- 15. PREFERENCE: Vendor Preference may only be granted upon written request and only in accordance with the West Virginia Code § 5A-3-37 and the West Virginia Code of State Rules. A Vendor Preference Certificate form has been attached hereto to allow Vendor to apply for the preference. - 2. DEFINITIONS: As used in this Solicitation/Contract, the following terms shall have the meanings attributed to them below. Additional definitions may be found in the specifications included with this Solicitation/Contract.
- 2.1. "Agency" or "Agencies" means the agency, board, commission, or other entity of the State of West Virginia that is identified on the first page of the Solicitation or any other public entity seeking to procure goods or services under this Contract.
- 2.2. "Bid" or "Proposal" means the vendors submitted response to this solicitation.
- 2.3. "Contract" means the binding agreement that is entered into between the State and the Vendor to provide the goods or services requested in the Solicitation.
- 2.4. "Director" means the Director of the West Virginia Department of Administration, Purchasing Division.
- 2.5. "Purchasing Division" means the West Virginia Department of Administration, Purchasing Division.
- 2.6. "Award Document" means the document signed by the Agency and the Purchasing Division, and approved as to form by the Attorney General, that identifies the Vendor as the contract holder.
- 2.7. "Solicitation" means the official notice of an opportunity to supply the State with goods or services that is published by the Purchasing Division.
- 2.8. "State" means the State of West Virginia and/or any of its agencies, commissions, boards, etc. as context requires.
- 2.9. "Vendor" or "Vendors" means any entity submitting a bid in response to the Solicitation, the entity that has been selected as the lowest responsible bidder, or the entity that has been awarded the Contract as context requires.

3. CONTRACT TERM; RENEWAL; EXTENSION: The term of this Contract shall be determined in accordance with the category that has been identified as applicable to this Contract below:

4. NOTICE TO PROCEED: Vendor shall begin performance of this Contract immediately upon receiving notice to proceed unless otherwise instructed by the Agency. Unless otherwise specified, the fully executed Award Document will be considered notice to proceed.
5. QUANTITIES: The quantities required under this Contract shall be determined in accordance with the category that has been identified as applicable to this Contract below.
Open End Contract: Quantities listed in this Solicitation are approximations only, based on estimates supplied by the Agency. It is understood and agreed that the Contract shall cover the quantities actually ordered for delivery during the term of the Contract, whether more or less than the quantities shown.
Service: The scope of the service to be provided will be more clearly defined in the specifications included herewith.
Combined Service and Goods: The scope of the service and deliverable goods to be provided will be more clearly defined in the specifications included herewith.
One Time Purchase: This Contract is for the purchase of a set quantity of goods that are identified in the specifications included herewith. Once those items have been delivered, no additional goods may be procured under this Contract without an appropriate change order approved by the Vendor, Agency, Purchasing Division, and Attorney General's office.
6. EMERGENCY PURCHASES: The Purchasing Division Director may authorize the Agency to purchase goods or services in the open market that Vendor would otherwise provide under this Contract if those goods or services are for immediate or expedited delivery in an emergency. Emergencies shall include, but are not limited to, delays in transportation or an unanticipated increase in the volume of work. An emergency purchase in the open market, approved by the Purchasing Division Director, shall not constitute of breach of this Contract and shall not entitle the Vendor to any form of compensation or damages. This provision does not excuse the State from fulfilling its obligations under a One Time Purchase contract.
7. REQUIRED DOCUMENTS: All of the items checked below must be provided to the Purchasing Division by the Vendor as specified below.
BID BOND (Construction Only): Pursuant to the requirements contained in W. Va. Code § 5-22-1(c), All Vendors submitting a bid on a construction project shall furnish a valid bid bond in the amount of five percent (5%) of the total amount of the bid protecting the State of West Virginia. The bid bond must be submitted with the bid.
PERFORMANCE BOND: The apparent successful Vendor shall provide a performance bond in the amount of The performance bond must be received by the Purchasing Division prior to Contract award. On construction contracts, the performance bond must be 100% of the Contract value.

LABOR/MATERIAL PAYMENT BOND: The apparent successful Vendor shall provide a labor/material payment bond in the amount of 100% of the Contract value. The labor/material payment bond must be delivered to the Purchasing Division prior to Contract award. In lieu of the Bid Bond, Performance Bond, and Labor/Material Payment Bond, the Vendor may provide certified checks, cashier's checks, or irrevocable letters of credit. Any certified check, cashier's check, or irrevocable letter of credit provided in lieu of a bond must be of the same amount and delivered on the same schedule as the bond it replaces. 8. WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE: The apparent successful Vendor shall comply with laws relating to workers compensation, shall maintain workers' compensation insurance when required, and shall furnish proof of workers' compensation insurance upon request.
9. LITIGATION BOND: The Director reserves the right to require any Vendor that files a protest of an award to submit a litigation bond in the amount equal to one percent of the lowest bid submitted or \$5,000, whichever is greater. The entire amount of the bond shall be forfeited if the hearing officer determines that the protest was filed for frivolous or improper purpose, including but not limited to, the purpose of harassing, causing unnecessary delay, or needless expense for the Agency. All litigation bonds shall be made payable to the Purchasing Division. In lieu of a bond, the protester may submit a cashier's check or certified check payable to the Purchasing Division. Cashier's or certified checks will be deposited with and held by the State Treasurer's office. If it is determined that the protest has not been filed for frivolous or improper purpose, the bond or deposit shall be returned in its entirety.
10. LIQUIDATED DAMAGES: Vendor shall pay liquidated damages in the amount of
for This clause shall in no way be considered exclusive and shall not limit the State or Agency's right to pursue any other available remedy.

- 11. ACCEPTANCE: Vendor's signature on its bid, or on the certification and signature page, constitutes an offer to the State that cannot be unilaterally withdrawn, signifies that the product or service proposed by vendor meets the mandatory requirements contained in the Solicitation for that product or service, unless otherwise indicated, and signifies acceptance of the terms and conditions contained in the Solicitation unless otherwise indicated.
- 12. PRICING: The pricing set forth herein is firm for the life of the Contract, unless specified elsewhere within this Solicitation/Contract by the State. A Vendor's inclusion of price adjustment provisions in its bid, without an express authorization from the State in the Solicitation to do so, may result in bid disqualification.
- 13. PAYMENT: Payment in advance is prohibited under this Contract. Payment may only be made after the delivery and acceptance of goods or services. The Vendor shall submit invoices, in arrears.
- 14. PURCHASING CARD ACCEPTANCE: The State of West Virginia currently utilizes a Purchasing Card program, administered under contract by a banking institution, to process payment for goods and services. The Vendor must accept the State of West Virginia's Purchasing Card for payment of all orders under this Contract unless the box below is checked.

- 15. TAXES: The Vendor shall pay any applicable sales, use, personal property or any other taxes arising out of this Contract and the transactions contemplated thereby. The State of West Virginia is exempt from federal and state taxes and will not pay or reimburse such taxes.
- 16. ADDITIONAL FEES: Vendor is not permitted to charge additional fees or assess additional charges that were not either expressly provided for in the solicitation published by the State of West Virginia or included in the unit price or lump sum bid amount that Vendor is required by the solicitation to provide. Including such fees or charges as notes to the solicitation may result in rejection of vendor's bid. Requesting such fees or charges be paid after the contract has been awarded may result in cancellation of the contract.
- 17. FUNDING: This Contract shall continue for the term stated herein, contingent upon funds being appropriated by the Legislature or otherwise being made available. In the event funds are not appropriated or otherwise made available, this Contract becomes void and of no effect beginning on July 1 of the fiscal year for which funding has not been appropriated or otherwise made available.
- 18. CANCELLATION: The Purchasing Division Director reserves the right to cancel this Contract immediately upon written notice to the vendor if the materials or workmanship supplied do not conform to the specifications contained in the Contract. The Purchasing Division Director may also cancel any purchase or Contract upon 30 days written notice to the Vendor in accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules § 148-1-5.2.b.

- 19. TIME: Time is of the essence with regard to all matters of time and performance in this Contract.
- 20. APPLICABLE LAW: This Contract is governed by and interpreted under West Virginia law without giving effect to its choice of law principles. Any information provided in specification manuals, or any other source, verbal or written, which contradicts or violates the West Virginia Constitution, West Virginia Code or West Virginia Code of State Rules is void and of no effect.
- 21. COMPLIANCE: Vendor shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations and ordinances. By submitting a bid, Vendor acknowledges that it has reviewed, understands, and will comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and ordinances.
- 22. ARBITRATION: Any references made to arbitration contained in this Contract, Vendor's bid, or in any American Institute of Architects documents pertaining to this Contract are hereby deleted, void, and of no effect.
- 23. MODIFICATIONS: This writing is the parties' final expression of intent. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Contract to the contrary no modification of this Contract shall be binding without mutual written consent of the Agency, and the Vendor, with approval of the Purchasing Division and the Attorney General's office (Attorney General approval is as to form only). Any change to existing contracts that adds work or changes contract cost, and were not included in the original contract, must be approved by the Purchasing Division and the Attorney General's Office (as to form) prior to the implementation of the change or commencement of work affected by the change.
- 24. WAIVER: The failure of either party to insist upon a strict performance of any of the terms or provision of this Contract, or to exercise any option, right, or remedy herein contained, shall not be construed as a waiver or a relinquishment for the future of such term, provision, option, right, or remedy, but the same shall continue in full force and effect. Any waiver must be expressly stated in writing and signed by the waiving party.
- 25. SUBSEQUENT FORMS: The terms and conditions contained in this Contract shall supersede any and all subsequent terms and conditions which may appear on any form documents submitted by Vendor to the Agency or Purchasing Division such as price lists, order forms, invoices, sales agreements, or maintenance agreements, and includes internet websites or other electronic documents. Acceptance or use of Vendor's forms does not constitute acceptance of the terms and conditions contained thereon.
- 26. ASSIGNMENT: Neither this Contract nor any monies due, or to become due hereunder, may be assigned by the Vendor without the express written consent of the Agency, the Purchasing Division, the Attorney General's office (as to form only), and any other government agency or office that may be required to approve such assignments. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Purchasing Division approval may or may not be required on certain agency delegated or exempt purchases.

- 27. WARRANTY: The Vendor expressly warrants that the goods and/or services covered by this Contract will: (a) conform to the specifications, drawings, samples, or other description furnished or specified by the Agency; (b) be merchantable and fit for the purpose intended; and (c) be free from defect in material and workmanship.
- 28. STATE EMPLOYEES: State employees are not permitted to utilize this Contract for personal use and the Vendor is prohibited from permitting or facilitating the same.
- 29. BANKRUPTCY: In the event the Vendor files for bankruptcy protection, the State of West Virginia may deem this Contract null and void, and terminate this Contract without notice.
- 30. PRIVACY, SECURITY, AND CONFIDENTIALITY: The Vendor agrees that it will not disclose to anyone, directly or indirectly, any such personally identifiable information or other confidential information gained from the Agency, unless the individual who is the subject of the information consents to the disclosure in writing or the disclosure is made pursuant to the Agency's policies, procedures, and rules. Vendor further agrees to comply with the Confidentiality Policies and Information Security Accountability Requirements, set forth in <a href="http://www.state.wv.us/admin/purchase/privacy/default.html">http://www.state.wv.us/admin/purchase/privacy/default.html</a>.
- 31. YOUR SUBMISSION IS A PUBLIC DOCUMENT: Vendor's entire response to the Solicitation and the resulting Contract are public documents. As public documents, they will be disclosed to the public following the bid/proposal opening or award of the contract, as required by the competitive bidding laws of West Virginia Code §§ 5A-3-1 et seq., 5-22-1 et seq., and 5G-1-1 et seq. and the Freedom of Information Act West Virginia Code §§ 29B-1-1 et seq.

