willfully or repeatedly violates the regulariments of section 5 of this Act, or Act, any standard, rule, or order promulgated pursuant to section 6 of this Act, or regulations prescribed pursuant to this Act, may be assessed a civil penalty of not more than \$70,000 for each violation, but not less than \$5,000 for each willful violation.

(d) Any employer who falls to correct a violation for which a citation has been issued under section 9(a) within the period permitted for its correction (which period shall not begin to nan until the case of any review proceeding under section 10 intotact by the employer in good faith and not solely for delay or avoidance of paraltees), may be assessed a certification of not more than \$7,000 for each day during which such failure or subhatter combines. which such failure or violation continues.

(e) Any employer who willfully violates any standard, rute, or order promulgated pursuent to Pub. - (a) Nothing in this Act shall prevent any State agency or court from asserting jurisdiction under State hav over any occupational safety or health issue with respect to which no standard is in affect under section 6.
- (b) Any State which, at any time, desires to assume responsibility for development and enforcement therein of occupational safety and health standards relating to any occupational safety or health issue with respect to which a Federal standard has been promulgated under section 6 shell submit a State plan for the development of such standards and their
- (c) The Secretary shall approve the plan submitted by a State under subsection (b), or any modification thereof, if such plan in his judgement \sim
 - (1) designates a State agency or agencies as the agency or agencies responsible for administrance the plan throughout the State,
 - (2) provides for the development and enforcement of safety and health standards relating to one or more safety or health issues, which standards (and the enforcement of which standards) are or will be at least as effective in providing safe and healthful employment and places of employment as the standards promulgated under section 6 which rate to the same saute, and which standards, when applicable to products which are distributed or used in interstate commerce, are required by competting local conditions and do not unduly burden interstate commerce.
- (3) provides for a right of entry and inspection of all workplaces subject to the Act which is at least as effective as that provided in section 8, and includes a prohibition on advance notice of inspections.
- (4) contains satisfactory assurances that such agency or agencies have or will have the legal authority and qualified personnel necessary for the enforcement of such standards,
- (5) gives satisfactory assurances that such State will devote adequate funds to the administration and enforcement of such standards,
- (6) contains satisfactory assurances that such State will, to the extent permitted by its law, establish and maintain an effective and comprehensive occupational safety and health program applicable to all employees of public agencies of the State and its political subdivisions, which program is an effective as the standards contained in an arrangement plan.
- (7) requires employers in the State to make reports to the Secretary in the same manner and to the same extent as if the plan were not in effect, and
- (8) provides that the State agency will make such reports to the Secretary in such form and containing such information, as the Secretary shall from time to time require.
- (d) If the Secretary rejects a plan automitted under subsection (b), he shall afford the State submitting the plan due notice and opportunity for a hearing before so doing.
- (e) After the Secretary approves a State plan submitted under subsection (b), he may, but shall not be required to, exarche his authority under sections 8, 9, 10, 13, and 17 with respect to comparable standards promulgated under sections 6, for the period specified in the next sentence. The Secretary may exercise the authority referred to above until he determines, on the basis of actual operations under the State plan, that the criterial set forth in subsection (c) are being applied, but he shall not make such determination for at least three years after the plan's approval under subsection (c). Upon making the determination referred to in the preceding sentence, the provisions of sections 5(a)(2), 8 (except for the purpose of carrying out subsection (f) of this section), 9, 10, 13, and 17, and standards promulgated under section 6 of this Act, shall not apply with respect to any occupational select or health issues covered under the plan, but the Secretary may retain jurisciction under the above provisions in any proceeding commenced under section 9 or 10 before the clate of determination.
- (f) The Secretary shall, on the basis of reports submitted by the State agency and his own inspections make a continuing evaluation of the manner in which each State having a plan approved under this section is carrying out such plan. Whenever the Secretary finds, after affording due notice and opportunity for a hearing, that in the administration of the State plan for any provision of the State plan (or any assurance contained therain), he shall notify the State agency of his withdrawal of approval of such plan and upon receipt of such notice such plan shall cease to its an effect, but the State agency of the state agency of the plan in order to enforce standards under the plan whenever the issues myoked do not relate to the reasons for the withdrawal of the plan.
- (g) The State may obtain a review of a decision of the Secretary withdrawing approval of or rejecting its plan by the United States court of appeals for the circuit in which the State is located by filing in such count within thirty days following receipt of notice of such decision a petition to modify or set aside in whole or in part the action of the Secretary. A copy of such petition shall forthwith be served upon the Secretary, and thereupon the Secretary shall

