Emergency Purchase Request Form for Central Purchases (WV-45)

Statutory Authority: Pursuant to West Virginia Code §5A-3-15 and 148 C.S.R. 1-7.6, the director may authorize, in writing, a state spending unit to purchase in the open market, without filing requisition or estimate, specific commodities for immediate delivery to meet bona fide emergencies arising from unforeseen causes.

Follow-up Award Requirements: Effective July 1, 2024, agencies are delegated the authority, upon written approval, to process all emergency purchases as agency contracts. Agencies must submit all contract documents to Purchasing.Division@wv.gov no later than 30 days of issuance.

Description of the emergency circumstance(s) that led to this emergency purchase request:

West Virginia State of Emergency Declaration, June 26, 2026, for Boone, Logan and Raleigh Counties following severe storms, flash flooding, landslides that damaged homes, business, roads, bridges and other infrastructure. Slow moving storm systems on June 22nd, produced damaging winds and heavy rainfall across the region. Rainfall totals exceeded six inches, overwhelming waterways, drainage systems, and transportation infrastructure. See Page 2

Proposed remedy:

Request for contract to include Boone, Logan and Raleigh Counties to remove debris impacting the streams and stream banks. Contract involve providing labor and equipment necessary to remove flood debris from impacted areas. See Page 2

Description of emergency circumstances that led to this emergency purchase request:

Roads damaged or blocked by mud and debris. Fast-moving water, mud, and debris can make roads unsafe for the public. Cleaning up the debris from streams and stream banks is needed for public safety. If the debris is not removed from the streams and stream banks and another severe storm comes through the area, the safety of the public will be in jeopardy.

Proposed remedy:

Required equipment that is needed to remove the debris from the impacting streams and stream banks:

- 89 hp minimum excavator with hydraulic or fixed thumb
- 2 on highway dump trucks minimum 250hp or 15 CY bed capacity
- 2 laborers with chainsaw and hand tools
- Tractor with Lowboy or Tag along

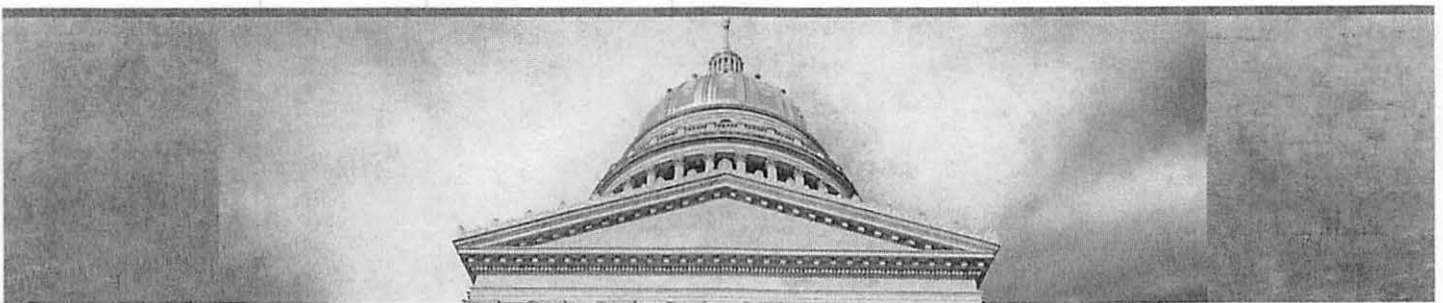
Proposed Duration / Quantity:

Duration of labor and equipment is 100 hours per contract. As clean-up efforts move forward, additional hours may be required to meet flood damage requirements and public safety and will be addressed at that time.

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GOVERNOR MORRISEY DECLARES STATE OF EMERGENCY FOR BOONE, LOGAN, AND RALEIGH COUNTIES

June 24, 2026

CHARLESTON, W.Va. - Governor Patrick Morrisey has declared a State of Emergency for Boone, Logan, and Raleigh counties following severe storms, flash flooding, and landslides that impacted communities across southern West Virginia.

"Protecting the safety of West Virginians remains our top priority," **said Governor Morrisey.** "My administration is working closely with local officials and emergency personnel to ensure affected communities have the resources they need as recovery efforts continue."

Beginning on June 22, a series of slow-moving storm systems produced damaging winds and heavy rainfall across the region. In some locations, rainfall totals exceeded six inches, overwhelming waterways, drainage systems, and transportation infrastructure. Throughout the evening of June 23, and into this morning, new reports of damage to homes, businesses, roads, bridges, and other property were communicated to the state.

State officials have been working with county commissioners, emergency managers, first responders, and local leaders to assess conditions on the ground as additional reports of flooding and storm damage have continued to emerge. Based on those assessments and the evolving needs identified by local officials, Governor Morrisey determined that a State of Emergency declaration was warranted.

Governor Morrisey has ordered personnel and resources to prepare to mobilize and respond to any emergency that may develop and has delegated certain administrative powers to the Director of the West Virginia Emergency Management Division to facilitate the provision of essential emergency services. State agencies, including the West Virginia Emergency Management Division, Division of Highways, and West Virginia National Guard, remain engaged in response and recovery efforts and are coordinating closely with local officials.

Residents are encouraged to remain alert, monitor local weather conditions, and follow instructions from local emergency management officials. Additional information will be provided as damage assessments and recovery operations continue.

The State of Emergency will remain in effect for 30 days unless terminated earlier by the Governor.