DO NOT SUBMIT MATERIAL YOU CONSIDER TO BE CONFIDENTIAL, A TRADE SECRET, OR OTHERWISE NOT SUBJECT TO PUBLIC DISCLOSURE.

Submission of any bid, proposal, or other document to the Purchasing Division constitutes your explicit consent to the subsequent public disclosure of the bid, proposal, or document. The Purchasing Division will disclose any document labeled "confidential," "proprietary," "trade secret," "private," or labeled with any other claim against public disclosure of the documents, to include any "trade secrets" as defined by West Virginia Code § 47-22-1 et seq. All submissions are subject to public disclosure without notice.

32. LICENSING: In accordance with West Virginia Code of State Rules § 148-1-6.1.e, Vendor must be licensed and in good standing in accordance with any and all state and local laws and requirements by any state or local agency of West Virginia, including, but not limited to, the West Virginia Secretary of State's Office, the West Virginia Tax Department, West Virginia Insurance Commission, or any other state agency or political subdivision. Upon request, the Vendor must provide all necessary releases to obtain information to enable the Purchasing Division Director or the Agency to verify that the Vendor is licensed and in good standing with the above entities.

- 33. ANTITRUST: In submitting a bid to, signing a contract with, or accepting a Award Document from any agency of the State of West Virginia, the Vendor agrees to convey, sell, assign, or transfer to the State of West Virginia all rights, title, and interest in and to all causes of action it may now or hereafter acquire under the antitrust laws of the United States and the State of West Virginia for price fixing and/or unreasonable restraints of trade relating to the particular commodities or services purchased or acquired by the State of West Virginia. Such assignment shall be made and become effective at the time the purchasing agency tenders the initial payment to Vendor.
- 34. VENDOR CERTIFICATIONS: By signing its bid or entering into this Contract, Vendor certifies (1) that its bid or offer was made without prior understanding, agreement, or connection with any corporation, firm, limited liability company, partnership, person or entity submitting a bid or offer for the same material, supplies, equipment or services; (2) that its bid or offer is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; (3) that this Contract is accepted or entered into without any prior understanding, agreement, or connection to any other entity that could be considered a violation of law; and (4) that it has reviewed this Solicitation in its entirety; understands the requirements, terms and conditions, and other information contained herein.

Vendor's signature on its bid or offer also affirms that neither it nor its representatives have any interest, nor shall acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would compromise the performance of its services hereunder. Any such interests shall be promptly presented in detail to the Agency. The individual signing this bid or offer on behalf of Vendor certifies that he or she is authorized by the Vendor to execute this bid or offer or any documents related thereto on Vendor's behalf; that he or she is authorized to bind the Vendor in a contractual relationship; and that, to the best of his or her knowledge, the Vendor has properly registered with any State agency that may require registration.

35. VENDOR RELATIONSHIP: The relationship of the Vendor to the State shall be that of an independent contractor and no principal-agent relationship or employer-employee relationship is contemplated or created by this Contract. The Vendor as an independent contractor is solely liable for the acts and omissions of its employees and agents. Vendor shall be responsible for selecting, supervising, and compensating any and all individuals employed pursuant to the terms of this Solicitation and resulting contract. Neither the Vendor, nor any employees or subcontractors of the Vendor, shall be deemed to be employees of the State for any purpose whatsoever. Vendor shall be exclusively responsible for payment of employees and contractors for all wages and salaries, taxes, withholding payments, penalties, fees, fringe benefits, professional liability insurance premiums, contributions to insurance and pension, or other deferred compensation plans, including but not limited to, Workers' Compensation and Social Security obligations, licensing fees, etc. and the filing of all necessary documents, forms, and returns pertinent to all of the foregoing.

Vendor shall hold harmless the State, and shall provide the State and Agency with a defense against any and all claims including, but not limited to, the foregoing payments, withholdings, contributions, taxes, Social Security taxes, and employer income tax returns.

- 36. INDEMNIFICATION: The Vendor agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the State and the Agency, their officers, and employees from and against: (1) Any claims or losses for services rendered by any subcontractor, person, or firm performing or supplying services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of the Contract; (2) Any claims or losses resulting to any person or entity injured or damaged by the Vendor, its officers, employees, or subcontractors by the publication, translation, reproduction, delivery, performance, use, or disposition of any data used under the Contract in a manner not authorized by the Contract, or by Federal or State statutes or regulations; and (3) Any failure of the Vendor, its officers, employees, or subcontractors to observe State and Federal laws including, but not limited to, labor and wage and hour laws.
- 37. PURCHASING AFFIDAVIT: In accordance with West Virginia Code § 5A-3-10a, all Vendors are required to sign, notarize, and submit the Purchasing Affidavit stating that neither the Vendor nor a related party owe a debt to the State in excess of \$1,000. The affidavit must be submitted prior to award, but should be submitted with the Vendor's bid. A copy of the Purchasing Affidavit is included herewith.
- 38. ADDITIONAL AGENCY AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT USE: This Contract may be utilized by other agencies, spending units, and political subdivisions of the State of West Virginia; county, municipal, and other local government bodies; and school districts ("Other Government Entities"). Any extension of this Contract to the aforementioned Other Government Entities must be on the same prices, terms, and conditions as those offered and agreed to in this Contract, provided that such extension is in compliance with the applicable laws, rules, and ordinances of the Other Government Entity. If the Vendor does not wish to extend the prices, terms, and conditions of its bid and subsequent contract to the Other Government Entities, the Vendor must clearly indicate such refusal in its bid. A refusal to extend this Contract to the Other Government Entities shall not impact or influence the award of this Contract in any manner.
- 39. CONFLICT OF INTEREST: Vendor, its officers or members or employees, shall not presently have or acquire an interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict with or compromise the performance of its obligations hereunder. Vendor shall periodically inquire of its officers, members and employees to ensure that a conflict of interest does not arise. Any conflict of interest discovered shall be promptly presented in detail to the Agency.

40. REPORTS: Vendor shall provide the Agency and/or the Purchasing Division with the

41. BACKGROUND CHECK: In accordance with W. Va. Code § 15-2D-3, the Director of the Division of Protective Services shall require any service provider whose employees are regularly employed on the grounds or in the buildings of the Capitol complex or who have access to sensitive or critical information to submit to a fingerprint-based state and federal background inquiry through the state repository. The service provider is responsible for any costs associated with the fingerprint-based state and federal background inquiry.

After the contract for such services has been approved, but before any such employees are permitted to be on the grounds or in the buildings of the Capitol complex or have access to sensitive or critical information, the service provider shall submit a list of all persons who will be physically present and working at the Capitol complex to the Director of the Division of Protective Services for purposes of verifying compliance with this provision. The State reserves the right to prohibit a service provider's employees from accessing sensitive or critical information or to be present at the Capitol complex based upon results addressed from a criminal background check.

- 42. PREFERENCE FOR USE OF DOMESTIC STEEL PRODUCTS: Except when authorized by the Director of the Purchasing Division pursuant to W. Va. Code § 5A-3-56, no contractor may use or supply steel products for a State Contract Project other than those steel products made in the United States. A contractor who uses steel products in violation of this section may be subject to civil penalties pursuant to W. Va. Code § 5A-3-56. As used in this section:
- a. "State Contract Project" means any erection or construction of, or any addition to, alteration of or other improvement to any building or structure, including, but not limited to, roads or highways, or the installation of any heating or cooling or ventilating plants or other equipment, or the supply of and materials for such projects, pursuant to a contract with the State of West Virginia for which bids were solicited on or after June 6, 2001.
- b. "Steel Products" means products rolled, formed, shaped, drawn, extruded, forged, cast, fabricated or otherwise similarly processed, or processed by a combination of two or more or such operations, from steel made by the open heath, basic oxygen, electric furnace, Bessemer or other steel making process. The Purchasing Division Director may, in writing, authorize the use of foreign steel products if:
- c. The cost for each contract item used does not exceed one tenth of one percent (.1%) of the total contract cost or two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00), whichever is greater. For the purposes of this section, the cost is the value of the steel product as delivered to the project; or d. The Director of the Purchasing Division determines that specified steel materials are not produced in the United States in sufficient quantity or otherwise are not reasonably available to meet contract requirements.

43. PREFERENCE FOR USE OF DOMESTIC ALUMINUM, GLASS, AND STEEL: In Accordance with W. Va. Code § 5-19-1 et seq., and W. Va. CSR § 148-10-1 et seq., for every contract or subcontract, subject to the limitations contained herein, for the construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, improvement or maintenance of public works or for the purchase of any item of machinery or equipment to be used at sites of public works, only domestic aluminum, glass or steel products shall be supplied unless the spending officer determines, in writing, after the receipt of offers or bids, (1) that the cost of domestic aluminum, glass or steel products is unreasonable or inconsistent with the public interest of the State of West Virginia, (2) that domestic aluminum, glass or steel products are not produced in sufficient quantities to meet the contract requirements, or (3) the available domestic aluminum, glass, or steel do not meet the contract specifications. This provision only applies to public works contracts awarded in an amount more than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) or public works contracts that require more than ten thousand pounds of steel products.

Within thirty days after the last day for filing such objections, the Secretary shall publish in the Federal Register a notice specifying the occupational safety or health standard to which objections have been filed and a hearing requested, and specifying a time and place for such hearing.
- (4) Within sixty days after the expiration of the period provided for the submission of

written data or comments under paragraph (2), or within shoty days after the completion of any hearing held under paragraph (3), the Secretary shall issue a rule promulgating, modifying, or revoking an eccupational safety or health standard or make a determination that a rule should not be issued. Such a rule may contain a provision delaying its effective data for the matter in such as the first of the secretary of the secretar drate a rule should not be issued. Such a falle may contain a provision delaying its effects white for such period (not in excess of ninety days) as the Secretary determines may be necessary to insure that effected employers and employees will be informed of the existence of the standard and of its terms and that employees will be removed are given an opportunity to familiarize themselves and their employees with the existence of the requirements of the standard.