Unless the court finds that the secretary's decision in rejecting a proposed State plan or withdrawing his approved of such a plan is not supported by substantial evidence the court shall affirm the Secretary's decision. SEC, 19. Federal Agency Safety Programs and Responsibilities

- (b) The Secretary shall report to the President a summary or digest of reports submitted to Pub. L. 97-375 him under subsection (a)(5) of this section, together with his evaluations of and recommendations derived from such reports.

- (2) The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall from time to time consult with the Secretary in order to develop specific plans for such research, demonstrations, and experiments as are necessary to produce criteria, including criteria identifying timic substances, enabling the Secretary to meet his responsibility for the formulation of selectly and health standards under this Act; and the Secretary of Health and Human Services, on the basis of such research, demonstrations, and experiments and any other information available to him, shall develop and publish at laust annually such extent as usil effectuable the numbers of this Act. criteria as will effectuate the purposes of this Act.
- (3) The Secretary of Health and Human Services, on the basis of such research (3) The Secretary or Hearin-and Human Services, on the basis of such research, demonstrations, and experiments, and any other information available to him, shall develop eitheria dealing with toxic materials and harmful physical agients and substances which will describe apposure levels that are eafe for various particular amployment, including but not limited to the exposure sevels at which no employee will suffer impaired health or functional capacities or diminished life expectancy as a result of his work experience.
- (4) The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall also conduct special research, (4) Ins Secretary or meant and numers services sher also opnount species research, special research, she demonstrations relating to occupational safety and health as are necessary to explore new problems, including those created by new technology in occupational safety and health, which may require ameliorative action beyond that which is otherwise provided for in the operating provisions of this Act. The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall also conduct research into the motivational and helpowered factors relations to the field of new matterial caffety and helpowered factors relations to the field of new matterial caffety and helpowered. behavioral factors relating to the field of occupational safety and health.

- (5) The Secretary of Health and Human Services, in order to comply with his responsibilities under paragraph (2), and in order to develop needed information reparting potentially took substances or harmful physical agents, may prescribe regulations requiring employers to measure, record, and make reports on the exposure of employees to substances or physical agents which the Secretary of Health and Human Services reasonably believes may endanger the health or safety of employees. The Secretary of Health and Human Services also is authorized to establish such programs of medical examinations and tests as may be necessary for establish such programs of medical examinations and tests as may be necessary for determining the incidence of occupational illnesses and the susceptibility of employees determining the incidence of occupational illnesses and the susceptibility of employees to such littlesses. Nothing in this or any other provision of this Act shall be deemed to such littlesses. Nothing in this or any other provision of this Act shall be deemed to sufficient or require medical examination, unruunization, or treatment for those who object thereto on religious grounds, except where such is neclassary for the protection of the health or safety of others. Upon the request of any employer who is required to measure and record exposure of employees to substances or physical agents as provided under this subsection, the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall furnish full financial or other assistance to such employer for the purpose of defraying any additional exposure incurred by him in carrying out the measuring and recording any additional expense incurred by him in carrying out the measuring and recording as provided in this subsection.
- (6) The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall publish within six months of enactment of this Act and thereafter as needed but at least annually a list of all known toxic substances by generic family or other useful grouping, and the concentrations at which such toxicity is known to occur. He shall determine following a written request by any employer or authorized representative of employees, specifying with reasonable particularity the grounds on which the request is made, whether any substance rominally found in the place of employment has potentially boxic effects in such concentrations as used or found; and shall submit such determination both to employers and affected employees as soon as possible. If the Secretary of Health and Human Services determines that any substance is potentially toxic at the concentrations in which it is used or found in a place of employment, and such substance is not covered by an occupational safety or health standard promutgated under section 6, the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall immediately submit such deterministion to the Secretary, together with all pertinent criteria.
- (7) Within two years of enactment of the Act, and annually thereafter the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall conduct and publish industry wide studies of the effect of chronic or low-level exposure to industrial materials, processes, and stresses on the potential for illness, disease, or loss of functional capacity in aging adults.
- (b) The Secretary of Health and Human Services is authorized to make inspections and question employers and employees as provided in section 8 of this Act in order to carry out his functions and responsibilities under this section.
- (c) The Secretary is authorized to enter into contracts, agreements, or other arrangements with appropriate public agencies or private organizations for the purpose of conducting studies relating to his responsibilities under this Act. In conving out his responsibilities under this subsection, the Secretary shell cooperate with the Secretary of Health and Human Services in order to avoid any duplication of efforts under this section.
- (d) Information obtained by the Secretary and the Secretary of Health and Human Services under this section shall be disseminated by the Secretary to employers and employees and organizations thereof.
- (e) The functions of the Secretory of Health and Human Services under this Act shall, to the extent feasible, be delegated to the Director of the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health established by section 22 of this Act.

EXPANDED RESEARCH ON WORKER SAPETY AND HEALTH

The Secretary of Health and Human Services (referred to in this section as the "Secretary"), exting through the Director of the Netional Institute of Occupational Safety and Health, shall enhance and expand research as deemed appropriate on the health and safety of workers who are at risk for botternorest threats or attacks in the workplace, including research on the health effects of measures taken to treat or protect such workers for diseases or disorders resulting from a biotemorist threat or attack. Nothing in this section may be construed as establishing new regulatory authority for the Secretary or the Director to issue or modify any occupational safety and health rule or regulation.

The State may also provide other schotation and training programs for employers and employees in the State. - (C) which is implementing precedures for requirity identifying and preventing hazards regulated under this Act and maintains appropriate involvement of, and training for, management and non-management employees in achieving safe and healthful working conditions, may be exempt from an inspection (except on inspection requested under section 8(f) or an inspection to determine the cause of a workplace accident which resulted in the death of one or more amployees or hospitalization for three or more employees) for a period of 1 year from the closing of the consultative visit.

SEC. 22. National Institute for Occupational Paristy and Health (a) It is the purpose of this section to establish a National Institute for Occupational Safety

and Health in the Department of Health and Human Services in order to competional Safety set fath in section 2 of this Act and to parform the functions of the Secretary of Health and Human Services under sections 20 and 21 of this Act.

(b) There is hereby established in the Department of Health and Human Services a National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health. The Institute shall be headed by a Director who shall be appointed by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and who shall serve for a term of six years unless previously removed by the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

- (c) The Institute is authorized to --
 - (1) develop and establish recommended occupational safety and health standards; and
 - (2) particing all functions of the Secretary of Health and Human Services under sections

(d) Upon his own initiative, or upon the request of the Secretary of Hestin and Human Sandes, the Director is authorized (1) to conduct such research and experimental programs as he determines are necessary for the development of criteria for new and improved occupational safety and health standards, and (2) efter consideration of the results of such research and experimental programs make recommendations concerning new or improved occupational safety and health standards. Any occupational safety and health standard recommended pursuant to this section shall immediately be forwarded to the Secretary of Labor, and to the Secretary of Health and Human Services. Labor, and to the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

(e) In addition to any authority vested in the Institute by other provisions of this section, the Director, in corrying out the functions of the Institute, is authorized to \cdots