(5) The Secretary, in promulgating standards dealing with toxic materials or harmful physical agents under this subsection, shall set the standard which most edequately assures, to the extent feasible, on the basis of the best available evidence, that no employee will suffer meterfal impairment of health or functional capacity even if such employee has require exposure to the hazard dealt with by such standard for the period of his working life. Development of standards under this subsection shall be based upon research, demonstrations, experiments, and such other information as may be appropriate. In addition to the attainment of the highest degree of health and safety protection for the employee, other considerations shall be the latest available scientific data in the field, the employee, over considerations and or or executive control of the standard, and experience gained under this and other health and safety laws. Whenever practicable, the standard promulgated shall be expressed in terms of objective criteria and of the performance desired.

(6) (A) Any employer may apply to the Secretary for a temporary order granting a vertance from a standard or any provision thereof promulgated under this section. Such temporary order shall be granted only if the employer files an application which meets the requirements of clause (8) and establishes

- (f) he is snable to comply with a standard by its effective date because of unavailability of professional or technical personnel or of materials and equipment needed to come into compliance with the standard or because necessary construction or alteration of facilities cannot be completed by the effective date.
- (ii) he is taking all available steps to safeguard his employees against the hazards covered by the standard, and
- (II) he has an effective program for coming into compliance with the standard as quickly

Any temporary order listued under this paregraph shall prescribe the precises, meens, nethods, operations, and processes which the employer must adopt and use while the order is in effect and state in detail his program for coming into compliance with the standard. Such a temporary order may be granted only after notice to employees and an opportunity for a hearing. Provided, That the Secretary may issue one interim order to be effective until a decision is made on the basis of the hearing. No temporary order may be in effect for longer than the period needed by the employer to advise compliance with the standard or once year, whichever is shorter, except that such an order may be renewed not more that twice (1) so long as the requirements of this paregraph are met and (11) if an application for renewal is filled at least 90 days prior to the experision date of the order. No interim renewal of an order may remain in effect for longer than 180 days.

- (B) An application for temporary order under this paragraph (6) shall contain:
- (i) a specification of the standard or portion thereof from which the employer seeks a
- (ii) a representation by the employer, supported by representations from qualified persons having firsthand knowledge of the facts represented, that he is unable to comply with the standard or portion thereof and a detailed statement of the reasons therefor.
- (間) a statement of the steps he has taken and will take (with specific dates) to protect employees egainst the hazard covered by the standard,
- (iv) a statement of when he expects to be able to comply with the standard and what about he has taken and what steps he will take (with dates specified) to come into compliance with the standard, and
- (v) a certification that he has informed his employees of the application by glving a copy thereof to their authorized representative, posting a statement giving a summary of the application and specifying where a copy may be examined at the piece or places where notices to employees are normally posted, and by other appropriate means.

A description of how employees have been informed shall be contained in the certification. The information to employees shall also inform them of their right to pelition the Secretary for a hearing.

- (C) The Secretary is authorized to grant a variance from any standard or portion increor whenever he determines, or the Secretary of Health and Human Services contines, that such variance is necessary to permit an employer to perticipate in an experiment approved by him or the Secretary of Health and Human Services designed to demonstrate or validate new and improved techniques to sofeguerd the health or safety of workers.
- (7) Any standard promulgated under this subsection shall prescribe the use of labels or other appropriate forms of warning as are necessary to insure that employees are apprised of all hezards to which they are exposed, relevant symptoms and appropriate emergency

treatment, and proper conditions and precautions of safe use or exposure. Where appropriate, such standard shall also prescribe suitable protective equipment and control or teachnological procedures to be used in connection with such hazards and shall provide for monitoring or measuring employee exposure at such locations and intervals, and in such manner as may be necessary for the protection of employees. In addition, where appropriate, any such standard shall prescribe the type and frequency of medical examinations or other tests which shall be made available, by the employee or at his cost, to employees exposed to such hazards in order to most effectively determine whether the health of such employees; is advancely affected by such exposure. In this event such medical examinations are in the nature of research, as determined by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, such examinations may be furnished at the expense of the Secretary of Health and Human Services, The results of such examinations or tasts shall be furnished only to the Secretary or the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and, at the request of the employee, to his physician. The Secretary, in consultation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, may by rule promulgated pursuant to section 553 of title 5, United States Code, make appropriate modifications in the foregoing requirements relating to the use of labels or other forms of warning, monitoring or measuring, and medical examinations, as may be warranted by experience, information, or medical or technological developments acquired subsequent to the promulgation of the relevant standard.

- (8) Whenever a rule promulgated by the Secretary differs substantially from an existing national consensus standard, the Secretary shall, at the same time, publish in the Faderal Register a statement of the reasons why the rule as adopted will better effectuate the purposes of this Act than the national consensus standard.
- (c) (1) The Secretary shall provide, without regard to the requirements of chapter 5, title 5, United States Code, for an emergency temporary standard to take immediate effect upon publication in the Federal Register if he determines —
  - (A) that employees are exposed to grave danger from exposure to substances or egents determined to be toxic or physically hermital or from new hazards, and
  - (B) that such emergency standard is necessary to protect employees from such danger.
- (2) Such standard shall be effective until superseded by a standard promulgated in accordance with the procedures prescribed in paragraph (3) of this subsection.
- (3) Upon publication of such standard in the Federal Register the Secretary shell commence a proceeding in accordance with section 6 (b) of this Act, and the standard as published shall also serve as a proposed rule for the proceeding. The Secretary shell promalgete a standard under this paragraph no later than six months after publication of the emergency standard as provided to paragraph (2) of this subsection.
- (d) Any affected employer may apply to the Secretary for a rule or order for a vertance from a standard promutgated under this section. Affected employees shall be given notice of each such application and an opportunity to participate in a hearing. The Secretary shall issue such rule or order if he determines on the record, after appropriate and a hearing, that the proponent of the varience has demonstrated by a prepondersince of the evidence that the conditions, practices, means, methods, operations, or processes used or proposed to he used by an employer will provide employment and places of employment to his employees which are as safe and healthful as those which would prevail if he compiled with the standard. The rule or order so issued shall prescribe the conditions like employer must maintain, and the practices, invests, methods, operations, and processes which he must adopt and utilize to the extent they differ from the standard in question. Such a rule or order may be modified or revoked upon application by an employer, employees, or by the Secretary on his own motion, in the menner precuribed for its issuance under this subsection at any time affects six months from its issuance.
- (a) Whenever the Secretary promulgates any standard, makes any rule, order, or decision, grants any exemption or extension of time, or compromises, mitigates, or settles any penalty assessed under this Act, he shall include a statement of the reasons for such action, which shall be published in the Federal Ragister.
- (f) Any person who may be adversely affected by a standard issued under this section may at any time prior to the shotieth day after such standard is promulgated file a petition challenging the validity of such standard with the United States court of appeals for the clicuit wherein such person resides or has his principal place of husness, for a judicial review of such standard. A copy of the petition shall be forthwith transmitted by the clark of the court to the Secretary. The filing of such petition shall not, unless otherwise ordered by the court, operate as a stay of the standard. The determinations of the Secretary shall be conclusive if supported by substantial evidence in the record considered as a whole.
- (g) In determining the priority for establishing standards under this section, the Secretary shall give due regard to the urgency of the need for mandatory safety and health standards for particular industries, trades, cealts, occupations, businesses, workplaces or work environments. The Secretary shall also give due regard to the recommendations of the Secretary of Health and Human Services regarding the need for mandatory standards in determining the priority for establishing such standards.

### SEC. 7. Advisory Committees; Administration

29 USC 656

(a) (1) There is hereby established a National Advisory Committee on Occupational Safety and Health consisting of twelve members appointed by the Secretary, four of whom are to be designated by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, without regard to the provisions 100

of title 5, United States Code, governing appointments in the competitive service, and composed of representatives of management, labor, occupational safety and occupational health professions, and of the public. The Secretary shall designate one of the public members as Chaliman. The members shall be selected upon the basis of their experience and competence in the field of occupational safety and health.

- (2) The Committee shall arivise, consult with, and make recommendations to the Secretary and the Secretary of Health and Human Services on matters relating to the administration of the Act. The Committee shall hold no fewer than two meetings during each calendar year. All meetings of the Committee shall be open to the public and a transcript shall be kept and made available for public inspection.
- (3) The members of the Committee shalf be compensated in accordance with the provisions of section 3109 of title S, United States Code.
- (4) The Secretary shall furnish to the Committee an executive secretary and such secretarial, clerical, and other services as are deemed necessary to the conduct of its hustines.

(b) An advisory committee may be appointed by the Secretary to assist him in his standard-setting functions under section 6 of this Act. Each such committee shall consist of not more than filteen members and shall include as a member one or more designess of the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and shall include as a member one or more designess of the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and shall include a so in present the viewpoint of the employers involved, and of persons shiflarly quelified to present the viewpoint of the employers involved, as one or more representatives of health and safety openides of the States. An edvisory committee may also include such other persons as the Secretary may appoint who are quelified by knowledge and experience to make a useful contribution to the work of such committee, including one or more representatives of professional organizations of technicians or professionals specializing in occupational safety or health, and one or more representatives of nationally recognized standards producing organizations, but the number of presents as appointed to such committee as representatives of Federal and State agencies. Persons appointed to such committee as representatives file shall be comparisated in the same manner as consultants or experts under section 3109 of this 5, United States Code, The Sacretary shall pay to any State visich is the employer of a member of such committee who is a spresentative of the health or safety agency of that State, remoturement sufficient to cover the actual cost to the State resulting from such representatives in membership on such committee. Any meeting of such committee shall be upon to the public and an accurating record shall be legal and made available to the public. No member of such committee in any proposed rule.

(c) In carrying out his responsibilities under this Act, the Secretary is authorized

to-

- (1) use, with the consent of any Federal agency, the services, facilities, and personnel of such agency, with or without reimbursement, and with the consent of any State or political subdivision thereof, accept and use the services, Reditties, and personnel of any agency of such State or subdivision with resolutement; and
- (2) amploy experts and consultants or organizations thereof as authorized by section 3109 of title 5, United States Code, except that contracts for such employment may be renewed annually; compensate includues so employed at rates not in excess of the rate spacified at the time of service for grade GS-18 under section 5332 of title 5, United States Code, including travel time, and allow them white away from their hornes or regular places of business, travel expenses (including per diam in lieu of subsistence) as authorized by section 5703 of title 5, United States Code, for persons in the Government service employed intermittentity, while so employed.

## SEC. S. Inspections, Investigations, and Recordinaping

(a) In order to carry but the purposes of this Act, the Secretary, upon presenting appropriate credentisis to the owner, operator, or agent in charge, is authorized —

- (1) to enter without delay and at reasonable times any factory, plant, establishment, construction site, or other area, workplace or environment where work is performed by an amplioner of an employer, and
- (2) to inspect and investigate during requier working hours and at other responsible times, and within responsible limits and in a reasonable manner, any such place of employment and all pertinent conditions, structures, machines, apparatus, devices, equipment, and materials therein, and to question privately any such employer, owner, operator, agent or employee.
- (b) In making his inspections and investigations under this Act the Secretary may require the attendance and testimony of witnesses and the production of evidence under oath. Witnesses shall be paid the same fees and mileage that are paid witnesses in the courts of the United States. In case of a contumacy, fedure, or refusal of any person to obey such an order, any district court of the United States or the United States courts of any territory or pressessint, within the jurisdiction of which such person is found, or resides or transacts business, upon the application by the Secretary, shall have jurisdiction to issue to such person an order requiring such person to appear to produce evidence if, as, and when so ordered, and to give teetimony relating to the makter under twestigation or in question, and any failure to obey such order of the court may be

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punished by said court as a contempt thereof.

- (c) (1) Each employer shall make, keep and preserve, and make evallable to the Secretary or the Secretary of Health and Human Services, such records regarding his activities relating to this Act as the Secretary, in cooperation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, may prescribe by regulation as necessary or appropriate for the enforcement of this Act or for developing information regarding the causes and prevention of occupational accidents and likesess. In order to carry out the provisions of this paragraph such regulations may include provisions requiring the employers to conduct periodic inspections. The Secretary shall also issue regulations requiring that employers to conduct periodic inspections. The Secretary shall also issue regulations requiring that employers, through posting of notices or other appropriate means, keep their employees informed of their protectors and obligations under this Act, Including the provisions of applicable standards.
- (2) The Secretary, in cooperation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, shall prescribe regulations requiring employers to maintain accurate records of, and to make periodic reports on, work-related destricts, injuries and illnesses other than minor injuries requiring only first act treatment and which do not involve medical treatment, loss of consciousness, restriction of work or motion, or transfer to another job.
- (3) The Secretary, in cooperation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, shall issue regulations requiring employers to maintain accurate records of employee exposures to potentially tools materials or harmful physical agents which are required to be moritored or measured under section 5. Such regulations shall provide employees or their representatives with an apportunity to observe such monitoring or measuring, and to have access to the records thereof. Such regulations shall also make appropriate provision for each employee or former employee to have access to such records as will indicate he own exposure to took materials or isomiful physical agents. Each employer shall promptly notify any employee who has been or to being exposed to bode materials or harmful physical agents in concentrations or at levels which exceed those prescribed by an applicable occupational safety and health standard promulgated under section 6, and shall inform any employee who is being thus exposed of the corrective access being taken.
- (d) Any information obtained by the Secretary, the Secretary of Health and Human Services, or a State agency under this Act shall be obtained with a minimum burden upon employers, especially those operating small businesses. Unnecessary duplication of efforts in obtaining information shall be reduced to the maximum extent fleasible.
- (a) Subject to regulations issued by the Secretary, a representative of the employer and a representative authorized by his employees shall be given an opportunity to accompany the Secretary or his euthorized representative during the physical inspection of any workplace under subsection (a) for the purpose of aiding such aspection. Where there is no authorized employee representative, the Secretary or his authorized representative shall consult with a reasonable number of employees concerning matters of health and sefery in the workplace.
- (f) (1) Any employees or representative of employees who believe that a violation of a safety or health standard exists that threatens physical harm, or that an imminent denger exists, may request an inspection by giving notice to the Secretary or his authorized representative of such violation or denger. Any such notice shall be reduced to writing, shall set forth with reasonable particularly the grounds for the notice, and shall be signed by the employees or representative of employees, and a copy shall be provided the employer or his agent no later than at the time of inspection, except that, upon the request of the person giving such notice, his name and the names of individual employees referred to therein shall not appear in such copy or on any record published, released, or made available pursuant to subsection (g) of this section. If upon receipt of such notification the Secretary determines there are reasonable grounds to believe that such violation or danger exists, he shall make a special inspection in accompance with the provisions of this section as soon as practicable, to determine if such violation or danger exists. If the Secretary determines there are no reasonable grounds to believe that a violation or danger exists in shall notify the amployees or representative of the employees in writing of such determination.
- (2) Prior to or during any inspection of a workplace, any employees or representative of employees employed in such workplace may notify the Secretary or any representative of the Secretary responsible for conducting the inspection, in writing, of any violation of this Act which they have reason to believe exists in such workplace. The Secretary shall, by regulation, establish procedures for informal review of any refusal by a representative of the Secretary to issue a classical with respect to any such alleged violation and shall furnish the employees or representative of employees requesting such review a written statement of the reasons for the Secretary's final disposition of the case.
- (g) (1) The Secretary and Secretary of freaith and Human Services are authorised to compile, arishize, and publish, either in summary or detailed form, all reports or information obtained under this section.
- (2) The Secretary and the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall each prescribe such rules and regulations as he may deem necessary to carry out their responsibilities under this Act, including rules and regulations dealing with the inspection of an employer's establishment.
- (h) The Secretary that not use the results of enforcement activities, such as the number of citations usued or penalties assessed, to evaluate employees directly involved in enforcement activities under this Act or to impose quotas or goals with regard to the results of such activities.

#### SEC. 9. Citations

29 USC 658

(a) If, upon inspection or investigation, the Secretary or his authorized representative believes that an employer has violated a requirement of section 5 of this Act, of any standard, rule or order promulgated pursuant to section 6 of this Act, or of any regulations

prescribed pursuant to this Act, he shall with reasonable promptness issue a citation to the amployer. Each citation shall be in writing and shall describe with particularity the nature of the violation, including a reference to the provision of the Act, standard; rule, regulation, or order alleged to have been violated. In addition, the citation shall fix a reasonable time; for the abatement of the violation. The Secretary may prescribe procedures for the issuance of a notice in lieu of a citation with respect to de manimis violations which have no direct or immediate relationship to safety or health.

(b) Each citation issued under this section, or a copy or copies thereof, shall be prominently posted, as preparitied in regulations issued by the Secretary, at or near each place a violation referred to in the citation occurred.

(c) No chatton may be issued under this section after the expiration of six months following the occurrence of any violation.

#### SEC. 10. Procedure for Enforcement

(a) If, after an inspection or investigation, the Secretary issues a citation under section 9(a), 29 USC 559 he shall, within a reasonable time after the termination of such inspection or investigation, notify the employer by certified mail of the pensity, if any, proposed to be assessed under section 17 and that the employer has fifteen working days within which to notify the Secretary that he withins to contest the citation or proprised assessment of pensity. If, within fifteen working days from the noceipt of the notice issued by the Secretary the employer falls to notify the Secretary that he interids to contest the citation or proposed assessment of pensity, and no notice is filed by any employee or representative of employees under subsection (c) within such time, the citation and the assessment, as proposed, shall be deemed a final order of the Commission and not subject to review by any court or agency.

(b) If the Secretary has reason to believe that an employer has failed to correct a violation for which a citation has been issued within the period permitted for its correction (which period shall not begin to run until the entry of a final order by the Commission in the case of any review proceedings under the section initiated by the employer in good faith and not solely for delay or avoidence of peralties), the Secretary shall notify the employer by certified mall of such failure and of the penalty proposed to be assessed under section 17 by reason of such failure, and that the employer has fifteen working days within which to notify the Secretary that he wishes to donless the Secretary's notification or the proposed assessment of penalty. If, within lifteen working days from the receipt of notification issued by the Secretary, the employer falls to notify the Secretary that he unsafe to confest the notification or proposed assessment of penalty, the notification and assessment, as proposed, shall be deemed a final order of the Commission and not subject to review by any court or agency.

(c) If an employer notifies the Secretary that he intends to contest a citation issued under section 9(a) or notification issued under subsection (a) or (b) or this section, or if, within fifteen working days of the issuance of a citation under section 9(a), any employee or representative of employees files a notice with the Secretary alleging that the period of time fixed in the citation for the abatement of the violation is unreasonable, the Secretary shall immediately advise the Commission of such notification, and the Commission shall efford an opportunity for a hearing (in accurdance with section 554 of title 5, United States Code, but without regard to subsection (a)(3) or such section). The Commission shall therefore issue an order, based on findings of fact, affirming, modifying, or vacating the Secretary's citation or proposed penalty, or directing other appropriate relief, and such order shall become final thirty days after its issuance. Upon a showing by an employer of a good faith effort to comply with the abatement requirements of a citation, and that abatement has not been completed because of factors beyond his reasonable control, the Secretary, after an opportunity for a hearing as provided in this subsection, shall assue an order affirming or modifying the abatement requirements in such cutation. The rules of procedure prescribed by the Commission shall provide affected employees or representatives of affected employees an opportunity to participate as parties to hearings under this subsection.

#### SEC. 11. Judicial Review

(a) Any person adversely affected or aggrieved by an order of the Commission Issued under subsection (c) of section 10 may obtain a review of such order in any United States court of appeals for the oxcult in which the violation is alleged to have occurred or where the employer has its principal office, or in the Court of Appeals for the Dist of Order a written petition praying that the order be modified or set aside. A copy of such petition shall be forthwan transmitted by the clerk of the court to the Commission and to the other parties, and thereupon the Commission shall file in the court the record in the proceeding as provided in section 21.12 of title 25, United States Cope. Upon such filing, the court shall have power to grant such temporary relief or restraining order as it deems just and proper, and to make and enter upon the pleadings, testimony, and proceedings set forth in such record a decree affirming, motifying, or setting assite in whole or in part, the order of the Commission and sinfording the same to the aptent that such order is affirmed or modified. The counterprenance of proceedings under this subsection shall not, unless ordered by the court, operate as a stay of the order of the Commission. Upon the filing of the record with it, the jurisdiction of the court shall be exclusive and its judgment and decree shall be final, except that the same shall be subject to review by the Supreme Court of the United States, as provided in section 1254 of title 28, United States Code.

(b) The Secretary may also obtain review or enforcement of any final order of the Commission by filing a position for such relief in the fluided States coast of appeals for the circuit in which the allegad violation occurred or in which the employer has its principal office, and the provisions of subsection (a) shall govern such proceedings to the extent applicable. If no petition for review, as provided in subsection (a), is filled within sixty days after service of the Commission's proter, the Commission's findings of fact and order shall be conclusive in connection with any petition for enforcement which is filed by the Secretary after the expiration of such sixty-day period. In any such case, as well as in the case of a moncontested dictation or notification by the Secretary which has become a final order of the Commission under subsection (a) or (b) of section 10, the clerk of the court, unless otherwise drained by the court, shall forthwith enter a decree enforcing the order and shall transmit a copy of such decree to the Secretary and the employer named in the petition. In any contempt proceeding brought to enforce a decree of a court of appeals entered pursuant to this subsection or subsection (a), the court of appeals may assess the penalties provided in section 17, in addition to invoking any other available remedies.

- (c) (1) No person shall discharge or in any manner discriminate against any employee because such employee hais filled any complaint or instituted or caused to be instituted any proceeding under or related to this Act or has tastified or is about to testify in any such proceeding or because of the exercise by such employee on behalf of himself or others of any right afforded by this Act.
- (2) Any employee who believes that he has been discharged or otherwise discriminated against by any person in violation of this subsection may, within thirty days after such violation occurs. The a complaint with the Secretary alleging such discriminated, upon receipt of such complaint, the Secretary is fall cause such investigation to be made as he deems appropriate. If upon such investigation, the Secretary determines that the provisions of this subsection have been violated, he shall bring an action in any appropriate United States district court agents such person. In any such action the littled States district ourts shall have jurisdiction, for cause shown to restrain violations of paragraph (1) of this subsection and order all appropriate relief including rehiring or reinstatement of the employee to his former position with back play.
- (3) Within 90 days of the receipt of a complaint filed under this subsection the Secretary shall notify the complainant of his determination under paragraph 2 of this subsection.