- prescribe such regulations as he deems necessary governing the manner in which its functions shall be carried out;
- (2) receive money and other property donated, bequeathed, or devised, without condition or restriction other than that it be used for the purposes of the Institute and to use, sell, or otherwise dispose of such property for the purpose of carrying out its
- (3) receive (and use, sell, or otherwise dispose of, in accordance with paragraph (2)), money and other property donated, bequesthed, or devised to the Institute with a condition or restriction, including a condition that the Institute use other funds of the Institute for the purposes of the gift;
- (4) In accordance with the civil service lews, appoint and fix the compensation of such personnal as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this section;
- (5) obtain the services of experts and consultants in accordance with the provisions of section 3109 of title 5, United States Code;
- (6) accept and utilize the services of voluntary and noncompensated personnel and relimburse them for travel expenses, including per diam, as authorized by section 5703 of title 5, United States Code:
- (7) enter into contracts, grants or other arrangements, or modifications thereof to carry out the provisions of this section, and such contracts or modifications thereof may be entered into without performance or other bonds, and without regard to section 3709 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (41 U.S.C. 5), or any other provision of law relating to competitive bidding;
- (8) make advance, progress, and other payments which the Director deems necessary under this title without regard to the provisions of section 3324 (a) and (b) of Title 31;
- (9) make other necessary expenditures.

- (f) The Director shall submit to the Secretary of Health and Human Services, to the President, and to the Congress an annual report of the operations of the Institute under this Act, which shall include a detailed statement of all private and public funds received and expended by it, and such recommendations as he deems appropriate.

HISTORICAL NOTES

This reprint generally retains the section numbers originally created by Congress in the Occupational Safety and Health (OSH) Act of 1970, Pub. L. 91-996, 84 Stat 1990. This document includes some editorial changes, such as changing the format to make it easier to read, correcting typographical errors, and updating some of the margin notes. Because Congress enacted emendments to the Act since 1970, this version differs from the original version of the OSH Act. It also differs slightly from the version published in the United States Code at 29 U.S.C. 661 of seg., For example, this reprint refers to the statute as the "Act" rather than the "chapter."

This reprint reflects the provisions of the OSH Act that are in effect as of January 1, 2004. Citations to Public Laws which made important amendments to the OSH Act since 1970 are set forth in the margina and explanatory ristes are included below.

NOTE: Some provisions of the OSH Act may be affected by the enactment of, or amendments to, other statutes, Section 17(h)(1), 29 U.S.C. 656, is an example. The original provision amended section 1114 of the 18 of the United States Code to Include employees of "the Department of Labor assigned to perform Investigative, Inspection, or law enforcement functions" within the list of persons protected by the provisions to allow prescribts on a procession of persons who have killed or attempted to did an officiar or employee of the U.S. government while performing official duties. This reprint sets forth the text of section 12(h) as enacted in 1970. However, since 1970, Congress has enacted multiple amendments to 18 U.S.C. 1114. The current version does not specifically include the Department of Labor in a list; rather it states that "Winever title or attempts to till any afficer or employee of the United States or of any agrees, in any branch of the United States Government (including any member of the uniformed services) while such officer or employee is empaged in or on account of the performance of official duties, or any person assisting such an officer or employee in the performance of such duties or on account of their assistance shall be purelying any in a provided by the statute, Readers are reminded that the official duties can be found in the current volumes of the United States Code Annotated.

Note: The text of Section 28 (Sobnomic Assistance to Small Bushness) amended Sections 7(b) and Section 4(c)(1) of the Small Bushness Act. Because these amendments are no longer current, the text of section 28 is omitted in this repoint. For the current version, see 15 U.S.C. 636.