### SEC. 12. The Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission

(a) The Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission is hereby established. The Commission shall be composed of three mambers who shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, from among persons who by reason of balding, education, or experience are qualified to carry out the functions of the Commission under this Act. The President shall designate one of the members of the Commission to serve as Chamman.

- (b) The terms of members of the Commission shall be six years except that

- (h) The Commission may order testimony to be taken by deposition in any proceedings pending before it at any state of such proceeding. Any person may be compelled to appear and depose, and to produce books, papers, or documents, in the same manner is witnesses may be compelled to appear and testify and produce like documentary evidence before the Commission. (d) If the Secretary arbitrarily or capriciously fails to seek relief under this section, any employee who may be injured by reason of such failure, or the representative of such employees, might bring an action against the Secretary at the United States district court for the district in which the imminent danger is alleged to exist or the employer has its principal office, or for the District of Calumbia, for a writ of mandamus to compet the Secretary to seek such an order and for such further relief as may be appropriate.

## SEC. 16. Representation in Civil Litigation

## SEC. 15. Confidentiality of Trade Secrets

All information reported to or otherwise obtained by the Secretary or his representative in connection with any inspection or proceeding under this Act which contains or which might reveal a trade secret referred to an section 1905 of title 18 of the Unified States Code shall be considered confidential for the purpose of that section, except that such information may be disclosed to other officers or employees concerned with carrying out this Act or when relevant in any proceeding under this Act.   - designates a State agency or agencies as the agency or agencies responsible for administering the plan throughout the State,
  - (2) provides for the development and enforcement of safety and health standards relating to one or more safety or health issues, which standards (and the enforcement of which standards) are or will be at least as effective in providing safe and healthful employment and places of employment as the standards promulgated under section 6 which relate to the same issues, and which standards, when applicable to products which are distributed or used in interstate commence, are required by compelling local conditions and do not unduly burden interstate commerce.
  - (3) provides for a right of entry and inspection of all workplaces subject to the Act which is at least as effective as that provided in section 8, and includes a prohibition on advance notice of inspections.
  - (4) contains satisfactory assurances that such agency or agencies have or will have the legal authority and qualified personnel mecessary for the enforcement of such standards,
  - (5) gives satisfactory assurances that such State will devote adequate funds to the administration and enforcement of such standards.
- (6) contains satisfactory assurances that such State will, to the extent permitted by its law, establish and maintain an effective and comprehensive occupational safety and lealth program applicable to all employees of public agencies of the State and its political aubdivisions, which program is as effective as the standards contained in an approved plan.
- (7) requires employers in the State to make reports to the Secretary in the seme menner and to the same extent as if the plan were not in effect, and
- (8) provides that the State agency will make such reports to the Secretary in such form and containing such information, as the Secretary shall from brine to time require.
- (d) If the Secretary rejects a plan submitted under subsection (b), he shall afford the State submitting the plan due notice and opportunity for a hearing before so doing.
- (e) After the Secretary approves a State plan submitted under subsection (b), he may, but shall not be nequired to, exercise his authority under section 8, 9, 10, 13, and 17 with respect to comparable standards promulgated under section 6, for the period specified in the next sentence. The Secretary may exercise the authority referred to above until he determines, on the basis of actual operations under the State plan, that the criterial set forth in subsection (c) are being applied, but he shall not make such determination for at least three years after the plan's approval under subsection (c). The head of each agency shall (after consultation with representatives of the employees

  - (3) keep adequate records of all occupational accidents and librasses for proper evaluation and necessary corrective action;
  - (4) consult with the Secretary with regard to the adequacy as to form and content of records kept pursuant to subsection (a)(3) of this section; and
  - (5) make an ensual report to the Secretary with respect to occupational accidents and injuries and the agency's program whoer this section. Such report shall include any report submitted under section 7502(e)(2) of title 5, United States Code.
- (b) The Secretary shall report to the President a summary or digest of reports submitted to him under subsection (a)(5) of this section, together with his evaluations of and recommendations derived from such reports.
- (c) Section 7902(c)(1) of title 5, United States Code, is amended by inserting after "agencies" the following: "and of labor organizations representing amployees".
- (d) The Secretary shall have access to records and reports kept and filed by Federal agencies pursuant to subsections (a)(3) and (5) of this section unless those records and reports are specifically required by Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of the national defense or foreign policy, in which case the Secretary shall have access to such information as will not jeopardice national defense or foreign policy.

### SEC. 20. Research and Dalated Activities

(a) (1) The Secretary of Health and Human Services, after consultation with the Secretary and with other appropriate Federal departments or agencies, shall conduct (directly or by grants or contracts) research, experiments, and demonstrations relating to occupational safety and health, including studies of psychological factors involved, and relating to innovative methods, techniques, and approaches for dealing with occupational safety and health middlesses. health problems.

- (2) The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall from time to time consult with the Secretary in order to develop specific plans for such research, demonstrations, and experiments as are necessary to produce criteria, including orderia identifying took substances, enabling the Secretary to meet his responsibility for the formulation of safety and health standards under this Act; and the Secretary of Health and Human Services, on the beas of such research, demonstrations, and experiments and any other adornation available to him, shell develop and publish at least annually such criteria as will affectuate the purposes of this Act.
- (3) The Secretary of Health and Human Services, on the basis of such research, demonstrations, and experiments, and any other information available to him, shall develop criteria dealing with roate materials and harmful physical agents and substances which will describe exposure levels that are safe for various periods of employment, including but not limited to the exposure levels at which no employee will suffer impaired health or functional capacities or diminished life expectancy as a result of his work experience.
- (4) The Socretary of Health and Human Services shall also conduct special research, experiments, and demonstrations relating to conspetional safety and health as are necessary to explore new problems, including those created by new technology in occupational safety and health, which may require ametiorative action beyond that which is otherwise provided for in the operating provisions of this Act. The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall also conduct research into the metivational and behavioral factors relating to the field of occupational safety and health.

- (5) The Secretary of Health and Human Services, in order to comply with his responsibilities under paragraph (2), and in order to develop needed information regarding potentially toxic substances or harmful physical agents, may prescribe regulations requiring employers to measure, record, and make reports on the exposure of employees to substances or physical agents which this Secretary of Health and Human Services reasonably believes may endanger the health or safety of employees. The Secretary of Health and Human Services size is authorized to establish such programs of medical examinations and tests as may be necessary for determining the incidence of occupational lithresses and the susceptibility of employees to such illnesses. Nothing in this or any other provision of this Act shall be deemed to euthorize or regular medical examination, immunization, or treatment for those who object thereto on refigious grounds, except where such is necessary for the protection of the health or safety of others. Upon the request of any employer who is required to measure and record exposure of employees to substances or physical agents as provided under this subsection, the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall found in financial or other assistance to such employer for the purpose of distraying any additional expense incurred by him in carrying out the measuring and recording as provided in this subsection.
- (6) The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall publish within six mombs of enactment of this Act and thereafter as needed but at least annually a list of all known toxic substances by generic family or other useful grouping, and the concentrations at which such toxicity is known to occur. He shall determine following a written request by any employer or authorized representative of employees, specifying with reasonable particularity the grounds on which the request is made, whether any substance concentrations as used or found; and shall submit such determination both to employers and affected employees as soon as possible. If the Secretary of Health and Human Services determines that any substance is potentially toxic at the concentrations in which it is used or found; an a place of employment, and such substance is not covered by an occupational safety or health standard promisingsted under section 6, the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall immediately submit such determination to the Secretary, together with all pertinent criterio.

- (b) The Secretary of Health and Human Services is authorized to make inspections and question employers and employees as provided in section. 8 of this Act in order to carry out his functions and responsibilities under this section.
- (c) The Secretary is authorized to enter into contracts, agreements, or other arrangements with appropriate public agencies or private organizations for the purpose of conducting studies relating to his responsibilities under this Act. In carrying out his responsibilities under this Act. In carrying out his responsibilities under this subsection, the Secretary shall cooperate with the Secretary of Health and Human Services in order to avoid any displication of efforts under this section.
- (d) Information obtained by the Secretary and the Secretary of Health and Human Services under this section shall be disseminated by the Secretary to employers and employees and organizations thereof.
- (e) The functions of the Secretary of Health and Human Services under this Act shall, to the extent feasible, be delegated to the Director of the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health established by Section 22 of this Act.

## EXPANDED RESEARCH ON WORKER SAFETY AND HEALTH

The Secretary of Health and Human Services (referred to in this section as the "Secretary"), esting through the Director of the National Institute of Occupational Safety and health, shall enhance and expand research as deemed appropriate on the health and safety of workers who are at risk for bioterrors; threats or attacks in the workplace, including research on the health effects of measures taken to treat or protect such workers for diseases or disorders resulting from a bioterrorist threat or attack. Nothing in this section may be construed as establishing new regulatory authority for the Secretary or the Director to issue or modify any occupational safety and health rule or regulation.

SEC. 21. Training and Employee Education
(a) The Secretary of Health and Human Services, after consultation with the Secretary and
with other appropriate Federal departments and agencies, shall conduct, illrectly or by grants
or contracts—

- education programs to provide an adequate supply of qualified personnel to carry out the purposes of this Act, and
- (2) Informational programs on the Importance of and proper use of adequate safety and health equipment.
- (b) The Secretary is also authorized to conduct, directly or by grants or contracts, short-term training of personnel engaged in work related to his responsibilities under this Act.
- (c) The Secretary, in consultation with the Secretary of Health and Human

#### Services, shall -

- (1) provide for the establishment and supervision of programs for the education and braining of employers and employees in the recognition, evolutions, and prevention of unsafe or unhealthful working conditions in employments covered by this Act, and
- (2) consult with and advise employers and employers, and organizations representing employers and employees as to effective means of preventing occupational injuries and litreases.

- (d) (1) The Secretary shall establish and support cooperative agreements with the States under which employers subject to this Act may consult with State personnel with respect to -
  - (A) the application of occupational safety and health requirements under this Act or under State plans approved under section 18; and
  - (6) voluntary efforts that employers may undertake to establish and maintain safe and healthful employment and places of employment. Such agreements may provide, as a condition of receiving funds under such agreements, for contributions by States toward meeting the costs of such agreements.
- (2) Pursuant to such agreements the State shall provide on-site consultation at the employer's worksite to employers who request such assistance. The State may also provide other education and training programs for employers and employees in the State. The State shall ensure that or site consultations conducted pursuant to such agreements include provision for the participation by employees.
- (3) Activities under this subsection shall be conducted independently of any enforcement activity. If an employer fails to take immediate action to enminate employee exposure to an imminent danger identified in a consultation or fails to correct a serious hazard so identified within a reasonable time, a report shall be made to the appropriate enforcement authority for such action as is appropriate.
- (4) The Secretary shall, by regulation after notice and opportunity for comment, establish rules under which an employer—
  - (A) which requests and undergoes an on-site consultative visit provided under this subsection;
- (B) which corrects the hazards that have been identified during the visit within the time frames established by the State and agrees to request a subsequent consultative visit if major changes in working conditions or work processes occur which introduce new hazards in the workplact; and
- (C) which is implementing procedures for regularly identifying and preventing hazards regulated under this Act and maintains appropriate involvement of, and training for, management and non-management employees in actieving safe and healthful working conditions, may be exempt from an inspection (except an inspection requested under section 8(f) of an inspection to determine the cause of a workplace excident which resulted in the death of one or more employees or hospitalization for three or more employees) for a period of 1 year from the closing of the consultainer visit.
- (5) A State shall provide worksite consultations under paragraph (2) at the

request of an employer. Priority in scheduling such consultations shall be

assigned to requests from small businesses which are in higher hazard industries or have the most hazardous conditions at leave in the request.

SEC. 22. National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (a) It is the purpose of this section to establish a National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health in the Department of Health and Human Services in order to carry out the policy set forth in section 2 of this Act and to perform the functions of the Secretary of Health and Human Services under sections 20 and 21 of this Act.

- (b) There is hereby established in the Department of Health and Human Services a Mational Institute for Occupational Safety and Health. The Institute shall be headed by a Director who shall be appointed by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and who shall serve for a term of six years unless previously removed by the Secretary of Health and Human Services.
- (c) The Institute is authorized to --
  - (1) develop and establish recommended occupational safety and health standards; and
  - (2) perform all functions of the Secretary of Health and Human Services under sections 20 and 21 of this Act,
- (d) Upon his own initiative, or upon the request of the Secretary of Health and Human Services, the Director is authorized (1) to conduct such research and experimental programs as he determine are necessary for the development of criteria for new and improved occupational safety and health standards, and (2) after consideration of the results of such research and experimental programs make recommendations concerning new or improved occupational safety and health standard recommended pursuant to this section shall immediately be forwarded to the Secretary of Labor, and to the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

- (e) In addition to any authority-vested in the Institute by other provisions of this section, the Director, in carrying out the functions of the Institute, is authorized to ...
  - prescribe such regulations as he deems necessary governing the manner in which its functions shall be carried out:
  - (2) receive money and other property donaled, bequeathed, or devised, without condition or restriction other than that it be used for the purposes of the institute and to use, sell, or otherwise dispose of such property for the purpose of carrying out its
- (3) receive (and use, sell, or otherwise dispose of, in accordance with paragraph (2)), money and other properly donated, bequeathed, or devised to the Institute with a condition or restriction, including a condition that the Institute use other funds of the Institute for the purposes of the gift;
- (4) in accordance with the civil service laws, appoint and fix the compensation of such personnel as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this section:
- (5) obtain the services of experts and consultants in accordance with the provisions of section 3109 of title 5, United Staties Code;
- (6) accept and utilize the services of voluntary and noncompensated personnel and reimburse them for travel expenses, including per clem, as authorized by section 5703 of title 5, United States Code;
- (7) enter into contracts, grants or other arrangements, or modifications thereof to carry out the provisions of this section, and such contracts or modifications thereof may be entered into without performance or other bonds, and without regard to section 3709 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (41 U.S.C. 5), or any other provision of law relating to competitive bidding;
- (8) make advance, progress, and other payments which the Director deems necessary under this title without regard to the provisions of section 3324 (a) and (b) of Tible 31:
- (9) make other necessary expenditures.

(f) The Director shall submit to the Secretary of Health and Human Services, to the President, and to the Congress on annual report of the operations of the Institute under this ACL, which shall include a detailed statement of all private and public funds received and expended by II, and such recommendations as he deems appropriate.

(g) Lead-Based Paint Activities.

- (1) Training Grant Program,
  - (A) The Institute, in conjunction with the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, may make grants for the training and education of workers and supervisors who are or may be directly engaged in lead-based point activities.

- (C) There are authorized to be appropriated, a minimum, \$10,000,000 to the institute for each of the fiscal years 1994 through 1997 to make grants under this

The Institute shall conduct periodic and comprehensive assessments of the efficiety of the worker and supervisor training orngrams developed and offered by those receiving grants under this section. The Director shall prepere reports on the results of these essessments addressed to the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency to Include recommendations as may be appropriate for the revision of these programs. The sum of \$500,000 is authorized to be appropriated to the Institute for each of the facel years 1994 through 1997 to carry out tivis paragraph.

## WORKERS' FAMILY PROTECTION

(a) Short title
This section may be cited as the "Workers' Family Protection Act".

#### (b) Findings and purpose

(1) Findings Congress finds that-

- Pub. L. 102-522, Title II, §209 added this best.
- (A) hazandous chemicals and substances that can threaten the health and safety of workers are being transported out of industries on workers' clothing and persons;
- (8) these chemicals and substances have the potential to pose an additional threat to the health and welfare of workers and their families;
- (C) additional information is needed concerning issues related to
- employee transported contaminant releases; and
- (D) additional regulations may be needed to prevent future releases of this type.
- (2) Purpose
  It is the purpose of this section to-
  - (A) increase understanding and evereness concerning the exterit and possible health impacts of the problems and incidents described in paragraph (1);
  - (B) prevent or mitigate future incidents of home contamination that could adversely affect the health and safety of workers and their families;
  - (C) clarify regulatory authority for preventing and responding to such incidents; and
  - (D) assist workers in recireasing and responding to such incidents when they occur.
- (c) Evaluation of employee transported contaminant releases

#### (1) Study

(A) In general Not lear then 18-months after October 26, 1992, the Director of the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (hereafter in this section referred to as the "Director"), in cooperation with the Secretary of Labor, the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, the Administrator of the Agency for Took: Substances and Disease Registry, and the heads of other Federal Government agencies as determined to be appropriate by the Director, shall conduct a study to evaluate the potential for, the provisience of, and the issues related to the contamination of workers' homes with hazardous chemicals and substances, including infectious agents, transported from the workplaces of such workers.

    - (IV) other government agencies (including the Department of Energy and the Environmental Protection Agency), as the Director may determine to be appropriate;
  - (ii) evaluate current statutory, regulatory, and voluntary industrial hygiene or other measures used by small, medium and large employers to prevent or remediate home contamination;
  - (III) compile a summary of the existing research and case histories conducted on incidents of employee transported contaminant releases, including—
    - the effectiveness of workplace housekeeping practices and personal protoctive equipment in preventing such incidents;
    - $(\Pi)$  the fealth effects, if any, of the resulting exposure on workers and their families;
    - (III) the effectiveness of normal house cleaning and laundry procedures for removing hazardous materials and agents from workers? homes and personal ciothing;
    - (IV) indoor air quality, as the research concerning such pertains to the fate of chemicals transported from a workplace into the home environment; and

- (V) methods for differentiating exposure health effects and relative risks associated with specific agents from other sources of exposure inside and outside the forms:
- (iv) Identify the role of Federal and State agencies in responding to incidents of home contamination;
- (v) prepare and submit to the Task Force established under paragraph (2) and to the appropriate committees of Congress, a report concerning the results of the matters studied or evaluated under clauses (i) through (iv); and
- (vi) study home contamination incidents and issues and worker and family protection policies and practices related to the special circumstances of firefighters and prepare and submit to the appropriate committees of Congress a report concerning the findings with respect to such study.
- (2) Development of Investigative strategy
  - (A) Task Fonce
    Not ster than 12 months after October 25, 1992, the Director shall establish a
    working group, to be known as the "Workers' Family Protection Task Fonce". The
    Task Fonce shall—
    - (i) be composed of not more than 15 individuals to be appointed by the Director from among individuals who are representative of workers, industry, actentists, industrial hygienists, the National Research Council, and government agencies, except that not more than one such individual shall be from each appropriate government agency and the number of individuals appointed to represent industry and workers shall be equal in number;
    - (II) review the report submitted under paragraph (1)(B)(v);
    - (III) determine, with respect to such report, the additional data needs, if any, and the need for additional evaluation of the scientific issues related to and the feasibility of developing such additional data; and
    - (iv) If additional data are determined by the Task Force to be needed, develop a recommended investigative strategy for use in obtaining such information.
  - (B) Investigative strategy
    - (i) Content
      The avestigative strategy developed under subparagraph (A)(iv) shall identify data gaps that can and cannot be filled, assumptions and uncertabiles associated with various components of such strategy, a timetable for the implementation of such strategy, and methodologies used to gather any required data.
    - (ii) Peer review
      The Director shall publish the proposed investigative strategy under subparagraph (A)(iv) for public comment and utilize other methods, including technical conferences or seminars, for the purpose of obtaining comments concerning the proposed strategy.
    - (iii) Final strategy
      After the peer review and public comment is conducted under clause
      (ii), the Director, in consultation with the heads of other povernment agencies, shall propose a final strategy for investigating issues related to agencies, shall propose a final strategy for investigating issues related to Coupational Safety and Health and other Federal agencies for the period of time necessary to enable such agencies to obtain the information identified under subparagraph (A)(III).
- (C) Construction Nothing in this section shall be construed as precluding any government agency from investigating issues related to home contamination using additing procedures until such time as a final strategy is developed or from taking actions in addition to those proposed in the strategy after its completion.
- (3) Implementation of investigative strategy Upon completion of the investigative strategy under subparagraph (B)(III), each Federal agency or department shall fulfill the role assigned to it by the strategy.
  - (d) Regulations
    - (1) In general

      Not later than 4 years after October 26, 1992, and periodically thereafter,
      the Secretary of Labor, based on the information developed under
      subsection (c) of this section and on other information available to the
      Secretary, shall—
      - (A) determine if additional education about, emphasis on, or enforcement of existing regulations or standards is needed and will be sufficient, or if additional regulations or standards are needed with regard to employee transported releases of hazardous materials; and

(B) prepare and submit to the appropriate committees of Congress a report concerning the result of such determination.

(2) Additional regulations or standards if the Secretary of Labor determines that additional regulations of standards are needed under paragraph (1), the Secretary shall promulgate, pursuant to the Secretary's authority under the Occupational Safety and Insalth Act of 1970 (29 U.S.C. 651 et seq.), see Comparisons or standards as determined to be appropriate not later than 3 years after such determination.

(e) Authorization of appropriations There are authorized to be appropriated from sums otherwise authorized to be appropriated, for each fiscal year such sums as may be necessary to carry out this section.