In 1977, the U.S. entered into the Panama Canal Treaty of 1977, Sept. 7, 1977, U.S.-Panama, T.I.A.S. 10030, 33 U.S.T. 39. In 1979, Congress exected implementing legislation. Panama Canal Act of 1979, Pub. I. 96-70, 93 Siat. 482 (1979). Although no corresponding emendricant to the OSH Act was enacted, the Canal Zone cassed to the authority of the Panama Canal Treaty until December 31, 1999, at which time authority over the Canal under transferred to the Republic of Panama.

On Merch 27, 1978, Pub. L. 95-251, 92 Stat. 183, replaced the term "hearing examinar(s)" with "administrative law judge(s)" in all federal laws, including sections 12(e), 12(j), and 12(f) of the OSH Act, 29 U.S.C. 661.

On October 13, 1978, Pub. L. 95-454, 92 Stat. 1111, 1221, which redesignated section numbers concerning personnel matters and compensation, regulard in the substitution of section 5372 of 10te 5 for section 5362 in section 12(e) of the OSH Act, 29 U.S.C. 561.

On October 17, 1979, Pub. L. 96-88, Title V, section 509(b), 93 Stat. 668, 695, redesignated references to the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to the Department of Health and Human Services and redesignated references to the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare to the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

On September 13, 1982, Pub. L. 97-258, §4(b), 96 Stat. 877, 1067, effectively substituted "Section 3324(a) and (b) of Title 31" for "Section 3648 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (31 (L.S.C. 529)" in section 22 (e)(8), 29 U.S.C. 671, relating to NIOSH procurement authority.

On December 21, 1982, Pub. L. 97-375, 96 Stat. 1819, deleted the sentence in section 19(b) of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 668, that directed the President of the United States to transmit annual reports of the activities of federal agencies to the House of Representatives and the Senete.

On October 12, 1984, Pub. L. 98-473, Chapter II, 98 Stat: 1837, 1987, (commonly referred to as the "Sentencing Reform Act of 1984") instituted a classification system for criminal offenses punishable under the United States Code. Under this system, an offense with imprisonment terms of "six months or less but more than thirty days," such as thirt found in 29 U.S.C. 566(a) for a willful violation of the OSH Act, is classified as a criminal "Class B infedermeanor." 18 U.S.C. 3559(a)(7).

The criminal code increases the monetary penalties for criminal misdemeanors beyond what is provided for in the OSH Act; a fine for a Class B misdemeanor resulting in death, for example, is not more than \$250,000 for an individual, and is not more than \$250,000 for an organization. 18 U.S.C. 357(b)(4), (c)(4). The criminal code also provides for authorized terms of probation for both individuals and organizations. 18 U.S.C. 3551, 3561. The term of imprisonment for individuals is the same as that authorized by the OSH Act, 18 U.S.C. 3581(b)(7).

On Howember 8, 1984, Pub. L. 98-620, 98 Stat. 3335, deleted the last sentence in section 11(a) of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 660, that required petitions filed under the subsection to be heard expeditiously.

On November 5, 1990, Pub. L. 101-506, 104 Stat. 1368, amended section 17 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 666, by increasing the paralles in section 17(a) from \$10,000 for each violation to "\$70,000 for each violation, but not (f) from \$1,000 to \$7,000.

On October 26, 1992, Pub. L. 102-522, 106 Stat. 3410, 3420, added to Title 29, section 671a "Workers' Femily Protection" to grant authority to the Director of NICSH to evaluable, investigate and if necessary, for the Secretary of Later to regulate employee transported releases of hazardous material that result from contamination on the employee clothing or person and may adversely affect the health and safety of workers and their families. Note: section 671a was enacted as section 209 of the Fire Admission Authorization Act of 1992, but it is reprinted here because it is codified within the chapter that comprises the OSH Act.

On October 28, 1992, the Housing and Community Development Act of 1902, Pub. L. 102-550, 106 Stat. 3572, 3924, amended section 22 of the Act. 29 U.S.C. 671, by adding subsection (g), which requires NIDSH to institute a training grant program for lead-based paint activities.