#### SEC. 23. Grants to the Status

(a) The Socretary is authorized, during the fiscel year ending June 30, 1971, and the two succeeding fiscal years, to make grants to the States which have designated a State agency under section 18 to assist them -

(1) in identifying their needs and responsibilities in the area of occupational safety and basith,

- (2) In developing State plans under section 18, or
- (3) in developing plans for --
  - (A) astablishing systems for the collection of information concerning the nature and frequency of occupational injuries and diseases;
  - (B) Increasing the expertise and enforcement capabilities of their personnel engaged in occupational safety and health programs; or
  - (C) otherwise improving the administration and enforcement of State occupational safety and health laws, including standards thereunder, consistent with the objectives of
- (b) The Secretary is authorized, during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1971, and the two succeeding fiscal years, to make grants to the States for experimental and demonstration projects consistent with the objectives set forth in subsection (a) of this section.
- (c) The Governor of the State shall designate the appropriate State agency for receipt of any grant made by the Secretary under this section.
- (d) Any State agency designated by the Governor of the State desiring a grant under this section shall submit an application therefor to the Secretary.
- (e) The Secretary shall review the application, and shall, after consultation with the Secretary of Health and Human Senures, approved by relief to the Secretary of alth and Human Services, approve or reject such application.
- (f) The Faderal share for each State grant under subsection (a) or (b) of this section may not exceed 90 per centum of the total cost of the application. In the event the Federal share for all States under either such subsection is not the same, the differences among the States shall be established on the basis of objective criteria.
- (g) The Secretary is authorized to make grants to the States to assist them in administering and enforcing programs for occupational safety and health contained in State plans approved by the Secretary pursuant to section 18 of this Act. The Federal share for each State grant under this subsection may not exceed 50 per centum of the total cost to the State of such a program. The last services of subsection (f) shall be applicable in determining the Federal share under this subsection.
- (h) Prior to June 30, 1973, the Secretary shall, after consultation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, transmit a report to the President and to the Congress, describing the experience under the grant programs authorized by this section and making any recommendations he may deem appropriate.

### SEC, 24. Statistics

- (a) In order to further the purposes of this Act, the Secretary, in consultation with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, shall develop and meintain an effective program of collection, compiletion, and analysis of occupational safety and health statistics. Such program may cover all employments whether or not subject to any other provisions of this Act, but shall not over employments excluded by section 4 of the Act. The Secretary shall compile accurate statistics on work infuries and lineases which shall include all disabling, serious, or significant injuries and filmsses, whether or not involving loss of time from work, other than minor injuries requiring only first aid treatment and which do not involve medical treatment, loss of consciousness, restriction of work or motion, or transfer to another job.
- (b) To carry out his duties under subsection (a) of this section, the Secretary may -
  - promote, encourage, or directly engage in programs of studies; information and communication concerning occupational safety and health statistics;

- (2) make grants to States or political subdivisions thereof in order to assist them in developing and administering programs dealing with occupational selety and health
- (3) arrange, through grants or contracts, for the conduct of such research and investigations as give promise of furthering the objectives of this section.
- (c) The Federal share for each grant under subsection (b) of this section may be up to 50 per centum of the State's total cost.
- (d) The Secretary may, with the consent of any State or political subdivision thereof, accept and use the services, facilities, and employees of the agencies of such State or political subdivision, with or without remoursement, in order to assist him in carrying out his functions under this section.
- (e) On the basis of the records made and kept pursuant to section 8(c) of this Act, employers shall file such reports with the Secretary as he shall prescribe by regulation, as necessary to carry out his furictions under this Act.
- (f) Agreements between the Department of Labor and States perteining to the collection of occupational safety and health statistics already in effect on the affective date of this Act shall remain in effect until supersaded by grants or curitracts made under this Act.

#### SEC. 25. Audits

(a) Each recipient of a grant under this Act shall keep such records as the Secretary or the 29 USC 574 Secretary of Health and Human Services shall prescribe, Including records which fully disclose the amount and disposition by such recipient of the proceeds of such grant, the total cost of the project or undertailing in connection with which such grant is made or used, and the amount of that portion of the cost of the project or undertaking supplied by other sources, and such other records as will facilitate an effective audit.

(b) The Secretary or the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and the Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their duly authorized representatives, shall have access for the purpose of audit and examination to any books, documents, papers, and records of the recipients of any grant under this Act that are pertinent to any such grant.

#### SEC. 26. Annual Report

Within one hundred and twenty days following the convening of each regular session of each 29 USC 675 Pub. Congress, the Secretary and the Secretary of Health and Human Services shell each prepare L 104-66 §3003 and submit to the President for transmittal to the Congress a report upon the subject matter terminated Congress, the secretary and one secretary or research and number services shell each prepare and submit to the President for brasmittal to the Congress a report upon the subject matter of this Act, the progress toward achievement of the purpose of this Act, the needs and requirements in the field of occupational safety and health, and any other relevant information. Such reports shall include information regarding occupational safety and health standards, and criteria for such standards, developed under this Act, defining areas of emphasis for new criteria and standards; an evaluation of the degree of observance of applicable occupational safety and health standards, and a summary of inspection and enforcement activity undertaken; analysis and evaluation of research activities for which results have been obtained under governmental and nungovernmental sponsorship, an analysis of major occupational diseases; evaluation of available control and measurement advances and other interested parties in the implementation of the Act, during the preceding year, a progress report on the development of an adequate supply of barried mempower in the field of occupational safety and health, including estimates of future needs and the efforts being reade by Government and others to meet those needs; listing of all towa substances in indistribut usage for which isbeling requirements, criteria, or standards have not yet been established; and such recommendations for additional legislation as are deemed necessary to protect the safety and health of the worker and improve the administration of this Act.

#### HISTORICAL NOTES

This reprint generally retains the section numbers originally created by Congress in the Occupational Safety and Health (OSH) Act of 1970, Pub, L. P1-596, 84 Stat 1590. This document includes some expensional changes, such as changing the format to make it easier to read, correcting typographical errors, and updating some of the margin notes. Because Congress enacted amendments to the Act since 1970, this version differs from the original version of the OSH Act. It also differs slightly from the version published in the United States Code at 29 U.S.C. 661 et seg., For example, this reprint refers to the statute as the "Act" rather than the "chapter."

This reprint reflects the provisions of the OSH Act that are in effect as of January 1, 2004. Chations to Public Laws which made important amendments to the OSH Act since 1970 are set forth in the margins and explanatory notes are included below.

NOTE: Same provisions of the OSH Act may be affected by the energiment of, or amendments to, other statutes. Section 17(h)(1), 29 U.S.C. 666, is an example. The original provision amended section 1114 of the 18 of the United States Code to include employees of "the Department of Labor assigned to perform anvestigative, inspection, or law enforcement functions" within the list of persons protected by the provisions to allow prosecution of persons who have tilted or attempted to kill an officer or employee of the U.S. government white performing official duties. This reprint sets forth the text of section 17(h) as enacted in 1970. However, since 1970, Congress has enacted multiple amendments to 18 U.S.C. 1114. The current version does not specifically include the Department of Labor in a list; rather it states that "Vincever kills or attempts to kill any officer or employee of the United States or of any agency in any branch of the United States Government (including any member of the uniformed services) while such officer or employee is engaged in or on account of the performance of official duties, or any person essisting such an officer or employee in the performance of official duties, or any person essisting such an officer or employee in the performance of the united States can be found in the current volumes of the United States Code, and more extensive historical notes can be found in the current volumes of the United States Code Annotated.

#### Amendments

On January 2, 1974, section 2(c) of Pub. L. 93-237 replaced the phrese "7(b)(6)" in section 28(d) of the OSH Act with "7(b)(5)". 87 Stat. 1023 Note: The text of Section 28 (Economic Assistance to Small Business) emended Sections 7(b) and Section 4(c)(1) of the Small Business Act. Because these amendments are no longer current, the text of section 28 is omitted in this represt. For the current version, see 15 U.S.C. 636.

In 1977, the U.S. entered into the Panama Canal Treaty of 1977, Sept. 7, 1977, U.S.-Panama, T.I.A.S. 10030, 33 U.S.T. 39, In 1979, Congress enacted implementing legislation, Panama Canal Act of 1979, Pub. L. 96-70, 93 Stat. 452 (1979). Although no corresponding amendment to the OSH Act was enacted, the Canal Zone ceased to exist in 1976. The U.S. continued to manage, operate and facilitate the transit of ships through the Canal under the authority of the Panama Canal Treaty until December 31, 1995, at which time authority over the Canal was transferred to the Republic of Panama.

On March 27, 1978, Pub. L. 95-251, 92 Stat. 183, replaced the larm "hearing examinar(e)" with "administrative law judge(s)" in all federal laws, including sections 12(e), 12(j), and 12(k) of the OSH Act, 29 U.S.C. 661.

On October 13, 1978, Pub. 1, 95-454, 92 Stat. 1111, 1221, which redesignated section numbers concerning personnel matters and compensation, regulard in the substitution of section 5372 of Title 5 for section 5352 in section 12(e) of the OSH Act, 29 U.S.C. 661.

On October 17, 1979, Pub. L. 96-88, Title V, section 509(b), 93 Stat. 668, 695, reclasignated references to the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to the Department of Health and Human Services and redesignated references to the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare to the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

On September 13, 1982, Pub. L. 97-258, §4(b), 96 Stat. 877, 1867, effectively substituted "Section 3324(a) and (b) of Title 31" for "Section 3648 of the revised Statutes, as amended (31 U.S.C. 529)" in section 22 (e)(8), 29 U.S.C. 671, relating to MIOSH procurement authority.

On December 21, 1982, Pub. L. 97-375, 96 Stat. 1819, deleted the sentence in section 19(b) of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 668, that directed the President of the United States to transmit annual reports of the activities of fiederal agencies to the House of Representatives and the Sanate.

On October 12, 1994, Pub. L. 98-473, Chapter II, 98 Stat. 1837, 1987, (commonly referred to as the "Sentencing Reform Act of 1984") instituted a classification system for critical offenses purishable under the United States Code. Under this system, an offense with hyprisonment terms of "six months or less but more than thirty days," such as that found in 29 U.S.C, 566(a) for a willful violation of the OSH Act, is classified as a criminal "Class B misdemeanor," 18 U.S.C. 3559(a)(7).

The criminal code increases the monetary penalties for criminal misdemeanors beyond what is provided for in the OSH Act: a fine for a class 8 misdemeanor resulting in death, for example, is not more than \$250,000 for an individual, and is not more than \$250,000 for an organization. 18 U.S.C. 3571(b)(4), (c)(4). The criminal code also provides for authorized terms of probation for both individuals and organizations. 18 U.S.C. 3551, 3561. The term of impresonment for individuals is the same as that authorized by the OSH Act. 18 U.S.C. 3581(b)(7).

On November 8, 1984, Pub. L. 98-620, 98 Spat. 3335, deleted the last sentence in section 11(a) of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 668, that required petitions filed under the subsection to be heard expeditiously.

On November 5, 1990, Pub. L. 101-508, 104 Stat. 1388, amended section 17 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 666, by increasing the penalties in section 17(a) from \$10,000 for each violation to "\$70,000 for each violation, but not less stan \$5,000 for each wilkful violation," and increased the immation on penalties in sections (b), (c), (d), and (f) from \$1,000 to \$7,000.

On October 26, 1992, Pub. L. 102-522; 106 Stat. 3410; 3420, added to Title 29, section 671a "Workers' Family Protection" to graint authority to the Director of NIOSH to evaluate, investigate and if necessary, for the Secretary of Labor to regulate employee transported releases of hazardous material that result from contamination on the employee's dotting or person and may adversely affect the health and safety of workers and their families. Note, section 671a was enacted as section 209 of the Fire Administration Authorization Act of 1992, but it is reprinted here because it is codified within the chapter that comprises the OSH Act.

On October 28, 1992, the Housing and Community Development Act of 1992, Pub. L. 102-550; 105 Stat. 3672, 3924, amended section 22 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 671, by adding subsection (g), which requires MTOSH to institute a training grant program for lead-based paint activities.

On July 5, 1994, section 7(b) of Pub. L. 103-272, 108 Stat. 745, repealed section 31 of the OSH Act, "Emergency Locator Beacons," Section 1(e) of the same Public Law, however, effected a modified version of section 31 of the OSH Act. This provision, titled "Emergency Locator Transmitters," is codified at 49 U.S.C. 44712.

On December 21, 1995, Section 3003 of Pub. L. 104-66, 109 Stat. 707, as amended, effective May 15, 2000, barmnared the provisions relating to the transmittal to Congress of reports under section 25 of the OSH Act. 29 U.S.C. 675.

On July 16, 1998, Pub. L. 105-197, 112 Stat. 638, amended section 21 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 670, by adding subsection (d), which required the Secretary to establish a compliance assistance program by which employers can consult with state personnel regarding the application of and compliance with OSHA standards.

On July 16, 1998, Pub. I., 105-198, 112 Stat. 640, amended section 8 of the Act, 29 U.S.C. 657, by adding subsection (h), which forbids the Secretary to use the results of enforcement activities to evaluate the employees involved in such enforcement or to impose quotas or goals.

On September 29, 1996, Pub. L. 105-241, 112 Stat. 1572, amended sections 3(5) and 19(a) of the Act, 29 LLS.C. 652 and 668, to include the United States Postal Service as an "employer" subject to OSHA enforcement.

On June 12, 2002, Pub. L. 107-188, Title I; Section 153, 116 Stat. 531, Congress enacted 29 U.S.C. 669s, to respond research on the "health and safety of workers who are at risk for bioterrorist threats or attacks in the workplace."

#### Surjedictional Note

Although no corresponding amendments to the OSH Act have been made, OSHA no longer exercises jurisdiction over the entity formenly known as the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, The Trust Territory, which consisted of the Former

Japanese Mandated Islands, was established in 1947 by the Security Council of the United Nations, and administered by the United States. *Trusteesing Agraement for the Former Japanese Mandated Islands*, Apr. 2-July 18, 1947, 61 Stat. 3301, T.I.A.S. 1665, B U.M.T.S. 189.

From 1947 to 1994, the people of these islands exercised the right of self-determination conveyed by the Trusteetho four times, resulting in the division of the Trust Territory into four separate critics. Three entities: the Republic of Peiau, the Federated States of Micronesia, and the Republic of the Mershall Islands, became "Freely Associated States," to which U.S. Federal Law does not apply. Since the OSH Act, is a generally applicable law that significant to Guann, it applies to the Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands, which elected to become a "Fing Territory" of the United States. Combined Texts. Reasons for textual deletions very. Some deletions may result from amendments to the OSH Act; others to subsequent amendments to other statutes which the original provisions of the OSH Act may have amended in 1970. In some instances, the original provision of the OSH Act was date-limited and is no imager

The text of section 12(c), 29 U.S.C. 661, is omitted. Subsection (c) amended sections 5314 and 5315 of Title 5, United States Code, to add the positions of Chairman and members of the Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission.

The text of section 27, 29 U.S.C. 676, is omitted. Section 27 listed Congressional findings on workers' compensation and established the National Commission on State Workman's Compensation Laws, which ceased to exist ninety days after the submission of its final report, which was due no later than July 31, 1972.

The text of section 26 (Economic Assistance to Small Business) amended sections 7(b) and section 4(c)(1) of the Small Business Act to allow for small business loans in order to comply with applicable standards. Because these amendments are no longer current, the text is omitted here. For the current version see 15 U.S.C. 636.

The text of section 29, (Additional Assistant Secretary of Labor), created an Assistant Secretary for Occupational Safety and Health, and section 30 (Additional Positions) created additional positions within the Department of Labor and the Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission in order to carry out the provisions of the OSH Act. The text of these sections is omitted here because it no longer reflects the current statutory provisions provisions, see 29 U.S.C. SS3 and 5 U.S.C. 5108 (c).

Section 31 of the original OSH Act amended 49 U.S.C. 1421 by inserting a section entitled "Emergency Locator Beacons." The text of that section is ornitized in this reprint because Pub. L. 103-272, 108 Stat.745, (July 5, 1994), repealed the text of section 31 and enacted a modified version of the provision, entitled "Emergency Locator Transmitters," which is codified at 49 U.S.C. 44712.

Notes on other legislation affecting the administration of the Occupational Safety and Resith Act. Sometimes legislation does not directly amend the OSH Act, but does place requirements on the Secretary of Labyr either to act or to refrain from acting under the authority of the OSH Act. Included below are some examples of such legislation. Please note that this is not intended to be a comprehensive list.

#### STANDARDS PROMULGATION.

For example, legislation may require the Secretary to promulgate specific standards pursuant to authority under section 6 of the OSH Act, 29 U.S.C. 655. Some examples include the following:

Hazardaus Waste Operations: Pub. L. 99-499, Tale I, section 126(a)-(f), 100 Stat. 1613 (1986), as amended by Pub. L. 100-202, section 101(f), Title II, section 201, 101 Stat. 1329 (1987), required the Secretary of Labor to promulgate standards concerning hazardous waste operations.

Chemical Process Selety Management: Pub. L. 101-549, Title 111, section 304, 104 Stat. 2399 (1990), required the Secretary of Labor, in coordination with the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, to promulgate a chemical process safety standard.

Hazardous Materials. Pub. L. 101-615, section 29, 104 Stat. 3244 (1990), required the Secretary of Labor, in consultation with the Secretaries of Transportation and Treasury, to Issue specific standards concerning the Iranding of Rezerdous materials.

Bibodbarne Pathogens Standard, Pub. L. 102-170, Title I, section 100, 105 Stat. 1107 (1991), required the Secretary of Labor to promulgate a final Bibodbarne Pathogens standard.

Lead Standard. The Housing and Community Development Act of 1992, Pub. L. 102-550, Title X, sections 1031 and 1032, 106 Stat. 3672 (1992), required the Secretary of Labor to Issue an Interim final lead standard.

#### EXTENSION OF COVERAGE

Sometimes a statute may make some OSH Act provisions applicable to certain critics that are not subject to titude provisions by the terms of the OSH Act. For example, the Congressional Accountability Act of 1995, Pub. L. 104-1, 109 Stat. 3, (1995), extended certain OSH Act coverage, such as the duty to comply with Section 5 of the OSH Act, to the Legislature Branch. Amenig other provisions, this legislation authorizes the General Coursel of the OSH act, to the Legislature Branch and Issue a citation or notice to correct the violation found. This statute does not make all the provisions of the OSH Act applicable to the Legislature Branch. Another example is the Medicare Prescription Drug, Improvement, and Modernization Act of 2003, Title IX, Section 947, Pub. L. 108-173, 117 Stat. 2055 (2003), which requires public hospitals not otherwise subject to the OSH Act to comply with OSHA's Bloodborne Pethogens standard, 29 CPR 1910.1030. This statute provides for the Imposition and collection of civil money peralities by the Department of Health and Human Services in the event that a hospital falls to comply with OSHA's Bloodborne Pethogens standard.

## PROGRAM CHANGES ENACTED THROUGH APPROPRIATIONS LEGISLATION.

Sometimes an approprietions statute may allow or restrict certain substantive actions by OSHA or the Secretary of Labor. For example, sometimes an appropriations statute may restrict the use of money appropriated to run the Occapational Series and Health Administration or the Department of Labor. One example of such a restriction, that has been included in OSHA's appropriation for many years, limits the applicability of OSHA requirements with respect to ferming operations that employ ten or fewer workers and do not maintain a temporary labor camp. Another example is a restriction that limits OSHA's authority to conduct certain emforcement activity with respect to employers of ten or fewer employees in low beared industries. See Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2004, Pub. L. 108-199, OM. E.—Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and Related Agendes Appropriations, 2004, Title I.—Department of Labor, 118 Stat. 3 (2004). Sometimes an appropriations statute may allow OSHA to retain some money collected to use for occupational safety and health training or grants. For example, the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2004, OM. E. Title I., cited above, allows OSHA to retain up to \$750,000 of training institute course tuition fees per fiscal year for such uses. For the statutory text of currently applicable appropriations provisions, consult the OSHA appropriations statute for the fiscal year in question.

## **PURCHASING AFFIDAVIT**

MANDATE: Under W. Va. Code §5A-3-10a, no contract or renewal of any contract may be awarded by the state or any of its political subdivisions to any vendor or prospective vendor when the vendor or prospective vendor or a related party to the vendor or prospective vendor is a debtor and: (1) the debt owed is an amount greater than one thousand dollars in the aggregate; or (2) the debtor is in employer default.

**EXCEPTION:** The prohibition listed above does not apply where a vendor has contested any tax administered pursuant to chapter eleven of the W. Va. Code, workers' compensation premium, permit fee or environmental fee or assessment and the matter has not become final or where the vendor has entered into a payment plan or agreement and the vendor is not in default of any of the provisions of such plan or agreement.

#### **DEFINITIONS:**

"Debt" means any assessment, premium, penalty, fine, tax or other amount of money owed to the state or any of its political subdivisions because of a judgment, fine, permit violation, license assessment, defaulted workers' compensation premium, penalty or other assessment presently delinquent or due and required to be paid to the state or any of its political subdivisions, including any interest or additional penalties accrued thereon.

"Employer default" means having an outstanding balance or liability to the old fund or to the uninsured employers' fund or being in policy default, as defined in W. Va. Code § 23-2c-2, failure to maintain mandatory workers' compensation coverage, or failure to fully meet its obligations as a workers' compensation self-insured employer. An employer is not in employer default if it has entered into a repayment agreement with the Insurance Commissioner and remains in compliance with the obligations under the repayment agreement.

"Related party" means a party, whether an individual, corporation, partnership, association, limited liability company or any other form or business association or other entity whatsoever, related to any vendor by blood, marriage, ownership or contract through which the party has a relationship of ownership or other interest with the vendor so that the party will actually or by effect receive or control a portion of the benefit, profit or other consideration from performance of a vendor contract with the party receiving an amount that meets or exceed five percent of the total contract amount.

AFFIRMATION: By signing this form, the vendor's authorized signer affirms and acknowledges under penalty of law for false swearing (*W. Va. Code* §61-5-3) that neither vendor nor any related party owe a debt as defined above and that neither vendor nor any related party are in employer default as defined above, unless the debt or employer default is permitted under the exception above.