On July 5, 1994, section 7(b) of Pub. L. 103-272, 108 Stat. 745, repealed section 31 of the OSH Act, "Emergency Locator Beacons" Section 1(e) of the same Public Law, however, exacted a modified version of section 31 of the OSH Act. This provision, titled "Emergency Locator Transmitters," is codified at 49 U.S.C. 44712.

On December 21, 1995, Section 3003 of Pub. L. 104-65, 109 Stat. 707, as amended, effective May 15, 2000, terminated the provisions relating to the transmittal to Congress of reports under section 26 of the CSH Act. 29 its.C. 675.

On July 16, 1998, Pub. 1. 105-197, 112 Stat. 638, amended section 21 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 670, by adding subsection (cf), which required the Secretary to establish a compilance assistance program by which employers can consult with state personnel regarding the application of and compilance with OSHA standards.

On July 16, 1998, Pub. L. 105-198, 112 Stat. 640, amended section 8 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 657, by adding subsection (h), which forbids the Secretary to use the results of enforcement activities to evaluate the employees involved in such enforcement or to impose quotes or goals.

On September 29, 1998, Pub. L. 105-241, 112 Stat. 1572, amended sections 3(5) and 19(a) of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 652 and 668, to enclude the United States Postal Service as an "employer" subject to OSHA enforcement.

On June 12, 2002, Pub. L. 107-188, Title I, Section 153, 116 Stat. 631, Congress emicted 29 U.S.C. 669a, to expand research on the "health and safety of workers who are at risk for bioterrorist threats or attacks in the workplace."

Jurisdictional Note

Although no corresponding amendments to the CSH Act have been made, CSHA no longer exercises jurisdiction over the entity formerly known as the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, The Trust Territory, which consisted

The text of section 12(c), 29 U.S.C. 661, is emitted. Subsection (c) amended sections 5314 and 5315 of Title 5, United States Code, to add the positions of Chairman and members of the Occupational Safety and Health.

The text of section 27, 29 U.S.C. 676, is amitted. Section 27 listed Congressional findings on workers' compensation and established the National Commission on State Workmen's Compensation Laws, which ceased to edst ninety days after the submission of its final report, which was due no later than July 31, 1972.

The text of section 28 (Economic Assistance to Small Business) amended sections 7(b) and section 4(c)(1) of the Small Business Act to allow for small business loans in order to comply with applicable standards. The tead of section 29, (Additional Assistant Secretary of Labor), created an Assistant Secretary for Occupational Safety and Health, and section 30 (Additional Positions) created additional positions within the Department of Labor and the Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission in order to carry out the provisions of the CSH Act. Section 31 of the original OSH Act amended 49 U.S.C. 1421 by inserting a section entitled "Emergancy Locator Beacons." The text of that section is omitted in this reprint because Pub. L. 103-272, 108 Stat.745, (July 5, 1991), repealed the text of section 31 and enacted a modified version of the provision, entitled "Emergency Locator Transmitters," which is codified at 49 U.S.C. 44712.

Sometimes legislation does not directly amend the OSH Act, but does place requirements on the Secretary of Labor either to act or to refrain from acting under the authority of the OSH Act. Included below are some examples of such legislation. Please note that this is not intended to be a comprehensive list.

STANDARDS PROMULGATION.

For example, legislation may require the Secretary to promulgate specific standards pursuant to authority under section 6 of the OSH Act, 29 U.S.C. 655. Some examples include the following:

Hazardous Weste Operations. Pub. L. 99-499, Title I, section 126(a)-(f), 100-Stat. 1613 (1986), as amended by Pub. L. 100-202, section 101(f), Title II, section 201, 101 Stat. 1329 (1987), required the Secretary of Labor to promulgate standards concerning hazardous waste operations.

Chemical Process Sinety Management Pub. L. 101-549, Title III, section 304, 104 Stat. 2399 (1990), required the Secretary of Labor, in coordination with the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, to promulgate a chemical process safety standard.

Historious Materials, Pub. L. 101-615, section 29, 104 Stat. 3244 (1990), required the Secretary of Labor, in consultation with the Secretaries of Transportation and Treasury, to laste specific standards concerning the handing of hazardous materials.

Bloodbarne Pethogens Standard. Pub. L. 102-170, Title I., section 100, 105 Stat. 1107 (1991), required the Secretary of Labor to promulgate a final Bloodborne Pethogens standard.

Lead Standard. The Housing and Community Development Act of 1992, Pub. L. 102-550, Title X, sections 1031 and 1032, 106 Stat. 9572 (1992), required the Secretary of Labor to issue an interim final lead standard.

EXTENSION OF COVERAGE.

Sometimes a statute may make some OSH Act provisions applicable to certain entities that are not subject to those provisions by the terms of the OSH Act. For example, the Congressional Accountability Act of 1995, Pub. L. 104-1, 109 Stat. 3, (1995), extended certain OSH Act coverage, such as the duty to comply with Section 5 of the OSH Act, to the Legislative Branch. Ameng other provisions, this regislation authorises the General Coursel of the OSH Act to imspect places of employment and issue a citation or notice to correct the violation found. This statute does not make all the provisions of the OSH Act applicable to the Legislative Branch. Another example is the Medicare Prascription Drug, Improvement, and Modernization Act of 2003, Title 19, Section 947, Pub. L. 109-173, 117 Stat. 2066 (2003), which requires public hospitals not otherwise subject to the OSH Act to comply with collection of civil money paralities by the Department of Health and Human Services in the event that a hospital lefts to comply with OSHA's Bloodborne Pathogens standard.

PURCHASING AFFIDAVIT

MANDATE: Under W. Va. Code §5A-3-10a, no contract or renewal of any contract may be awarded by the state or any of its political subdivisions to any vendor or prospective vendor when the vendor or prospective vendor or a related party to the vendor or prospective vendor is a debtor and: (1) the debt owed is an amount greater than one thousand dollars in the aggregate; or (2) the debtor is in employer default.

EXCEPTION: The prohibition listed above does not apply where a vendor has contested any tax administered pursuant to chapter eleven of the W. Va. Code, workers' compensation premium, permit fee or environmental fee or assessment and the matter has not become final or where the vendor has entered into a payment plan or agreement and the vendor is not in default of any of the provisions of such plan or agreement.

DEFINITIONS:

"Debt" means any assessment, premium, penalty, fine, tax or other amount of money owed to the state or any of its political subdivisions because of a judgment, fine, permit violation, license assessment, defaulted workers' compensation premium, penalty or other assessment presently delinquent or due and required to be paid to the state or any of its political subdivisions, including any interest or additional penalties accrued thereon.

"Employer default" means having an outstanding balance or liability to the old fund or to the uninsured employers' fund or being in policy default, as defined in W. Va. Code § 23-2c-2, failure to maintain mandatory workers' compensation coverage, or failure to fully meet its obligations as a workers' compensation self-insured employer. An employer is not in employer default if it has entered into a repayment agreement with the insurance Commissioner and remains in compliance with the obligations under the repayment agreement.

"Related party" means a party, whether an individual, corporation, partnership, association, limited liability company or any other form or business association or other entity whatsoever, related to any vendor by blood, marriage, ownership or contract through which the party has a relationship of ownership or other interest with the vendor so that the party will actually or by effect receive or control a portion of the benefit, profit or other consideration from performance of a vendor contract with the party receiving an amount that meets or exceed five percent of the total contract amount.

AFFIRMATION: By signing this form, the vendor's authorized signer affirms and acknowledges under penalty of law for false swearing (*W. Va. Code* §61-5-3) that neither vendor nor any related party owe a debt as defined above and that neither vendor nor any related party are in employer default as defined above, unless the debt or employer default is permitted under the exception above.
